Local Government The last Bywong Community meeting, attended by Community members and members of the public, protested at the NSW Government's move to absorb the Shire in Queanbeyan and Yass and resolved to send a submission arguing this view to the Boundaries Commission. The meeting supported the YSC's position in this matter.

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YARROWLUMLA COUNCIL NEWS

Local Government Amalgamations It seems that Local Government amalgamations are a certainty and Yarrowlumla Council will be the first cab off the rank. This decision follows the land grab request to the NSW Government by Queanbeyan City Council for 120 square Kms of Yarrowlumla Shire for the so-called necessary expansion of Queanbeyan.

Your Council has been busy and has attended meetings all over the Shire to inform residents of the situation and to seek opinions and support from the various Community Associations in the preparation of submissions to the NSW Minister for Local Government and the NSW Boundaries Commission. I thank those many people who attended these meetings in Wamboin, Bywong and Sutton and also for the support shown and the preparation of submissions by those Community Associations.

Following these meetings we have gained the support for a couple of proposals for amalgamations and these have now been submitted to the Commission and the Minister. At the Council meeting on Tuesday 24 June the Council resolved to:

- 1 Formally oppose the request by Queanbeyan Council for the ceding for 120 km2 of land from the eastern side of Yarrowlumla Council area and submit to the NSW Boundaries Commission an alternate reduced area based on greenfield land available for development. (This will provide enough land for Queanbeyan to expand to a population of about 80,000 people – water permitting, and will keep the already developed rural residential areas of Fernleigh Park, Mt Campbell and Little Burra in a rural shire.)
- 2 Formally oppose the proposal by the Minister for Local Government for the dissolution of Yarrowlumla Shire as other alternatives, which achieve the NSW Government's objective of reform of local government, are available and are considered more suitable to both the residents and staff.
- 3 Submit to the Minister for Local Government a separate proposal of two options that Council considers are more suitable than the west/east split as proposed by the Minister:

a. A "Regional" council consisting of the whole of Yass, Gunning, Tallaganda and Queanbeyan Council areas and that part of Yarrowlumla Council area excluding the land proposed to be ceded to Tumut Council on the western side of the existing Yarrowlumla Council area.

b. A "Rural Lifestyle" council consisting of parts of Yass, Gunning, Mulwaree Council areas, the whole of Tallaganda Council area and that part of Yarrowlumla Council area excluding the land proposed to be ceded to Tumut Council on the western side of the existing Yarrowlumla Council area and the land proposed to be ceded to Queanbeyan Council on the eastern side of the existing Yarrowlumla Council area. (This could be called Lake George Council or perhaps Weereewa.) Keep your fingers crossed and I will keep you informed.

- 20 coppers logs- 100mm x 2m. long.

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AMALGAMATION OF SHIRES

History. The NSW Government is pursuing a policy of rationalising the administration of local government by amalgamating smaller municipalities and shires. A number of amalgamation and boundary adjustments have been approved by the NSW Local Government Boundaries Commission.

On 12 May 2003 the Queanbeyan City Council submitted a boundary adjustment request to the NSW Minister for Local Government, seeking the transfer of 155 sq km of Yarrowlumla Shire to the City of Queanbeyan. This request seems to be the catalyst of further ideas, beginning with a proposal by the Minister to dissolve Yarrowlumla Shire by transferring Western Yarrowlumla to Yass, and Eastern Yarrowlumla to Queanbeyan.

WCA Meeting. The Wamboin Community Association held a public meeting on the 17th of June to discuss this proposal. The Mayors of Yarrowlumla, Queanbeyan and Yass addressed the meeting in the Wamboin Community Hall and stated their respective positions. After some discussion the 57 residents of Wamboin who attended the meeting voted on the various options which affect our area.

We found it difficult to understand why there is any necessity for our Shire to be amalgamated because the population of Eastern Yarrowlumla exceeds 10,000, and its revenue exceeds \$10 million - the total revenue of Yarrowlumla Shire in 2001/02 was \$14.4 million. (The Premier of NSW recently identified councils with a population of less than 6,000 [and revenue of less than \$10 million] as candidates for amalgamation.) This was pointed out in our submission however, should the Minister continue with the dissolution of Yarrowlumla Shire the voting was as follows:

- The meeting was overwhelming in favour of amalgamation with neighbouring country Shires to form a 'Rural Lifestyle' Shire.
- There were some votes in favour of becoming part of the Yass Shire. This amalgamation of Wamboin, Bywong and Sutton with Yass was raised by the Mayor of Yass (Nic Carmody). The purpose is to place all of the 'Yass River catchment' in control of the Yass Shire. He stated this option was favourably received when put forward to the Minister. The Yass Mayor said that due to a severe water problem, the control of the Yass River catchment was a very important issue for Yass. To maintain the flow of the Yass River they needed to clear all the willows from the rivers and streams and their intention would be to stop any further development or building of dams in the catchment area.
- Some residents spoke up for a hands off, status quo.
- The proposed amalgamation with Queanbeyan City Council was soundly rejected by all residents who attended the meeting.


WAMBOIN COUNTRY GOLF CLUB - JUNE

HORSES AND BUSHFIRES

(Taken from Agriculture Notes by Patricia Ellis & Hilary Pope, Attwood for the State of Victoria Department of Natural Resources & Environment, 1999 -- Will be reprinted in the next few issues of the Whisper. -- suggested for reprinting in the Whisper by Chris Powell)

Maintain a fire cache

Tools to have on hand at your property:

a ladder long enough to reach the roof of building in case of a roof fire; a minimum of 30 metres of pre-connected garden hose (or adequate length to reach all parts of your buildings) with a spray nozzle; a shovel for clearing vegetation and throwing dirt; a rake for clearing vegetation; water buckets; toch; a battery-powered radio for monitoring news.

Keep these items together in an easily accessible place. Don't let the tools be used for any purpose other than fire fighting. Mark them with red paint if necessary.

Make sure everyone who lives, works, or agists at your property know where the cache is located.

Prepare an evacuation kit

Equip a plastic rubbish bin (with lid) with the following: wirecutters and a sharp knife; torch, portable radio and fresh batteries; water bucket; extra lead rope and head collar; woollen blankets and towels; equine first aid items; whatever else you feel is essential for the first 24 hours.

Store the kit in an easily accessible location and don't use it for anything but emergencies.

Identify your horses

Permanently identified horses (microchipped, branded or identified by a drawing, which includes whorls and white markings) will be more speedily reunited with their owners if separation occurs during a disaster.

In an emergency at the very least be prepared to "paint" your name and phone number on the horse itself using livestock grease crayon, like the ones used to number horses in endurance rides, or clip similar details on its coat. Neckbands, hip stickers and identification tags on leather head collars can also be useful.

If fire threatens- decide quickly

If you decided to evacuate with or without your horse/s, this decision must be made very early. Late evacuation is a deadly option. Once the fire is close, visibility will be very poor and travel will be hazardous. Fallen trees, powerlines, abandoned cars and even fire fighting vehicles can easily block roads. Even quiet horses may panic in a float filled with smoke or when exposed to the noise of sirens. (To be continued in August 2003 Whisper)

The Brigade would also like to thank the Bywong Community Association for the donation of \$500 following the annual car boot sale. The money will certainly help the brigade with the extension to the fire station.

Residents are reminded to take care this winter using woodfires indoors. There is nothing better than settling down in front of a crackling and warming fire but unfortunately they are also a notoriously good way of starting house fires. Don't take your fireplace for granted. The fire is like a caged animal, docile while contained but can easily get out of your control when released. We all need to remember that in the time it takes for a fire truck to reach your location it may be too late to save the property and so some prior planning around the home should be undertaken. For example, it is a good idea to see if the battery in the smoke alarm is working properly. We all have operational smoke detectors fitted in strategic locations in our homes, don't we?

Some people are concerned to see bushfire fighting vehicles travelling around the area in the winter months. There is still a lot of work to do, even in the "off" season. We still get regular calls to attend motor car accidents and to investigate the odd smoke sighting. All of these activities are logged and it is interesting to tally the distances we travel. It is also another way to ensure that our vehicles are well maintained and capable of responding around the clock. Recently we held the first of several practice sessions in off-road tanker driving for our brigade drivers and several other brigades in the Shire. We are grateful to **Frank Watson** for letting us use his property for these practice sessions. Before the start of the next fire season we need to make sure that our drivers can practice their skills in both off-road and on-road situations. The wild and hazardous challenge of negotiating peak hour traffic in Queanbeyan also awaits us!

I would like to thank and congratulate those members who spent a Friday evening and a weekend attending a First Aid course recently. We can only hope that they don't have to use this knowledge but it is a reassuring feeling to know that they have it.

The brigade has been provided with a new facsimile machine on 6236 9220. Please feel free to contact us on any firerelated issue by using the fax or by telephoning 6238 3316 (my home phone), 0409 991 340 (my mobile phone), 6236 9220 (Cliff Spong's home phone) or his mobile phone 0402 010 942. Work is continuing on developing a website for the brigade. Once some improvements are made to the brigade's computerised record systems the website design can be finalised. The website will serve as an information resource and access point for residents as well as a limited record base for brigade members.

As a timely reminder, if any suspicious vehicles are seen in the area notify the police as soon as possible. There has been some criminal activity in our area. We need to stay alert.

Fund raising committee

It has probably become evident to most readers of our community paper that operating an emergency service, like the fire brigade, takes a lot of continual effort by many people in what we laughingly call "spare time". There are many, many things that need to be done to keep the brigade operating. As equally important to putting out fires and responding to emergency incidents is the job of raising funds to keep the brigade operationally viable. This task is becoming increasing difficult because it usually falls to the firefighters themselves to raise money and collect donations. We need to spread the work of running the brigade to more people than the usual few. It would be fantastic if we could get help from people in our community who could establish and run a permanent fund raising committee for the brigade. This way we could have some fire brigade members who fight fires and others who work to ensure that firefighters can continue to fight the fires. If you could help us please contact me. Static Water Supply During the fires in January this year, we had to identify many water sources in our area in case we needed to resupply firefighting vehicles or helicopters. This type of contingency planning is a normal practice during any firefighting emergency. Most residents would be aware that under the New South Wales *Rural Fires Act*, an authorised officer of a fire brigade could use any water from a property during an incident. However brigades from other areas called in to help local brigades can be at a disadvantage in knowing the location of these local water supply assets. The Rural Fire Service is now implementing a scheme where these assets can be identified by markers fixed to fence posts, for example, given the consent of the property owners. Over the next few months members of the brigade will carry this work. At the same time we



will be updating our records to identify and catalogue any fire risks, hazards and local information which could help us plan and respond to local emergencies.

Work has started but help is still needed!!

It is pleasing to report that work has started on the extension to the fire shed. As the *Wamboin Whisper* is going to press it is planned that the footings will be inspected and poured. The photograph below from **Andrew Dunn**, shows the site being prepared for the footings. What can't easily be seen is the large pile of rocks and earth that was removed to get the site to this stage! However we still need more help for this project. Even a few hours would be a great help. Most of the work doesn't need any prior experience and we can show you what is needed. 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IF ONLY THEY COULD TALK

A new series by local vet, Dr Garry McComb BVSc QDAH

GOOD DOG OR BAD DOG? Each year in Australia about 20% of urban dogs are surrendered to pounds and animal shelters and of these, 80% are euthanised. Most of these dogs (up to 80% in some surveys) were surrendered because of behaviour problems. The most common problems seem to be boisterousness, aggression directed towards people and interdog aggression. It has also been found that if dogs had not attended obedience classes they were almost 70% more likely to be surrendered.

Other common problems include behaviours such as digging, jumping up, barking, destructiveness and chewing. These are all normal behaviours and as such cannot be eliminated entirely. However they can be modified to a more socially acceptable behaviour. The owner needs to understand why the dog may be behaving in this way and how to respond accordingly. Bad behaviour is often exacerbated by boredom, confinement and lack of activity. Dogs are highly intelligent, active, social animals who need activity, company and stimulation.

It has been demonstrated that dogs who have been isolated during the sensitive socialisation period of 4-16 weeks of age are more likely to be hyperactive, aggressive, difficult to train, antisocial and fearful. Behaviours learnt in this socialisation period, be they good or bad, will carry over into the dog's adult life. It is important to try to introduce your puppy to as many people, objects and situations as possible during this time.

The best way to achieve this is to attend a Puppy Preschool. These are conducted by some veterinary practices. The aims of Puppy Preschool are to :

- Socialise puppies with other dogs and people.
- Start basic obedience training.
- · Identify any potential behaviour problems early so that measures can be introduced to modify that trait.
- Educate owners on all aspects of puppy development, pet care and living with a dog in the family.
- Help make trips to the vet more enjoyable for dogs and owners (and veterinary staff!) dogs that have been to Puppy Preschool definitely do enjoy coming back to the veterinary hospital.
- · Get puppies off to a good start so that they become controlled, well behaved and socially acceptable adults.
- Teach good manners to dogs so that they can live happily with their owners and others.

Caller, "H.....hello....HELLO....HELLO....is...that...Hello.....Ian? HELLO ...you......me? H..... Ian can youwhat?....million dollar deal,....you/me yes...I......can't.....what..... hear...."

Me: "Yes, I can hear you....what?...(silent expletive)......say.....who is it.....HELLO (another silent expletive)...okay. I'll ring you back on the landline."

Caller: "What?....oh"

I finish the mobile phone charades by hanging up, then let forth with an appropriate expletive or six (curious how much better one feels having done that), pick up the landline and dial....

Me: "Hello, was that you Pete?"

Pete (the unsuccessful caller) responds affirmatively followed by a "What the hell happened?"

Me: "Oh, well, just one of the joys of a "rural lifestyle". Yes this line is much better isn't it?" No, I don't have the mobile any more, I've just turfed it into the (expletive) dam!"

Know the experience? I'm sure many of you do. And, I've gotta tell you, solid mobile phone coverage ain't one of strengths of living in or visiting the Wamboin & Bywong localities. For some, it's probably a sufficient reason for not deciding/continuing to live out here.

And there's something else. It doesn't appear to matter which telecommunication carrier you are with out here. Some days you've got mobile reception of sorts; but most times reception is either non-existent or so suspect the line falls out part way through a conversation. Hence the kind of quality conversation exampled above.

Our property is elevated and sits a little east of Millpost Hill. The aspect is north-east and we look across Wamboin and the Clare Valley to Lake George escarpment. So, we're not exactly in a ditch. But, surprisingly, we sure as hell seem to be in a mobile communication vacuum. On a really "happy" day – perhaps when the gods are as one, the planets are in alignment, wind is breezing in the right direction, etc, we can, according to the mobile screen, "lock in" (read "sniff") either Bywong Hill or Lake George Sth. Pretty impressive, eh?!

"So, what's your beef?", I hear you exclaim.

Well, it's just this - if your mobile phone rings, you can be fairly sure the caller is wanting to conduct a "sensible' conversation with you, and naturally it's vice-versa. Right? Right! Well, on a really, really, good day, to have any hope of a reasonable conversation with the caller we must present to the sliding door which faces NNW. We find that standing on one leg helps (right leg appears to work best). With one's nose all but pressed against the window, and remembering always that you cannot have too animated a conversation while on the phone lest you breach the 1mm tolerance (1/4 degree in longitude) and, guess what, the call drops out. So, when the phone rings the idea is to grab it, position yourself quickly at the sliding door and as your heart beats expectantly, answer the call with an optimistic but somewhat hesitant "Hello?". So, having taken the long way round, the beef is this, if you use a mobile phone service out here, at best reception is intermittent but it's mainly zilch.

"Ever thought of purchasing a CDMA phone or switching provider?", I hear the phone marketing people bleat. CDMA? What's the point? Why go there when those who have gone before have found it no better (in their area) than digital. As for the other providers? Again, what's the point? Quality of the digital airwave service appears to be the same regardless of the provider. We've covered the spectrum, so to speak, thanks to the help of friends who have visited and who utilise networks other than ours. None of our friends utilising a different network appears to fare any better than us. Thus, the assertion that our reception would be improved were we to switch to a different provider appears to be but a furphy. Experience suggests a change in provider (at our place) would make not a skerrick of a difference!

Perhaps the quality of coverage varies in the region – most probably it does. It may be that most of you already have great coverage and are therefore content. After all, when you hang a righty from Sutton Road into Norton Road the digital display really begins to get excited. Have you ever noticed the plethora of repeater stations that pop up on the mobile phone display as you climb the escarpment into Wamboin? Talk about "beam me up Scotty", there's Hume, Fyshwick, Jerrabomberra, Oak Hill (don't know where that is), Cook – yes Cook, Mt Majura (that's reasonable), and A.I.S (surely not the Institute of Sport?). And not long after cresting the escarpment the Bywong Hill signal kicks in as you're dipping and lurching and weaving and possibly heaving your way eastbound along Norton Road. No shortage of repeaters it would seem, at least on the western perimeter of the region. But why can't we get a more reasonable coverage right across the region – a quality (strong, even - no surprise drop-out) reception. I'm sure the mobile phone signal is blissful close to Bywong Hill (wherever that is) and Lake George Sth. Bungendore appears to have reasonable coverage. I appreciate Bywong and Wamboin are somewhat more undulating than Bungendore. But with over 900 families in the Wamboin/Bywong area, where properties (improved and raw acreage) are turning over at a seemingly prodigious rate, isn't it time to expect a less fickle, stronger and more reliable mobile telephone coverage across the region?

Millpost Hill sits among the highest nobs in the area and it's fairly central. What about a communication tower atop Millpost? Ooh, that pulled a few of you out of the woodwork! Would it be an eyesore? Probably, I don't really know – but as long as it's not painted Mission Brown it should be okay? Houses are rising all around Millpost so what's a tower between friends. There's already a trig point atop Millpost - why not also a tower – Millpost could become (for most of us) Wamboin and Bywong's main earway to the airway. Alternatively, 'cos communication towers don't come cheap and, truthfully, they






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Razor Blades and Other Cutting Edges
