YARROWLUMLA COUNCIL NEWS

Yarrowlumla Shire to be carved up? Despite promises to the contrary from the Carr Government it seems that Yarrowlumla Shire is to be carved up between Queanbeyan City and Yass Shire.Last month I reported that Queanbeyan had made a request to take over all that land south of the City down to Burra. The Boundaries Commission has been instructed by the Government to consider this request and it has advised Yarrowlumla Council of the inquiry but that it will not be holding the usual formal public inquiry into the proposed changes. It will only consider Council and public submissions, but no public hearings. Coupled with other information and press releases from the Minister for Local Government and advice to both Queanbeyan and Yass Councils, it is most probable that our Shire will be split between Yass and Queanbeyan.

There are many issues to be considered and more information to come in the following weeks and months but before the end of this year I believe that we will live in Queanbeyan!



A NEWSLETTER FROM YOUR VOLUNTEER RURAL FIRE BRIGADE COMPILED BY CLIFF SPONG WITH HELP FROM MANY MEMBERS OF THE BRIGADE

From the Captain's Desk

Although it is not exactly an issue that your fire brigade has been formed to deal with, I feel that all of us in our community should be aware and concerned about recent break-ins and acts of vandalism involving community property. The recent break-in at the fire shed resulted in some valuable equipment being stolen. Disgusting acts of vandalism around the community hall and at nearby properties have dismayed and angered many people. Also recent break-ins at some properties have resulted in property being stolen and causing a great deal of anxiety and anger for the affected residents. We need to keep a watchful eye for anything that looks suspicious. If you notice anything unusual, contact the police. They will attend as soon as they can but as a community we need to realise that we can have a role to play as well. We may not have a formal neighbourhood watch program operating but the principles can be applied by all of us.

It has been fortunate that our services have not been needed to put out any serious fires recently. A small number of motor vehicle accidents have kept us busy however. As well as these incidents we have been busy with another training program for many new recruits and the regular training routines for "older" hands. I am pleased to report that the brigade's ranks are growing and more people in our area have a better understanding of protecting their properties and those of others. The brigade's training programs now have an excellent reputation throughout the Shire

The extension to the fire shed should start soon. We are waiting for some final quotes. A project management plan has been drawn up and the project coordinator, Andrew Dunn, should be able to get the teams on the job shortly. Behind the scenes Marion Sheldrick has been putting in a lot of time and effort in approaching many companies to see if they can donate equipment or supplies to help the project. We haven't been inundated with offers but it hasn't been for a lack of trying. We will see what happens in the next few weeks.

At the last meeting of the Wamboin Community Association Geoff Shalders, the recently appointed Fire Mitigation Officer in our region, and I, presented some information about hazard reduction and property protection activities in our area. The NSW Rural Fire Service has recently employed 40 Fire Mitigation Officers across the State. Their primary roles are to handle bush fire hazard complaints and to issue Hazard Reduction Certificates. The rest of this month's article concentrates on the issue of hazard reduction and the new procedures we will all need to know and follow.

Bush Fire Hazard Reduction Certificates.

The following information has been summarised from some notes compiled by Geoff Shalders. When the changes become law it will be necessary to adhere to the new procedures. The new system should help residents better reduce the fire hazards at their properties. It also removes the requirements, in most cases, to gain approvals under eight acts. In limited cases, where bush fire hazard reduction work is likely to adversely affect important environmental attributes, a certificate may not be granted. The decision to issue these new certificates has to be made within 7 days after the application is submitted. Geoff can provide more detailed information as well inspecting the sites of the proposed hazard reduction. This will serve at least two purposes. He will firstly be able to gain a good appreciation of our area and secondly provide first hand advice to residents about fire hazards and balancing these with the need to manage the rural environment.

Recent changes to the Rural Fires Act 1997 and with the introduction of the Environmental Assessment Amendment Act 2002 will provide an improved assessment procedure for hazard reductions. The Bush Fire Environmental Assessment Code specifies the assessment requirements prior to issuing a Bush Fire Hazard Reduction Certificate. These certificates are issued by the Fire Mitigation Officer and are valid for 12 months. During the fire season an additional permit has to be obtained from the local fire brigade.

Approvals under this Code will not be required for agricultural activities such as stubble burning, burning diseased crops, orchard pruning and grazing. The Code cannot be used to gain approvals for operations such as land clearance, burning of domestic or industrial rubbish or circumventing other regulations such as Tree Preservation Orders.

The Code does not cover the construction of a track, trail or road, coastal wetlands or Littoral rainforests, land to which an integrated forestry operation has been approved, land where a development consent already applies for the provision of Asset Protection Zones, bush regeneration burns including pile burns of weed species or for ecological purposes, or isolated areas of vegetation.

The Code only covers work on land within an Asset Protection Zone (APZ). The maximum width of an APZ must be within the distances described in the Bush Fire Risk Management Plan, which is a maximum of 100 metres from the edge of a habitable structure and for other community assets as defined in the Plan. The types of work permitted are mechanical hazard reduction using slashing, trittering and tree removal as well as the use of graders, dozers and ploughs, and prescribed burning.

If any land has been identified as Strategic Fire Advantage Zones in the Bush Fire Risk Management Plan, as areas complementing an Asset Protection Zone or if the hazard reduction work is generally within 1000 metres of an asset, the types of work permitted are mechanical work for the maintenance of existing breaks, but not removing native vegetation, and prescribed burning.

An application for a Bush Fire Hazard Reduction Certificate on private property must be in writing using the application forms available from the RFS. There is no application fee for the certificates.

HORSES AND BUSHFIRES

(Taken from Agriculture Notes by Patricia Ellis & Hilary Pope, Attwood for the State of Victoria Department of Natural Resources & Environment, 1999 -- Will be reprinted in the next few issues of the Whisper. -- suggested for reprinting in the Whisper by Chris Powell)

If you live in a high risk area it is essential to develop a fire safety plan before the fire season. This may include:

A plan for early evacuation of horses to a safer district. Horse evacuations present unique problems. Make arrangements ahead of time for a place to temporarily relocate your horses. Options may include showgrounds, sale yards, parks, racetracks, pony club grounds or placement with family and friends. Identify several possible retreat routes from your property in case fires block your escape. Decide in advance which horses you will evacuate and make sure they are suitably trained for transport.

Identify a "safe" area on the property where horses can be placed if evacuation is not possible or practical. This area should be a closely grazed paddock or be created from several paddocks by opening gates. Ideally it should have a dam with clear access, an alternative "safe" area might be a large well fenced sand menage arena provided there are no trees or buildings nearby that will burn readily. Post your plan in a clearly visible place together with the telephone number of the local fire brigade and your property's CFA map reference.

Make sure that everyone who lives, works or agists at your property understands the plan.

On days of Total Fire Ban put your horses in the designated "safe" area or, if you work away from the property, you might do this the night before.

Have an annual meeting with neighbours, friends or other mutual interest groups to discuss fire contingency plans and establish ahead of time who will check on and help whom and which resources will be shared. Set up a bushfire emergency plan with the landholder if your horses are agisted, and leave horses in well-grazed paddocks or move them to a safe location during the fire season.

REDUCE FIRE HAZARDS

Reduce fire hazards before the fire season starts. Remove all fire fuel such as excess grass, sticks, leaf litter etc for 20 to 30 meters around the buildings. Store hay, straw, shavings, scrap wood, fuel supplies and chemicals safely away from important buildings. Clean roof surfaces and gutters regularly. Create fire breaks in strategic locations. Develop a grazing plan to reduce fire risk.

A well maintained garden and well watered lawn will help protect the house. Use fire resistant plants on your property. Post "no smoking" signs in and around the stable and in vegetated areas as appropriate. Make sure chainsaws and other equipment are fitted with an Australian Standards approved spark arrester.

If you live in a high risk ara, invest in a rainwater storage tank, a sprinkler system and a firefighting pump, and consider erecting fireproof fencing such as steel or concrete posts, particularly if you own a stallion. If your fences are electrified, make sure the remainder of fences are "horseproof" as often power is out during a bushfire.

ALL CREATURES GREAT AND SMALL

Firstly a little history and acknowledgement regarding the above titles. I'm sure most of you know the phrase "All Creatures Great and Small" from the name of a book, then movie and TV series about the life and times of an English veterinarian named James Herriot (James Herriot is a pseudonym). Herriot's first book published in Great Britain in 1970 was called "If Only They Could Talk". His second book was titled "It Shouldn't Happen to a Vet" (1972). Subsequent books were "Let Sleeping Vets Lie" (1973), "Vet in Harness" (1974) "Vets Might Fly" (1976) and "Vet in a Spin" (1977).

"All Creatures Great and Small" was an omnibus edition comprising the first two titles and part of the third. It was published for the American market and became a top US seller. At the time of publication of these early works I was studying Veterinary Science at the University of Queensland and these books became a great source of stimulation and encouragement for me and my fellow students. After many many hours of studying physics (why I don't really know), anatomy, animal husbandry, biochemistry (yuk) and nutrition etc etc, it provided great relief to read a chapter or two of Herriot's books. His books certainly at times gave me the stimulation and inspiration to forge ahead with my studies at Uni.

The real James Herriot was J A (Alf) Wight (1916 - 1995) who trained in Glasgow and joined Donald Sinclair (Siegfried Farnon) in his Thirsk (Darrowby) practice. His books have been translated into over 20 languages and also spawned the long running TV series (90 episodes) and two feature films.

A couple of years ago my son Ben and his Derbyshire born wife Norma, took Margie and me on a tour of Yorkshire. We took a detour to Thirsk. Herriot's home and the practice are now a very popular museum. Situated in the actual "Skeldale House" at 23 Kirkgate, Thirsk, North Yorkshire, the creation of the museum was the millennium project of the local Council. I was absolutely fascinated by everything in this museum which showed not only how veterinary science was practiced but also how people lived in that era.

After a couple of hours there Ben, who works in the financial world in London, was having considerable difficulty extracting me from the premises and suggested he was entitled to equal time at the "Accountants' Museum". The thought of looking at lead pencils, rubbers and sharpeners, ledgers and journals did not inspire me!

I hereby acknowledge James Herriot and the titles of his books.

The end of another era. Blair and I began working together in January 1978 and must just about have the record for "Longest Veterinary Partnership" - certainly in this region. As many of you know, Blair retired on the 30th of April 2003. We thank him for his long-serving contribution to animal welfare in this region and wish him well in his retirement. No doubt many of you will see more of him on the golf courses.



YELLOW-TAILED BLACK COCKATOOS

There's been much interest and debate in the Wamboin area (via an email discussion group on local wildlife) concerning the now regular visits from the spectacular but seemingly destructive flocks of Yellow-tailed Black Cockatoos (Calyptorhynchus funereus funereus). Their stay is usually short but they manage to make their presence felt. Like something out of a Hitchcock movie, they fly low, appear to be fearless, have a deafening screech and manage to wreak havoc on many plants. Responses to them vary from joy to annoyance with many locals putting out the welcome mat by planting their favoured native food sources, while others are devising ways to discourage their return.

These birds with their loud, distinctive "kee-ow" calls, have been frequenting the area for the past few years. Their natural habitat varies from rainforests and woodlands through to timber along water-courses. They are known to be regular visitors to coastal heathlands, orchards and pine plantations, which no doubt accounts for their sojourns to the Wamboin district. Short of removing all pines in the area (an idea which would no doubt be supported by many, as they are now high on the list of environmental weeds across the country!) it seems the Yellow-tails are here to stay.

According to Rainer Rehwinkel of the National Parks and Wildlife Service, Queanbeyan:

"Part of the natural diet of these wonderful birds is the large wood grub which feeds in wattles and gums. This is what they're hunting for when they are apparently ring-barking trees. These bird were unheard of in the Macs Reef Road area or even the suburbs of Canberra 20 years ago. They seem to have moved into these areas recently because of the pine trees, upon whose cones they feed. Pine seeds are an inferior source of food for this adaptable species — I have heard of a study that showed that Yellow-tailed Black Cockatoos that ate large amounts of these seeds had a lower breeding success rate.

The fact that these bird are feeding on their 'natural diet', albeit in the 'new habitat' of rural subdivisions should be regarded as part of the evolutionary processes that are adapting this once uncommon bird species to a landscape highly modified by humans. This should be celebrated. I for one would certainly not mind it if these wonderful birds wrecked a few saplings in order to survive, as they certainly have been doing for eons in their tall forest habitat! And importantly, those trees infested with wood boring grubs will certainly not survive to maturity in any case".

Apart from wood grubs, these birds have a penchant for banksias and hakeas in particular, but will probably search out almost any large-fruited native species or conifers. They leave the bushes looking as if they had been pruned by Edward Scissorhands! Fortunately these plants manage to recover, bear fruit and live to survive another attack.

Of particular interest recently has been the repeated sighting of a luminous yellow version of the Yellow-tailed Black Cockatoo in this area. The bird had small patches of black which at first glance gave the impression that the bird had reversed colourings. It was also thought by some to be albino. Albinoism is the total absence of all pigments which means the bird would have been white with pink eyes. In fact the condition this particular bird had is referred to as 'leucism'. Leucistic birds have an impairment in the normal pigmentation process. In this bird the chemical 'melanin' had been almost totally blocked, only appearing normal in the flight and tail feathers, and some individual feathers on its back and chest.

Understandably, there were great efforts being made to capture this bird in a photograph (hopefully that was the only type of capture attempted!) and although exceedingly difficult some people were successful. 
Certainly the occasional stop-over of the Yellow-tails is less of a threat than the imminent invasion of the Common (or Indian) Mynah bird to the region. This pest bird was introduced to the local region (Canberra) in 1968, and is now encroaching on this area, having already established at Eaglehawk and sighted near the Sutton Interchange and as far as Newington Road. Common Mynah is a very aggressive, gregarious territorial species. It nests in hollows and soon displaces native species that require hollows for their survival. Often it is in such large numbers that it excludes almost if not all native hollow-requiring species. At the October 13 meeting of the **Geary's Gap/Wamboin Landcare Group**, Chris Tidemann, Senior Lecturer in Wildlife Management from the ANU School of Resources, Environment & Society, will be addressing the problem and providing ideas on how to combat it.
