Wamboin Community Association -- President's Paragraphs

Palerang Council Social Plan – The Draft Social Plan has been on public exhibition for about a month with submissions to be lodged by the end of April. The draft is Braidwood-centric with very limited information on western Palerang. WCA has lodged a submission suggesting improvements to the plan. Many thanks to John van der Straaten for preparing the submission.

Rubbish – The Wamboin Community Hall has a recycling station, but general rubbish has to be taken to the Macs Reef or Bungendore tips. The rubbish bins at the Hall are for the use of Hall patrons only. There have been a number of instances of inappropriate dumping of rubbish at the hall. The latest incident occurred during the April WCA meeting when somebody dumped used oil containers and other rubbish in the ute of a member attending the meeting. This type of behaviour is irresponsible and unacceptable in our community. Everybody needs to take responsibility for their own waste disposal.

Land Valuations – Landholders who objected to their valuation should have received acknowledgement of the objection by now. No time frame has been given for when the review of objections will be complete. Steve Whan has responded to the WCA community submission. In his letter, he acknowledged the discrepancy in the land valuations done on 14th November and 5th October and indicated that he has written to the Minister for Lands "pointing out that individual reviews will not address that appears to be a large scale problem with all the valuations carried out on 5 October". To date, there has been no response from the Valuer-General, the Premier or the Minister for Lands.

Review of Rural Lands Protection Boards rating system – The WCA made a submission to the RLPB review (thanks again to John van der Straaten for preparing the submission). Richard Bull, who is conducting the review, would like to meet with Bywong and Wamboin residents. The date, time and place of this meeting has not been finalised yet, but is likely to be on or around 14th May. If you would like to attend the meeting, contact John van der Straaten (ph: 6238 3590) for further details.

Wamboin Community Association – The next WCA meeting is on **15th May at 7:30pm**. Everybody is welcome to come and be involved. Ian Peters from Telstra is still proving elusive – we'll keep trying to get him to come and speak at a meeting to give us an update on what is happening with regard to mobile phone coverage and broadband in Wamboin.

Bywong Community News

Bywong and Wamboin, amongst others, have been short-changed in Palerang's Draft Social and Community Development Plan.

Bywong Community expressed this view in its response to the Draft Plan, prepared following a working session attended by Bywong and Wamboin residents, together with representatives of the CWA, Bywong Hall Committee and the Greenways Committee. The Community's response pointed out that Council's report contained little information about, or understanding of, the large rural residential areas in the west of its area. It recommended that Council include a section on Bywong in the report and that Council contact community associations in Bywong, Wamboin and other areas to obtain accurate information about these areas, and that the Plan address the matter of insurance, vital for the continual functioning of community associations.

The Community also recommended that Council provide locality signs and maps defining Bywong, signs for attractions and the Community Hall, and signage and support for the greenways.

- The Community also recommended that Council
- seek a reduced speed limit on Bungendore Road,
- widen a verge on Macs Reef and Bungendore Roads to allow for walking
- provide appropriate signage at the intersection of Norton and Bungendore Road,
- upgrade the electrical supply at Bywong Hall, and provide a future recreational facility
 - at the present site of the Macs Reef tip.



SHEEP MANAGEMENT WORKSHOP

The Bungendore and District Sheepdog Association (BADSA) has organised a sheep management workshop in conjunction with the Braidwood Rural Lands Protection Board (RLPB). The workshop will be conducted by Dr Bob Templeton from the RLPB at the Burra Hall, Burra Road, Burra on Saturday 21 April 2007, from 10am to 3pm. Entry is FREE but bookings are essential as places for this "hands on" workshop will be limited. Morning tea and a sausage sizzle will be available with proceeds going to cover costs. Any profits will go to the BADSA, a non-profit organisation which supports responsible sheep dog training and trialling in Bungendore and surrounding area.

"This is a hands-on opportunity for small rural landowners to learn more about sheep management, put practice to the theory and gain maximum benefit from their RLPB levy," Dr Templeton said. "We'll be covering topics such as establishing stock, general husbandry, land maintenance and regulatory aspects." WILDCARE SNAKE HANDLERS GROW...... by Philip Machin

Wildcare has recently increased the number of trained snake handlers available and it now has no less than 15 in the Bungendore, Wamboin, Bywong and Sutton area. So, there is even less need for you to take matters into your own hands



when confronted by our slithery friends. Over the summer period *Wildcare* has been called out to over 150 incidents throughout the region. And advice has also been given by telephone. It is pleasing to see more and more people contacting *Wildcare* to sort out snake encounters in and around the house and yard.

The two main snakes in our area are Brown and Tiger Snakes. Both are highly venomous snakes with world rankings of 2 and 5. However snakes are misunderstood creatures, their main reaction when disturbed is to hide. They will only bite if threatened, surprised, picked up or cornered. Usually if approached they will flee. Unfortunately there have been some tragic accidents in NSW over the summer in which people have been killed and hurt. Please contact *Wildcare* on 62991966 for help – anytime day or night. Put it in your Mobile.....

Most snakes close to the house will just pass through. But if you leave the door or window open they may come in! This year *Wildcare* has rescued snakes from people's bedrooms, lounge rooms and laundries. They are also partial to garages and sheds – particularly chook sheds. But don't be alarmed. You can take precautions by ensuring the yard is clean and tidy, food bins are secure, wood piles away from the house, likely holes and gaps are blocked off and windows and doors are closed.

Fortunately reptiles are gradually hibernating, so unless we have an Indian summer we may not see too many around until next Spring. Be proud of all our wildlife and look out for it. Jake Annetts (pictured) of Wamboin is *Wildcare's* latest snake handler recruit.

From the Captain's Desk



Apart from a number of car fires last month, it is pleasing to report that things have been relatively quiet on the incident front. That doesn't mean to say that your brigade hasn't been busy but fortunately the pagers have been not been activated too often last month. One incident however stands out. Not for the fact that it happened, but more notably, when it happened. It wasn't the first Friday the 13th that your brigade has been called out to an incident and last month was no different. Judging from the photograph below it is easy to see that it wasn't a good day for one car owner. It was lucky that it didn't involve any injuries, other vehicles or lead to an accident on Sutton Road.

During the 27th to the 29th of April a crew from your Brigade took part in a

THE STABLE DOOR

The Great Grape Harvest

Over the past few Saturdays, members of the Wamboin Volunteer Rural Fire Brigade and their families, supporters and other helpers have been beavering away at Lambert Vineyards in Wamboin bringing in the current harvest. Reason? To help ensure continuity of much needed funds so the Brigade can maintain and build its community protection capability. In recent times the Brigade's area of responsibility has been extended to include Sutton Park as well as its traditional patch of Bywong and Wamboin. I understand from Steve and Ruth Lambert that, although the birds "kneecapped" the chardonnay grapes this year, and the drought has been a challenge, this year's vintage of reds and remaining whites is looking pretty damn satisfactory. I believe other vineyards across the region have also faired okay although there are a few that suffered very badly from frost late last year "nipping new growth in the bud". So come on all you consumers, if you didn't or couldn't help your volunteer Brigade secure a few more funds for its community operations – at the least "drop down to you local" vineyard for a tasting – and support our fledgling industry by buying a bottle or 12 for those special occasions.

I was in (my old home town) Melbourne a couple of weekends ago – a "flying visit" to join in engagement and housewarming celebrations of one of my 4 favourite nieces. Just to be clear, all my nieces, ie all 4, are favourites. While there, I was distressed to read in The Age newspaper of the impact smoke haze has apparently wrought on grapevines in northern Victoria and no doubt elsewhere across that and other States. One wine grower reported that the first of his white aromatic grape varieties were ready to be picked but they tasted flat and stale. The fruit flavour was muted. The grape's aroma and aftertaste were like – "an ashtray piled with day-old dead ciggies". Yukkk!! Tests later confirmed his suspicion: smoke taint.

Smoke haze in December from one of the biggest bushfires in Victorian history had apparently penetrated and undermined the transference of sweet, juicy flavours in his grapes and, at vintage its effect was horribly clear. Many winemakers in the King and Alpine valleys have, according to the article, decided not to make wine from the smoke-damaged fruit, with the final tally of discarded fruit possibly as high as 20,000 tonnes.

As I prepare this burst for The Stable Door – thankful for the 28mm of wet stuff that has fallen in the past 36 hours - it occurred to me that the current vintage has seen several wine regions across Australia affected by smoke haze – from Mt Barker to Adelaide Hills, Tasmania and parts of north-east Victoria, Strathbogie Ranges, Yarra Valley and Gipplsand. According to The Age article by Jeni Port, the detection of smoke taint in wine is new and was noticed widely following the bushfire affected vintage of 2003 – wine growers in the north-east including the King Valley picked up an unusual taste in their wines. Wonder what the impact of the 2003 fires in the Canberra region may have been, if any? In Western Australia, it is even alleged by some that in the industry that "out-of-bushfire season" organised backburning may also contribute to the "taint" phenomenon. Apparently a research project into the phenomenon by Western Australia's agriculture and food department and Curtin University will be released in the coming months and the Victorian Wine Industry Association has applied for funding to study whether smoke taint has affected the physiology of vines. Guess we'll hear more on the grapevine as I'm sure those in the industry including in our region, will have an interest and may have more to say on this.

Nature Notes – April 2007 Jo Walker

Finally, at the end of April, the weather is getting cold enough to bring thoughts of cutting firewood to mind. The rain over the last day or two has been welcome after another dry spell and fell gently enough to soak into the ground. And the Red-leg Grass (*Bothriochloa macra*) is living up to its name at the moment, forming patches of pink along the roadsides.

Not much is in flower at the moment apart from a few daisies. *Chrysocephalum semipapposum*, the Clustered Everlasting, is having a late flush of flowering, its heads of small, deep yellow button flowers brightening up the autumn landscape. Some of the *Cassinia quinquefaria* bushes are still sporting their straw-coloured inflorescences, and the little *Vittadinia muelleri* seems to bear its tiny blue flowers most of the year. This dainty little daisy, with the rather uncomplimentary common name of Fuzzweed (because of its profuse fuzzy seed heads), has spread over parts of my place during the last few dry years. It grows on dry, shallow soils in full sun, and is a compact little plant seldom more than 10 cm tall with bright green 3-pronged leaves. The kangaroos don't seem to feed on it, so it is probably unpalatable to stock. However, the Crimson Rosellas spend quite a bit of time some evenings pulling off and eating the seeds.

At the beginning of the month, a pair of Leaden Flycatchers were here for a day or two. They are uncommon in this area, but will breed here during the summer, leaving before the end of April. They are smallish birds, about 15 cm long, and are one of the few species to have more colourful females than males. The male bird is a dark leaden grey on its head, back, wings, tail and upper chest – the underparts are white. The female is a similar colour, with a brownish tinge on the wings, but her upper chest is a pale buff-orange. Both have small crests on their heads which they will raise slightly if excited. A similar bird is the Satin Flycatcher – the plumage is darker than that of the Leaden Flycatcher and has an attractive blue sheen, and the female has a darker orange upper chest. Another Flycatcher, The Restless Flycatcher, is often called the Scissor Grinder as one of its calls is a harsh buzzing sound. Both the male and female of this species are similar and are distinguished from the males of the previous two species by having a totally white throat and chest. I haven't seen a Satin Flycatcher in Wamboin (although they are probably here, at least occasionally), but when I lived in Queanbeyan there was a pair in my garden once for a day or two. The Restless Flycatcher has turned up here a few times, but doesn't seem to be a regular visitor – at least not on my place.

Walking up along the creek yesterday, I found the large old *Eucalyptus rubida* that was leaning out over the creek defying gravity when I came here twenty years ago had finally fallen. It is lying parallel to another *E. rubida* that fell a few years ago – that one made heart-rending groaning noises all one afternoon as its roots dragged out of the ground. Another even older tree close by died slowly over the last few years of drought. This species usually grows in damp areas (that part of my place was once running with water for weeks at a time – a long time ago!) and a lot of them are probably not going to last much longer without really good rains.


WAMBOIN HISTORY AND LEGENDS No.2 -- THE "HALL"

The building of the Community Hall would be one of the most important and frequently used assets in Wamboin. The "Hall" as we most refer to it, has been used for so many situations that many may not even know of its past uses. Weddings, memorial services, polling booths, balls, birthdays, fashion parades, community meetings and all the other "user groups"(fire brigade, golf, playgroup, Scouts & Cubs, art classes, pilates) which meet regularly to use the facility. When the 1985 fires which swept through, Wamboin used the Hall as a coordination / refuge centre and now it is designated by the Council for that purpose in times of emergencies. When those fires occurred, Norton Road went only as far as the Yass River, so Wamboin became a "trap" as far as fires went, with only the one access being from Sutton Road.

Back in 1982, 134 families living in the Wamboin area were in need of a meeting place. A public meeting on 3rd April 1982 agreed for a "Hall" to be built on a block which had been put aside in Bingley Way for "Local activities".

The original plan for the building was to be a brick or block structure, with a costing of over \$80,000 at the time. The funds available from the "Section 84 funds" (monies put aside by developers for community projects) was about \$12,000, so a farm shed on a concrete slab was agreed on. The shire gave a donation of \$1,000 for a water tank and septic system. The community would raise additional money for lining of the walls, electrical and a kitchen. The site was leveled by Geoff Rudd with his mini dozer. As usual, the frame arrived 3 weeks late, so there was a great rush to start assembly. Unfortunately a partial collapse of the framework occurred about 4PM on the Saturday. Fortunately nobody was injured. (The twisted steel memento hanging it the hall today is a reminder of that event.) Two damaged columns were taken home by Hank Berlee for immediate repairs while the instructions were read, stating that the wall cladding was to be installed prior to the roof timbers. By Sunday night, the walls, cladding and trusses were back in place. Hank and Lofty Mason took over the supervision after that, and the rest of the construction continued incident free. If you look carefully on the eastern end, you can see the original hinges on the permanently fixed huge double doors, which you could drive through a couple of tractors side by side. The 2^{nd} columns from the eastern end shows signs of the rigging used to hold the curtains for the production of Cinderella, which played to an audience of 180! The flag pole, also on that side was donated by the Kowen Forest and was ingeniously "debarked" by dragging it around on the gravel roads by the "Bedford" fire truck. The timber cladding inside finished off the rough sawn timber framing and painting of the floor was enough to make it a respectable building. The hall was built entirely by the locals (with the exception of the slab) over many, many weekends and finally completed in 1984. Under project manager Lofty, the regular gang of tradies and others has completed to lock up stage this addition, which will further improve the building. Unfortunately, the hall is now starting to show its age like us all. It has been maintained all these years by all the "life members" of the hall committee, without outside help, we have fixed all those little things that go wrong and vandalized and try to keep it usable for all those that rely on it each week. I feel quite attached to it now, looking back on all the hours I have spent working on it over the years, like the Masons, Trent, Hank, Peter and others, but now it is in need of some repairs, in particular the gutters, attention to a few leaks on the roof and some painting. Feel free to contact the community association if you are a "Tradie" or you have the time to donate your skills.

The hall has resurrected itself as a great meeting place, with the huge success of the Wamboin Produce Markets. The only complaints being that you have to wait 4 weeks for the next one to come around. For many of the regular users, the most important icon inside, is the "Bar". Many a tall story has been told over the red laminex bench top, with scars from a runaway circular saw (so they say) It has survived in the corner silently absorbing stories and spills over the years, where most of us remember the great times living in Wamboin, and why we wouldn't live anywhere else.....
