

#### WAMBOIN PONY CLUB

Wamboin Pony Club is looking forward to a fresh start to 2008, following 5 months of enforced "unmounted" activities due to the equine influenza outbreak in NSW.

Activities with horses/ponies and riders are set to recommence from Sunday 10<sup>th</sup> February 2008. There will be a few new requirements for attendance at club days to make sure the Club complies with both PCA NSW and DPI requirements, but all current members are looking forward to being able to meet again on horse back.

Wamboin Pony Club holds rally days usually on the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> Sundays of each month (except for January and December). The club conducts activities at the Canning Close Reserve, which is located at the end of Canning Close Wamboin. Facilities include car and float parking, a small club house, a sand dressage arena, a sand/sawdust show jumping arena, a large flatwork arena and cross country training jumps.

Rally days commence at 10.00am (members usually arrive around 9.30am to get ready to ride at 10.00am) and run til 3.00pm with an hour lunch break. Riders must be a financial riding member of pony club. Riders must be accompanied by a responsible adult at all times if under the age of 18 years. **Riders MUST wear:** 

- A well fitting approved helmet AS/NZS 3838
- Smooth soled elastic sided riding boots. Boots may have a front zipper, but no laces. Only riders 17 years and older may wear long boots.

The club encourages all riding members to wear the club uniform at rally days.

Generally 2 sessions are held in the morning with a break for lunch around 12:00 noon. Then there are two more sessions after the break. This format relies on four instructors being available on the day. There are lots of different activities that riders may participate in at rally day including show jumping, dressage, cross country, troop drill, mounted games, sporting, polocrosse, horse care and theory.

Wamboin Pony Club caters for all levels of riders, from beginner through to the experienced, aged from 5 years through to 24 years of age. Existing members will receive more detailed information on the new requirements for attending a rally day by email. Just to remind existing members that membership is now due. Membership paperwork for 2008 can be completed at the first rally day on 10<sup>th</sup> February, just remember riders cannot ride on the grounds until all monies (including insurance) are paid and all forms completed.

#### WILDCARE GRAPEVINE

Our local wildlife group *Wildcare* reports that it has been a quieter than normal Christmas and New Year period. That's not to say there hasn't been a good number of call outs for the *Wildcare* volunteers, including for snake handlers, just not as many as in previous years. Perhaps this is an indication of the better spring and summer weather in many areas that has given more options for wildlife to stay away from danger areas such as our roads and properties where out of control cats, dogs and the occasional human makes life difficult.



Wildcare often encourages people to do the right thing, and a growing number are doing just that, but there have been a few stories on the grapevine where not everyone has got the message. Like the lady who had the best intentions by trying to feed an injured bird bread and milk and an adult wombat that had been fed cat food over a long period. Birds and animals need to be fed the right food and have the right care to do well. Good intentions need to be tempered with good advice from organisations like Wildcare. It's illegal to hold and care for wildlife without a licence, which is a good reason to join a wildlife group and do it right.

There is still the odd story of people taking matters into their own hands in dealing with snakes, which turn up in the wrong place. Unless it's a dire

emergency, then snakes need to be handled by trained people. Dealing with venomous snakes on one's own is a dangerous activity both for you and anyone else in the vicinity. So, step back, give the snake some room, keep an eye on it and if necessary call *Wildcare* to get some help. Chances are a snake will sort itself out and clear off. A recent call out to a late night house party saw a tiger snake bailed up in the kitchen. Left alone and with people out of the way, it quickly found the open door and slithered away. It was later picked up by a *Wildcare* snake handler from underneath the hot water system where it had gone to hide. Killing snakes is against the Law. If you find yourself with someone who wants to be a hero tell them to think again.

*Wildcare* is available to give advice and help sort out injured and rescued wildlife, so get in touch and call 6299 1966, 24 hours a day. If you are interested in joining *Wildcare* to help rescue and care for native animals, give them a call or visit their Website: www wildcare.com.au.

#### The Vigneron's Lot

#### A short but, unfortunately, true story by Phil Elliott

One should never tempt the Gods. If I have learnt nothing else since embarking on my new found life as an apprentice vigneron, it is that one simple fact - never tempt the Gods.

The vineyard was looking resplendent. The chardonnay vines were loaded with flowers and this was to be the year of my first crop. The vines had grown so well that I even had to fit and use the foliage wires, so named to keep the foliage from shading the grapes as they matured; allowing the sunlight to convert the grape juices into sugars, nay nectars, from which I would extract my first vintage from MY grapes. Since the grasshoppers of 2005 and the late frost of 2006 I had been on my guard against whatever pestilence I was to encounter in 2007. I had prepared for light brown apple moth and vine moth. My fridge was loaded with biological agents to combat grasshopper plague. I had sprayed the vines with a multitude of fungicides to neutralise every type of mildew known to man.

I had become confident. I had become very confident as I walked amongst the vines each evening with a glass of wine from someone else's vines in my hand. Not like this next year. It would be a glass of wine from MY vines then. I was confident. I was smug.

It rained on and off during the afternoon: that hot oppressive type of rain that said "It isn't over yet." There was more to come. Humidity was 100% but I didn't worry about that - there was so much anti-fungal spray on my vines they would not be affected. But then it started to blacken in the north-west and the forecast of heavy rain and flash flooding was starting to materialise. Still not a problem - the vineyard is on the side of a hill - no prospect of flooding there.

The black line approached, slowly at first but gathering speed as it came into perspective, now rolling, moving faster. And you could hear the rumbling as the Gods stamped their feet further down the valley. This storm cell had a bit of power in it - you could feel it. I also felt something else as the downburst reached us; the ice cold breath of something hidden within the approaching curtain of rain.

The droplets hit us like miniature snowballs - big, wet and sloppy - as the parched earth tried in vain to absorb the moisture now pelting down upon it. Rivulets began to run off the surrounding hillside, gathering pace and growing in size as they ran towards the dry river bed. And then we heard it - the sound of the one thing I could not prepare for - the sound of hail.

For fifteen minutes the Gods pelted us with rain and hail. Fifteen minutes in which we received 25 millimetres of moisture - and about 20 percent of that in solid form.

It went as quickly as it had arrived, leaving behind the roaring of the torrents coursing down the surrounding hills. And my vineyard looked as if a mechanical harvester had been through it. The young tendrils had been cut, as if by a knife. The flowers had disappeared and the ground was covered with shredded vine leaves. Vintage 2008 littered the floor of the vineyard.

I had tempted the Gods, and they had accepted the challenge.

From the Captain's Desk



Before I get into all the news about the activities your brigade has been involved in over the past two months, let me, on behalf of everyone in the brigade, wish our reader a happy, safe and wet 2008.

There was a special social event during December that deserves special mention. Our annual Christmas party early in December was a great success. Many people came along for an enjoyable evening. It was especially pleasing to meet some of our new Wamboinites who dropped in for a few quiet ones, some fine food and a chat. A special visitor did make a surprise visit and arrived in a big red fire truck instead of his sleigh. Many children of all ages enjoyed his visit. I and all members of the Brigade owe a big vote of thanks to Wendy Downs and all her helpers for making the evening a great success. The spread was excellent.

I am not sure how many people in our community realise, but medical history was made recently by a well known identity in Wamboin. We have it on the very best authority that medical tests have categorically disproved a long held belief that the Treasurer of our brigade, Larry King, does not have a heart! The tests not only showed that Larry had been fooling many of us for years, but his ticker was not in as good a shape as it should be. We all sincerely hope that the bypass operation goes well and the revised plumbing serves him faithfully for many years to come.

We would like to thank the Bywong Community Association for a generous donation recently which we will be able to put towards purchasing some new equipment. We would also like to express our thanks to our local member of State parliament, Steve Whan, shown in the picture taken by Ian Coillet, for his work in securing a grant from the State Government to purchase some much needed pagers for our new members as well as a special high-powered backpack blower to help us clear fire breaks and control small fires.

During the past two months only a few incidents have required your Brigade's attention. A few motor car accidents, the odd torched vehicle (one shown below near the Wamboin Community Hall) have created some excitement. We were also





involved in controlling a large haystack fire outside of Bungendore

with other brigades from our zone. It was estimated that fire destroyed \$70,000 worth of hay and it took a number of days work to secure the site.

Although we have had a very quiet introduction to the official fire season, the traditional danger period for our community is just around the corner. The next couple of months have often proved to be our most active. The grass is curing, the ground litter is drying out and with the relatively high fuel loads due to the recent rain, we have the makings of some potentially disquieting times ahead. Although what follows is repeating some information we published some time ago, the

message is just as important now as it was then. There is some valuable information on the NSW Rural Fire Service website (http://www.bushfire.nsw.gov.au) and the information below can be found there. It should help you to consider what the possible fire threats are to your property. Knowing this information should then help you plan what you need to do to minimise any threats should fire threaten.

#### How bushfires affect houses

#### Three ways houses are set alight by bushfire

Houses are set alight through embers, radiant heat and direct flame contact.



#### Emhers (snarks)

Embers (sparks) are the main cause of houses catching alight during bush fires. Extreme fire weather days are accompanied by strong to gale force winds, which carry burning debris. Embers therefore gain entry to houses through broken windows or gaps in and around walls roof cladding and ignite the contents Embers also lodge on and ignite horizontal timber decking, guttering, steps and window sills. They can be blown up against and ignite timber used for supports, underfloor battens, posts and

- ACTION

  Have a Bushfire Survival Plan.

  Have a portable battery operated AM/FM radio to receive information during the fire.

  Don't enter the bush if smoke or fire is in the area.

  Stay calm and report all fires on 000!


  Check if elderly neighbours need assistance. If possible, block your gutters and fill with water.

  If you choose to self-evacuate, do so early.

  If ordered to evacuate by the police you must obey, so have pets and valuables packed and ready to go.

  Wear long sleeves and long pants, natural fibres and sturdy footwear.

  Close all windows and doors, block spaces beneath doors with wet towels or blankets.



#### Radiant Heat + Direct Flame

The hotter a fire the greater the amount of int heat and the faster the fire will

Direct flame impact usually occcurs when something combustible is near the house eg. shrubs, wood piles or outbuilding.

- Wear long sleeves and long pants made from natural fibres and sturdy footwear Have eye and breathing protection available for everyone Keep a torch and portable AMFM radio at hand, in case power falls, to monitor weather
- Turn off gas and power
  Hose down walls, gardens etc before the fire arrives
  Block downpipes and fill gutters with water
  Fill all sinks, baths etc with water to use on spot fires
- in case mains water supply or domestic electric water

- in case mains water supply or domestic electric water pumps fail Bring hoses/fittings and other fire suppression tools inside, so they can be used later Close all doors and windows and block gaps with damp towels Move flammable curtains and furniture away from windows Shelter in a part of the house most distant from approaching fire front until fire has passed then actively put out spot fires Once fire front has passed, go outside to check for spot fires and ember attack



#### After the Fire Has Passed

Ember attack is the biggest threat to houses. This can last for several hours after the fire front has passed. Unattended houses are very susceptible during this stage. People who have relocated can return during this stage. Experience shows will survive the passage of a bush fire

#### ACTION

It is the owner's responsibility to secure the site following a fire.

After the fire has passed and for several hours after the fire front has passed, patrol your property and put out spot fires started by flying embers.

#### FREE SOIL HEALTH WORKSHOP FOR HOBBY FARMERS



NSW Department of Primary Industries, are running two free Soil Health Workshops.

The workshops will be held on properties near Canberra –

- one at Uriarra, on Saturday 9th February 2008, and
- another at Burra, on Saturday 23rd February 2008.
- Both sessions will run from 9:00am 2:00pm (morning tea and BBQ lunch provided).

Both workshops will cover issues promoting healthy soils and healthy landscapes by training landholders in diagnosing and addressing soil health problems on their property.

Attendees will get access to heavily subsidised cheap soil tests and will learn techniques for drought proofing small properties / rural residential landholdings.

The hopeful outcome of these workshops, is that over the next 10 to 20 years, as land managers adopt the practises learnt through the workshops - this will see a significant improvement in soil structure and organic matter levels, a lowering of soil acidity, and a more calculated and sustainable approach to fertilizer use. This in turn will have a major impact on the productivity of properties and the long term sustainability of the catchment.

Attendees should also bring a Pen, Chair, 1kg of topsoil from your property, Hat, Sunscreen, Water, and suitable Clothes for a Paddock walk.

The Benchmarking Soil Chemistry Project is funded by the National Action Plan for Salinity and Water Quality, and Murrumbidgee Catchment Management Authority, and is presented by the Department of Primary Industries



#### Young and old writers wanted: what secrets do you know about Lake George?

Calling all aspiring writers: the Weereewa Festival committee is calling for submissions in its short story competition for 2008. And this year there is an added incentive for entrants - the winning story in the Open section of the competition will be awarded the Milton Simms Literary Medal. This will be the first time the medal is to be awarded, and it is hoped that it will be an ongoing part of the festival's literary program. The medal will be hand-made of silver and designed by X Gallery's Xanthe Gay. The Open section of the 2008 competition is for writers of all ages and abilities, and has its focus on celebrating Lake George (Weereewa) located to Bungendore's east. A lake that is thought to be among the oldest inland lakes in the world, and famous for its vanishing waterline and scientific intrigue. The theme for the 2008 festival is "Shorelines" and writers in the Open section are asked to consider the following statement as a basis for their stories: *shorelines – a start or finish of place, scope, extent, story?* Your interpretation of this theme is limited only by your imagination. The competition closes on February 29, 2008, and prize winners will be notified by post. It is hoped the medal will be awarded by one of Australia's leading authors at a literary dinner to be held in late March during the festival.

The medal is named in honour of Milton Simms – a former Australian National University librarian and former long-time Bungendore resident who lobbied in his position as Yarrowlumla deputy mayor to secure funds to build the Bungendore Library and school hall. He is fondly remembered by festival committee members as a learned man with a love of books, who spent the latter half of his life living on his family property which overlooked Lake George.

Stories in the Open section should be no longer than 2000 words and sent to P.O Box 170, Bungendore, NSW, 2621. The writer's name and full address should be written on a cover note and attached firmly to the submitted story. Names should not appear anywhere else on the story.

In addition to the Open section, there will also be an opportunity for local school children to compete for prizes for themselves, as well as their school, in a junior writers' section. The theme for the junior competition will be "Secrets of the Lake". Children are asked to submit stories or poems up to 800 words based on their thoughts about the secrets abounding the shores of Lake George. The junior section is divided into two sections: Kindergarten to Year 2 (as at February 29, 2008) and Year 3 to Year 6. The children's stories can be sent to the P.O Box listed above. Students lucky enough to attend Bungendore Public School in 2008 will be treated to a number of guest speakers next year who will regale the children with tales about the lake and its mysterious history in a bid to inspire some great stories.

But that doesn't mean that you can't start thinking about and writing your stories right now!

# Nature Notes – January 2008

The downpour a week or so before Christmas filled the dams and brought impressive torrents of white water hurtling down my creek. One good day's rain and several showers since have left the countryside green – so restful after those brown, dusty summers of the past few years.

That big, fruit-eating cuckoo, the Koel, seems to have departed early this year – I haven't heard its loud call since the beginning of January. There are still other cuckoos around though. Earlier, during spring, there was a Pallid Cuckoo here – not often seen, but making his presence known with a call of six or seven loud notes on a rising scale. He must have found a mate who, in turn, discovered a convenient host nest because their offspring was sitting in a tree recently being fed by an attentive White-eared Honeyeater. Pallid Cuckoos use the open cup nests of a range of birds with eggs similar to their own brown-spotted cream ones. They lay a single egg, and the cuckoo nestling, as soon as it hatches, quickly ejects any eggs or young of the host species.

A Sacred Kingfisher spent a few moments in front of the house a few days ago. This attractive little bird (green back and head, blue wings and tail, buff-coloured collar and front, dark facial line and long kingfisher beak) feeds on aquatic creatures but will also dive on beetles and grasshoppers and small lizards on dry land.

It's years since I've seen Emperor Gum Moths around, but recently found caterpillars of both local species feeding on young eucalypts – *Eucalyptus melliodora* (Yellow Box) and *E. dives* (Broad-leaved Peppermint). These stout caterpillars are large – up to 8 cm long just prior to pupation. *Antheraea eucalypti* is bluish green with a pale stripe along either side and lines of brightly coloured tubercles along its back while *A. helena* is plain bright green with a pink stripe along either side. Both construct large oval cocoons to pupate in - and pupation may last several years, presumably depending on weather conditions. The adult moths are large, robust insects with a striking eyespot on each of their four wings.

Walking past a flowering shrub the other day, I was struck by the number and variety of insects feeding on the nectar and pollen – flies, wasps, beetles and at least five species of native bees. The one that caught my eye (in fact, there were four or five on closer inspection) was a Black Resin Bee, *Chalicodoma* sp., the first time I'd noticed this species here. This bee is almost as big as the introduced honey-bee, and is black with a band of white hairs on the first segment of the abdomen. It is a solitary bee, often nesting in abandoned borer holes in the stems of trees or shrubs where it lays several eggs and leaves them to develop into the next generation. The holes are sealed with a mixture of leaf pulp and resin, hence the name of this little insect. The nesting cavities are un-lined, unlike those of the closely-related Leafcutter Bee which excises circular pieces of leaf from soft-leaved plants, native and exotic, and carefully folds them around the inside of the tunnel forming its nest. Both of these bees are solitary, but there are some species of Australian native bees that live in social colonies and produce honey.
