THE FIRE DANGER PERIOD HAS ENDED.

BURNING OFF IN THE OPEN WILL BE PERMITTED, BUT PLEASE ENSURE YOU NOTIFY YOUR NEIGHBOURS AND YOUR BRIGADE CAPTAIN AT LEAST 24 HOURS BEFORE YOU LIGHT THE FIRE. RING 000 (Zero-Zero-Zero) TO REPORT FIRES OR SMOKE SIGHTINGS.

From the Captain's Desk



This month I am again pleased to report that your brigade has remained alert but apart from an early Sunday morning callout to a car accident on the Federal Highway (shown below), our services have not bee required for any serious reason during May. Although the picture taken by our intrepid photographer, Peter Greenwood, looks quite dramatic, we understand that the injuries to the occupants of the car were not serious. The other car involved in the collision is some distance behind the Wamboin fire brigade vehicle on the left-hand side of the picture.

I would like to thank all those community conscious people who have contacted either Andrew Dunn, our Senior Deputy Captain or me and their neighbours before they lit up that odd pile of vegetation. This notification really helps all of us. It gives your neighbours plenty of time to make sure any smoke does not adversely affect people with breathing difficulties, to attend to any stock that may be affected and even making sure the washing doesn't have to be done again! It also helps when

people further afield or driving through our area ring 000 to report a smoke sighting and we can then identify it as a notified burn which may not require a brigade response. This would then mean that our volunteers would not need to waste their time with an unnecessary alarm call.

Our training programs continue and while the regular brigade program rolls on many of our members are continuing with training courses run at the zone level. We have members completing their basic training programs as well as 10 people furthering their knowledge by undertaking advanced firefighter courses. Members are also taking part in specialist training programs, including chainsaw and rural fire driving.



We all congratulate Jake Blight for completing his Rural Fire Driver course recently. This is a specialised driving course for drivers of rural fire service vehicles, especially the heavy tankers on and off-road.

Our Annual General Meeting will be held on 10 June starting at 7:30pm at the fire shed at 112 Bingley Way. Everyone is welcome to come along. It would be a great opportunity to meet people in our area and also for our visitors to see the fantastic facility your support has provided for your brigade to operate from and the equipment we use. It is also a good time to pick up information about property protection and the things to consider during different parts of the year when it comes to fire and emergency preparedness. While Wendy Downs is recuperating Pam Klemke will be organising the sumptuous offerings later in the evening. All positions within the brigade are open and nominations are welcome, even on the night.

As our loyal reader can confirm it is important to appreciate that as rural residents there is a joint responsibility between property owners and emergency services in endeavouring to reduce the impact or effects of an emergency situation, should it ever arise. As far as property protection in the event of fire is concerned, information is available from your brigade, our local fire control office in Queanbeyan, and the NSW Rural Fire Service website. It is the crucial 30 minutes after the 000 call is placed or the smoke is sighted that we need to plan for. That is the time it usually takes for most emergency services to get to our properties. For some properties it could well be shorter or longer. However, long it takes, that is the rural lifestyle reality.

One of the issues we also may need to consider, not only in a fire emergency but in other incidents, is a plan if ever our properties are isolated for some time. Roads could be blocked and power may be unavailable. In this event we need to make sure that we are as self reliant as is practicable while we wait for services to be re-established. I recently came across a valuable website which has been developed for this eventuality. It is http://www.pantrylist.com.au. It is well worth a look as a starting point for your planning, but issues concerning the storage of fuel and maintaining stock on your property have not been included.

As a none too subtle reminder, try this quick quiz. What do the images below mean for you?







Possible answers:

- 1. I can you ignore them because I have them all installed in my house and/or shed and everyone in my household knows what they are for and how to use all of them.
- 2. I should check the ones installed in my house to see if the batteries are ok, it is still fully charged or everyone still can reach it comfortably
- 3. I need to get them installed in my house or shed
- 4. I can afford to ignore them.

(In case the pictures don't mean anything to you, they are, from left to right, a fire blanket, a smoke alarm and a fire extinguisher. We do not promote or endorse any particular brand except to say, make sure whatever one you choose complies with the relevant Australian Standard)

In closing, I can report that Wendy Downs, our fantastic Support Crew Coordinator, is recuperating at home after her recent hospital visit. We all hope she gets well very soon.



Wamboin Community Association Electronic Notice Board Update

The Whisper On-Line The Wamboin Whisper, the chronicle of life in Wamboin, purveyor of rural virtues, and harbinger of community events is now available on-line. The Whisper archives are maintained on the WCA electronic noticeboard Web site, and since this is a private Web site, the process of accessing the archives the first time around may seem a little unusual to the uninitiated. But if you are interested, set aside a few minutes, relax, in whatever way you find most appropriate (some patience may be required), and read on. Two years ago, the Wamboin Community Association set up an electronic notice board to assist with the distribution of community-related information to residents of Wamboin and Bywong. You will first need to subscribe to the WCA electronic noticeboard to gain access to the Whisper archives. The notice board is set up as a group mailing list, hosted by Yahoo. To subscribe, simply send an email message to:

Wamboin Noticeboard-subscribe@yahoogroups.com.au The email message does not need any subject or content. The 'system' simply reads the sender's address and assumes that this is to be added to the subscription list.

After you send in your subscription request, the 'system' will send back a message asking you to confirm that you want to subscribe. This is to guard against people sending in a bogus request on your behalf. You need to reply to this message as directed. Your subscription request will then be sent to the notice board administrator for authorisation, and thereafter you will receive a message confirming the success of your request. (Unfortunately, depending on the time of day/week, and the 'activity level' of the administrator, this authorisation could take anywhere from a couple of minutes to a couple of days, but it will not usually take more than a couple of hours.)

To post a message on the notice board, after you have subscribed, simply send your message to:

Wamboin_Noticeboard@yahoogroups.com.au

Subscribers will receive messages as they are posted. Messages can only be posted by subscribers, and will be sent only to subscribers. Yahoo also hosts a private Web site for the notice board, which provides access to archives of notice board messages and a *Files* area containing WCA documents that may be of community interest, but which is **only open to notice board subscribers**. Documents currently available include the **WCA Meet & Greet package**, an overview of community groups in the Bywong/Wamboin area, with handy hints for rural living, and **electronic copies of The Whisper**.

The easiest way to access the notice board Web site is to follow the **Visit Your Group** link on any Wamboin_Noticeboard email message. Alternatively, enter the URL:

http://au.groups.yahoo.com/group/Wamboin_Noticeboard

in your Web browser. Either way, you will be taken to the Noticeboard Home Page.

You will need to obtain a Yahoo! ID to access the WCA electronic noticeboard Web site.

At this point, since this is a private Web site (Noticeboard subscribers only), you will need to Sign In (click on **Sign In** at the top of the page) to gain access to any useful features. To Sign In, you will need a Yahoo! ID. If you don't have a Yahoo! ID, you will need to Sign Up (click on **Sign Up** at the top of the page, or usually also anywhere that you are prompted for a Yahoo! ID) before proceeding. Note that a Yahoo! ID is simply the means used by Yahoo to associate a User Name (your Yahoo! ID) with the email address that you have used to subscribe to Wamboin_Noticeboard (or any other Yahoo Group). When providing details for your Yahoo! ID, the only essential information is the email address, which must be one that is subscribed to Wamboin_Noticeboard. You can put anything you like in the other fields.

When you have successfully navigated your way to the inner sanctum of the Web site, you will see the various options available on the left hand side of the screen. Currently, only the Messages and Files options are enabled, the former providing access to message archives and the latter to the files discussed above. The Whisper will be uploaded to the Web site every month, when it is published, and subscribers will be notified automatically of its availability.

Wildcare Rescues Wallaby by Phillip Machin

What else would you be doing on a fine sunny Saturday morning? I bet you wouldn't be chasing around town for three hours trying to catch an energetic Swamp Wallaby. But that's exactly what four Wildcare rescuers ended up doing – Lesley, Rosemary and Steve from Wamboin and Gabby from Jerrabomberra.



The call came in that there was a Swamp Wallaby hopping around the supermarket car park in the centre of town. It wasn't there to do the weekend shopping and if left to its on devices it may well have been injured or stressed out. So, it was important to catch the animal and put it somewhere much safer. But by the time Wildcare arrived to catch the animal it had disappeared, only to pop up enjoying itself on the showground several hundred metres away.

Swamp Wallabies are quick and after a few near misses it was finally caught in a net and wrestled to the ground. The animal was sedated, wrapped up and safely translocated out of town.

After a sleep it was ready to go again and hopped off as if nothing had happened. Just another day in the life of a Swamp Wallaby. As Lesley says "Wildcare often gets asked to relocate animals, which find themselves in the wrong place. And our rescuers deal with these situations very well. More often than not it is a snake that needs to be removed, but as in this case, we can also successfully catch and relocate much larger animals".

(This should have been printed in the May 2008 Whisper but was not due to a mistake on my part. – Ned Noel, editor)

I don't pay much attention to real estate movements around here but every now and again I am surprised at just how many places have changed hands in the years we have been here. Now we're comparative "new chums" with only twelve years of Wamboin history but the thought of ever shifting, sprucing up the property for sale, nailing the "for sale" sign to the letter box and then waiting for a buyer has always filled me with horror. I'm too scarred from my former gypsy life to ever willingly contemplate a change, and so I was taken aback when I discovered that friends who'd arrived here at about the same time as we did were quietly upping stakes and moving.

In the relatively short time that we've all been here there have been many changes in our area. When we first arrived it was a wetter period, and we had a robust cottage garden around the house. The creek flats were squelchy underfoot and the few kangaroos kept a discreet distance. Walking across paddocks where now there are roads I'd found low stone walls, all that remained of a miner's camp, and nearby an abandoned shaft filled with water. The scribbly gums bore the scars of early timber cutters and small scattered dams, scratched in the shaley dirt, watered native animals now, rather than flocks of sheep. Long before we arrived the creek flat had been an Aboriginal hunting ground, with the old trees on the rise hanging low, providing perfect cover for the hunters. The few trees on the flat had only grown after the hunters had long since disappeared.

People come and go, and there are always changes; some we like and some we don't. Some people make their mark, others simply vanish. Our little community has changed over the years and now it's time to farewell a couple who have, without fuss or fanfare, initiated changes in our community which have helped to make it a better place. They may quietly make their exit, but their legacy will remain.
