### Wamboin Community Association President's Paragraphs

Palerang Council – The Council has adopted its Management Plan and Budget. The WCA made a submission to Council in which we took issue with the lack of vision and objectives in the Plan, the current and future staffing levels, the costings for waste and sewerage charges, the inadequate budgetary details and the refusal to address the inherent inequities in the rate model. Unfortunately, our submission was totally disregarded and never acknowledged. The WCA also wrote to the NSW Minister for Local Government (Kerry Hickey) and the Member for Monaro (Steve Whan) to express our lack of confidence in the Council. Following a motion passed at the last WCA meeting, a letter has been sent to the Premier, Kerry Hickey, John Turner (Shadow Minister for Local Government) and Steve Whan to express extreme disappointment in the Management Plan and Budget approved by the Local Government Minister, a lack of confidence in Palerang Council and a recommendation that an administrator be appointed by the NSW Government.

**Braidwood Rural Lands Protection Board** – The WCA has written to the NSW Minister for Primary Industries (Ian McDonald) to voice dissatisfaction about the extension of the rating base, the lack of explanation or consultation, the lack of relevance to most of the residents on small properties and unnecessary nature of this extra layer of government.

**Meeting with NSW State Government Ministers** – The NSW Cabinet Meeting is being held in Queanbeyan on 1<sup>st</sup> August and the Ministers will be available for meetings with community groups. John van der Straaten and I have arranged meetings with Ministers Hickey and McDonald during which we will discuss our concerns about Palerang Council and Braidwood Rural Lands Protection Board.

**State Plan** – The NSW State Plan will be developed to set the priorities and goals for NSW for the next decade. Members of the public will be given an opportunity to contribute. Further details are available in the 28<sup>th</sup> June edition of the Bungendore Mirror or online at <a href="www.nsw.gov.au/stateplan">www.nsw.gov.au/stateplan</a>. The WCA will be following the process and make a submission. If you have anything that you would like the WCA to raise, contact me or another member of the WCA excecutive.

**Federal Electorate Boundary Changes** – The proposed changes to the Federal Electorate boundaries would see Wamboin and Bywong moved from Eden-Monaro to Hume. This would result in Wamboin/Bywong being segregated from the rest of Palerang with our local member in Goulburn. The WCA has made a submission to the Redistribution Committee in which we set out our commonality of interest with the Electorate of Eden-Monaro (particularly the centres of Bungendore and Queanbeyan), the importance of having a locally accessible federal representative and asked the Committee to review its proposal.

WCA Electronic Noticeboard – The Wamboin Whisper plays a vital role in community communication and we are very thankful to Ned for all the work he puts into it. However, in recent months we have had a number of issues arise which needed to be publicised in between Whisper editions. After discussions at the last WCA meeting, it was decided that an electronic noticeboard would complement the Whisper in disseminating community information. Many thanks to Pete Harrison for setting it up. I encourage everybody to subscribe – details of how to subscribe are included later in the Whisper.

**Annual Curry Night** – Make a date in your diary for Wamboin's gastronomical delight of the year which will be on the 19<sup>th</sup> August. All enquiries to Dave Hubbard (ph: 6238 3308)

**Fireworks and Bonfire** – the annual Fireworks and Bonfire will be held on the 16<sup>th</sup> September – see the ad later in the Whisper for details. We have requested slightly less noisy fireworks this year to minimise the impact on residents and livestock nearby. Suitable material can now be added to the bonfire pile on the oval.

**WCA meeting** –Meetings cover a wide range of topics with some lively debate. 

### Do You Want a Voice on the Braidwood Rural Lands Protection Board?

The NSW Government has recently re-introduced a land tax on small acreage blocks in the Braidwood Rural Lands Protection Board (BRLPB) area. The land tax is collected by the BRLPB, and is used to fund RLPB staff and services. It is a tax that was queried by many small acreage owners over 15 years ago and for good reason was withdrawn. The financially strapped NSW Government (thanks Mr. Whan) has decided to re-introduce the tax to fund what should be funded either by the users of services, or more equitably across the whole NSW community through the Dept. of Agriculture, as it is done in other states.

I think most of you have read or heard the various grumblings about the land tax. The gripe I have about the reintroduction of this land tax is not so much the amount, though it would normally cover some costs of the management of my land. The tax is probably not an onerous sum for most residents of small acreages. My concerns are related to its inequity, the way it was introduced, the general lack of any need of small acreage owners to avail themselves of any of the services provided, subsidy of private industry, and what appears to be a rather awkward BRLPB electoral system.

My perception of the electoral system is that it could be greatly improved so that all taxpayers are able to at least understand it! If we have to pay this legislated land tax, I feel that the 1200 odd small block owners impacted by this tax are at least deserving of a voice on the BRLPB.

The way you enroll to vote is to ensure you fill out section 2 of the recent Land & Stock Return form. It is not essential to fill this section out, and if you do not, it appears to me that your name may not go onto the electoral role. The BRLPB has told me they are quite happy with this method to enroll taxpayers. My reading of the form is that if you do not enter names into the spaces provided in section 2, you may not be on the electoral role, despite the landowners printed names appearing above in section 1. If this was not filled in, you may not receive an electoral form.

After querying this aspect with the BRLPB, I received a rapid response from them. The document attached to their email was a "Special Enrolment Application Form". A copy of this form appears elsewhere in this Wamboin Whisper, in order that you may enroll if you wish to do so. I would encourage you to fill it out and send it to the BRLPB if you have not enrolled, noting that up to two people per land holding are entitled to enrollment.

The reason for encouraging enrolment is that many people were very disgruntled about the land tax. Some have finally paid it, and others I know are refusing to pay it. In the end it is a legislated land tax. At the very least, given the numerous small landholders involved in subsidizing the funding of the BRLPB, we should be entitled to a voice on its Board. The only way we will get that is if we are able to vote. Some were so disgruntled they were prepared to consider standing for the BRLPB. One of those people, Colin Brammall, has nominated to represent the Bywong/Wamboin area, so keep reading all the local papers for further news from him.

This information may not reach you by the due date for enrollment of the 9<sup>th</sup> August. If it does you can fax the completed form to the BRLPB at 4842 2790. However, I would hope that the BRLPB would accept them in good faith for the election on the 20<sup>th</sup> September.

### WCA Meetings with NSW Ministers for Primary Industries and Local Government

On Tuesday 1 August the NSW Government Cabinet met in Queanbeyan and provided local community organisations with the opportunity to meet with Ministers and discuss issues of concern within their portfolios.

WCA President, Helen Montesin, and Secretary, John van der Straaten, met with the Minister for Primary Industries, Ian Macdonald, MLC, and the Minister for Local Government, Kerry Hickey, MP. The Ministers were provided with portfolio Issues Briefs, copies of correspondence (unanswered) to them and the July edition of the Wamboin Whisper.

Minister Macdonald recognised that the extension of the rating base by the Braidwood Rural Lands Protection Board could antagonise small property owners not involved in a commercial enterprise and he stoutly defended the need for an organisation like an RLPB to be supported by rural-style communities. He would not accept our arguments on the irrelevance of the BRLPB tax and levies on unproductive properties, the lack of communication by the BRLPB and the anachronistic additional tier of rural administration. We informed him that the WCA would be making a submission to the Premier's State Plan recommending that the responsibilities and activities of the BRLPB be undertaken by the Palerang Council and State Departments. The Minister did accept our comment on the undemocratic voting system employed by the BRLPB and has asked that the WCA write to him on this issue.

Minister Hickey appeared well informed on the financial problems of Palerang Council and the effect on our community through the imbalance of Council's representation. He accepted our concerns over the shortcomings of Palerang's Draft Management Plan and Budget for 2006/7 and the failure by Council to take account of the inequities of the previous rate model but was taken aback when we mentioned that Council had ignored his direction for sub-categories to be employed in Council's rate model. He was surprised that this year the WCA had passed two motions of no confidence in the Council but accepted this position as other community groups, which had met with him earlier, had also expressed deep dissatisfaction with aspects in the performance of the Palerang Councillors and Council staff. The Minister agreed that the Palerang Council appears to be hobbled by poor finance and planning management and assured us that his Department would be monitoring Council's financial, management and environmental plans. We also discussed the issues of increased usage and projected usage of local roads associated with the Defence establishment off the Kings Highway and the endeavours of the NSW Government to monitor public liability insurance costs for small community groups.

We found both Ministers most approachable and interested in the activities of the Wamboin community and understanding of the issues we raised. They complemented us on our briefs, the standard of our representations - and the quality of the Whisper! -- John van der Straaten

The fire season has now ended. Fire permits are not required if you want to burn off or light fires in the open, but please notify your neighbours and your fire brigade Captain 24 hours before you light up.

Ring 000 to report fires or smoke sightings.

#### From the Captain's Desk



Now is the time to start getting rid of all that rubbish around the house, tree prunings, piles of leaves, dead trees, and even the odd dead animal on bonfires or just a small fire in the back paddock. What is wrong with that I hear our faithful reader say? Nothing at all, I say, so long as you think of what could happen at 2am. A lot of people in our community have been clearing up around their properties and taking advantage of the good weather and burning off. A lot of those people are letting their neighbours and their local brigade know about these burn offs and the occasional celebratory bonfire. There are at least two good reasons we ask people to do this. The first is to not alarm your neighbours and allow them to make plans if there are any issues with animals or if smoke could be a problem, among other things. It may even be a good way to meet your neighbours! The second reason is by

informing your fire brigade and our Fire Control Centre it can avoid a call out of the brigade or the one of the field officers at 2am when a 000 call is received. This happened recently and because of the difficulty of judging distances at night, it took nearly two hours of searching to be sure that the reported fire wasn't serious or likely to cause problems. Even though it is a peaceful time in the wee small hours and some interesting wildlife can be seen, I can think of better things to do, especially at this time of year. Admittedly this problem isn't widespread and it is probably the lot of your firefighters to chase fires wherever and whenever they are reported. All I can ask is that you call before you light. It can save a lot of time and sometimes some embarrassment.

Fortunately last month was another relatively quiet one for your brigade. The odd motor vehicle accident and some fire sightings were well taken care of. Our training program continues despite one of the usual problems we experience as a volunteer emergency service organisation. When there aren't a lot of fires or other emergencies some volunteers can lose some interest in continuously training and keeping their skills honed. Often basic and repetitious training activities can quickly lose its excitement and appeal if there aren't any real incidents to contend with. However, we are making sure that there is variety in our training to contend with this problem. Perhaps the only thing I can say is that it is one of things we have to accept in volunteering for this sort of work. We never know when we will need to use our skills and so we just have to keep practising and training.

This time of year is when the brigade's fleet undergoes the annual servicing and inspection routine. All vehicles have now been inspected and a few repairs are being carried out during the workshop service. The issue here is that as residents of Palerang Shire you will need to come to terms with some real consequences of the financial situation our Council is in. As you know the Council is now restricting its expenditure program. This will now have an impact on what funds will be made available to your fire brigades in the Shire. It is unlikely that ageing fire fighting vehicles will be replaced in the short to medium term. This means that maintaining the vehicles we have takes on a greater urgency. All we can hope for is that the limited maintenance funds can cope.

Many members of the brigade have spent time, effort and money in repairing and modifying a small four wheel drive vehicle provided to us last year. The plans we had were to create a rapid response vehicle equipped with supplies, rations and other amenities which was also capable of towing our quick fill trailer. The unit could then be used at any incident in the Shire and be used as a command post or a relief point for fire fighting crews. Our initial plans have suffered a setback as the vehicle has been "repossessed" and allocated elsewhere in the Shire. However, we have now slightly changed our operational plans for incidents to ensure that either one of the other two personnel carriers we have will be used in this role. Our response capabilities should not be adversely affected.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank our friends and colleagues in the Bungendore Brigade, especially their Captain, Duncan Campbell-Wilson, for their help and understanding each weekend for the last month or so in allowing us to use on of their more modern tankers to instruct a couple of our budding truck pilots. This invaluable experience is a lead up to their truck licence tests. All of us wish them the best for their tests and hope that they will soon be going solo.

The Wamboin Hall Management Committee has approved the brigade's plans to improve the fire fighting capabilities around the Hall and to increase the water storage behind the fire shed. Over the next few months we will be setting up a

permanent pump near the dam behind the Hall which will be plumbed into pipes connecting to two outlets at the Hall. This will allow us to pump water to the Hall during an emergency if we need to combat any fires as well being able to be used to fill any firefighting vehicle. The trucks will be able to be filled faster than at present. We also plan to install two water tanks behind the fire shed to catch the runoff from each roof. The extra fresh water will help if we have to use the community hall as an evacuation centre.

As always we are keen for more people to join the brigade in any capacity. As well as needing firefighters we have just as much need for people to help the firefighters do their job. We need people to help with the administrative functions, catering, transport, repairs, maintenance, fund raising, distributing information around the community and other important activities. You can help us help you! If you are interested please give me a call.

There is much information on the brigade's website about property protection and things to do when fires approach. I encourage you to look it up, if you have access to the Internet. Failing that, please give me a phone call on 0409 991 340 or 6236 9220.

### No Administrator — Minister

From Cr Terry Bransdon

Having missed the last deadline for the Wamboin Whisper I'd like to thank the 100-plus people who attended the local community briefing by Council management on the proposed 2006-07 Budget. It was a demonstration of the community's concern over the raw deal ratepayers are getting in our part of the shire.

We lost the round on the rates model but now I've hopefully succeeded in stopping the Council staff plans to make us pay more than village residents to dispose of our household rubbish after the Macs Reef Road tip closes and a transfer station opens at Bungendore.

When the transfer station actually opens in July 2008, rural residents will now be paying \$240 waste charge plus \$130 (for weekly \$2.50 fees/ it was to have been \$5) – a total of \$370. Urban dwellers will pay about \$281 for village collection and a reduced waste charge of \$170. Total cost \$451. Had the charge of remained at \$5 we would have been paying \$500 with petrol and personal time costs on top of that!

The council now has agreed to workshop this issue, hopefully to make it more equitable, with the first session held on August 3.

We've also lost out on any chance of an independent Administrator replacing the current council, a move receiving considerable comment around Wamboin / Bywong since I suggested in May that all councillors should quit to force this.

I wrote to the Minister over this and received the following reply in late July.

Dear Clr Bransdon,

I am writing in reply to your letter of 29 May 2006 regarding Palerang Council and your request for the appointment of an administrator.

I have noted your comments about council's performance and your request to remove all councillors and appoint an administrator. The Local Government Act 1993 provides for two levels of examination into a council's operations.

The first is a formal investigation under section 430 of the Act undertaken by representatives authorised by the Director General of the Department of Local Government. The investigation power is used to intervene in cases of a serious breakdown in council operations or where there are major flaws in a council process.

The second is a public inquiry conducted under section 740 of the Act, and is generally only undertaken where there are serious questions over whether the council should be dismissed. They are ultimately accountable to their electors for their actions.

It is the responsibility of the elected council to direct and control the affairs of the council in accordance with the Act. This role includes participating in the optimum allocation of the council's resources for the benefit of the area. Councillors, as members of the governing body, have a responsibility to review the performance of the council and its delivery of services, and the management plans and revenue policies of the council.

This role includes the setting of rates. It is council's responsibility to adopt rate strategies that achieve equitable outcomes for its residents and ratepayers.

Thank you for bringing your views to my attention. Both the Department of Local Government and I will continue to monitor the situation at council.

### A Letter to Wamboin and Bywong Residents

I am writing to you to appeal for a fair go and some respect for the administrative staff at the Braidwood RLPB. Since the new rating area has been announced the staff has been subjected to a lot of underserved personal attacks laced with obscenities when they answer the phone. These workers did not ask for the rating area to be reduced to 4 hectares. They are only the shop front of the Board. They do not deserve to be abused nor have they earned it.

The Deputy Chairman of the Braidwood RLPB John Reardon and myself addressed the Wamboin Community Association a few months back. At the meeting we were subject to a lot of pointed questions about the Board but they were never personal. After the meeting we were invited to share supper with the association members and the discussion continued in good spirit. In some cases we got agreement and in others we agreed to disagree.

I left the meeting with the impression that the association members were not happy about the situation. However, I was very impressed with the standard of behaviour shown by the members.

If you are angry about the changes and you want to do something then ringing the Board and abusing someone will not achieve anything. If you are sufficiently upset then write to the Board and tell us. You may also write to your local state member and/or the NSW Minister for Primary Industries. If the Board receives a written complaint then it has to be considered by the Board.

Not all the abuse is coming from Wamboin. But a lot of it is coming from Wamboin and Bywong. If everyone could please consider the health of the administrative staff then the level of abuse will drop dramatically.



Q: How many "Real Men" does it take to change a light bulb? A: None. "Real Men" aren't afraid of the dark.

Be that as it may, the world's reliance on old fashioned light globes sucks more power than is produced by the world's 440 odd nuclear power plants. According to information provided during a launch by the International Energy Agency (IEA) in Paris of its new publication, Light's Labour's Lost – Policies for Energy Efficient Lighting, without rapid action the amount of energy used for lighting is predicted to be 80% higher in 2030 than today. ### Nature Notes - July 2006

The temperature has dropped a bit today and there's a cold wintry wind blowing, but, over the last week or so, it has been decidedly spring-like with temperatures up to 15 degrees. The birds have certainly noticed – the magpies are picking up twigs and other nesting material, and the Wood Ducks were high in the big yellow box tree at the end of our driveway the other day, examining it for a suitable nest site. Wood Ducks nest in tree hollows, often a considerable height from the ground. Pacific Black Ducks often use similar nest sites, but will also use dead tree stumps, the old nests of other water birds or will build their nests in a scrape on the ground. It always seems a bit incongruous to see a duck nesting high in a tree. It does have the advantage of safety, but only until the ducklings are fledged. Then they have to flutter to the ground and have no safe place to return to – both species will often get ten or more ducklings to this stage, but, after predation and road kills, are lucky to see two or three of their offspring reach adulthood.

The Urn Heaths (*Melichrus urceolatus*) are still flowering and providing the honeyeaters with nectar, but not much else in the plant world is showing any colour. *Styphelia triflora* is still carrying a few long greenish-cream flowers, but is also fruiting. The edible fruit are about a centimetre long and green, turning darker (sometimes with a purplish hue) as they ripen. They are quite sweet, but there isn't a lot of soft fruit round the hard stone. Quite a lot of plants in the heath family (Epacridaceae) have sweet edible fruits, and several of these are local plants. Like *Styphelia triflora*, *Astroloma humifusum* (Cranberry Heath) produces greenish fruit (often streaked with purplish markings); and *Monotoca scoparia* and *Lissanthe strigose* bear pale pink or white fruits. *Monotoca* seems to seed only sporadically here, but *Lissanthe* bears fruit most years – however, the fruit are only 3 or 4 millimetres wide, so you need quite a few for a taste!

On a sad note, one of the little red-necked wallabies I've mentioned previously came to a nasty end a week or two ago. I found the little body up along my creek, freshly dead and half-eaten. It was probably a bit big for a fox to tackle - I suspect a roaming dog as I regularly see large canine paw-prints in the mud near the dam or in the creek at the top of my place. If you own a dog, do *please* keep it on your own property.

While on this subject, I've seen dogs feeding on dead kangaroos at the roadside twice in the past week. Now, although sheep are the main carriers of the immature stages of hydatid worms, kangaroos can also carry them. Humans can't pick up an infestation from either of these two animals, but, if a dog eats infected dead animals, the hydatid worms can complete their development and lay eggs which are passed in the dog's droppings. These can contaminate the ground or the dog's coat or tongue. If one of us then ingests some eggs (pat the friends' dog at a barbecue, then eat some chips!), these can hatch and the immature stages of the hydatid worms will disperse and form cysts, potentially very dangerous if they occur in the brain or other vital organ. A good enough reason to keep the dogs safe at home, perhaps.
