

The aim of the service is to provide nutritional assistance to people who are permanently, or in some cases temporarily unable to cater for themselves.

Who is eligible to receive meals? To receive Meals on Wheels you must be assessed as being eligible. The referral for an assessment can be done by your local doctor, Community Health Care worker, hospital, HACC services, yourself or a friend/relative. Providing you are eligible, a Coordinator will contact you to arrange the assessment of your personal requirements and design your food service plan. Personal details are dealt with in the strictest confidence. We assist those who are frail, aged and people with a disability and the carers of these people. There is a selection of approx 25 varieties of frozen meals that include beef, lamb, veal, pork, chicken, seafood and vegetarian dishes. Most special dietary requirements are catered for. Clients are charged for the cost of the meal only. Delivery can be arranged. If you or someone you know is in need of assistance or information please do not hesitate to contact Kate or Michelle on 6299 3000.

Are you, or do you know someone who is interested in becoming a volunteer? If so please call the Meals on Wheels team on 6299 3000. Volunteers are needed to deliver frozen meals to clients within your community. 


IDENTIFICATION ON CATS AND DOGS

What Happens When a Tree Falls Across The Road In the Forest In The Dark by Ned Noel

Some of you know more about this than me and were more useful. We were coming home, up Sutton Road, around 7 pm on, I think, Thursday, October 19. A vehicle was in front of us, and in front of it was a truck towing two long semi trailers We all braked to a stop for reasons unknown. We were a couple hundred meters uphill of the first 100 K sign, just north of the farmhouse at the bottom of the new section. We waited about five minutes, tired in the dark. More and more cars came to a halt behind us. Over the five minutes it became clear that quite a few people were moving around on the road up ahead, and one person walked by mentioning that a tree had fallen.

Curiosity led me to walk up in front of the double semi truck. Some of you had responded a lot more quickly, and were doing more than satisfying curiosity. A fairly large eucalypt, perhaps 15 meters high, had fallen from the hilside above the high bank on the east side of the road. The fallen tree with its many large branches was blocking the entire road, right in front of the large semi. About ten men and women were efficiently clearing the tree. One person mentioned that the chain saw in use appeared in the hands one of the blockaded travellers. Large branches were rapidly being cut and pulled off the road. I started to pull on one, but couldn't budge it. Then someone said that the northbound / uphill lane was clear. Time to run back to the car so as not to hold up vehicles in the long line down the hill. I heard not a single beeping horn or complaining person. There were a number of drivers and passengers waiting calmly, some out of their vehicles talking to each other. And some skillful men and women working together to solve a serious and unexpected problem as if they had trained together for it three times in the previous week. Because a mixture of persons use the road, it seems likely that many of the "emergency tree clearing crew" were strangers to each other.

We drove up past the fallen tree, now cut back to only the southbound lane and shrinking by the minute. We then started to pass cars still stopped in the downhill, southbound lane. There were at least 20, if not 40. The next few days more and more of the tree went missing. You can still see, as of October 31, its ever shortening fallen thick trunk and large lower branches.

NO FIRE PERMITS WILL BE ISSUED FOR THE REMAINDER OF THIS FIRE SEASON.

From the Captain's Desk

This fire season has begun with some vengeance. Already your brigade has been called on to help at a number of fires outside our area. Wamboin crews have already assisted in containing fires in the old Tallaganda shire area, near Bredbo and just last weekend members of our Remote Area Firefighting Team (RAFT) were deployed at the Lake Burragorang fire near Sydney. The smoke in our area just recently came from that fire. The dramatic picture below shows some of our intrepid RAFT members being deployed by helicopter to begin working on containment lines for the approaching fire. At that stage the fire had burnt out around 5000 hectares of bushland but had not threatened any properties.



In case you are a little surprised with the announcement at the top of this article, it is true. We were informed recently that no fire permits could be issued for the remainder of this fire season. While this may be inconvenient for some property owners, it does make some sense. Unless a hazard reduction by fire is absolutely essential or an animal carcass needs to be incinerated, no exceptions will be considered. The recent fire in the Bredbo resulted from a hazard reduction fire getting away. Some other fires east of us have started after property owners lost control of some small fires.

I fell it is important to repeat some

Make sure you have done everything you can to make sure your property is well set up so that any fire doesn't cause major damage. 

Chalkboard: The chalkboard at the corner of Norton Road and Gallagher Crescent is managed by the Wamboin Community Association and is approved by the Council. Micro-chipping and your pets

- There is *no national database* for all microchip numbers and there is no way to search all known databases from one contact phone number, or online. [except possibly through RSPCA]
 - These are some of the registers on which animals in this area might be listed:
 - Australian Animal Register [AAR] the best because they have access to some other private registers.
 - Lost Dogs Home
 - These are probably the only two nationwide registers and one of them will probably be the only register for the proposed laws in the ACT.
 - o Pet Safe
 - o Central Animal Register [CAR]
 - National Pet Register [NPR]
 - o Companion Animal Register [CARNSW].
 - this is run by the local councils for the NSW Government. Microchipping can be done by the Qbyn. Pound but the register will record numbers from other registers used by vets and other licensed implanters.
 - o RSPCA
 - Which has access to all registers online except the CAR[NSW].
- Search enquiries at AAR should also mean searches of the databases of CAR, Petsafe and NPR, and possibly vice versa, but care must be taken, when requesting a search, that the answer covers all those registers and not just the one contacted.
- Microchip numbers do not always indentify on which register the number has been placed and even if they did, the number sequence might not be recognised by the person doing the scanning.. They usually indentify the manufacturer but there remains the possibility that the chip, if imported, will not meet ISO standards in Australia.
- There may be other registers, in other states, not listed here. State governments may be running their own 'Companion Animal Registers'.
 - If you have moved to this area it is vital that you:
 - Place your pets on the CAR[NSW] register. [compulsory -www.dlg.nsw.gov.au]
 - *Change your address* with your own register and check to see if it is known by other registers likely to be contacted in this area. Your vet would help with this.
- If you are likely to move interstate, check to ensure that the register your pet is listed on will be recognised in that state, and *change your address*!
- Check with your vet, that the register on which your pet is placed is likely to be searched if the animal is lost and subsequently scanned. If there is any doubt, change to a register with a nationwide scope and make enquiries of that register about what happens if your pet is lost.




Braidwood RLPB Water Assistance

We had a number of visitors and Dennis Farrer took out the prize for the best visitor's score for the day.





GRUMPY OLD WOMEN

Men of the world – rest your case! It's official!! *Women are grumpier than men in the morning*. Ooooh – I can just feel the eyes narrowing – the lips beginning to purse – fingers taking on that well-witnessed claw-like position!! Sorry gals – the new British survey by The Sleep Council confirms it. You are not only grumpier than we blokes in the morning but you're grumpier more often. And, whatsmore, you stay in a bad mood for longer.

One of the aims of The Sleep Council is to raise awareness of the importance of a good night's sleep to health and wellbeing. Its survey found 24% of men said they never wake up in a bad mood opposed to only 14% of women. It seems women are also more likely to stay grumpier for longer with 13% staying in a bad mood for two to four hours (men 10%).

The survey was published ahead of Britain's National Sleep In Day (Oct 29) – the day the clocks go back and, for the blokes at least, an opportunity for an extra good-mood hour in bed. For the women....well, I guess that means sixty more minutes to For most of us down-under, now that we've just popped our clocks forward, we blokes awaken in our usual, higher percentile good mood; women? – well they also win 'cos there's less time for bad mooding in the boudoir.

Forty-one (41) percent of all survey participants believe lack of sleep is the main reason for their black mood in the morning. "As men appear to sleep better than women (15% get a good seven night's sleep a week as opposed to only 9% of women), perhaps it's not surprising that more women than men get out of bed on the wrong side," says Jessica Alexander of The Sleep Council.

A quarter (24%) of those questioned cited general stress and worry as a reason for early morning moodiness. The over 45 age-group fares worst of all in sleep starvation with a massive 44% saying they never get a good night's sleep. The Council questions whether this might not be connected to the fact that this age group is the most likely to have teenagers. And teenagers are the moodiest of all with 25% staying so for up to four hours.

But I digress. Almost a third of women blamed their partner's snoring for their trouble sleeping. The survey also found that women far outweigh men in having a busy and packed morning. Well, not in this household. But again, I am distracted. So, men of the universe, unite. It's good news, and it's beyond dispute. It's confirmed, there's only one right side of the bed, and it's yours.

FROM THE FRYING PAN TO THE FIRE: Out of the bedroom and into Fire Brigade matters – grumpy or not, female or not, your fellow community volunteers in the Fire Brigade really need your help. The Wamboin Volunteer Rural Fire Brigade which services Wamboin, Bywong and Sutton Park all the way up to Rydges Hotel on the highway really needs more dedicated volunteers. Lots of people have said "Yes, I want to join," but haven't followed through. The community clock is ticking.

Volunteers in the Brigade have a great record of protecting the community. But that's history. I believe statistics show that people spend more time thinking about holidays, television, entertainment etc than superannuation. I'm not going there other than to ask whether a few more people in the Sutton Park, Bywong and Wamboin communities might think on this. Might you make time (as have former and current volunteers) to join and help the Fire Brigade; to participate in any one of the many ways possible so that now, and in times of greater need, the Brigade (and through it, yours and other people's properties, houses, families, stock and pets) are as strongly "superannuated" as possible? The Brigade is not chasing money from the community at this point, though that is always helpful. As you will have observed during the year from its adverts in the Whisper and on the community notice boards, what the Brigade needs most are more volunteer firies and a strong support group of non-firies.
