The NSW Bush Fire Council have made some changes to regulations concerning Total Fire Bans. From this year, TOTAL FIRE BANS will commence and end at MIDNIGHT and electric and gas barbeques are exempted. The following explains the conditions which must apply for this exemption from the Total Fire Ban.



"Fire lit, maintained, or used by or on behalf of the owner or occupier of a permanent dwelling, not being a caravan, tent or similar structure, for the purpose of food preparation on a gas fired or electric appliance on the premises on which the dwelling is situated where:

- (a) such appliance is under the direct control of a responsible adult person present at all relevant times;
- (b) all inflammable material whatever kind is cleared within three metres of the appliance;
- (c) the appliance is located within twenty metres of the dwelling;
 - (d) a system of applying an adequate stream of water to the appliance and its surrounds is available for immediate and continuous use."

WAMBOIN - SUTTON SCHOOL BUS SERVICE

Dear Parents,

In order to maintain an acceptable atmosphere on my bus service I intend to enforce the following regulations. I would like to think I have the full support of both parents and students in this matter, as these regulations are for the well being, safety and comfort of all students travelling.

- 1. Pupils are to be reminded that the bus is under the control of the driver. Pupils, therefore, are under obligations to obey his instructions, as the lives of the passengers are in his hands.
- Students must sit where directed by the driver, if so directed.
- 3. Bus property is to be respected and marking or damage of an kind will not be tolerated. Vandalism may lead to prosecution.
- 4. Pupils are expected to practise common sense, safety and respect for property when travelling on the bus.
- 5. Such behaviour as fighting, kicking, swearing, hitting and spitting will not be tolerated.
- 6. No eating or drinking is permitted on the bus. (Transport Department regulations.)
- 7. Where possible, pupils must remain seated at all times, but particularly whilst the bus is in motion.
- 8. Smoking is not permitted on any buses (Transport Department regulations.)
- 9. A child must not stand in any position that obstructs the vision of the driver, nor on any steps within the bus.
- 10. No articles of any kind are to be thrown either within the bus or through the windows.
- 11. No part of the body may protrude from the bus.

NOTE: ATTENTION IS DRAWN TO THE FOLLOWING IMPORTANT POINTS.

Parents must realise that buses carry passengers, seated or standing, according to regulations and to the capacity of the individual bus.

Regulation 126 of the Motor Transport Act states:

"The driver of a public vehicle upon any public street shall not knowlingly carry:

(subsection C) - any person who is noisy or violent or misbehaving or disturbing the public peace. Except that it shall not be an offence to convey a person who is noisy or violent or misbehaving or disturbing the public peace to a police station.

PENALTIES FOR BREACHES

Breaches of the above regulations will be dealt with in the following way.

Two warnings will be given to the parents -

the school will then be notified -

the child will then be put off the bus for a determined period.



ALL CREATURES GREAT AND SMALL - a continuing series by

One distinctly un-cheery factor of the summer season in this area is the GRASS SEED. In the last couple of weeks, with the seed starting to mature, several dogs have been presented with seed problems.

The penetrating powers of the seeds enable them to end up in the most peculiar regions with symptoms related to the area affected. Long haired dogs suffer most to the extent that, if they are going to be exposed to seedy grass, they should hav, the feet and ears clipped short and all dogs should have these areas checked every night after exposure to seeds. Where ears are concerned the seed is caught by hair over the ear canal area and then drops into the ear canal. It then tends to slide quickly down out of sight and is very irritant. This causes sudden head shaking and holding the affected side downwards and often pain on touching the base of the affected ear. Prompt action is best to avoid severe, persistent ear inflammation, if you can see the seed you maybe able to remove it, if not veterinary treatment is indicated. We remove the seed with special lights and instruments, and often no anaesthetic is required, but with many dogs, due to pain and depth of penetration, a short anaesthetic is necessary. With feet, the seeds catch on the hair between the toes, and due to their shape and the action of the toes themselves, they quickly penetrate the skin and gradually work through the skin and disappear. The area then swells up and develops an abscess which is very painful. In some cases, with bathing and squeezing gently, the abscess will burst and the seed will come out with the discharge, but in many cases the seed remains inside and may continue it's travel several centimetres up the leg, inducing a severe infection as it goes. So again, most cases require veterinary treatment to locate and remove the seed (or seeds) and to control the infection with antibiotics.

The next most common problem area for seeds is the throat, in all types of dogs, and were cats. The animal chews the seed heads, or licks seeds from its coat, and the seeds stick into the mouth and throat regions, and many go right through the tissues and form abscesses under the jaws or throat area. These take several days to develop and at times can cause swallowing and even breathing problems. Whilst some may burst and discharge the seed, most require veterinary treatment to prevent serious consequences from chronic infection - as the seeds frequently remain inside unless surgically

opened and cleaned out.

Eyes are quite often a site for seeds too. They lodge under the eyelids or the "3rd eyelid" and are very painful. Sudden pain/discharge/ and closure of the eye at this time of year, should mean a careful search for seeds.. Often an anaesthetic is required to find them as they can start to work into the deeper tissues quite quickly. Also, in dogs, the leg/body junctions i.e. armpits, in long haired dogs often trap seeds which work into the skin and form little pustules, and the vulva and penis areas are other likely penetration areas.

While I have concerntrated on dogs (and cats) most other animals can have grass seed problems especially in the eyes, and horses on seedy hay often pack up under the tongue with grass seeds.

I hope you will realise the potential hazards of seeds from the above resume, and take appropriate preventative action where possible.



Geographical Names - 'Canberra Country Estate'

For some time residents have been complaining that the name 'Canberra Country Estate' is both inelegant and inappropriate for an area of New South Wales. Furthermore it is understood that this name has no official status whatsoever.

This matter has been mentioned to Mr R.E. Guy as a representative of the present developers of the area. The present developers apparently have no particular liking for the name 'Canberra Country Estate' and would probably prefer a name which has some historic association with the area, for example 'Amungula' or 'Wamboin' which are the names of the two parishes covered by the development area.

On 20th April 1980 there was a meeting of both resident and non-resident owners of land in the area to discuss, among other things, this question of an official name for the area. Some 60 persons, including Councillor P.J. McCullagh attended this meeting. After considerable discussion and a series of votes I was asked to suggest to the Shire Council the following names, which are given in order of preference:-

Kowen Hills; Kowen; Wamboin; Wamboin Hills; Amungula Hills; Amungula; Mount Poppet; Poppet Hills.

It is requested that the Shire Council take such steps as may be necessary to have one of these names officially bestowed on the area.

I am sending a copy of this letter to Mr R.E. Guy so that the present developers may have an opportunity to comment.
