The next WCA meeting will on 16<sup>th</sup> September at 7:30pm at the Community Hall.

**Local Council Elections** -- will be held on **13 September 2008** and voting is compulsory for residents aged 18 and over. The WCA has long recognised the need for adequate local representation on Council. For this reason, and in response to community pressure, several WCA executive members have nominated as candidates in the election. I am standing on Judith Miller's Progressive Palerang Group (*the Progressives*), along with John van der Straaten, Ned Noel and Pete Harrison. The group members all have a solid background in the community with a long history of working together as a team. The Progressives will be a voice for all Palerang residents and will work to build a viable and sustainable Palerang for the 21<sup>st</sup> Century. 



David is a lawyer working in Defence and is associated



Our Group B, *Get the Balance Right*, aims to work to do just that — to have the shire's population, and especially Wamboin/Bywong and hobby farmers, represented fairly.

The Group feels all Palerang communities deserve the best possible representation, both demographically and geographically. Group B includes Mike McColl (from Bungendore), Richard Holding (Bywong), Simon Blake (Wamboin), Keith France (Wamboin) and Terry Bransdon (now back in Bywong after a year living in Bungendore).

Terry was the last mayor of Yarrowlumla before the amalgamation, the administrator of the newly constituted Local Government Area and then the first mayor of Palerang.

He is Wamboin/Bywong's local councillor, is seeking re-election because he has lots of ideas to contribute. He retired last week from full time employment, so he has the time to focus on the job and give it the effort it deserves.

Terry has been sticking up for the residents of our area and especially rural residential residents since 1999. He has maintained a strong interest in Wamboin and Bywong issues from the poor telecommunications and internet infrastructure to the condition of our roads through to establishing the rates reference group – the main reason he was ousted as mayor by the Braidwood Boys and Burra's Jim McLachlan in September 2005.

The rates reference group, especially with Wamboin Community Association President Helen Montesin's contribution, managed to rectify much of the unjust rate burden that the Braidwood group thrust on Wamboin/Bywong residents in 2005-06.

Group B is pleased to have Terry as its Number 1 because the new Council will need corporate memory and experience. There will be at least four new councillors and perhaps six, and as the council is a \$50 million a year enterprise, there needs to be experience as well as lots of new talent.


Group B provides four new candidates with diverse talents and great ideas for the future Council.

#### **Group C – Community First**

With the round of Meet the Candidate events that began in Wamboin, all the groups and individuals have tried hard to distinguish themselves to the Palerang voters. They're good forums to introduce new faces, but the short time allowed for thirty five people, all keen to share their reasons for standing, left little time for specific questions. That really leaves voters to choose people who they think will represent them fully, and whom they trust. There were some familiar faces such as the current councillors, and many of you would have known Catherine Moore, for her work on the community visioning process, her representation of community views during Council debates and regular contributions to local media. Her record of community consultation has attracted a group of like minded candidates as **Community First (Group C on the ballot paper).** The four women and four men from across the shire come from a strong community base, having been active invarious ways on our home turf and beyond.

We are, in the order on the ticket, Catherine Moore from Charleys Forest, Judith Turley from rural Bungendore, Forbes Gordon from Braidwood village, Angela Casey from Araluen, Fred Harden and John Taylor from Bungendore village, Sarah Merriman from near Reidsdale and Ian Moy from Krawarree.

**Our platform?** We want to work towards **a healthy and sustainable future for all** with appropriate planning that takes into account the future needs of the people of Palerang, reflects the expressed visions of various communities and



recognises the pressing need to plan for and adapt to climate change and dwindling water supplies; increased democracy through maximising community involvement with real and ongoing community consultation which informs Council decision-making; **openness and accountability** through ongoing declaration of donations received and erring on the side of caution when it comes to conflict of interest issues; and **inclusive and non-adversarial politics** – we have all signed with a preelection pledge to, if elected, treat councillors and others with respect at all times, while recognising diversity of opinion and working co-operatively to solve problems.

We understand the nature of the dispersed rural lifestyle of this Shire and the importance of the villages which support

those communities. We maintain that the costs of all new development infrastructure should be met by the developers themselves, not by the community, and that increasing rates or the rates base is not the way to raise revenue.

We are the Rural Community Group. Our members are Kev Fiebig, Mike Jaggard, Nivan Lau, Alan Schmidt and Nerida Hart. (Due to communication problems that were partly my fault Group E did not have time to supply an integrated ½ page, so John Mitchell of the Mirror sent me the material he had on their number 1 and 2 persons with their group's statements along with 4 photos. I've tried to put that together here in a coherent fashion. – Ned Noel, Whisper Editor)

This coming election is an important opportunity for all residents to be heard through consultation and open governance. We recognise that we all don't live in towns or villages; it's a big shire and we all come from varied backgrounds and that's what makes us one vibrant community. We also recognise that resources are limited, so we think that we need to make sure that rates are fairly and equitably distributed, taking particular note of what supports and improves our lives – sustainability is something we need to focus on. We think we need to be open and keep people informed about how decisions are made. Having been involved in the local community we get a sense that many don't think that resources are not equally distributed across the shire. Do you agree? I encourage you to get in contact with us to let us know what's important to you.

Kevin Fiebig is married with two kids (one still at home and one in the Army). He and his family and came out to Burra in 2005 and quickly realised that living in a rural community is the only way to live! He runs run a small mob of Wiltshire sheep, a couple of horses and enjoy the sense of community and the many social groups that are active in our area. He has become active in the local community through the various clubs and last year became President of the Burra Community Association. He and his family have received a great deal of support and benefit from the community and that's what has inspired him to run for Council. He has a diverse background that includes working in the private and public sector, including a stint in the Royal Australian Navy. His main skill set is in management, and he has been an executive manager in the Australian Public Service for about 15 years. Mike Jaggard is 54 years old and has been married for 30 years, with 2 adults girls; both are doing community work (one is with SES and the other is with the rural fire service). His wife is a nursing sister at the Canberra hospital, and is involved in the rural fire service. In the past 27yrs he's been a chef around the Canberra area, as head chef has done the budgeting and problem solving, especially dealing with clients and staff, trying to listen to what people are saying. He has been very lucky and had the best 7 years in Royalla of doing something he loves doing -- living in the rural community and cooking – the two passions in his life (not counting my wife Irene and his family). They breed Murray Grey cattle - although the numbers are down due to ongoing drought – and the horses come up every night looking for a feed.

He has been involved in the rural community most of his life here as well in NZ. He has been in Royalla for the past seven years. He has been involved in rural fire services both ACT as well as NSW for the last 26 yrs. He has a lot of changes in the RFS but it still comes down to local knowledge and strong community spirit which seems to pull us through when times get tough. That's why he is standing for council, as he believes that it's time for us to listen and look at solutions. When he first came out to Royalla he got involved with Greening Australia, using his tractor to put in rip lines in peoples blocks so they can plant trees and now it's good to see the results of that work.

In conclusion we cannot change things overnight maybe but will do our best to listen and see if things can be done, but most of important thing is that the small communities can have a say and also get something back for their rates in either works or maintenance.

At that event, I shared about the financial adversity of my youth, the creative stimulation working in the entertainment industry, and the fateful juncture in my life where I joined other penniless uni dropouts in Silicon Valley to start-up enterprises that went on to transform the world, including Apple Computer, Microsoft, Electronic Arts and my venture, Computerland. That was about when time ran out and left the story incomplete.

In another minute, I would have completed my point that positive outcomes do not require 'perfect conditions' or lots of money. Rather they require a large inclusive vision and able leadership to make it come about. That real-life knowledge of how to make things successful is what I would put to good use if elected to council. I do not accept the Progressive Group's public position that "rates are unlikely to ever go down". Such a statement demonstrates their puerile approach to enterprise economics and lack of front-line money creation experience.

As Council's \$40M annual operating bud-get only has 17% of it coming from Rates, there are very real prospects of stabilising and winding back Rates without cutting back services. But to do so, the councillors must have strong financial skills and proven innovation in economic problem solving and revenue creation. Starting as the Progressive Group does, denying that rate reductions are ever possible, they have no chance of finding a solution and if found by others would be as likely to deny it as support it.

I assert that the Wamboin/Bywong Ratepayer's essential interests reside first and foremost in Council's financial viability and performance, not whether the LEP has 20, 40 or 80 hectare lots. Without economic strength all the rest is just window dressing that will fly out the window if an administrator is appointed.

Few candidate CVs indicate that they can provide the economic vision and leadership required to govern a \$40M enterprise or can bring Rates down. I am one who can, as is Howard Crozier. I strongly believe your own Anne Goonan makes the grade too. So I encourage you to vote 1 to 3, below-the-line, for us to protect your greater interests by assuring the best economic outcome for Council, from the slate of candidates available. As for the LEP, the candidate fear mongering is uncalled for because in the end it will be the community who'll have the final say.



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#### Wal Raynolds

Age 58, married 31 yrs. 2 grown up children. Farmer Contractor. Palerang faces a huge development challenge, now and in the future. Bungendore is growing at 7 - 10% p.a. There is a very strong feeling against development in parts of the community, and that development per se, needs to be stopped. I believe that is impossible. It is a Councillor's duty to control development, after the community has decided what development is appropriate at the L.E.P. stage. The system of L.E.P. D.C.P.'s S. 94 plans S. 64 plans provides certainty to the whole community. The importance of an L.E.P. cannot be overstated; for instance the Y.L.E.P. allowed village development in Bungendore without Town Sewer. This has since been amended by this Council. It is therefore imperative that the community of Palerang make very clear to the next Council what the community wants. It is unreasonable to expect Councillors to vote down developments that are legal under the existing L.E.P. or any future L.E.P. There are too many instances of planning laws being ignored, for the sake of instant popularity, or money ,or some other form of corruption. I always support the L.E.P. and its associated documents. I fully realise this stance has annoyed a lot of people, and for that I apologise ,but for me there was never a choice. Right from the start I led the rates debate. I am very pleased with the result. In each zone the more you're worth the more you pay: a high base rate [service component], then valuation based, a straight line graph. Queensland pays tax according to the same tax scale as Tasmania. N.S.W. pays the same rate of G.S.T. as the Northern Territory. Nerriga pays rates according to valuation, the same as Wamboin.

They became friends and had a treeful of frogs.

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
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#### **Bywong Bushfires**



#### From the Captain's Desk

Last month was busy for many reasons. Your brigade had several incidents to deal with, our brigade training program rolled on, several brigade members took part in training programs at the Zone level, the Community Education Group began the planning for our street meetings, the field officers continued the work in developing risk management plans for our brigade area and we found time for a productive working bee at the fire shed.

It is always a sad task to bring our reader news of fires in our area, especially so when the news involves someone's house or property. Unfortunately late one Sunday evening we were called to house fire in Bungendore Road. Although considerable damage resulted, it was restricted to part of the house. The situation

could have been much worse if it had not been for alert neighbours who raised the alarm. It is on these and other occasions involving fires when you have to think that this could happen to any of us. Understanding the risks and taking reasonable precautions is not difficult. It is that knowledge that gives us greater control over the consequences of these incidents. Being prepared for that critical 30 to 40 minutes before emergency services can arrive at where we choose to live is a crucial factor in limiting the aftermath. Installing smoke detectors, limiting the sources of fuel for a fire to get a hold, be it vegetation, debris in roof gutters, piles of firewood, or flammable liquids are all things we need to be aware of. The list of risks can go on. There are many strategies all of us can use to reduce these risks. In so doing we can reduce the impact on our properties if the event of a fire or other emergency. Helping spread this knowledge and understanding in our community will be a major focus for your brigade over the next few months.

Your brigade was also called to the scene of an early morning accident along Sutton Road involving a B-Double semi-

trailer which had come to grief and caught fire. Luckily the driver was not injured but the fire destroyed the prime mover and the first trailer.

Strangely at roughly the same time on consecutive Sunday nights during the past month seemed to be the time for car accidents or call-outs to reported car accidents. Your brigade responded quickly to provide assistance on each occasion.

During the month a number of members successfully passed several different training courses. Darrell Tipton is now a qualified Prescribed Burn Supervisor. #### WOMBAT DENNIS RESCUED

Wildcare doesn't rescue too many large adult male wombats, but a couple of weeks ago, on a very cold wet and windy morning, it did just that. Denise, a property owner off the Federal Highway, had noticed a large wombat struggle up the hill from the creek and disappear under one of her sheds. The wombat was wobbly on its feet, hunched up and it was in the middle

of the morning when all good wombats are supposed to be underground sleeping off the exertions of the night before. Clearly something was wrong. Denise called Wildcare and on closer inspection it was very clear why Dennis was feeling in a bad way. Half his back had been savaged and opened up creating a large and ulcerated wound down to its bone. Even though he was a big boy at over 30 kilograms, it's likely the damage was done by another more dominant wombat, but a stray dog could also have been involved too.

It took two Wildcare volunteers to pick up, transport and take Dennis into care to see if he could be fixed-up. Safety is the number one priority and wild wombats can be quite vicious. After some sedation, his wounds were cleaned up, including removing maggots, ticks, dead skin and infection. He was given antibiotics and treated for lice. Later a veterinarian cleaned the wounds more thoroughly. Currently, Wildcare carers are keeping the wound



clean and moist to allow it to heal slowly and to limit scarring. This means Dennis has to live in a secure rubber tub to keep him away from too much dirt. He's lost a lot of weight through this period, both due to his weakened state and being stressed out by being in care and locked up. As Dennis progresses and his wounds start to close over, he will be put into an outdoor enclosure to recuperate and get strong again before going off to a safe release site. Fingers crossed that all goes well and Wildcare carers can make him into a good-looking wombat again.

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# Nature Notes – August 2008

As I'm writing this, on the last day of winter, the rain is falling steadily outside – a lovely sight after a month in which evaporation had so far exceeded rainfall.

Spring seems to be well on the way. The local wattles – *Acacia dealbata* (Silver Wattle), *A. rubida* (Redleaf Wattle) and the little, spiky Ploughshare Wattle (*A. gunnii*) - are brightening up the countryside, and, this morning, I found the first Early Nancy (*Wurmbea dioica*). Another sign of spring was a Shingleback Lizard basking in the sun a few days ago.

The birds are busy too, with a couple of magpie nests under construction and other birds chasing intruders away from their territory. Honeyeaters seem to be the most aggressive – Red Wattlebirds, White-eared Honeyeaters and Eastern Spinebills seem to spend as much time chasing as they do feeding. I haven't found any Honeyeaters' nests yet, but one pair of White-eared Honeyeaters is presumably sitting on a clutch of eggs by now: a couple of weeks ago, there was a joey lying in the sun near the house when one of these birds landed on him and attempted to pluck out some fur. The joey swatted it away with a forepaw, but it was a very persistent bird, and, on the fourth try, managed to pluck out a beakful of soft fur. I've heard of White-eared Honeyeaters taking hair from dogs too, but was surprised when a friend told me he'd had one land fleetingly on his thatch of white hair and snatch a bit for its nest. I've had some close encounters with Grey Fantails as they've attempted to catch bushflies that were bothering me, but so far haven't become part of someone's nest!

It's interesting to see new wildlife and plants still turning up here. A few weeks ago, a wombat tried to build a tunnel in four places along the creek before finally moving on, presumably to somewhere with fewer rocks in the soil. Another little animal has been raiding the compost heap for vegetable and fruit scraps – possibly a Brushtail Possum, although the droppings it's leaving are not really typical of that species. Several bird species have come and gone over the years or visit intermittently, but the Crested Pigeons that came in about ten years ago now seem firmly entrenched. Plants are still turning up, though. Last year, I noticed *Juncus fockei* (a rush) and a moisture-loving grass, *Lachnagrostis avenacea*, growing in a small pond below the dam, and more recently found one of the Kangaroo Apples (*Solanum linearifolium*) along the creek. The native Solanum is in the same family as potatoes and tomatoes (Solanaceae) and has beautiful purple flowers followed by yellowish fruit similar to small tomatoes. Although they don't seem to be generally favoured as a food source, this plant most probably arrived via bird droppings – the most likely route for a lot of new plant arrivals.
