Yarrowlumla Shire Notes (courtesy Cr David Robertson)

Sutton & Norton Roads Intersection : The DMR has advised that lines will be painted on the road when a painting gang is in the area. This was expected to occur in June but failed to eventuate.

Bingley Way Reserve : The Shire Council has voted \$ 1000 for material for the provision of a septic tank, water tank and pipes for toilets where the Pony Club area is. A working party from residents will shortly be formed to provide the necessary labour to get the job done.

Bus Shelters : Following a request from the Community Association, the Council has agreed to provide two bus shelters on Norton Road at the ends of Cooper and Poppett Roads. The Council is presently investigating the best type that is available and they should appear shortly.

Army Firing Range at Majura : Following the heavy weapons firings on 10 Feb 83, complaints were made by Arthur Sibley and some of the residents of Bidges Road about the distress caused to some elderly residents and the terror exhibited by animals. These complaints were forwarded by Mr Jim Snow M.F. to the Minister for Defence. The Minister replied that the Army had to train, that the Majura Range was essential and that the opening of the Australian Defence Force Academy would result in even more practice firings. The Council has replied that it regards this reply as unsatisfactory. It does not dispute the Army need for firing ranges and has no objection to small arms practice, however, it would like some assurance that the Army is seeking alternative areas for heavy weapon_firing practice, well away from heavily settled areas.

Development Plan for the Shire : Because the majority of development in the Shire is taking place in this area, Council has decided not to wait for the completion of the major task of preparing a Local Environment Plan (LEP) for the whole Shire but to prepare a separate LEP for the area bounded by : the ACT border in the South, the Sutton Rd in the West, the Gunning Shire border in the North and Lake and Gundaroo Roads in the East. Wamboin takes up a considerable amount of this area. It is hoped that the draft LEP will be completed in time for the August Council Meeting.

As part of this project a short 'demographic' questionnaire is being sent to all residents and landowners in the area. The questions are few and simple ; how many live on the property, age brackets , where children go to school etc. This survey is important and will help Council to ascertain what recreation facilities, public halls, schools, health facilities and so on are needed in the area. Please complete your questionnaire promptly and return it in the stamped addressed envelope that will be provided.

BEEKEEPING

Quite a few residents have taken up Beekeeping to produce Honey and complain at how difficult the task is. Take some comfort in the following article which appeared in the 1974 issue of "World Crops" :

"India's production of honey and beeswax dropped by 50% in 1972 and conservationists must take the blame. The fall in production reflects problems caused by the ban on the hunting of TIGERS. As a result of the ban, in 1972, no less than 29 honey and beeswax collecters were devoured by man-eating tiger which in former days would have been shot. The number of tigers in India's forests is estimated (1974) to be in excess of 2000 and doubtless their numbers will be allowed to increase until they make a meal of a prominent conservationist instead of a humble beeswax collector.

WAMBOIN COMMUNITY HALL

The grand plan we had last year of building a suitable community centre at the Bingley Way Reserve to cost \$ 80 000 plus labour dosn't look like eventuating for some years to come. However, our need is now as we already have a pressing need for a meeting place for Scouts, Pony Club, General Meetings and the like.

Accepting that the community centre will probably be co-located with the future school some time in the future, we have lowered our sights somewhat to accommodate our present urgent needs. We believe that Council could possibly provide an amount of \$ 12 000 almost immediately for the construction of a Shed type building complete with concrete floor about 30 feet by 60 feet in dimensions so that is what we are looking at at present. A building sub-committee has now been formed by the Wamboin Community Council to address the matter urgently.

When it is built, and we hope such will be the case this year, we will need funds of our own for lining, electrical reticulation and connection, heating, curtains, floor coverings, cooking facilities, water connection etc etc.

A start has already been made on the raising of funds for this purpose and \$ 157.52 was raised on our bonfire night through the sale of refreshments. (well done ladies !)

"ALL C MATURES GAMAT & SAMEL" - a continuing series of topical Veterinary information by local Vet. Dr. BLAIR LAMONT.

The turn of the seasons is on us again, and with the onset of the "Porridge season", some discussion on <u>BOTS in Horses</u>. Adult Bot flies hatch from pupae in the warmer months and in the course of their short 4 day life, dart about the horse and lay eggs on the hairs, especially the leg area: The eggs remain infective for about 7 weeks, and they break open and hatch when rubbed and licked by the horse. The larvae burrow into the lips and tongue for a month or so, then reemerge in the throat area and are swallowed. They then develope to adult bots, and live attached to the stomach wall for several months. When winter is passed and the warmer weather returns, the Bot grubs detach and pass out in the droppings, where they pupate and eventually hatch to Bot flies in a month or so.

Most damage from Nots is probably caused by the "Stampeding" of the horses when the adult flies are laying eggs - as the Bot larvae and grubs seldon cause trouble in the horse - in 24 years of practice, I remember only one aged horse which developed a stomach perforation! However, prevention is highly recommended as they must do some minor damage.

A large percentage can be prevented from hatching, by removing the eggs from the hairs as often as possible, or soaking the eggs in eg. Malawash Solution, twice weekly. However, in many cases this is not practicable, and some Bots will end up in the stomach - but bear in mind this is at least a couple of months after the eggs were laid! So do not rush in too early with Bot pastes/drenches, we advise wait until hAY, then repeat treatment in AUGUST; this gives a good kill of the early and late Bot grubs, and few will survive to drop out and recommence the cycle.

In theory, as no Bots can survive over winter outside the horse, if every horse was treated thice during winter, we could practically wipe out the menace in one season!

From the above, it can be seen that treatment with BOT & WORM combinations is required late Autumn and Winter, so the other intermittent treatmentneed only be for WORDS - but more on that in the future.

As most Anti-Bot chemicals can be toxic to horses it is important to calculate the dose accurately - otherwise diarrhoea and nervous signs may arise.

<u>HYDATID</u> tape worms are in the news these days, and it is heartening to see the local councils giving such strong support. It is to be hoped that all amboin residents will heed the warnings and observe the precautions, which will be amply publicised over the next few months in the Hydatid Control Campaign.

Perhaps I can clarify some points on which we are often queried: ie: the Hydatid tape orm is virtually invisable to the naked eye, it only infects dogs (not cats), and it is picked up by ingestion of internal org ns of sheep and kongaroos particularily. The "eggs" which pass out in the dogs facees, if ingested by a human, may develope into the Cypts which cause Hydatosis.

It is probable that immunity arises in mony humans if repeatedly

exposed to infection, but if the initial contact is severe, or if immunity is absent or insufficient, then the disease can become ostablished, often with fatal consequences. As there is no way of assessing immunity we should all take precautions at all times, by dosing all dogs with possible exposure to dead sheep/ kangaroos etc (virtually all Wamboin canines??). Use <u>DAONOIT</u> tablets every 6 weeks (obtainable from any Vet, or at a subsidised rate from the Yargalumla Shire office). There is also recently available a palatable granule form of Droncit for anyone who may have problems dosing with tablets.

Do not confuse the Hydatid tapeworm with the Common Dog (& Cat) tapeworm. The segments of these may be seen in the facces or attached to the coat in the tail area (look like flattened rice-grains and may be con-joined): the intermediate host is the dog/cat <u>FLEA</u>, and it is unlikely that human disease would arise. Treatment is adecuately covered by the above Droncit régime, and prevention lies in eliminating fleas.

So much for this episode - till next time - GOOD HEALTH!
