CAROLS NIGHT 11 December

Despite a bleak night fifteen families turned out for a rousing Christmas Carols evening at Wamboin Park last Sunday week. A joyous and festive evening was had by all and at the (damp/cold) conclusion, Fran Pennay collected for the annual Wamboin Salvation Army Christmas Appeal. Remember, we all have our financial difficulties, particularly this time of the year, but there are thousands of fellow Australians far worse off, especially neglected children. Please don't close your hearts to them just because you missed the carols evening.

COMMUNITY HALL

You may recall that we had previously submitted to Council a request for funds to build a multi-purpose Community Hall at Wamboin Park in Bingley Way. The estimated total cost would have been about \$80 000 with considerable labour being provided by community members.

Due to doubts as to where permanent community facilities would or should be located, in consequence of future land releases in the area, and of course, the very large sum involved for such an excellent facility, this request has been deferred by Council. Hopefully, the proposed major construction will eventually be funded as a Bi-Centenary project.

(For those newer members of Wamboin we see the need for a Hall to be the venue for the following types of activities, many of which are presently held in private homes:

Community meetings.....Pony Club, Scouts, Cubs & Guides Hobbies & Recreation Clubs.....Child minding......Dancing.. Youth social clubs.....Rural Weddings, Church services etc etc)

As an interim solution to this urgent community need, a proposal has now been put to Council for the funding of a 60' x 30' steel shed (including a full length verandah) and concrete floor. Priorities for funding following that required for the "Hall" have been advised to Council as follows:

- ...connection of electricity (incl existing toilet block)
 ...water tank to service the Hall and toilets or pumping
 system for the existing bore
- ...internal heating for the Hall (pot-belly stove?)
- ... grading of cricket area and laying of a concrete strip

The proposed steel shed will be to the same standard as that provided by Council to the Burra community recently. It will be made of colour bonded steel (olive green) which looks quite attractive at Burra and blends in well with the local environment.

IT IS UNDERSTOOD THAT FUNDS ARE AVAILABLE FOR THIS PROJECT AND THAT IT IS HOPED TO BE COMPLETED BY MARCH 1984

(The Community Association believes that it is acting in the general interest of all community members in this regard. If any resident has any serious objections to the proposal they should contact the President -Max Heron to express their views)

TOILET HUT

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Most of you will be aware that a Toilet Hut is already located at Wamboin Park but it is not sewer connected and is also in need of repair. \$1000 has already been allocated by Council for this purpose and hopefully work will commence soon after Christmas.

BUS SHELTERS

These are to be provided and installed by Council as soon as the Norton Road upgrading works have been completed. It is understood that road works will include widening, surface repair, bus pull-off bays, line marking and the provision of speed restriction and caution signs.

FUTURE LABOUR NEEDS

Early in the New Year it is hoped to bring many long standing projects to fruition. These will include:

...Community Hall - lining of walls/ceiling, painting, landscaping & general internal decoration

... Toilet Block - Repairs, painting & plumbing

... Pony Club Area - Fencing to replace the un-sightly tyres and the construction of Jumps etc

Apart from the social/community needs for these facilities, their development also adds to the value of all our properties. If you can provide labour on a casual or regular basis, professional or skilled services, equipment, materials or grants of MONEY to help these projects to completion, please contact the Association President-(Max Heron)

MORNING CHILDRENS SECURITY DUTIES

We are all very concerned about the physical security of our community school children especially while they are waiting for the School Buses on busy Norton Road in the mornings. At that time, many thoughtless residents roar along Norton Road trying not to be late for work and building workmen unfamiliar with the area are arriving at Wamboin - at speed!

Although some parents supervise their children and stop them from straying or playing on the road, other parents are not able to do so

for a variety of reasons.

Norton Road is a very dangerous place for young children to be left unattended between the hours of 7.30 and 8.30 am. The problem is not so bad when they return from School in the evenings as they disperse quickly and drivers never seem to be in so much of a hurry. The Community Association Committee is considering the possibility of starting a roster system of adults or older children to supervise children at bus stops on Norton Road on school mornings with the added task of also ensuring that the school buses don't leave half the children behind as they are wont to do of late due to irregular timings.

NEW HIGHWAY SYSTEM

It is understood that by 1988 the Federal Highway is to be re-aligned virtally in a straight line between Goulburn and Canberra. An aspect that is of considerable interest to us is that a "fly-over" is to be constructed where Sutton Road crosses. As we are all aware, the present junction is extremely dangerous, especially for the lumbering school buses.

We are also advised that as part of this project (Bi-Centenary National Road Plan), the Sutton Road is to be considerably upgraded.

of course, we would all prefer that Sutton Road was not used by heavy transports and the snow traffic, all of which pays scant regard to the speed limit and the dangerous-bends' speed control signs' as only by the Grace of God have innocent families not been involved with the recent spate of Semi-trailer smashes. However, there appears to be little hope of stopping this type of traffic on a road that was never designed for such heavy use.

Council at its Special Meeting altered the times and dates of the Council meetings. In future, Council meetings will commence at 5.30 p.m. and will be held on the third Tuesday of each month. There has been a proviso attached that no new business will be transacted after 9.30 p.m. If the agenda is not completed at that time the meeting will be adjourned to the 4th Tuesday of the month. All meetings of the Finance and Policy, Works, Community Services and Bush Fire/Noxious Weeds Committees will now be open to the public. Any person wishing to attend the Council meeting or the above Committee meetings would be most welcome.

The Commonwealth Government has provided Unemployment Grants under the Community Employment Scheme. Local Government and Community Organisations are eligible to apply for these grants.

Council has agreed to submit the following programme for funding:

- (a) Augmentation of the Bungendore Water Supply;
- (b) Employment of a clerk to prepare a property information system;
- (c) Employment of a draftsman or a clerk in the Engineer's office;
- (d) Scrub clearing on roads to improve sight distance;
- (e) Stormwater Drainage Foxlow Street Rutledge Street to drain;
- (f) Duralla Street Bungendore Kerb & Gutter Malbon Street to Modbury Street;
- (g) Burra Road drainage improvement drill and blast rocks in table drains;
- (h) Brindabella Road drainage improvement works in water tables plus instal culverts

Council has also asked the Bungendore Community Aid to submit an application for extensions to the School of Arts Building.

"ALL CREATURES GREAT AND SMALL" - a continuing series by

DR. BLAIR LAMONT. B.V.M.S., M.R.C.V.S.

One of the commonest urban poisons is SNAIL BAIT (commonly "Defender or "Baysol"). This seems to be quite attractive to dogs and can be eaten either by access to the packet or from picking up in the garden after spreading - obviously it would be best to spread only little amounts in any one area - but even then some dogs will seek it out. Symptons vary between the two common types. "Defender" causes signs progressing from anxiety and loss of co-ordination, to muscle tremors, to severe spasms with death following; some degree of diarrhoea is usually present also and the distinct green colour of the pellets may be evident if sufficient time has elapsed since ingestion. The "Baysol" type causes more salivation and fluid congestion in the lungs with less sign of spasms, but fatal collapse can occur quite rapidly (The blue colour of the pellets is often visible in saliva, etc.) I suggest contact a vet. immediately you suspect trouble - if you see the dog eat the poison, try and check the amount and type of bait, and the vet. may well recommend an emetic injection before signs appear; if the dog is already showing symptoms treatment is urgent - again I stress that immediate transport to a vet. is best and that trying to make the dog vomit usually does more harm than good. Caught early, treatment is usually 100% successful, especially with the "BAYSOL" type - so I would suggest that this is the better type touse if you have dogs around. (I mention specifically dogs in most of these poisons but cats will also be affected IF they eat the baits - which is uncommon)

In conclusion I might briefly mention some other poisons. LEAD ingestion via lead based paints or battery chewing can lead to gastric or nervous signs in all animals and cage birds - and is a cause of "fits" in dogs, ANTIFREEZE causes usually fatal kidney problems if drunk. HERBICIDES sprayed on grass/weeds can be fatal to any stock - and dogs and cats often chew grass too - and don't forget the chooks and cage birds. (Talking of chooks - we had some cases of deaths where poultry picked over horse droppings after the horses were treated with Equiguard worm granules.) 1080, of course is a very severe poison, but fortunately seems uncommon in this area - but graziers especially should be aware of any "1080 drops" in their area.

I should also mention ASPIRIN - this can be fatal especially to cats - all the more so as most owners give virtually a "human" type dose: I suggest avoid it completely in cats, and as a general rule with any "human" drugs given to animals, give a "pro-rata: dose on a weight basis.

Having recently attended another "BIRD" conference, I would remind poultry and cage bird owners, that many vets are interested in this field, and vet knowledge has increased dramatically in recent years. For aviary type situations it is surprising what a routine post-mortem can reveal, and even a "droppings" check twice yearly can cut out worm and coccidia before they cause major problems. (Any post mortems - chill only, do not deep freeze.).

So much for this issue - till next time GOOD HEALTH.
