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


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YARROWLUMLA COUNCIL NEWS

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1/10 PAGE ADS TO COST \$15 BEGINNING FEB, 2004

Whisper advertising revenue, at around \$750 per issue, is dropping down to the level of its printing costs. This is partly because when I am putting the Whisper together late at night, and unsure of the size of ads, I have downsized them to be avoid taking more out of advertisers' pockets than they might have to give, which has somewhat diminished total revenue.

Because the Whisper has to pay for itself, and hopefully to bring in a little profit to the community association, advertising prices need to go up a little bit. An ongoing problem has been to fairly size 1/10 and 1/8 page ads, priced at \$10 and \$15. One way to raise revenue a bit and to solve this sizing problem is to combine the two categories and charge the higher rate, with the size to be at least 1/10 page, and sometimes a bit more depending on space on the page. I regret asking advertisers running 1/10 page ads, many of whom have kept the Whisper going for years, to pay more.

If it helps, you can know that Whisper circulation has grown to around 900, and, thanks to many volunteer contributors, the content has made it more readable. My hope is that this change can take effect with the February, 2004 issue. Between now and then there is only the single end of year Dec 2003 / Jan 2004 issue. If any advertriser with a \$10 ad decides the price hike to \$15 is too rich, I do wish to thank you for running your ad until now. Alternatively, if anyone wishes to discuss this proposed price hike please phone me on 6238 3484 or Lofty Mason, Community Association President, on 6238 3258. 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
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114 Molonglo Street 6238 1517 **HORSES AND BUSHFIRES - Conclusion**

(taken from Agriculture Notes by Patricia Ellis & Hilary Pope, Attwood for the State of Victoria Department of Natural Resources & Environment, 1999 – – suggested for reprinting in the Whisper by Chris Powell)

Veterinarians will most probaly be working under emergency circumstances and communications may be disrupted, so expect some delay before help arrives. You must therefore be prepared to monitor the progress of your horses and to administer appropriate fist aid while you are waiting for professional assistance.

Skin burns produce severe inflammation, indicated by heat, pain and swelling. Thus first aid must be antiinflammatory, ie cold water delivered by a horse or gently sponging if you still have access to a water supply. It is also important that horses have ready access to feed and water (if available), shade and to soft, even ground if their feet are burnt.

The veterinarian will assess the degree and depth of the burns and treat accordingly. Treatment may include injections to relieve pain, reduce inflammation and prevent infection, and intravenous fluids may be given to counteract shock. Antiinflammatory creams may also be supplied. Check all burnt areas regularly for fly strike. The horse should be kept warm and confortable and coaxed to eat and drink. Careful nursing is of utmost importance to recovery.

Horses with quite severe burns will often respond well to intensive treatment, but this can be time consuming and very costly.

A common cause of death in fires and in the days aferward is complications from smoke inhalation. Severe smoke inhalation can cause delayed lung damage, which may not be immediately obvious. Horses may appear normal after the fire, but 3-4 hours can be come anxious with rapid, sometimes laboured breathing, and an elevated heart rate. These horses need urgent veterinary treatment particularly if they have burns around the eyes, singeing of the mane and forelock, muzzle burns and a soot-stained discharge form the nose.

Care must be taken introducing horses to burnt areas. There may be hot spots that could flare up without warning. Partially burned structures and trees may be unstable and suddenly fall over. Make sure the fencing is secure. Check for ash pits – areas where root systems have burned underground – downed power lines and dangerous debris before turning horses out in a burned paddock.

The distress of having a horse burnt in a bushfire can be magnified by the lack of readily available first aid measures. This can be compounded in the fire destroys facilities and prevents any form of communication to seek help.

Good forward planning will protect the safety and well being of your hourses if you live in a high fire risk area. Carefully consider the needs of your animals when developing your household survival plan. Develop your fire safety plan now and practice it regularly!



BURGLARY - REDUCING THE RISKS

During the months of August and September this year, Wamboin suffered an increase of burglaries within its community. Since then, offenders believed to be involved in this criminal activity have been arrested and has led to no homes being broken into during October. A pleasing result since six homes were robbed during September.

As discussed at a recent community meeting, there were a number of reasons as to why Wamboin was targeted. It is believed that a contributing factor was a lack security measures that certain victims had in place. Unfortunately, there will always be thieves on the lookout for properties they can rob. There are, however, simple measures you can take to greatly reduce the likelihood your property will be targeted.

PROFILE OF A THIEF Most thieves enter through a door or window at the side or rear of the house. They are usually after jewellery, cash or other portable items that can be easily sold eg. televisions, video recorders, personal computers, cameras and stereos. Generally, they don't like to enter properties if they think someone may be home.

ALWAYS LOCK UP Good home security involves more than fitting deadlocks or an alarm. You must ensure you use them - every time you leave your home. All too frequently in Wamboin, thieves enter homes through unlocked or open doors and windows.

GOOD NEIGHBOURS - YOUR BEST WATCHDOG Good neighbours are one of the best security devices you can have. Get to know your neighbours, stay in touch and together keep an eye out for any suspicious behaviour. It's a good idea to exchange work and holiday telephone numbers. Recently, a number of burglaries have been prevented through observant neighbours. Report any unusual noises or suspicious behaviour to your local police.

KEEP ACCURATE RECORDS Thieves don't like stealing property that is clearly identified. Marked property is very hard to dispose of and recent legislation regarding the operation of pawnbrokers had made it even more difficult. Accurate records of all your property will not only deter thieves but will give the police a better chance of locating your property. Some hints:

- Engrave your electrical equipment and other property (including your CDs) with your driver's licence number, prefixed by NSW. Engraving machines are available from your local police station.
- Keep photographic records of all your property that can't be engraved, especially jewellery and works of art.
- Obtain valuation certificates with detailed descriptions of all items. Store the certificates in a safe place.

KEYS

- Never leave spare keys outside your home. Thieves know all the usual hiding places, especially under mats or pot plants.
- Don't have personal details such as your name, address and telephone number on your keys.
- Give a duplicate set of keys to a trusted friend, relative or neighbour.
- If you lose yours keys or move into a new home, make sure you change all the locks. If someone calls you to say that they have found your keys, tell them to drop them off at the nearest police station.

• Don't leave keys on the kitchen table or any other obvious place.

DOORS

- Install quality deadlock devices on all external doors.
- Check your doors are correctly fitted and working properly. Check door frames are secure and sound.

• Security grilles can be useful barrier to outsiders. They should only be used, however, as a last resort to enhance physical security of entry doors and windows in high risk situations/locations.

- Don't leave notes on the door stating that you are away or when you'll return.
- Keep your front door locked when you are at the back of the house, or in the garden.
- Install a peephole in your front door and always check the identification of strangers before you let them into your home. If in doubt, don't open the door.
- Secure garage doors with deadlocks or strong padlocks. Always lock the garage door.

YARDS

- Thieves like their privacy too, so ensure you keep trees and shrubs trimmed, especially trees close to your house that could be climbed to gain access to your property, or to hide thieves' activities.
- Owning a pet dog may deter would-be thieves from targeting your home.
- Ensure all gates are secured. The rear and sides of homes are often targeted by thieves.
- Always lock away tools, ladders and gardening equipment. These items can be used by thieves to enter your home.

• Infra red (or movement activated) security lights covering front and rear access to your home may help deter would-be thieves.

• Ensure your street number/property name is clearly visible from the street. This will help police and other emergency personnel find your home quickly in an emergency.

WINDOWS

- Install key operated locks on all windows. Have your window locks keyed alike so you only need one key to open or lock all your windows.
- Use laminated glass or shatter resistant window film to help prevent entry.

ALARMS

Visible alarm equipment can be very effective deterrent to thieves. Your alarm system should cover all external entry doors and windows.

IF YOU ARE ROBBED If you arrive home and suspect that you've been robbed, call the Queanbeyan Police Station immediately. If you are alone ask a neighbour to come in with you or wait until the police arrive. If you suspect the thieves may still be inside, don't enter the premises. While you're waiting for the police to arrive, compile a list of what you think is missing. Include brand names, model numbers, serial numbers, accurate descriptions and any engraving details in your list. Remember not to touch anything. It is important the police see your home exactly as the thief left it. What you think is a mess could be valuable evidence.

BURGLARY IS EVERYONE'S PROBLEM Are you a risk of a break-in? Is your home safe from intruders? Have you done all you can to ensure your own safety and the protection of your property? Are your valuables protected? Or ... is it easy for a burglar to get in? Easy for a burglar to sell your things without suspicion? Are you secluded but unsafe sheltered from prying eyes but sheltering to thieves? If you answer 'yes' to any of these queries, you may need to introduce some changes around your home – to make it harder for burglars to break in, and easier for you and your neighbours to sleep at night. 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Geary's Gap/Wamboin Landcare

Myna Birds Now In Wamboin. At the last Landcare meeting, Dr Chris Tidemann of the ANU talked of the problems caused by Common Myna birds in the region. These aggressive, intelligent, adaptable and noisy little birds not only harass every native bird in their sight but frequently evict them from the hollows in which they breed. They have also been known to displace sugar gliders, which are valued residents of our area, from their 'homes'. Originating in India and having been introduced to Canberra in 1968, they have now made their way to Wamboin and are already threatening our local wildlife and biodiversity. They adapt readily to human habitat and food and at the meeting one local reported they were already making themselves at home in her roof. A resident of Poppet Road says she regularly has 20 or more on her lawn. Dr Tidemann has developed a trap which has been quite effectively used in Canberra. It fulfills all the requirements set by the Australian Animal Ethics Committee and allows only 2 species, Mynas and Starlings to enter. He will be allowing the Landcare group to borrow the trap for a period of time at the end of November for use in the area. Mobile Phone Survey – closing instalment (from me) – for the moment Below are the responses I've received from eight residents since last month's Whisper hit your letterbox. The ratio of mobile phone users who have good vs bad quality reception is about in line with earlier responses. Since July, when the survey kicked-off, 28 residents emailed responses. Your contribution has helped form the basis of a Report on the Quality of Mobile Phone Coverage in Wamboin and Bywong localities. In addition, over 70 people signed the Mobile Phone Petition - an impressive outcome given its limited exposure (time and venue). At the time of writing (25/10), the Report has just been forwarded to El Presidente of the Wamboin Community Association, Lofty Mason. At its last meeting (20/10), members of the Bywong Community Association made some useful suggestions and these have been incorporated in the Report. BCA indicated a keenness to formally support community initiatives for improved mobile phone reception. All things being equal, it will annexe a formal letter of endorsement to the Report. If things go to plan, the then WCA & BCA backed Report will be despatched to the key mobile phone telecommunication carriers, relevant politicians and other people the Association/s believe it is appropriate to target. And, the excitement builds....and federal government election draw ever closer ... the mobile phone customer/voter call is simple, that mobile phone reception across our localities must be improved.....HELLO!

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FLEA FACTS

Jumping ability. Fleas can jump 150 times their own length and with an acceleration equivalent to 140g's. They can jump 30 cm horizontally and 13 cm vertically. Hosts are located by heat and interrupted light. The mechanics of jumping are dependent on resilin - a super-elastic protein located in the thorax above the hind legs.

Breeding ability. Adult fleas feed within seconds of jumping onto a host - they have piercing mouth-parts that suck blood from the host (dogs and cats but will also bite man). They mate within 24 hours and produce eggs by 34 hours. Up to 50 eggs/flea/day are laid. A single flea can produce 350,000 new fleas in a year - imagine what a married flea could produce!! Fleas can live for up to 500 days. The eggs fall off the host and hatch in 1-10 days depending on the conditions. The larva feed on organic matter and on the blood in the faeces passed by adult fleas. The larva then forms a pupa - a sticky cocoon which usually lasts for 7 days but can last for 140 days in cooler moist conditions ie Winter. Flea pupae hatch into adult fleas in response to environmental stimuli (warm humid weather, vibration, sound and carbon dioxide - walk into a house that has been deserted for months and fleas will suddenly hatch and bite you). Total lifecycle 12-180 days. 95 % of the lifecycle is spent off the host.

Clinical significance. Flea allergy dermatitis (FAD) is an allergy to flea saliva and is the most common dermatological disease of dogs that we see. Allergies develop best when a dog is exposed intermittently to large numbers of fleas whereas cats develop FAD more commonly from continuous exposure. In dogs the most common site of scratching and hair loss is on the rump and around the base of the tail. Cats show lesions around the neck, back, thighs and abdomen. Other effects of fleas are irritation from bites resulting in trauma and self trauma from scratching. Very severe flea infestations can cause anaemia and death especially in puppies. The flea is also the intermediate host for a couple of worms - the most important in this area is the Tapeworm.

Prevention. Gone are the days of powders and washes. Single spot-on treatments now provide a month of flea control. The one that we recommend is Frontline Plus which not only kills adult fleas for a month (and ticks for 2 weeks) but also kills eggs, and prevents larvae and pupae from developing.

"Things that go bump in the night ... Should not really give one a fright...."

So begins Spike Milligan's delightful piece of whimsy. The trouble here is that a great deal goes "bump in the night", but I hear little, except perhaps for the drone of jet aircraft circling monotonously at high altitude. A day in the spring time garden usually finishes me!

But the other morning, in that golden time I cherish before the sun shakes off the night, the usual sequence of morning greeting, first by the rooster, then the kookaburra, magpie and cockatoo, was disturbed. There was a commotion from the chook house. A little later I saw Mort, that faithful hound, cradling a limp possum and licking it tenderly. The possum, sadly, was beyond responding. It was dead, showing all the hallmarks of a fox attack.

I felt I had known that possum well. On nightly raids it would drop from the overhanging bushes and tear out the primulas, rip up the pansies and chew on beetroots still buried in the ground. One night we heard a rustle in the tree. There, in the torch light, was a possum, but a most unfortunate little fella with a bulbous growth under its chin. The "growth" we discovered as it fell to the ground was a half eaten rockmelon that I had been waiting to pick . Then one morning we saw a possum hanging spreadeagled in a prickly wattle. It stayed there all day, as if dead, and it was only under the cover of darkness did it rouse itself and vanish into the night. So that was what they meant by "playing possum", but now the little creature of the night had given up its games. Reluctantly, for the ground is hard, I grabbed the shovel and with my faithful hound, set off to dig its final resting place. I buried him and we solemnly tamped down the dirt and went away. But things must have gone "bump" in the night, for next morning I discovered an empty grave. I retrieved the dusty possum and under somewhat critical supervision, respectfully buried him once again, marking the grave with a large tree stump.
