

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
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EASTERN CAPITAL CITY LOCAL GOVERNMENT AREA NEWS





IF ONLY THEY COULD TALK

A series by local vet, Dr Garry McComb BVSc QDAH PSITTACINE BEAK & FEATHER DISEASE

One of the many frustrating diseases that we see in birds is feather loss. The easy ones to cure are caused by lice and mites however this article is about one for which there is no treatment. Psittacine Beak and Feather Disease (PBFD) is caused by the smallest known virus (circovirus). It is predominately a disease of parrots but different strains of the virus have been found to affect pigeons, doves, finches and seagulls. The different viral strains do not appear to affect other bird groups, other animal species or humans.

The virus targets the skin and the immune system. The typically infected bird will develop multiple feather abnormalities. These can be quite variable and include feather loss, broken feathers, abnormally coloured feathers, retained feather sheaths, and pinched or narrowed feathers. The beak may also be affected resulting in overgrowth, deformities and fractures. Not all birds will show beak abnormalities. The most commonly affected wild birds are sulphur-crested cockatoos, gang gangs, and lorikeets.

Feather loss leads to an inability to fly and a decrease in insulation. Beak abnormalities result in starvation. Also, because the virus attacks the immune system, many birds die from secondary infections.

The virus is transmitted in feather dust, faeces and crop secretions. Infected birds will pass the virus to the developing egg. Younger birds more likely to become infected and develop disease than older ones. Very young chicks can suffer sudden death with no feather abnormalities.

In birds with obvious clinical signs a tentative diagnosis can be made on physical appearance alone. However this is inaccurate, as there many causes of feather abnormalities, feather picking being one of the major differential diagnoses. Birds that feather pick do not have abnormal head feathers whereas birds with PBFD can have abnormal head feathers. The only reliable method of PBFD diagnosis involves collecting a blood sample and testing for the virus. After infection with the virus the bird may develop the disease - this may take up to 18 months. Some infected birds may mount an effective immune response that removes the virus from its system. These birds will most likely become immune. Some birds may remain clinically normal but will still shed the virus - this is particularly common among lorikeets. These birds remain a continual source of infection for other birds. A few birds with clinical signs (usually lorikeets) may recover.

The disease is present in wild Australian parrot populations. Estimates vary but may be as high as 30-40%. Despite this wild birds are not believed to pose a great threat to aviary birds. Direct exposure to infected individuals or to the virus on clothes and utensils is much more significant. The virus is quite resistant but can be killed by chlorine disinfectants. There is no treatment.

The Fire Season has been extended until 30 April 2004 Remember: No Fires without a Permit

From the Captain's Desk



It seems that all those rain dances haven't worked. There is still a lot of dry fuel out there and the weather forecasts do not look good from a firefighter's viewpoint. Although we have been exceptionally fortunate so far this fire season the fire risks remain too high to declare an end to this season. We received the word last week that the fire danger season will be extended until the end of April. This means that fires are not permitted unless a permit has been granted.

It is pleasing to report that when the extension to the fire shed has reached the lock-up stage the internal fit-out can go ahead thanks to a great effort by **Peter Greenwood** in securing funding from the Australian Government under its Regional Partnerships program, administered by the Department of Transport and Regional Services. The grant will enable us to put in the flooring, plumbing, stairs, and internal wall linings for example. The plan is to officially open the extension at the end of September 2004.

As can be seen from the photographs below, taken by **Peter Greenwood**, work is underway again. The picture on the left shows the progress just before lunch on Monday 29 March and on the right the structure at the end of the day.



The ground floor of the extension will provide more parking space for brigade vehicles and the upstairs area will provide an improved training and administrative area. Although some people had put in requests for a pole from the top floor to the ground we had to settle for a conventional staircase. Perhaps not as much fun but maybe more realistic!



The first part of the brigade's website is now available. The website has been developed in two parts. The first provides information for the local community. The information covers almost every issue connected with bush fires and being prepared for them. The website also has many links to many other fire-related sites to make accessing the information as easy as possible. The second part will enable brigade members to access specific information on brigade activities and their own personal brigade records. The Internet address is www.wamboin-fireshed.com. Each year somewhere in Australia the national Australian & New Zealand Police and Emergency Services Games are held. This year the event was held in Perth. The competition is a mix of numerous sports from athletics, swimming, fishing, golf, ten pin bowling, beach volleyball, indoor soccer and many more. The competitors are from Australia, New Zealand, Singapore, PNG, Indonesia and South Africa. Ages start from 18 and the stop when you do. Her fire fighting training came in handy with the temperature in the low forties each day and the temperature of the track between 52 and 55 degrees. She brought back a swag of medals in the 18-29 years age group -1^{st} in the 100 metres, long and triple jumps, 2^{nd} in the 200 metres and discus, 3^{rd} in the 100 metres hurdles and a creditable 4^{th} in the shot putt. The result in the shot putt is completely understandable as the ladies who came 1^{st} , 2^{nd} and 3^{rd} were all police officers and only came in two sizes - large and extra large!

On Saturday 13 March 2004 an enjoyable ceremony was held at the Gidgee Estate Winery. Following the success of the sales of their Bush Fire Red Kay Brett and Cheryl Lane presented the brigade with a cheque for \$1200. As an expression of the brigade's thanks for the cheque and the great efforts of the Bush Fire Red team, certificates of appreciation were presented to Kay and Cheryl, Alan Nicol, and Richard Taylor from Uriarra Printers. Unfortunately Michael, our local postie, and a representative from LJ Hooker Bungendore could not be present to accept the brigade's thanks. On the right are members of the brigade with a couple of welcome visitors, Bruce Arthur, the areas' Fire Control Officer and Rachel Schroder, the brigade's youngest member (front row on the right).

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GEARY'S GAP/WAMBOIN LANDCARE Growing Native Trees in Phalaris Paddocks by Hiliary Kent and John Merritt

Phalaris was widely used in the Geary's Gap/Wamboin area to augment native grasses. It is hardy and vigorous and now the dominant grass in most low-lying areas. It poses special problems for those who wish to grow Australian native trees. There is no simple way of overcoming these problems.

Preparation Phalaris is too vigorous and dense to permit direct seeding. We plant tube stock. Wherever possible we rip some months before planting. We then apply Glyphophate along both sides of the rip line to create a metre-wide phalaris-free strip. The dead phalaris is left in the ground to help conserve moisture and inhibit grass growth. If it is removed it is quickly replaced by wild sorrel, which has the capacity to choke young trees almost equally to that of phalaris itself. Moreover, in time, the phalaris will always come back. Thus we also add mulch to the rip lines. Often we use phalaris hay, cut after the seeds have fallen. It is durable and effective. We grow our own tube stock or purchase it from local nurseries.

Planting Our planting practice is to loosen the rootball, firm the tree in well, construct a saucer-shaped depression around it, add a teaspoon of slow release fertilizer, water well, and then mulch. Whenever possible we plant after rain. We do not stake tube stock. Small trees usually become wind firm before they begin significant upward growth. We do stake taller plantings, using either two or three wooden stakes and a support placed 15-30cm above ground. We no longer use plastic growbags. While they provide wind protection, they generate too much heat in the summer months.

We favour spring plantings. Dry and frosty autumns are common in this region and they can be hard on young trees. With spring plantings the frost problem is reduced and there is usually some rain before summer sets in. When the frosts arrive in April or May the trees are able to survive.

We have planted a mixture of eucalyptus species so as to minimize the effects of insect attack. We have also included a fair proportion of acacias. They add nitrogen to the soil and grow quickly, giving the other trees some wind protection. We give new plantings survival water in their first year, watering once every 3 weeks during summer. After the first year, they are on their own. We then spend a lot time cutting our persistent clumps of phalaris and renewing the mulch on rip lines. We stop weeding and mulching only when the trees are well-established. Some brush cutting might follow, but establish trees soon reduce phalaris growth themselves.

Protecting young trees Phalaris must be eaten down or slashed if it is not to become a fire hazard. We run sheep but they can be hard on trees. For some time we experimented with a variety of individual wire tree guardswhich we anchored with steel pickets. These worked well while the trees were young, but not so well when they acquired breadth and height. They restrict lateral growth and the sheep learn to climb up the sides. There was no alternative but to fence our windbreaks and to build large circles of ringlock around solitary paddock trees. When the foliage on the paddock trees is above sheep height, we remove the ringlock and use chicken wire sheaths to protect the trunks. (Light plastic mesh workd just as well.) The sheath needs to be anchored otherwise the sheep will push it upwards and nibble the areas of exposed trunk. Persistence does pay off. Most of our five year plus trees are now without protection and are strong enough to withstand sheep rubbing against them.

Tree selection We began by trying to grow trees that were indigenous to the local area. We achieved significant success with *Eucalyptus mannifera, E. poyanthemos, E.macrorhyncha* and *E. bridgesiana*. But we had difficulty with *E. rossii* and with cauarinas, and failed completely with *E. melliodora*. We concluded that our block had been so disturbed by its years as a grazing paddock that any attempt to re-create and indigenous environment was Quixote, so we branched out into species from other areas of Australia. The trees we have grown with most success on the drier parts of our block are: *Eucalytus macarthurii, E. pauciflora, E. bridgesiana, E. mannifera, E. apiculata, E. moorei, E. paliformis, E. poyanthemos, E. nicholli, E. rubida, E. macrorhyncha* and *E. cinerea*.


On damper, colder areas, by far the best performers are *E. ovata, E. parvifolia, E. camphora* and *E. aggregata*. We have experimented with many different wattles. *Acacia dealbata, A. rubida, A. boormani* and *A. cardiophylla* have all proven reliable performers. (Hiliary and John were founding members of Geary's Gap/Wamboin Landcare and their input contributed heavily to the success of the group. They plan on leaving the area soon and as can be ascertained from their article, will be leaving their property in much better condition than they found it. We wish them well.)




AUSTAG
