Sutton joins quarry discussion A general meeting of Sutton and District Community Association decided to request representation on the Quarry Committee and to hold a public meeting to discuss the proposed re-activation of the Sutton quarry development after hearing of the motion passed by a public meeting at Bywong. This motion, passed unanimously by more than fifty members of the public, requested Yass Valley and Palerang Shire Councils to oppose the development, and in the event that the development commences, calling on the Yass Valley Council to uphold firmly at all times all of the consent conditions imposed by the Land and Environment Court. Community President Warwick Cathro had previously joined Janet Smith from the Quarry Committee in addressing a meeting of Yass Valley on the matter.

Community Christmas party Wamboin residents are invited to drop in on the Community's Christmas drinks at the Community Hall between 6 and 8 pm on Saturday 3 December. Gidgee wines will again be in attendance and their vintages will be available for tastings. Bring anything you like - we have soft drink, some beer and nibbles.

SUTTON ROAD FIASCO ... BOB IS NOT ALONE

I'm one resident feeling just like Bob Allan (Whisper, October). I spent my working life engineering roads and aerodromes, but this hasn't helped me comprehend the fun and games going on with the Sutton Road "upgrade".

It may assist to understand the two pillars of modern roadmaking. Firstly we must deskill public authorities, such that they are uninformed purchasers of engineering services; secondly we transfer costs to the road users. One classic example of both is the modern practice of road sealing, whereby the user is asked to complete the aggregate (stone) embedment process. Unfortunately, the collateral damage for the motorist is the familiar stone chips and cracked windscreens.

More to the point, any inconvenience during construction is now largely worn by the motorist rather than the contractor. At Sutton Road the traffic light circus is an absolute disgrace, and confirms where the hapless road users fit into this bad joke, compounded, of course, by that endless cycle of construct, rip, construct, rip, etc.

In the bad old days project success was measured in terms of completion within quality, cost and time constraints. This so called "upgrade" isn't looking good on time and quality measures, even allowing for those pot-holes appearing in record time.

Taking all this into consideration, it is easy to understand why the total cost to Wamboin residents will not be taken into account; the cost over-run doesn't need this! ... And the ACT Government / Contractor can get away with it. Graham Bailey, Norton Road



IF ONLY THEY COULD TALK

A series by local vet, Dr Garry McComb BVSc QDAH

One of the concerns for any pregnant woman is **Toxoplasmosis**, which is caused by a single-celled parasite called *Toxoplasma gondii*, a protozoan-type organism that lives and breeds primarily in cats' intestines. It normally causes little or no illness to the cat, although some may get fever, pneumonia, liver problems etc. However the parasite produces millions of oocysts, which pass out into the cat's faeces. In most cases, these are produced over only a 10 to 12 day period, and this may happen only once in a cat's life, depending on the cat's diet and resistance to re-infection. The oocysts become infective within 2 to 5 days and can then survive for up to 18 months in shady areas. Cats become infected by eating these oocysts or by eating other foods which may contain toxoplasma cysts. This could be rodents or birds, undercooked meat or chicken. It is not found in dry or tinned cat foods.

The problem is that the oocysts are very often picked up by humans, animals and birds. In the case of humans, it can be by cleaning cat litter trays or by working in soils contaminated by cat faeces. Even the vegetables we eat may be contaminated as a result of cats using the garden as a toilet area. Foods can also be contaminated by knives, utensils and cutting boards that have had contact with raw meat.

Most people who become infected with *Toxoplasma* are not aware of it. Others however, may experience flu-like symptoms with swollen lymph glands or muscle aches and pains that last for a month or more. Severe toxoplasmosis, causing damage to the brain, eyes or other organs, can develop from an acute *Toxoplasma* infection or one that had occurred earlier in life and is now reactivated. Severe cases are more likely in individuals who have weak immune systems

In humans treatment is difficult, even though infection can usually be diagnosed by blood samples. It is not practical to test or treat cats themselves as the disease, if present at all, is very short lived and intermittent.

Prevention is the main aspect. This means keeping contact with dried cat faeces or contaminated areas to a minimum, especially in young children and pregnant women. Where possible, try and ensure that cats eat only tinned or dry cat food, and reduce roaming. Wear gloves when you garden or do anything outdoors that involves handling soil. Wash your hands well with soap and water after outdoor activities, especially before you eat or prepare any food.

When preparing raw meat, wash any cutting boards, sinks, knives and other utensils that might have touched the raw meat thoroughly with soap and hot water to avoid cross-contaminating other foods. Wash your hands well with soap and water after handling raw meat. It is recommended that all meat be cooked thoroughly; that is, to an internal temperature of 70° C and until it is no longer pink in the centre.

FIRE PERMITS ARE REQUIRED FROM YOUR BRIGADE IF YOU WANT TO BURN OFF OR LIGHT FIRES IN THE OPEN. You will also need to notify your neighbours and your fire brigade Captain 24 hours before you light up.

From the Captain's Desk



It seems a little ironic to be trying to write about fire-related things right now when you look out the window. What do we see? Everything is SO green. Everything is growing. You can practically hear the stuff getting bigger! No complaints whatsoever, of course. It has been a long time since things looked this good. It isn't often we hear stories about the vegetation towards the coast being dryer than here, but this is the case. Firefighters have been busy East and North of us. We may need to lend a hand there later.

During the past month your brigade has been called but our services weren't required. One incident had us responding into the wild depths of the ACT to investigate reports of a truck fire on Sutton Road, somewhere towards Queanbeyan. Our crews were ready to roll from the fire shed but when the Senior Deputy Captain, Andrew Dunn, found the burning truck, so had the ACT brigades and 428 from Queanbeyan. In case you don't know, 428 is the identification number of the NSW Fire Brigade truck

based in Queanbeyan. A quick assessment and our "Senior" notified Fire Control that the other emergency service crews had the situation well in hand and we could be stood down. Another incident occurred a couple of weeks later. A truck was reported to have rolled over spilling fuel, near the intersection of Macs Reef Road and the Federal Highway. One crew from our brigade was dispatched to the incident while other crews waited at the fire shed. An ambulance and police car were also dispatched. You would think that a truck that had rolled over would be fairly easy to find, but however hard they tried, the police, ambulance crew and our crew just could not find it! Maybe this was a case of divine intervention and somewhere there is a very happy truck driver earning a few beers somewhere after telling the story of a miraculous recovery when his truck was turned the right way up and the fuel spill just disappeared. Maybe this was simply a case of a hoax call, wasting a lot of time and putting a lot of people to a great deal of trouble and concern. I will leave our faithful reader to make up their mind.

There was one extremely hazardous and gruelling exercise your brigade was involved in last month, however. The story isn't pretty. The situation was tense for some of the time. Our patience was tested. We were outnumbered but we had a plan. We were well briefed and we relied on our teamwork. We worked as elite units, quietly, diplomatically, and yet when necessary, very assertively. Yes, faithful reader, you guessed it. Your brigade was in charge of organising the parking at the recent home and leisure show at Exhibition Park in Canberra. We were lucky to get this contract where we can earn money for the brigade and experience all the good manners, cooperation, bloody mindedness, arrogance, appreciation, respect and humour that makes people what they are. Admittedly it would have been easier herding cats at some stages during our shifts, but order eventually won the day and most visitors to the show appreciated out efforts.

Earlier last month a state-wide open day was held by the NSW Rural Fire Service. It was an opportunity for everyone in the community to visit their local brigade, speak to the volunteers, inspect the facilities and the equipment, and get some valuable advice about fire prevention and property protection. At the appointed hour on the anointed day our doors were open. The shed was swept out. The fire shed was tidied up and the new extension looked spick and span. The trucks were parked outside in an ordered row. They made an impressive sight. Our promotional literature was neatly set out. We were resplendent in our yellows. The barbecue was set up. Several of us were also busy repairing equipment and doing some odd jobs around the shed during a working bee. We were ready and we waited. We waited for a while for the visitors, and then we waited again. Waiting is an acquired skill for firefighters and so we honed our skills a little more. Our training paid off and we had a very successful day, waiting. At least the barbecue lunch was very tasty and very welcome! Pity we didn't get any visitors to help us enjoy it.

According to local custom, our December training session on the first Tuesday evening will be taken over by our Christmas party. Everyone is welcome to come along and help us celebrate the occasion and join us for a cleansing ale, soft drink, or the odd glass of wine, plus the traditional sumptuous barbecued repast. Rumour has it a portly and bearded gentleman, dressed in a red suit, may be visiting to put some smiles on the faces of the young'uns of all ages. The festivities begin around 6 pm. We would be pleased to see you there.

Over the weekend of the 12th and 13th of November several members of your brigade will be joining many others from brigades in the district in a very excellent adventure, namely NAVEX '05. This annual event helps our volunteers test their

skills and learn some more, as they work through many realistic training scenarios. They also get to use their navigating skills being dispatched around the district and finding their way through many different types of terrain.

During last month two of our members spent another of their weekends being reaccredited for their work with helicopters as part of their Remote Area Firefighting Team (RAFT) operations - winching and hot refuelling. It also isn't surprising, but our two members, Andrew Dunn and Darrell Tipton were described by the acting Fire Control Officer as "consummate professionals" and are a credit to our brigade. Naturally we know this already but it is always pleasing to hear it from others! Public help to identify trail bike riders

27 September 2005

ACT Policing is seeking the community's co-operation and assistance as the Traffic Operations team prepares a series of targeted actions against illegal trail bike riding in Canberra's parks and reserves. Police believe the problem with illegal trail bike riding is confined to a small group of riders and are confident that with the aid of the community, they will be caught.

The head of ACT Policing's Traffic Operations, Detective Superintendent Michael Chew, said police continue to act on the public's complaints regarding this type of behaviour. "Our efforts to apprehend these offenders will be aided greatly by the ongoing willingness of the community to work with us in identifying the offenders," Det Supt Chew said today. "We need specific information to be provided as promptly as possible, and assistance from witnesses prepared to attend court should the need arise. The sort of information we need is the date, place and time of the incident, any identifying features of the person or the motorcycle, a description of the incident, and whether there are other witnesses."

Aside from targeted operations planned in the weeks ahead, police are also working with other government departments to create physical obstacles to restrict trail bike access to public parklands.

"While we have several initiatives in place to address this issue, the type of response which has proved the most effective by far is the vigilance and willingness of members of the public to provide reports and to attend court as witnesses," said Det Supt Chew. "However at no time should anyone attempt to intervene with illegal trail bike riders, nor place themselves at risk of injury," he added. The result of that survey was 97 in favour, 41 against, and 3 of no fixed opinion (bless their souls – my addition). At its meeting on 18/4/1984, Council determined that the formation of the Wamboin Brigade should proceed." The note goes on to say " A public meeting will therefore be held at the Shed in Bingley Way at 7.30 pm on 8/5/1984 to establish the necessary organization i.e. Office bearers, Organization, Subscriptions, General Business and any questions of residents.....As the establishment of an efficient fire protection Unit is of Prime Importance to all residents, it is hoped that all families will be able to attend or at least send one representative." Well, as the saying goes... "the rest is history".

History it may be. And the Wamboin Bush Fire Brigade as it was then known and its various community members has a solid and successful history of protecting Wamboin, Bywong and surrounding areas. Moreover, over the years, members of the Wamboin Volunteer Rural Fire Brigade (as it has been called for several years) have been fantastic in protecting this region and areas further afield. Many, I hope all, in the community support the Brigade, whether it be by giving generously or what they can to the Brigade's Annual Donation Drive, or as a member of the Brigade's Support Crew, perhaps even as one of its Active Bush Fire Fighters. Rainfall and Temperatures in Wamboin statistics from the Robertsons



Nature Notes – October 2005

The most noticeable thing about Wamboin at the moment is the brilliant green mantle of grasses and other vegetation covering the countryside – a wonderful sight after the long period of drought.

October is the beginning of the 'daisy period'. You've probably all noticed the increasing area of little white paper daisies, *Leucochrysum albicans*, on the corner of Weeroona and Denley Drives. These are extremely hardy little plants which seem to prefer dryish, rocky sites to grow on – plenty of those in Wamboin! I'm naturalising this species on my land, and now have several eye-catching populations. The plants are fairly short-lived (just a few years), but produce large quantities of viable seed which germinate readily.

In the damper areas – and there are a lot of these this year – the bright yellow globes of Billy Buttons (*Craspedia variabilis*) are waving in the wind. Another daisy, *Brachyscome spathulata*, prefers the damp heavy soil between scattered *Kunzea ericoides* bushes. The beautiful mauve-blue flowers are held on slender stems up to 30 cm tall. The Yam Daisy, *Microseris lanceolata*, is making a come-back this year. It inhabits moist grassy areas and disappeared for a few seasons due to the drought. But the edible underground tubers survived and the plants are flowering well this year. The flowers are bright yellow and rather similar to some of the dandelion-like weeds. However, before flowering the Yam Daisy buds are bent over facing downwards. The stem straightens as the flower opens and then bends downwards again as the seed begins to form.

Two tiny daisies, with long names to make up for their size, are also flowering at present. *Triptilodiscus pygmaeus* is the tiny plant with little globose yellow flower-heads that is filling all of the gaps between grasses and growing on otherwise bare patches of ground. Probably most people dismiss it as a weed, but it is a native plant. In fact, there is only one species of *Triptilodiscus* in the world and it's ours. This is also the situation with *Isoetopsis graminifolia*, the Grass Cushion. This tiny annual, less than 5 cm tall, looks like a small tuft of bright green grass, but at its base you can see tiny flower-heads that look like miniscule cauliflowers. This one usually grows in small groups, but occasionally spreads to larger, more noticeable patches.

There is one beautiful plant in flower right now that you don't have to get on your knees to see – *Pomaderris angustifolia*. The few that survived the roadworks are flowering along Sutton Road, covered in masses of tiny cream flowers. There is a huge, elderly one growing on my place – about 2 metres tall and several metres across –that looks like a cream cloud at the moment. An added bonus is the quite strong, very fragrant scent. Pomaderris plants are in the Rhamnaceae family and are related to *Cryptandra amara* var. *longiflora*, another of our local plants. The Cryptandra is a small twiggy plant, usually 20 to 30 cm tall, which bears masses of small tubular white flowers in spring. There is a large patch of them (which have just about finished flowering) one kilometre from Norton Road along Weeroona Drive on the left side.

On the bird front, the magpies and the Red wattle Birds are busy coaxing their fledgling babies through the trees and the two King Parrots are still visiting occasionally. But the most exciting thing that has happened here for a while was the sighting of a Lyrebird two weeks ago. A magpie was swooping something the other side of the vegetation along the creek and suddenly a Lyrebird came through the bushes, trotted along for a few metres and disappeared back into the shrubbery. There are Lyrebirds along Molonglo Gorge and in one of the small gorges in Kowen Forest, but I've never seen them here before. I'd be interested to know if anyone else has seen them in Wamboin.
