#### YARROWLUMLA COUNCIL NEWS

Local Government Amalgamations No decision has yet been made on the outcome of the possible dissolution of Yarrowlumla Shire. Council made a presentation to the Boundaries Commission on the 10<sup>th</sup> of July and our case was put on the options of a Regional Council and preferably a "Rural Lifestyle" Council through amalgamation of surrounding rural shires. These were the options I outlined in the July Whisper. Council also opposed the 120 square kilometre land grab by Queanbeyan City but we were prepared to cede enough land for Queanbeyan to expand to a population of about 80,000 (water permitting). The Boundaries Commission members were impressed by the support given in submissions by the various community groups across the Shire and expressed their view on the importance of that support given by residents. I thank those Community Associations and individuals who have taken the time and made the effort to protect the lifestyle we have chosen. I don't expect an outcome until well into August.

Rates Council has now adopted the 2003–2004 Management Plan and Budget. In line with Government rate pegging legislation the overall rate income for the Council is only allowed to increase by 3.6%. Because of the structure of the rating system which has a base rate plus an Ad-Valorem rate, we cannot simply adjust all rates by 3.6%. The Ad Valorem rate is cents in the dollar of the Unimproved Capital Value (UCV) which was recently determined independently by the NSW Valuer General. For our own rural residential property the rates will be calculated on a base rate of \$110.78 plus the Ad Valorem rate of 0.003069xUCV ie 0.3069 cents in the dollar. (last year base rate \$99.47 plus 0.004023xUCV) The Rural Fire Service levy is \$5.25 plus 0.000153xUCV. If your UCV increased by more than the average then the rate increase will also be higher than the average. Looking at my own UCV I suspect that this will be the case in Wamboin and Bywong. Rate calculations are complex and are governed by NSW legislation.

Fire Station Extensions Commenced The long awaited extension to the Wamboin Volunteer Bush Fire Brigade's fire station in Bingley Way has commenced. The two storey extension with a double length tanker bay plus a training and meeting room on the top floor is being constructed with volunteer labour. If you have building experience and would like to help I would be delighted to hear from you.

### New Neighbour for Wamboin and Bywong?

There are mixed feelings in the area over a proposed new development which could see 2000 new houses built on suburban blocks next to Sutton village. David Rouse, who some of us remember as Yarrowlumla Shire's chief planner, is project manager for the developer. He recently outlined the proposal to a meeting of a working group set up by Sutton and District Community Association.

Mr Rouse said he was co-ordinating a submission to Yarrowlumla Council to re-zone the land from "rural" to "village", but that little had yet been done on design concepts or layout. The developer hoped for 2000 - 2500 blocks, but 1500-2000 blocks of 800-1200 square metres was a more likely outcome. Work was unlikely to start before about two years. The Sutton working group aims to give local residents an opportunity to have a say in formulating a community position on the development. This position will be the basis for any response to government agencies involved in land use decisions and their related impacts.

While the working group continues to collect information about the planning and infrastructure implications of the proposal, the lack of detail about the proposed development makes this difficult. There is further uncertainty because of the proposed merging of Yarrowlumla Council with Queanbeyan City Council and/or Yass Shire Council, as noone now knows who will be responsible for a decision on the development.

Some Sutton community members have already expressed concern that the area could not sustain an additional 5000 people and that approval for the development could trigger further such proposals. They question whether adequate water and sewage services can be provided, and point out that previous planning documents have assumed that development could not take place in Sutton without a piped water supply. The working group has already begun a study of water resources and will be looking at the outcome of similar developments elsewhere.

### From the Captain's Desk I think the message we try to ge



There are many times when I think the message we try to get across about fire protection is just like a broken record, or in more up to date terms, a CD stuck on a track. We have no choice but to continually repeat ourselves in the faint hope that it will be heard. Everything local residents can do to reduce the impact of a fire on their property increases the chance that it will survive a fire. You cannot expect your local fire brigade to do everything for you. You have a responsibility in this area to prepare the passive defence of your own property. It is our job to put fires out and to protect life and if we can, protect property. A joint effort between residents and the volunteers in your local fire brigade

is necessary to minimise the impact of fires in our community.

This time of year presents the perfect opportunity to get outside and prepare our properties for the coming fire season. It is only about eight weeks away! Our memories of the fires last January can't be that short. Can you remember the anxiety you felt with the news of how the fires were moving towards Canberra and the southern areas of this Shire. There was a reasonable expectation that the fires would turn and push north towards us. We should learn the lessons we learnt at the beginning of the year. Most houses and property in Canberra were lost because of embers attacks and not as the result of direct exposure to flames. If more people who were physically able to stay with their houses, and if the right preparations had been taken, more houses could have been saved. If you need advice about what you can do please contact me, or any field officers in the brigade. We will be only too pleased to give you some advice.

The Wamboin community's annual bonfire is taking shape in front of the community hall. Many residents have been using the opportunity to clear their properties and put the cuttings and flammable organic rubbish on the pile. The bonfire is scheduled for the 20<sup>th</sup> of September. It should be a fun night and it will also be an opportunity to collect some literature about fire prevention and preparing your property. It will also be an opportunity to view some of the fire brigade equipment and the work on the fire shed.


The extension to the fire shed is progressing well. The foundations for the ground floor slab have been prepared. I would like to thank those people who have spent the past few weekends helping with the work. Even if people can only spend a few hours, it all adds up in the long run. The certificates can be obtained from the Fire Mitigation Officer, Jeff Shalders, at the Fire and Emergency Centre in Queanbeyan, on application. He can be contacted on 6297 1840 during business hours. As well as advising residents about the legalities of hazard reduction activities on their properties he can provide several pamphlets on the subject. There is also a lot of information about the new system for hazard reduction on the NSW Rural Fire Service website, "www. rfs.nsw.gov.au." Remember, reducing fire hazards can be achieved in many ways; burning is not the only solution.

Most of the work doesn't need any prior experience and we can show you what is needed. ### Geary's Gap/Wamboin Landcare The Right Tree in the Right Place?

The European invasion and settlement of Australia has wrought many and sometimes irreversible changes to the Australian landscape. As a result of our requirement for food and fibre and to support our current living standards, immense tracts of native vegetation communities have been destroyed or greatly modified to fulfill our needs for urban, industrial or agricultural development. This has been done with little regard for human long-term sustainability, let alone the many other animal species that live with us.

To achieve long-term sustainability in Australia, there will have to be some significant attitudinal changes within the community. One area in which change could be achieved with minimal fuss, cost or inconvenience is by planting the right tree in the right place.

Exotic trees are unfortunately being widely planted in rural residential subdivisions and farms, with little thought to the long term repercussions of their use. Some of these repercussions are:

Weed invasion Some exotic species currently being widely used are Monterey Pine (*Pinus radiata*), White Poplar or Cottonwood (*Populus alba*), Lombardy Poplar (*Populus nigra* 'Italica'), various willows (*Salix* spp), Rowan (*Sorbus aucuparia*), various Brooms and Tree lucerne (*Genista, Cystisus*, and *Chamaecytisus* spp), Cotoneaster (*Cotoneaster* spp), Firethorn (*Pyracantha* spp) and Privets (*Ligustrum* spp) amongst others. These species are proving highly invasive of natural vegetation communities and neighbouring property, including public lands. It is strongly recommended that any invasive species such as those mentioned not be used in rural areas.

Landscape Changes A major factor in surveys taken of international visitors to Australia is that they come for our wide open spaces, rural vistas and our different plants and animals. Our landscapes, flora and fauna and natural heritage generally earn us immense amounts of overseas income, just because it is there. However, we need to recognise the value of landscape as an asset, and repair and enhance it where we can. The establishment of exotic trees throughout rural Australia is greatly compromising this asset.

This is not to suggest that no exotic trees are useful or should not be planted, but we really need to consider maximising the benefits from every tree we plant. Some rural residents find the dryness and "rough" nature of the local natural landscapes too harsh, and embark on "softening" programs, and extend this over their whole properties. The benefits are dubious, and are certainly environmentally damaging in the longer term. Surely the benefits of the "green oasis" are best confined to the near surrounds of the residence, where they can fulfill the need for softer surrounds. Utilise native species for shelterbelts around the edges of paddocks or property, designed to link with neighbouring remnant vegetation or plantings. This will contribute very significantly to retaining that unique "Australianess" of our rural landscapes, a feature that is rapidly being lost to landscapes not dissimilar to those in parts of Europe.

Biodiversity protection. By planting native vegetation we can make some reparations for the cost of our "environmental footprint" and improve foraging and breeding habitat availability for wildlife into the future, as well as meeting all farm/recreational block requirements for shelterbelts and aesthetics. Remember, it takes 4-5 human generations (10%-120 years) for most Australian trees to begin forming hollows suitable for habitat for many fauna species, and some species are totally dependant on native vegetation to survive.

Further advice on suitable plant species is available from Yarrowlumla Council or your local Landcare Group. (Article from the Landcare publication 'Look After Your Natural Assets')

### HORSES AND BUSHFIRES

(Taken from Agriculture Notes by Patricia Ellis & Hilary Pope, Attwood for the State of Victoria Department of Natural Resources & Environment, 1999 -- Will be reprinted in the next few issues of the Whisper. -- suggested for reprinting in the Whisper by Chris Powell)

#### Wear Safe Attire

In the event that a fire threatens you, whether you decide to evacuate or stay, the right clothes can help shield you from radiant heat, burning embers and flames:

Cotton fabrics are essential. Synthetics can melt and cause serious burns. Wear long pants, a long sleeved shirt with sleeves down or a woolen jumper, and a wide brimmed hat. Sturdy leather gloves, while cumbersome, are essential to protect your hands from painful and disabling burns. Wear a damp cotton scarf or handkerchief "bandit-style" to shield your nose and face. Goggles will help protect your eyes from smoke and burning embers. A word to the wise: condition your horse to strange appearance ahead of time!

#### Fire-Safe Gear for Horses

The same applies for fire safe clothing for your horse. Don't use synthetic (nylon or plastic) halters or lead ropes. These may melt and cause serious burns to your horse and its handler. Leather halters and cotton lead ropes, while generally not as strong as nylon, will be safer. Don't use nylon fly masks or other synthetic tack or equipment.

#### When Fire Strikes

You should plan on the basis that you will receive no official warning that a fire is coming. You must be aware that firefighters will be concentrating their efforts on controlling the fire. When the fire comes your way, your personal safety and that of the people working with you must be your first concern.

Try to remain calm and alert. Think clearly and act decisively. Pay attention to weather conditions and fire behaviour. Watch for a sudden change in widn direction or speed, a dramatic change in air temperature or humidity, or smoke and ash or burning embers dropping around you. Monitor weather forecasts and media broadcasts, especially ABC radio and local community radio stations for emergency information. Maintain good communications with the people you are working with. Give clear instructions and make sure they are understood.

Co-operate with firefighters and other emergency services. Your safety and the safety of other civilians and emergency personnel are their paramount concern. If your property is closely threatened by a bushfire and you cannot move your horses to a safer district, then: fill troughs, baths, sinks and metal buckets (plastic ones melt) with reserve water for later use. Turn off power and gas and disconnect electrical fences. Remove all equipment from your horse. Rugs burn, plastic headstalls melt, and metal buckets get hot.


