#### President's Paragraphs

Palerang Draft Management Plan and Budget 2006-7—The Draft Management Plan and Budget has been the main focus of our attention in the last month. Notification of the public meeting at Wamboin came too late for inclusion in last month's Whisper. At very short notice, the WCA executive along with Bywong Community Association prepared a flyer for residents and conducted a letterbox drop of the area. I would like to thank all those involved with getting it done in such a timely and efficient manner. It was very successful, with almost 90 people attending the public meeting on Wednesday. See John van Straaten's report of the meeting later in the Whisper. The WCA executive is preparing a submission to Council objecting to the Draft Management Plan and Budget. We also intend to write to the NSW Minister for Local Government and the Member for Monaro.

**Braidwood Rural Lands Protection Board** – The WCA has written to the BRLPB to thank them for addressing the WCA May meeting and to voice dissatisfaction about the extension of their rating base, the lack of explanation or consultation, the lack of relevance to most of the residents on small properties and unnecessary nature of this extra layer of government.

**Drainage Work at Wamboin Community Hall** – Council have commenced drainage works at the hall. Thank you, Lofty and your team for putting in extra work on this project that the Council should have done.

Wamboin Produce Markets – After a successful season, the markets are now in recess until September.

**Annual Curry Night** – Make a date in your diary for Wamboin's gastronomical delight of the year which will be on the 19<sup>th</sup> August.

**Fireworks and Bonfire** – Another date to reserve is the 16<sup>th</sup> September, when the annual Fireworks and Bonfire will be held. Hopefully, this year the weather be kind to us.

#### PALERANG COUNCIL'S DRAFT MANAGEMENT PLAN & BUDGET 2006-7

Palerang Council's staff has prepared a draft Management Plan and Budget for Palerang for 2006-7 with projections for the next 5 years. The Council has authorised the public display of the Plan and Budget and the General Manager's letter to Palerang ratepayers of 1 June advised that these documents could be accessed on Council's web-site. He invited written submissions by 27 June. This letter also advised that Council had applied to the Minister for Local Government for a 9.9% increase for each of the next 5 years and considered that Palerang Council would not be viable without these rate increases.

Public meetings were held in Braidwood, Bungendore and Wamboin to discuss the draft Plan and Budget and you all were asked to complete a remarkable survey form which served as an example of Council's perception of "public consultation". Council's presentations at each venue were tailored to the audiences with the General Manager explaining the need for increases in rates and charges, comparing Palerang's rates with selected other Councils and outlining areas of expenditure. The Directors of Community Development and of Works also outlined their activities which required funding and indicated the areas for which funding would not be forthcoming. One of these was the inability to run the swimming pools at Braidwood, Bungendore and Captains Flat as it would require nearly \$190 000 to operate them all for a summer. This cynical exercise attracted the attention of many people at the Braidwood and Bungendore meetings and the emotion engendered distracted their attention from the details of the proposed rate increases and the measures to manage Palerang in 2006-7 and beyond.

Wamboin Community Hall last Wednesday night, however, had a full house and after the presentation s by Council's staff the subsequent discussion became very spirited in respect of the preparation and substance of the draft Plan, the accuracy of the figures, the composition (categories) and validity of the proposed rate model, the rates differentials between eastern and western Palerang and arrangements for the waste of Palerang. It was clear that there was much community dissatisfaction with significant sections of the Plan and Budget, not just the inequities of the current and proposed rate structures.

This article will be too late to encourage you to comment to Council in a submission. The Wamboin Community Association is making a submission and is writing to the NSW Minister for Local Government and the Member for Monaro on why this draft Management Plan and Budget is unacceptable in its current form. You too can write to the Hon.Kerry Hickey, MP, Minister for Local Government, Level 32 Governor MacquarieTower, 1 Farrer Place, Sydney. NSW.2000 and set out your concerns about the draft Plan and the proposed rate structures. -- John van der Straaten

One could almost believe that the weather man dozed off while his finger was still firmly pressed on the "fine and beaut" button. We have had seemingly endless days of perfect autumn weather; a light frost to put an edge on the new day, blue skies and barely a breeze to hurry along the last, lingering red leaves. Without fanfare, the purple blue winter irises have appeared and violets are poking through. An evening walk transforms the eucalypts from blue grey leaves to black lace on pale grey satin, and just for an instant you can glimpse the black silhouettes of a pen and ink sketch that an artist has carelessly thrown aside.

But you can have too much of a good thing, and even Pollyanna has her breaking point. Where is the rain. I thought last May was despairingly dry, but even with water in the dam, this May seems worse. The chooks are expressing their displeasure when I throw them lettuce leaves instead of a bundle of freshly pulled green weeds, the kangaroo is bringing her joey to the front door to trample and nibble violets because there is nothing to eat beyond the garden, and the frogs have all gone to ground. The last pool in the creek bed has disappeared. But as much as I feel for the animals, and the trees and bush, I feel for myself, too. I have a lists and lists of things, saved up to do on a rainy day. But it never rains! And while the sun shines, while the rain stays away, I have to be outside. I can't waste it. So cupboards stay crammed and unsorted, crates of photos sit alongside empty albums, and the family history grows more complex as it remains unchronicled. My sewing machine lies idle and the stack of books on my bedside table, grows. I never get beyond the first page of anything before I fall into an exhausted sleep.

I wouldn't live anywhere else....but where else would you complain about too much of a good thing. Would someone please rouse the weatherman.....I desperately need at least a month of rain to bring some discipline back into my life .....and the animals and bush might welcome it, too.

#### Nature Notes – June 2006 Jo Walker

Well, the first month of winter has brought us all sorts of interesting weather – over 60 mm of welcome rain, some nice warm days, one or two exceptionally cold nights and one memorable day when the landscape was still white at midday and the temperature didn't rise much above zero. All of this has been enough to get some germination going in the plant world: little bright green swards of grass seedlings are filling up the spaces between red-brown expanses of Kangaroo Grass (*Themeda triandra*).

Not a lot is in flower at the moment, just the Early Wattle (*Acacia genistifolia*), the Urn Heath (*Melichrus urceolatus*) and the mistletoes. Early Wattle is a common plant in the Queanbeyan area and along the escarpment into Kowen Forest – it has dark green spiny foliage and pale cream-coloured flowers and grows into a medium to tall shrub. *Melichrus urceolatus* is in the heath family (Epacridaceae) and is a very common sub-shrub in Wamboin – it grows to about 30 cm high and has light green, sharply pointed leaves and cream, urn-shaped flowers. These flowers are attractive to honeyeaters as a food source during the winter, and Eastern Spinebills and White-eared Honeyeaters can often be seen feeding on them. The mistletoes are also a nectar source, and their flowers are worth a look if you have any growing on the lower branches of eucalypts or wattles. They are quite beautiful – clusters of cylindrical red and yellow blooms.

The little male Australasian Grebe who has been frequenting my dam for a couple of months has been joined by a female now, and they are there most days floating on, and diving in, the icy cold water.

The Yellow- tailed Black Cockatoos paid a visit here the other day, noticed by their distinctive calls long before I saw them. Fortunately, the were confining their activities to food-gathering, tearing out large chunks of Silver Wattle wood to get to the juicy grubs within. They were regular visitors here a year or two ago, and, after they'd had a feed, would go in search of what must have seemed like cockatoo entertainment. They were particularly drawn to the out-of-area eucalypts and hakeas I'd planted, some of them by that time quite tall trees. As far as I could see, there were no insect tunnels in the plants they attacked with such relish – those big black birds just seemed to take a delight in tearing off branches and ring-barking the trees. Across the creek, I can see a hakea that, by now, should be a small tree but is instead a wide, flat shrub due to the cockatoos' attempts at topiary. I'd really like to know how they picked out the non-local trees which are very similar to those growing naturally here.

#### FENCES AND WILDLIFE

**Fences and wildife:** Two friends came across a distressing scene on a recent greenways walk. On a section where there are high and 'wildlife unfriendly' fences on both sides of the trail, they saw from a distance that a kangaroo was being chased by two dogs. She was dodging this way and that – seemingly unconfident about clearing the fence in either direction, and the human appearance had removed the 'straight ahead' option. Finally she backed up, made a big effort and went over one of the fences, almost catching a foot in the process. The two dogs continued chasing her across the property, now joined by three or four others.

The friends walked on and saw a lone joey, frozen against a ringlock fence, presumably waiting for dark and the possibility of Mum's return. Around the bend where the action had been, they found a newly dead joey on the trail. That pretty well doused the nature walk. This was on a trail section where, at least once before, a dead kangaroo was found caught in a ringlock section of fence it couldn't clear.

The greenways are designated officially as both access for humans through the countryside and also as conservation areas for native flora and fauna. Therefore fences facing the greenways that block wildlife migration pathways or escape from marauding pets defeat the purpose. Very few neighbouring properties appear to have such heavy stock loads (or stock deer?) that fences higher than 1.2 metres with added barbed wire and ringlock are necessary. The problem can become severe for wildlife, particularly where this type of fencing is on both sides of the greenway.

Please take another look at your fences next to greenways: Landholders are asked to please take a look at fences bordering the greenway and consider removing barbed wire and top strands that are more than four feet (1.2 m) high. Ringlock or wire at ground level can also cause problems for echidnas and other native wildlife. Six wire fence or horse-sighter wire fence design are the most wildlife friendly – starting 15 cm off the ground to 1.2 m height, with the top two strands at least 30 cm apart so roos can't catch their legs and become entangled. In regard to dogs, there can be animal welfare considerations as this story shows, and in general unleashed dogs are prohibited on the greenways.







Ring 000 to report fires or smoke sightings.

#### From the Captain's Desk

It is pleasing to report that we have had a quiet month, but only as far as incidents are concerned. We have been busy with our training program as well as a well attended working bee at the fire shed. One recent incident though, could be a good excuse for one lucky motorist to buy a lottery ticket. What would the odds be for a motorist driving a small car towing a large trailer with a large car on it losing control and crashing outside the only property on a major road where a fire crew lives and has a fire truck garaged on the property? Those odds have to be comparable with winning Lotto!

Last month we held our annual general meeting which was well attended despite the cool evening temperature. We were pleased to welcome several distinguished guests including the Mayor of Palerang, Councillor Jim Maclachlan and

Superintendent Nick Turner.

As the Brigade President, Peter Greenwood said in his report, "The past twelve months has seen a period of catch-up and consolidation for the Brigade. The Executive has been meeting regularly and I believe that we are in a sound financial and administrative state. Our Budget and Business Plan has been established which clearly sets out our goals not only for the short term but also for the future. One of our plans that is coming to fruition is the establishment of a major Community Emergency Refuge Centre at the Wamboin Hall. We have committed funds and will be working closely with the Wamboin Community Association and the Hall Management Committee to complete an extension to the hall. This extension will

include a meeting room, which can double as sleeping area for visiting fire fighters plus a small shower and change room. We are about to commence work on the provision of an additional rain water storage tank at the rear of the fire station plus a fixed large capacity fire fighting pump on the dam with underground reticulation and hose outlets adjacent to the hall and fire station for fire protection during bush fire emergencies and also for quick water replenishment of fire tankers.

Recruiting has been a targeted activity and I welcome on board sixteen new members to the Brigade.

I acknowledge and sincerely support the members of our community in Wamboin, Bywong and our newer areas of responsibility in Sutton Park and the Bidges Rd area, who have responded to our donations drive and given generously to the Brigade. Our members have also responded magnificently to fund raising activities such as car parking at EPIC, grape picking, letter box drops and manning our road-side collection points."

Our outgoing and hard working Training Officer, Nev Schroder, who provided interesting and challenging training exercises during the year, made an interesting observation during his report. He said that "more than 1,000 person hours had been clocked-up in local brigade training and that this did not include the Zone training which has ramped up significantly".

The meeting provided a memorable opportunity to recognise the long and dedicated support provided to the brigade by one of our stalwarts, Charlie Le Lievre. Much to the appreciation of all brigade members and our guests, our President took great pride in admitting Charlie as a Life Member of the Brigade, in recognition and appreciation of his meritorious service.

During the meeting training and proficiency awards were presented to Dave Cochrane (Crew Leader), Nev Schroder and Phil Sadler (Rural Fire Driving (Light and Heavy vehicles)), Chris Murdock (Advanced Fire Fighter), Cattlin Hubbard, Bob Pearson, Cliff Spong, Andrew Dunn, Scott Foster, Peter Greenwood, David Cochrane, Ian Coillet, Adrian van Prooyen (First Aid), Andrew Dunn and Darrell Tipton (Helicopter Winch Skills), and Tim Ayling and Riccardo Della-Torre (Bush Fire Fighter).

The meeting also provided an opportunity to present the inaugural Annual Captains' Awards to Tony Fisher and Charlie Le Lievre, the Brigade's Principal Driving Instructors. The awards were in recognition of them comfortably dealing with a level of terror quite possibly beyond the call of duty. #### Notice To All Residents of the Wamboin / Bywong Area

We have been residents of Wamboin for 22 years, residing at 557 Norton Road. We have always run 30-40 head of sheep and newborn lambs on our 30 acre property. Over the past 2-3 years (we believe since the opening of Denley Heights) we have had an increasing number of dog attacks.

The Christmas of 2006 we arrived home from holidays to witness horrendous carnage. Our sheep had sustaned inhumane injuries inflicted by dogs. They had been either run up and down the high paddocks and dropped from exhaustion and couldn't get up, run into the river (which had water at that time), or had a number of deep wounds inflicted to various areas of their bodies. These attacks left 20 of our sheep dead, and lying around our paddocks. It was a sickening sight.

We called the Queanbeyan Police. We gave a statement to two detectives who stated we were well within our rights to shoot on the spot if we witnessed such attachks. We have experienced at least two more dog attacks with more dead and wounded sheep as recently as last week. We have reported these attacks to the police.

The problem with dog attacks is that they occur at night and in silence. We bring this to your attention because we know that there is more than one dog involved in these incidents. The sheep are often dragged down from behind and attached around the face. It could be your dog! Dogs travel in packs. Once they have tasted blood -- they will re-offend. For all those who believe it couldn't be my dog because it plays with little Johnny and is so docile - then yes it could!

We ask this of you all: RESTRAIN YOUR ANIMALS AT NIGHT - DON'T ALLOW THEM TO ROAM. Because otherwise WE WILL SHOOT TO KILL - NOT BY CHOICE BUT BECAUSE THESE ATTACKS ARE INHUMANE AND SO SICKENING. If anyone has any information that may assist us or has experienced dog attacks, please don't hesitate to contact us. Many thanks for your attention. -- Chris & Rose Lyons, Ph 6238 3386.





#### **Arthritis in Animals**

Osteoarthritis or degenerative joint disease, a type of arthritis, is the most common form of joint disease affecting humans and in animals. Osteoarthritis is the result of cartilages, the shock-absorbing smooth tissues at the end of bones, wearing thin leaving the bones to rub against each other causing pain and stiffness. Arthritis affects all ages although it mainly occurs in middle-aged to older animals.

**Symptoms:** Dogs or cats may be slower to get up or down, reluctant to jump or climb stairs or cry when picked up. Horses may show varying degrees of lameness. As winter approaches and the temperature drops, symptoms may be more pronounced. The arthritis can be most noticeable in the morning when the joints have not warmed up sufficiently and it improves with exercise.

**Diagnosis:** This includes a history of problems associated with movement, a physical examination by the vet to determine the range of motion in the joint, swellings, pain or crepitus.X-rays may be required to rule out other problems such as infection or cancer of the bones or joints.A number of risk factors can cause osteoarthritis. These include previous injury to the joint, inheriting abnormal joint conformation such as Hip Dysplasia, excessive exercise, and being overweight.

**Treatment:** There is no cure for arthritis. The mainstay of the treatment is to slow the progression of the disease and to relieve pain for the animal to maintain a good quality of life. The prognosis depends on the severity of the disease and the intended use of the animal. For example, racehorses often have a worse outcome than a pleasure horse. Many treatment options are available but this will depend on the species and the individual animal. Some examples include medications such as oral anti-inflammatories, injections into joints or muscle, and surgery. It is highly recommended that you consult your vet to tailor the appropriate treatment for your animal. Note: it is important not to use human medications for animals unless advised by the vet as they can cause kidney failure and gastrointestinal ulcers.
