Wamboin Community Association Presidents Paragraphs

Wamboin Community Association Executive – At the recent AGM, the existing executive was re-elected with the addition of Rhona Gillespie. Our hardworking committee consists of John van der Straaten (secretary), Keith France (treasurer), Rhona Gillespie (vice-president), Pete Harrison (vice-president), Helen Montesin (president) and a few other non-executive committee members. I'd like to welcome Rhona and thank the rest of the committee for their continued support.

WCA Meeting – Ian Peters, Stephen Trump and Sarah Grady from Telstra attended the March meeting to give us an update on telecommunication services in the Wamboin area. The Bywong mobile phone tower is to be upgraded to enhance its output. However, there has been no further development on the proposed Wamboin tower. All residents are welcome to attend the next WCA meeting on 15th April at 7:30pm at the Community Hall.

Palerang Council – WCA has become increasingly concerned about the delays in completing the Palerang LEP. It is now unlikely that it will be completed in this term of Council. John van der Straaten made a statement at the Council meeting last week to express our concerns about the delays and our dismay at the deliberate tactics taken by some self-interest groups and Councillors to stymie the attempts by Council staff to progress the LEP.

This disappointing performance by some Councillors, who are not acting in the interests of the wider Palerang, highlights the need to have adequate local representation on the next Council. WCA is keen to facilitate the formation of a local ticket for the **next local government elections** which will be held on 13th September 2008. We have asked Peter Bascomb to come out to Wamboin and talk about how Council works and what being a Councillor entails. We will provide details of the talk when they are finalised. If you are interested in standing for Council, or know of anybody who might be, please contact Helen Montesin (ph: 6238 3208) or John van der Straaten (ph: 6238 3590).

Wamboin Locality Sign – The WCA has been discussing a suitable Locality Sign for our area. We have decided that the most suitable would be a sandstone block etched with 'WAMBOIN' mounted in a stonewall near the corner of Norton and Sutton Roads. Lofty Mason has volunteered to be the Project Manager for this project and is currently liaising with Council to get the process moving.

Wamboin Produce Markets – The markets continue to thrive providing a great range of local produce and the opportunity to catch up with friends over a cup of coffee/tea and scones/muffins. The next markets will be on **19**th **April** from 9:00am until noon.

Bywong Community News

Clean Up Day: It is both good and bad news that the Bywong team achieved some spectacular results on Clean Up Australia Day.

Again under the sure organisational hands of Warwick and Jenny Johnston, thirty-nine volunteers collected 95 bags of rubbish and a number of other major items too large or too numerous to go into bags. These additional items included numbers of roadside guideposts, and what appeared to be callous dumping on the Old Federal Highway of materials including 62 tyres, quantities of foam packing and about 300 kg of scrap metal. The dedicated team on the Old Highway deserves special mention for a sterling effort, as does the small team which managed to clean up more than 3 km of Shinglehouse Way.

Would you like to be the postman?

Having lived in Wamboin for over 32 years I have seen many changes in the mail delivery service. Back in the early days, all the letterboxes for the whole of Wamboin properties were positioned on the corner of Norton Rd and Gallagher Crescent. You had to apply to the PMG for a roadside mailbox number. You were then allowed to install a box providing it complied with placement and design guidelines. Since then, people have installed basic to elaborate brick monoliths for the postman and other "deliverers" like the Whisper volunteers, to attempt a drop off. Unfortunately, we do not have a postie on a "Honda step through" motorbike to make deliveries, but an Australia Post contractor who generally has to tender for this position. He or she would use their own vehicle for the job, having to drive on the wrong side of the road, avoid potholes, guideposts and ditches as well as any vehicles on the road. Probably the best guide to the perfect letterbox is to try and deliver a letter to your own box, without reversing or creating a dangerous situation for other road users. Below is a copy of Australia Posts publication on roadside mailboxes.

DESIGN:

- Boxes should be large enough to hold the items of mail you expect to receive. Remember that many publications are bulky
- The front opening should be large enough to receive all items other than parcels. If you plan to receive a newspaper, provide a large slot. Articles too large for the box are returned to the post office from where you will have to arrange collection during business hours.
- The box should be robust to withstand normal use and sometimes abnormal weather conditions, and should be free of sharp projections and edges.
- The box must be identified with your Rural number and your name and/or Property Name.

SITING: The Mail Contractor is expected to be able to stop in front of the box, and where possible without reversing, deliver mail without alighting from his or her vehicle. Therefore, the box should be:

- Facing the road, as close as practicable to the road alignment
- Accessible from a car window, unobstructed by trees, posts, gates, ditches etc.

A simple test to see if your mailbox is suitable. Next time you take mail from it, drive up to it from the road, and without leaving your vehicle reach from the driver's window, and extract the mail from the box, then imagine you have to drive to the next mailbox on your road. If you cannot then think of what the Mail Contractor has to go through each time.



Avoiding Kangaroos on the Road by Phillip Machin

Kangaroos have been in the news lately, but the ACT kangaroo problem at the Belconnen Defence site is not the purpose of this article. Love them or hate them, all motorists want to avoid having an accident with a kangaroo. But how often do we consciously think about reducing the risk of having an accident?



Skippy can be very unpredictable and they are camouflaged too. If you are travelling in a car in rural areas where there are likely to be kangaroos, then everyone in the car needs to be on the lookout – particularly at dawn and dusk and throughout the night hours. Locals get to know where kangaroos are likely to be and where they cross the road, but that is of no use if a motorist is simply going too fast to stop. At 80 km/h, allowing for thinking and braking distance, you will need 54 metres to stop the car before impact. However at 60 km/h one only needs 33 metres to stop. Older cars will take a longer distance to stop. Just because you can legally travel fast down our rural roads, think about what a safe speed may be. Looking ahead and matching visibility with braking distance is very important if the risk of hitting a kangaroo is to be reduced. A 'Shoo Roo', which is available from auto accessory shops, can also help to stop kangaroo accidents happening.

Hitting a kangaroo or any other animal can be traumatic and shocking. Please do the right thing and stop and check the animal. If necessary, contact *Wildcare*, so they can send someone out to help both you and the injured animal. Don't just drive off – it is unlawful not to report an accident involving injured wildlife. *Wildcare* is not in the blame game and everyone knows accidents happen. What is unforgivable is a motorist driving away and leaving badly injured animals by the roadside.

Wildcare is available to give advice and help sort out injured and rescued wildlife, so get in touch and call 6299 1966, 24 hours a day.

Nature Notes – March 2008 Jo Walker

March gave us a warm start to autumn, and the 30 mm of rain that fell last week was more than welcome. The landscape has returned to shades of green without much in the way of colourful flowers, although there are still a few daisies blooming. The autumn-flowering Pale Everlasting (*Helichrysum rutidolepis*) is sporting its lemon-yellow flowers: this attractive daisy is a suckering plant usually found in moist areas (although it has tolerated very dry conditions here for several years). The local form has soft green leaves, but, slightly further afield, this species can cover areas of roadside with smaller, silvery leaves and shorter flowers. As daisies, as well as many other groups of plants, are constantly undergoing botanical revisions, the two forms may eventually be classified as different species or, at least, different varieties or sub-species.

A Cassinia that has been intriguing us for several years (it didn't quite key out to any of the species listed in the NSW Flora) has just been given a name of its own – *Cassinia hewsonii*. This daisy bush grows in Wamboin – quite prolifically along Fernloff Road. It's a rather spindly bush with thin, shiny green leaves and clusters of tiny cream flowers and is one of five *Cassinia* species growing in this area.

It's interesting to see that new plants are still making an appearance on my piece of land. A couple of years ago, *Juncus fockei* and a grass, *Lachnagrostis* sp., began to grow in the little pond below my dam. This year, I discovered the purple-flowered *Solanum linearifolium* (the Mountain Kangaroo Apple) and *Einadia hastata* (Berry Saltbush – so-called because of its profusion of tiny red fruits) – just one plant of each – growing along the creek. The latter two species probably arrived via bird dropping, and the pond plants as seeds in mud on the feet of ducks or other water-birds.

Last week, I found four Black Mountain Midge Orchids (*Genoplesium* (*Corunastylis*) sp. aff. *rufum*) high on the hillside growing in heavy clay soil amongst some scrubby Burgan bushes. This was another first – although orchids often flower sporadically, not making an appearance for several years at a time (and you need to be wandering around in just the right spot when they are flowering), so these may have been there for many years without being noticed. The flowers are tiny, yellowish-green and maroon, with about ten flowers to a stem; the plants here were less than 10 cm tall, another reason that they may have been previously over-looked.

A beautiful Macleay's Swallowtail Butterfly was flitting around here the other day, taking nectar from the flowers of the thistles I was about to chop out. As its name suggests, this beautiful insect has tail-like extensions to its hind-wings. Its appearance is predominantly lime-green and cream with shades of brown along the edges of its wings. Although it is more common in mountain areas, it is a fairly regular visitor here. Its larvae feed on the leaves of Sassafras trees (*Doryphora sassafras*) along the coastal ranges and also on the Mountain Pepper (*Tasmannia lanceolata*) which can be found further inland. The larvae must have tough stomachs! I can remember it being a bit of a joke to get new members of the plant society to which I belong to taste a leaf of one of these plants when found on a bushwalk. At first it tastes, well, just leafy – but, after a minute or so, it's quite evident where the plant gets its name!

But it still came as a shock when Pearl Harbour was bombed on 7 December 1941. The HMAS Sydney had been sunk just two and half weeks earlier, though official confirmation to Australians was delayed until 30 November. June belongs to the Friends and Family of the HMAS Sydney and has provided a lot of information on the topic of the sinking of the HMAS Sydney through the thoroughness of her research. How synchronistic is it to have the Prime Minister announce that the remains of the HMAS Sydney were found after 66 years of mystery on the day prior to her presentation at our Club meeting.

This means that until the end of April, fires cannot be lit in the open without a fire permit. If you need a permit please call 0409 991 340 to arrange an inspection of your intended burn area and what needs to be burnt. We will also need to ensure that you have adequate facilities to control or put out the fire. A permit will only be issued to burn off vegetation, but not for burning building or "man-made" materials.

I would like to devote the remainder of this month's article to what could be described as a pictorial affirmation of the fantastic support your brigade receives from our community and businesses in our area. It is nothing short of brilliant and helps ensure that your brigade is equipped to provide the level of service we all

expect. 

Birchman's Estate

The last major release of new blocks of land in the Bywong / Wamboin area is about ready after five and a half years of preparation and development. The 39 lot rural residential Estate is divided in two by a parcel of land linked to the existing greenway network. This land is to be dedicated to Council as a public reserve. The northern portion, taking in 16 lots is accessed through an extension of Birchman's Grove. The southern portion taking in 23 lots is accessed from Hogan Drive. The blocks vary in size from 2 hectares to 15 hectares.

Neil and Marie Quinn, purchased the land along with adjoining property in the 1970's. The land shows some evidence of earlier use, with many of the trees felled under 1930's tree clearing policy still in evidence.

Road construction commenced June last just when the "drought" broke as a result one of the challenging aspects of the development has been dealing with deep erosion gullies at some points on the land. One stretch of the extension of the Birchman's Grove road rests on a geo-fabric rock "mattresses".

As with most rural blocks, block owners will also be expected to have their own water tanks to collect rainwater falling on the roof for household use. Non-potable water for all the blocks will come, through a reticulated system, from the one dam allowed on the estate. It can capture 17 megalitres per year from runoff and the same amount through a bore. This amount is based on regulations which restrict new developments to capturing roughly 10% of the annual rainfall in a dam and extracting the same amount from ground water supplies via a metered bore. Further dams and bores can not be constructed or developed on the new lots.

Considerable effort was expended to save the trees on the site. Covenants over the land will ensure that the native grasslands and established tree cover is protected. The developer has made a donation to the local landcare group. Members have in turn donated time to put in many more trees, as explained by Landcare in a separate article in this issue of the Whisper. Historically in this area almost every rural residential purchaser has greatly increased the number of trees on land formerly used for pasture.

A 30 metre wide public reserve has been created over Birchams Creek downstream from the water supply dam.

The main contractor for the road works has been Pybar, an Orange based construction company. Ecowise has been the contractor for the installation of the power supply. Telstra has put in the telephone cabling to each block. A number of local contractors and subcontractors have also contributed to the work.

All the blocks, in addition to having reticulated water, are fully fenced. Building precincts have been defined for each lot.

The 5.5 hectare public reserve of treed bush land separating the north and south groups of blocks will be linked to road reserves that will enable a connection, partially via walkway and partially via roadway verges, connecting the existing Newington Road trailway endpoint to the existing trailway from Hogan Drive to the top of Millpost Hill.

The development provided a Section 94 Road improvement contribution of \$402,500 to Palerang Council and a Section 94 Community Services contribution of \$7,500 to meet the additional requirements for roads and other infrastructure in the area.




