SOLUTION TO BRIDGE HAND

Bidding

South	West	North	East
1S	Pass	2C	Pass
2S	Pass	3S	Pass
4S	Pass	Pass	Pass

South's opening bid is based on 14 points. North's hand is too good for a single raise (6-10 points) as there are 11 points. North's procedure is to show his own suit first and to raise the spades later if South can rebid the suit. After North's response of two clubs South merely rebids his spades, showing 11/12 points. South has no hesitation in accepting the invitation to game.

Play

West opens the six of hearts, and South plans the play. South is in danger of losing one spade, two hearts and a club. He must find a way to reduce this loss by one trick.

East plays the ten of hearts at the first trick, and South wins the king. South realizes that he can obtain one discard on dummy's king of diamonds. What should he discard? South decides to discard a heart on dummy's king of diamonds. At trick 2 South leads the ace of spades to draw a round of trumps. He cannot draw a second trump, since then the opponents would take the king of spades and lead hearts before South has obtained his discard. South cannot afford to give up the lead. Next step is to cash the ace of diamonds in order to get it out of the way. He cannot discard on dummy's king of diamonds until he has first cleared the road by taking the ace of diamonds. Next South leads a club to dummy's ace. It is necessary to reach dummy in order to take the king of diamonds. South dares not risk the club finesse since that would give the opponents a chance to cash their heart tricks. After taking the ace of clubs Declarer cashes the king of diamonds in order to discard one of the hearts. This is the key play of the hand. Declarer can then go about the business of drawing the rest of the trumps. He gives up a trump trick to the king of spades, whereupon the opponents try to take their heart tricks. South ruffs the ace of hearts with a high trump in order to make sure that he cannot be overruffed. He then draws the last trump and sets up another club trick by knocking out the king of clubs. South wins the last three tricks with his two trumps and dummy's high club.
