I'm up for election again, partly as when I last counted, we were pretty short of nominations over here.



Perhaps we will see you at the Bush Dance. GO WAMBOIN!



From the Captain's Desk





Over the past few weekends some brigade members have finished work on installing a powered hose reel on one of our Category 1 tankers and hose winders on each of the four tankers. The brigade is grateful to be able to fit the electric hose reel. It has been purchased through the generous support of the Eagle Hawk Hotel Social Club, the Bywong Community Association and our local Landcare group. This new hose reel saves a lot of physical effort in winding in one of the long hoses on this truck. During a bushfire it is remarkable how often this needs to be done. Our members will really value this addition. Although a manual device, the other hose winders we have fitted to the trucks will help us roll up all sizes of collapsible hoses faster and with less effort. These too will be of great help to our firefighters. We have just taken delivery of some new safety devices we can use at night to help motorists see our firefighters or help warn motorists of

any traffic restrictions. These new devices are called e-flares and look like a torch which emit very bright flashing blue and red lights. They can be worn by the volunteers or clipped to witches hats laid out on a road or even fitted to special stands. These too have been purchased using some of the generous donations from our community. The new e-flares were very helpful one recent late Saturday night and into Sunday morning at the accident reported below.

It seems some tourists to our country received a very personal introduction to our hopping wildlife late on a cold Sunday evening quite recently. Their journey along Macs Reef Road was interrupted suddenly when a kangaroo landed on the bonnet of their vehicle. As can be seen in the photograph taken by Peter Greenwood, the vehicle eventually stopped in a ditch beside the road and the occupants were lucky not to have sustained any serious injuries. The car was extensively damaged. The fate of the kangaroo is unknown. Crews in the brigade's two Category 1 tankers remained alert to the threat posed by leaking petrol until the tow truck arrived. Although at that hour of the night and morning other traffic was very light, the road was blocked off for a short while. The new safety e-flare beacons worked well and helped highlight the firefighters and the area immediately near our fire trucks.

Over recent weekends several members of our brigade have spent their time improving their fire fighting skills. Keith Wrench took part in the rural fire driving course learning to drive fire tankers off-road in places which





An important issue for all of us is understanding how fires can start at home. Many authorities consider the kitchen as the most dangerous room in the house. I am not referring to the possibilities of repercussions if you comment on the cooking prowess of your significant other, but rather what the cooking could create in terms of fires. Most cooking related fires occur between 5pm and 7pm. There is also the problem of faulty electrical wiring or overloading the existing circuits. Portable heaters and other appliances, especially in winter can be easily left on resulting in problems when we least expect them. The perennial problem of children playing with matches or other ignition sources can lead to serious injuries and damage to your property. That carelessly discarded cigarette or a candle left unattended can also be causes for concern.



Properly installed smoke detectors with functioning batteries are important in giving you early warning of impending problems in your home, especially at night. It is a sobering thought that when we are asleep we can go into a deeper sleep if smoke is in a room. Waking up time to do anything about a fire is much harder. If you just use your present smoke detector to let you that the toast is cooked may be using the technology creatively, but the detector may need relocating. There are several types of smoke detectors on the market. Some of the more sophisticated ones detect combustion products even before smoke is produced. Some detect both. Some have test switches. Some have receptors built in that allow a TV remote control to test them or turn them off. Some can be controlled by shining a strong torch at them. It all depends on what you and your budget needs. A lot of detailed information is available on many websites. The Rural Fire Service and the NSW Fire Brigade websites have a lot of information. Many hardware and other retail outlets have booklets and pamphlets as well as many different types of detectors.

As well as the smoke detectors, it would pay to also consider the often overlooked fire extinguishers and fire blankets. Using fire extinguishers and fire blankets is not particularly difficult and can be the difference between scorch marks on the walls and losing the kitchen or even the house. Again, there is a lot of information around on the types of fire extinguishers and fire blankets and where they should be used. Using a water–based fire extinguisher or even throwing water on cooking oil or fat fires, electrical fires, flammable liquids or gases is too dangerous to contemplate. For example, throwing water or using a water-based fire extinguisher on a cooking oil fire or a fat fire causes the water to instantly vaporise causing an explosion which can result in horrendous burns for anyone nearby.

For those of us luckily enough to have shed to work in, play in or even retreat to, installing a fire extinguisher there, and a first aid kit, could pay dividends. Installing a fire extinguisher or a knapsack sprayer on mobile machinery such as the tractor or ride-on mower, can also be a godsend in the hotter months.

Developing an evacuation plan for your property is another thing that can give you some comforting certainty and save you time when decisions have to be made under pressure. The plan should consider the members of your family including any people with restricted mobility or medical conditions, children, possible visitors, any pets, and any livestock.

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WILDCARE SPRINGS INTO ACTION

Does this picture look like your backyard? Spring is just around the corner and this is a great time of the year to have a



look around your living and work areas to see what needs to be tidied away. Why? Because the more dead and dying vegetation, rubbish, long grass and woodpiles left close to the house and outhouses the more chance of encouraging snakes and lizards. Lizards are OK, but they need to be protected from uncontrolled dogs and cats. We live in a great part of the world, but it is also famous for its tiger, brown and red-bellied black snakes. These are amongst the most venomous snakes, so there is good reason to give yourself every chance to keep these reptiles at arms distance.

Being aware and not alarmed is the key. And to help you see snakes close to your home have a good old tidy-up. This will not only deter snakes from moving across open spaces, but you will see them better and be able to avoid them.

On larger properties leave as much natural bush undisturbed to keep and attract all those animals and reptiles that we know are around – like echidnas, lizards, kangaroos, possums, flying foxes, wallabies, wombats, birds and snakes

Possums and many birds like to use tree hollows, so make a point of leaving them standing. There is much we can do to live in harmony with our wildlife and in winter we can see much more clearly the structure of the landscape and see what can be done to improve things. Keeping the areas around where we live and work will help to make everyone safer and avoid surprises.

And it's really important to take charge of cats and dogs. Not only for their safety - to stop them being bitten, but to prevent them chasing and injuring other animals. Cats do most of their damage at night, so owners need to get in the habit of bringing them inside. Most of us like living in a wildlife rich environment, so it's up to us to play our part. Oh and why not start taking down barbed wire to stop birds, bats and other animals from becoming hooked.

Love them or hate them we all have an opinion about kangaroos. Most residents of Wamboin and Bywong are keen to live in harmony with our wildlife, including the Eastern Grey Kangaroo. Living close to nature is often the reason people give for liking the life in this rural residential area. But there is a minority of people who have a different idea. Wildcare callouts have been relatively less than in previous years, but the telephone routinely rings for volunteers to attend road accidents to rescue or euthanaise animals. And all too often it is the Good Samaritan who has rung in well after the accident driver has raced away. If you hit an animal please stop and check what damage has been done and contact Wildcare for help. If you have to drive away pass an accurate location to Wildcare so they can find the animal and check it out. There is no blame-game here,

so feel safe to contact Wildcare if you hit a kangaroo.



Many people never hit a kangaroo. But some drivers haven't learnt the tricks of the trade – to drive slower at dawn, dusk and overnight; to be especially vigilant at known wildlife crossing points; to look out along the road verges, as well as ahead; to get passengers to look out too; to stop and check an animal if it is hit; and to ring Wildcare or another wildlife group to come and check an injured animal. Many female kangaroos can have a Joey onboard and they can be rescued.

Not everyone reads the Wamboin Whisper, so please pass the message onto your family and friends to help them be safer on our roads. It's OK to drive slowly – you will save fuel, as well as wildlife. Sometimes 60 km/h is too fast, but there is nothing wrong with going at a speed much less than the speed limit.

And it's OK to set an example to all those other go-faster drivers.

For those good Samaritans– keep up the good work. It is refreshing to see the number of people who want to do the right thing – to stop and check animals that may be injured. Some people even stop to shoo animals off the road and through open gates.

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LOCAL GOVERNMENT ELECTIONS - PALERANG COUNCIL

Local Government elections in New South Wales are held every four years and if you are over 18 years of age and on the Electoral Roll you are required to vote at each election. The 2008 election will be held on Saturday 13 September and, although voting booths are yet to be officially notified, it can be presumed that the Wamboin Community Hall will be one location. To be eligible to vote you should check with the Electoral Office by 4 August.

You will also have noticed in the Bungendore Bulletin and the Bungendore Mirror that there has been a series of letters on the subject and statements and publicity by people offering themselves as candidates for Council for the subsequent four years. Tickets are being organised to obtain maximum support for their candidates and some people are standing alone. Some candidates were previously Councillors and have a track record, some have stood for Council before while others are new to the scene and, as unknowns, have a difficulty in such a large Council area to have their views known to electors. Consequently between the time you read this article and 13 September there will be considerable publicity in the local press and in your letter box as groups and individual people manoeuvre to obtain your vote.

The Wamboin Community Association recognises the difficulties faced by the community and will hold a 'Meet The Candidates' evening at the Wamboin Community Hall at 8pm on Tuesday 19 August.

Since the NSW Government amalgamated a number of Shires and created the precursor of the Palerang Council out of the former Tallaganda, Mulwaree(part), Goulburn(part), and Yarrowlumla Shires, the now Palerang Council has experienced difficulty in financing the responsibilities given to it by the NSW Government and this hasn't been helped by the adversarial composition of the Council and the behaviour of some Councillors. Unfortunately, there was a geographical, if not philosophical, imbalance between the interests of the Council majority and the larger part of the Palerang population and, only after much acrimony and representations by the rural residential communities, that a better balance of opinion was obtained. However, there were many responsibilities either evaded or not focussed on by the Councillors, eg the Local Environment Plan (LEP). It is to be hoped that the next Council will remedy some of these important legal responsibilities which will shape the future direction of Palerang's local area.

Until nominations close on Wednesday 13 August we will not know who will be standing for election but it is anticipated that there might be two or three tickets (groups) from the Wamboin/Bywong area who will be providing an opportunity for us to elect a more representative Council. Even though there has been a lot of vocal Community dissatisfaction with the current Councillors on matters other than roads, rates and rubbish, it has been very difficult to find prospective candidates who will volunteer to give of their time to be your community representatives for the next four years.

So, I would encourage you to think seriously about what you want for your community in the future and then before you vote choose a team or person(s) who are likely to succeed in achieving your objectives.


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Judith Miller – Time for Palarang to move into the 21st Century

The morning is frozen and still. We didn't get the snow, but yesterday's raindrops hang onto the naked branches like tiny crystal balls. The wattles beside our road, those that survived the ravages of the clearing bobcats, are covered in tight little balls of icy yellow. The lone daffodil looks downcast, perhaps regretting its early appearance, and the few hellebores are tucked up under last year's leaves. We're in the depths of winter, but the days are getting longer. My dear old chook noticed it probably before I did, and laid her first egg for the season in a cosy nest of lucerne away from the chook yard.

With the cold weather it's rather hard to turn your mind to the notions of global warming, and the need to makes as little negative impact on the environment as possible, but we try. We try to save water and we try to be as Green as we can, using the car judiciously, recycling and reusing. Doing this creates a warm, fuzzy feeling, but it's easy to be naïve. Every human activity has a consequence. However, we've become a little more earnest in our endeavours to help protect our beautiful world, but it's a hard road.

We still have our twenty five year old, water guzzling washing machine which refuses to die. It's had many near death experiences but skilful surgery has always brought it back from the brink. Being a Greenie is hard work, but as long as we breathe we'll keep trying to find ways to conserve and recycle. I am on the lookout, though, for a pair of rubber boots, size 8, with drawstring tops............ wouldn't live anywhere else!



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Nature Notes - July 2008

At last it's beginning to feel a bit like winter after a few white frosts and the odd snowflake. The rain was very welcome, and, although it wasn't enough to get the creek running and the dam full, the winter grasses have greened up sufficiently to make all the herbivores happier. I hadn't seen the red-necked wallabies for a while, but last week four of them were grazing up near the forest with a group of kangaroos, their beautiful soft coats glowing reddish in the late afternoon sunlight.

Some of the Silver Wattles (*Acacia dealbata*) have begun to flower and there are a few prickly, pale-flowered *A. genistifolia* flowering profusely on that bank above the stone wall on Sutton Road. The tiny Ploughshare Wattle (*A. gunnii*), which often only grows to about 30 cm tall, is also sporting a few cream flowers. All of the local wattles are carrying lots of buds so there should be a good display of yellow shortly.

Even with the onset of some colder mornings, it still feels more like spring than winter. Probably the magpies and some of the other birds are feeling the same way as they've started to behave a bit more aggressively as if they're staking out their nesting territory. Interestingly, the sulphur-crested cockatoos still have three youngsters in their flock being fed by parent birds (after much heart-rending, raucous calling!). I've noticed before that their young ones seem to appear in winter – also that very few of the sixty or so birds in the local flock seem to breed.

I was down by the dam the other day when a movement caught my eye. It was a little yellow-faced honeyeater diving from its perch into and under the water and hurtling straight out again. It did this several times, then sat back on a branch above the water fluffing and preening its wet feathers. The day before, another honeyeater, a red wattlebird, had had a rather longer bath in a large water bowl near the house – it was there for several minutes, splashing around and snapping and clacking its beak in enjoyment. Galahs seem to prefer showering to bathing: when it was raining recently, five of them were sitting on a dead tree lifting their wings and eventually hanging upside down with their wings open obviously enjoying the sensation of water falling on their feathers.

Wamboin seems to provide good habitat for some of the native orchids, especially one of the Greenhood Orchids. Colonies of the Little Dumpy Orchid, *Diplodium truncatum* (previously *Pterostylis truncata* – botanists love to keep changing the well-known names of plants!), seem to be popping up everywhere this year. At this time of the year, only the rosettes of bright green ovate leaves are visible and some of the colonies on my place are over a metre across. Unfortunately, they don't flower every year, and I've only ever seen one really good flowering season here when the numerous pale green, brownstriped, rather bulbous flowers covered sizeable patches of bare soil between the grass tussocks. Maybe, just maybe, this will be another one of those years.



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
