

"How's the Market?"

The question we get asked most often is "how's the real estate market?" The answer is that from an analysis of the number of sales in this area, it's never been better. That's probably best indicated by the number of "under offer and "sold" stickers around the region. We at Sutton Real Estate have actually seen an increase in sale numbers (year to date) over the same period last year, the supposed high point of the market.

What has happened though is that there has been a sharp increase in the number of properties on the market. This, in our opinion, has created the public perception that things are a bit slow. There is no doubt that some properties are taking a bit longer to sell, but buyers have been spoiled for choice. Instead of one or two in each price category, there are now probably half a dozen. This time last year we had about 20 properties on the market. Currently we have approximately 50.

Homebuyers generally shop with a set of criteria and a budget. With the abundance of choice they may be able to find more than one property that suits their needs. Which property will they buy? The one that represents the best value for money on a feature for feature basis. The net result is, those vendors pushing for that slightly higher price are not selling until they in turn become the best value for money.

Those properties that are well priced and well presented will sell. You just have to be the best value for money in your property category. There is however nothing wrong with seeking a premium, so long as you're prepared to wait that little bit longer.

In reality the sale price of your property is only one factor in the process. Unless you are selling an investment home then the most important thing to consider is the change over price, ie. The sale price of your current property minus sale costs, minus moving costs, minus the purchase price of your new home and minus the dreaded stamp duty = the changeover cost.

Generally you'll find that if you're selling and buying at the same time in a similar market, that as a percentage of your sale price, the change over price will not vary appreciably. The change over price will only vary if there is a significant shift in the market between the time you sell and when you're ready to buy, or if you are moving to an area interstate or overseas that is greatly affected by local influences not relevant to our area.

So if you're thinking of selling, don't be overly influenced by the media hype. Find out a realistic sale price for your current home, research the market you're moving to, factor in your time frame and make your decision.

Fire permits are required if you want to burn off or light fires in the open. Your neighbours and your fire brigade Captain need to be notified 24 hours before you light up.

RING 000 TO REPORT FIRES OR SMOKE SIGHTINGS.

From the Captain's Desk

It had to happen I suppose. If our reader remembers, last month's article was written on the morning of a fine day at the end of a very quiet fire season. I made the big mistake of commenting publicly about the lack of incidents. Retribution can be swift. That afternoon we did get a call. A grass fire was reported and the winds were picking up. We had crews there as quickly

as we could and between the brigade and the owners of the property the fire was contained within the boundaries of the paddock. Within a few days another call went out to assist the Queanbeyan brigade with a fire that was threatening properties south of Queanbeyan. Many brigades responded to this one as the terrain made access difficult. We spent a couple of days there making sure it was completely blacked out. The photograph below shows two brigade members, Mark Watson and Peter Greenwood, doing some of the exciting blacking out work towards the end of the fire at Barrack's Creek. I think I may have learned my lesson. I won't mention the lack of emergency activities this month or the quiet times we are experiencing. I just won't mention them at all!

In what we will probably brand me as a grumpy old man I thought I would share one of my dislikes. It is to do with how our language is being mangled almost everyday. While I don't have too many problems in accepting that the meanings of words and phrases can and do evolve to suit the times when they are used, it is fascinating how quickly meanings can be obliterated. Don't get me started on phrases such as "a genuine fast bowler", "fully sick", "totally awesome" and many others. I will quickly get myself into trouble, especially with anyone several years younger than me. The

concern that I would like to mention here is how the meaning of the word "volunteer" seems to be changing.

When we join the fire brigade we accept that it does mean that we are technically on call 24 hours a day, every day of the year. We do this knowingly and willingly. We accept that it could and does create friction with our families when we spend a lot of time training, maintaining our equipment or attending incidents. We do this work for many individual reasons and it can involve some degree of risk and many hours of controlled boredom, but we like to think it is a worthwhile occupation. We do this work along with everything else we need to do in our lives. We did volunteer after all.

So what is the problem, our loyal reader may be asking? It is fascinating how many people these days seem to believe that there will always be someone to save or protect them, be it at odd times and also from themselves. It is disappointing to report that many people appear to fervently believe and expect that a volunteer fire brigade can respond in five minutes to any incident at any time of the day or night



when they have lit a fire to get rid of some rubbish and then it gets out of control. They appear to believe that because we are volunteers that is what we are paid for and what we do all the time! We do this work because we believe in what we do and we do the best we can to help and protect our own communities, but being taken for granted is not in our job descriptions. We all need to work together as partners to ensure our community is safe from the threat of fires. We also have to accept that it is a fact of life that it takes time for us to get from our homes and places of work and get to an incident, real or otherwise. Property owners also need to understand their roles in this partnership. We all need to keep the fire hazards down on our properties. If you don't know how or what the hazards then please call one of the field officers or me. We will be happy to advise.

Before I get off the soapbox, there is one more thing. If you are planning to burn off, please, please wear the appropriate clothing. I have seen people burning off large sections of their paddocks without any decent clothing to protect themselves. Many of them have been seen coughing and squinting while running to avoid the smoke. One person was even heard to say that they didn't know it got so hot fighting a fire and their fire was only a small pile of branches. Please be careful and look for advice on our website or call.

At the risk of repeating myself, fire permits are not required now but please notify your neighbours and me at least 24 hours burn you intend lighting up. This saves a lot of unnecessary activity and having crews put on alert when people ring reporting smoke. Even though the official fire danger period is over there is still a reasonable risk of bush fires. As you know we haven't had any significant rain for quite a while and the ground fuel is still abundant and dry. We need to be watchful and alert but you can relax, we won't be sending you a fridge magnet.

This month I can announce that we may be presenting an award to the happiest firefighter in the brigade whom, despite having a great deal to do at home, volunteered recently on a weekday to assist the police in destroying an expensive quantity of evidence. The evidence was collected during a raid west of Canberra and had to be disposed of quickly and properly. When we spoke by telephone during the proceedings I asked if everything was going well. He said quite jovially that "everything was really cool, man but it is a real bummer that the wind keeps changing direction!"

Over the past few weekends many members of the brigade and some of their families have been spending many leisurely hours enjoying the sunshine, many jokes, pleasant conversation as well as partaking of some fine food and wine. During the quieter moments we helped Steve and Ruth Lambert pick several tonnes of grapes! We are grateful to Steve and Ruth for their support for the brigade and this is one way we can help them. The grapes we picked last year have produced a fine drop and we hope that this year's crop is just as successful.

The brigade will be holding its annual general meeting at 7:30pm on 14 June 2005 in the Wamboin Community Hall in Bingley Way. Everyone in the Wamboin, Bywong and Sutton areas are more than welcome to join us. We will be electing the office bearers and field officers for the next year as well as reporting on our activities. Refreshments will be provided after the meeting.

And before I forget and get into BIG trouble, it is really pleasing to report that Alison Spong again represented the Wamboin brigade, and the entire NSW Rural Fire Service at the Emergency Services Games. The Games were held in Adelaide this year. Her performances were outstanding: First - Long Jump and a new record of 5.35 metres; First - Triple Jump; First - Discus; Third - 100 metres; Third - 200 metres; Third - Shot Putt .



Nature Notes – April 2005 Jo Walker

A few days ago, I was reading something I wrote when I first moved to Wamboin sixteen years ago. In those days, the dam was always full, there were permanent waterholes in the creek inhabited by tadpoles and leeches, and there were green patches on the driest hillsides where seepage areas kept the ground moist. The silver wattles had healthy, dense grey foliage and were covered in clouds of yellow in spring, and the knee-high kangaroo grass in front of the house actually had to be mown! I wonder if it will ever be like that again? Right now, we seem to be returning to drought conditions.

However, there are a few interesting results of this long dry. As the dam continues to evaporate, it exposes a margin of damp clay mud that is readily colonized by moisture-loving mat plants. The most attractive of these is the Swamp Isotoma (*Isotoma fluviatilis*), its dense, ovate – and sometimes toothed – green leaves are often almost covered with blue flowers. The flower petals are arranged asymmetrically and are pale blue, with a yellow patch at the throat ringed with darker blue. Another mat plant, with much smaller flowers, is the Small Mudwort (*Glossostigma elatinoides*). This one looks almost like a reddish algal growth on the mud, but closer inspection shows tightly packed green-red leaves a few millimetres in length. The 5-petalled flowers are also small, up to about 5 mm across, but occasionally cover the leaves quite densely. They are pale grey to light mauve and give the plant a frosted appearance. Another little plant that has only appeared around my dam in the last year or so is the Swamp Stonecrop (*Crassula helmsii*). This plant is a quick colonizer and covers an extensive area. It has tiny (2-6 mm) fleshy, linear leaves of a very bright green. The flowers are minute, only about 2-3 mm across, white and 4-petalled. A mixture of these little mats now covers the whole margin of my dam – a very attractive fringe.

Last week, I saw a dramatic altercation take place in one of the big old yellow box trees along my creek. This tree has lost a few branches, and, over the years, the resulting holes have been enlarged by the sulphur-crested cockatoos and galahs who will often sit up there for lengthy periods quietly pecking away at the dead wood. I was working near this tree when two galahs I'd seen inspecting one of the holes began squawking, flapping their wings and raising their crests excitedly. As they'd never bothered about my presence before, I wondered what all the excitement was about. Then, there was a movement at the hole, and a little square, dark shape with a tail drifted across to a nearby dead wattle. It was a sugar glider! The galahs continued to screech and peer down the hole, so I assume there must have been other gliders there. The evicted glider clung to the wattle for some time after I'd seen the galahs off, then suddenly glided back to the tree, made its way up the trunk in a series of little leaps, and disappeared back into its home. There are several holes in that tree, so I'm hoping that the galahs and the sugar gliders can sort out a compromise!



Bywong and Wamboin Greenways

Wamboin and Bywong are fortunate to enjoy a network of Greenways that are Council-owned recreational and conservation trails through the district. Now in its 12th year, the Greenways provide a non-motorised right-of-way through the countryside, utilising a network of old Crown road reserves and road verge tracks. The second and equally important role for the Greenways is conservation: retaining and revitalising native vegetation patches in public ownership. Old crown roads, existing road verges and travelling stock routes are often islands of endemic species in a sea of agricultural exotics. Yarrowlumla Shire Council adopted 'access to the countryside' as its Bicentennial theme in 1988 and established the Bywong/Wamboin Greenways with State government cooperation a few years later.

But it wouldn't have happened without the perseverance and vision of local residents. Community association members and Pony Club parents — who sensibly preferred a network of trails to having their children ride on roads — showed how Greenways might work at a time when the very idea was attacked by some as vaguely un-Australian. Former YSC Councillor Suzanne Ridley and Bywong resident Julian Thompson were there from the beginning, pushing the idea through many a paper hurdle and Council session. They can now smile wryly when real estate advertisements boast of the property-value-enhancing benefits of access to Greenways.

Local community associations have continued their support together with the Geary's Gap Wamboin Landcare Group. Council established a Greenways management committee (355 committee) of local residents in 1995 and this committee oversees the maintenance and enhancement of the existing trail for controlled public use as well as conservation works. Dollars for maintenance and improvement have come from a small Council grant, a Natural Heritage grant and Total Catchment Management program grant augmented by community fund raising and much volunteer labour for fencing and gating, planting, minor earthworks, signage and public awareness.

New Greenway links are subject to negotiation between ECRCC and the State government for gazettal of the relevant crown roads and in some instances can involve an agreement with a subdivision developer. A new Greenways ideally has its own 355 committee of local residents. Future funding and volunteer commitment are now up to the Council and the community.

Remember some features of our Greenways: (1) Reserved for pedestrian, horse or push bike traffic – No motorised vehicles, including dirt bikes; (2) Dogs must be leashed; (3) No hunting of any descriptio; (4) Protect the environment – no collecting, littering, fires; (5) Stay on designated pathways – erosion is an ongoing concern; (6) Respect adjoining private property boundaries and leave gates as they are found; (7) No grazing of stock on Greenways.

Happiness is a wheelbarrow, a good shovel and a pile of cow manure against a curtain of red gold leaves under an autumn sky. The gardening gurus may have other things in mind for us, but I'm making compost heaps. I've been snipping and hacking and pulling in the garden and have amassed a mountain of material for mulching. This, with the manure, a scattering of lime and a deep watering should produce crumbly brown compost for spring. Already the worms and slaters and little things that move have claimed their paradise. I'll leave it to them.

I haven't had a vegetable garden this season. About all I've harvested is two bonus pumpkins, and bunches of self sown parsley and cherry tomatoes. There hasn't been any water to spare, but I have had some of the fruits of other Wamboin gardens. We went to the local produce market on Saturday and it was a real treat. I came home with yet more blooming snacks for the rabbits, and an armful of lettuces, tomatoes, basil, rocket, zucchinis and garlic. As well I had a tub of fetta cheese from a doe-eyed jersey cow and a brown paper bag of freshly ground coffee. And I was peckish.

I chopped up some tomatoes and basil, and added a grind of black pepper. Then I brushed several slices of good Italian bread with olive oil and lightly grilled them. While the aroma of brewed coffee was teasing me, I heaped the tomatoes on the toast and added a chunk of cheese, more like bocconcini than fetta to my taste. What a perfect repast!
