Wamboin Community Association -- President's Paragraphs

Happy New Year to you all. A bit late, but this is the first Whisper for the year. I wish you all the very best for 2009. Emergency Management Information Session – Members of the Lake George Emergency Management Committee are co-ordinating an information session at the Wamboin Community Hall on 17th February at 8:00pm (following the WCA meeting) to ensure that Wamboin residents are aware of the emergency management arrangements for the area. They are proposing to have a range of emergency service representatives attending, including from the NSW Rural Fire Service, NSW State Emergency Service, NSW Fire Brigade, Police, Ambulance and the Palerang Council local emergency representative. The session will provide information on the emergency management arrangements for a range of possible incidences (e.g. bushfires and snow storms) that may require the opening of an evacuation centre. It is important that all residents know what to do in an emergency and I encourage you all to attend.

Wamboin Community Association – The first meeting for the year will be on 17th February at 7:30pm at the Wamboin Community Hall. The meeting will be followed by an information session on Emergency Management Arrangements for Wamboin, as detailed above. This is an important issue for the community and I hope everyone will come – you never know when you might be faced with an emergency and will need to know what to do.

Wamboin Produce Markets – The markets continue to thrive providing a great range of local produce and the opportunity to catch up with friends over a cup of coffee/tea and scones/muffins. The next markets will be on **21**st **February** from 9:00am until noon.

Wamboin Fire Station and Community Hall – A \$25,000 grant to upgrade the power supply and provide an emergency generator for the Fire Station and the Community Hall has been recommended by the Council. The grant is part of the \$310,000 Federal Infrastructure Grant allocated to Palerang and the recommendation has been submitted to the Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Local Government for approval. Many thanks to Peter Greenwood and John van der Straaten for their hard work in obtaining the grant. Peter put the initial proposal forward to Council and John's statement at the Council meeting was instrumental in getting the Council to form a sub-committee to consider applications from the whole of Palerang and not just the villages.

Palerang Council – WCA members attended the recent extra-ordinary Council meetings (the first was adjourned due to the lack of a quorum) to speak against the rescission motions proposed. The first motion was to rescind the December decision to hold a referendum on wards at the upcoming by-election. The WCA has been seeking a referendum on wards since the inception of Palerang. Pete Harrison made a statement at the December meeting that was pivotal in getting the referendum motion on the table and passed. It is very disappointing to have Council reverse the previous decision and the WCA will continue to lobby them on this issue. The second rescission motion, which was also passed, was to reverse the decision to consider other sites for the Bungendore Transfer Station. In our discussion with Council, we have managed to get the Council to review the Waste Management Strategy and, in particular, to consider the possibility of a transfer station at the Macs Reef tip site. The Bywong and Wamboin Community Associations have been invited to participate in a workshop with Council to discuss the options.

Palerang Council By-election – There will be a by-election on 14th March to fill the vacancy left by Judith Miller's resignation from Council. Voting is compulsory and to assist residents in making an informed vote, the WCA is proposing to host a 'Meet the Candidates' information session' on 3rd March at 7:30pm at the Wamboin Community Hall.

New Residents – If you are new to Wamboin, or know someone who is, Lofty Mason has collated a "Meet and Greet" package. It contains useful information about Wamboin, including a map. It has details of the diverse range of community groups in the area. Please contact Lofty on 6238 3258 for a copy.

We left 2008 with a great gathering at the community Christmas Drinks, with about 50 people attending including two of our finest Bungendore police. Thanks to our local Koonaburra winery for providing some Christmas cheer.

Even **bigger thanks to Morag Cotsell** who has recently resigned from the Bywong Association Committee. Morag has been kept busy keeping the Association running when there were few people available to help. She will continue to be involved in the Association and keep our website going.

We are still looking for people to deliver to Wicks Road, Shepherd Road and Shinglehill Way. Macs Reef Road tip closure – community consultation regarding alternative waste management options. Council has now agreed that the Bywong / Wamboin / Sutton East area should have a local waste management facility when the Macs Reef Road tip closes at the end of 2009. The alternative was going to be for residents to drive to Bungendore to the waste transfer station. The Council has also agreed to consult with the local community to assist in developing a suitable option. More information on the consultation will be made available in coming months.

Federal \$ money for Bywong facilities. Bywong has been shortlisted to receive local government infrastructure funding of \$42,000 to build composting toilets at the Bywong Hall and to build a bus shelter, location to be determined. This funding is yet to be confirmed. All projects are to be completed by 30 September 2009 and will be co-ordinated by Council.

Bywong Hall (Les Reardon Reserve) – would you like to help run the Hall? The Les Reardon Reserve and Community Hall - Bywong Hall -is administered by a committee of dedicated local volunteers and is one of 24 Section 355 committees of Palerang Shire Council. This committee is separate to the Bywong Community Association, although the Association has membership on this committee along with other residents and regular hall users. The committee is seeking Bywong residents who are interested in having a say about the Hall and are available to give some time on a long-term basis. Meetings are held approximately every 3-4 months and the time involved including meetings would be 2-4 hours per month maximum, depending on what activities the Committee decides to take on. *More information about the history and other details of the Hall is at the end of the Bywong News bulletin*.

About Les Reardon Reserve & Community Hall (Bywong Hall). Les Reardon Reserve, which is the property of the Eastern Capital City Regional Council, is managed by the s.355 Les Reardon Reserve Facility Management Committee of Palerang Shire Council. The membership of the Committee includes a local Councillor, representatives from regular hall users such as Bywong Community, Geary's Gap Pony Club and the local Landcare Group and also residents of Bywong.

History. Mr. Les Reardon gave a parcel of land dedicated to the new community of Bywong, now known as the Les Reardon Reserve. The Geary's Gap Pony Club applied to have use of the grounds for their activities and the concept of the Hall was developed. The Hall was designed by architect Tim Haldon-Brown and was built by a group of dedicated local residents, spearheaded by Andy Burbidge and Jan Donald, who volunteered their time and expertise one Sunday each fortnight. Events held at the Hall in the past have included local bush dances and the Bywong Field Day, similar to the car boot sale but more for local business people to show their products. The Geary's Gap Pony Club also holds regular events at the Hall and grounds, along with the annual Car Boot Sale, the Trivia night in July and other community social events organized by the Bywong Community Association.

Facilities. The Hall has cooking facilities and there is ample parking at the rear of the building. The capacity of the Hall is around 50 for seated dinners and meetings and 75-100 for standing functions.

Hiring the Hall. The hiring of the Hall is done through the Les Reardon Reserve Facility Management Committee. The rates of hire for casual (private) users of the Hall are:

- \$75 for evening period up to midnight
- \$125 per 24 hour period
- Instructional use of the grounds may be arranged direct with the Geary's Gap Pony Club www.gearysgap.pcansw.org.au
- Weekend use by arrangement

A refundable bond of \$100 is payable at the time of booking. Should any cleaning, repairs or replacement of broken items be required at the end of the hire period, that part of the bond required to pay for such cleaning or damage will be not be refunded.

Wamboin Market Plant Sale - Saturday 21 February. Landcare will have LOTS of native plants for sale at the next Wamboin Market. We have so many that are ready for planting right now, that we just can't leave it till the annual Bywong Car Boot Sale! All plants cost \$3 and will grow in this area.

Meetings: In 2009, we will have only a few meetings and instead, we will have a range of other activities such as field trips and rambles, and we will extend the propagation sessions to include education on plant identification (especially weeds), propagation methods and other topics of interest. The next two field trips for Landcare members are:

Field trip – Monday 9th February 2009, 6-7pm. This will replace our first monthly meeting. It will be held at the home of Kathy Handel and Keith France. RSVP to kukinya@bigpond.com, ph 6238 3596 by Sunday 8 February. This field visit will show how a bare hill is gradually being transformed into a woodland, methods of planting that worked and those that failed, and how to create a house garden that attracts wildlife.

Field trip - Sunday 1 March, 4.30-6.00pm. The owners of this property are attempting to transform a bare paddock into a refuge for local wildlife. Around the house, this is achieved by using nest boxes, rocks, water points and a wide range of mostly native plants. Almost 130 different species of birds have now been recorded, over a period of more than 20 years. Plantings in the paddocks have been less successful, and have been hampered by drought, feral animals and incorrect planting methods. In recent years ripping has improved the success rate, and in 2005 they employed Greening Australia to sow 15 kms of native plants specifically selected for the Wamboin area, using direct seeding. After a slow start this is starting to show results. This field visit will show both recommended and inappropriate methods of tree planting and tree selection, and ways to increase habitat for our local fauna. Propagation sessions are held on the first Saturday of each month at Geoff Butler's place, 38 Birchman's Grove, 9am – 11am; enquiries to Geoff on gbu22182@bigpond.net.au or ph 62369158. The next sessions will be on **7 February and 7 March**. We will put labels on plants to be sold at the Wamboin market and Bywong Car Boot Sale as well as potting up cuttings and seedlings.

THE FIRE DANGER PERIOD HAS STARTED.

A FIRE PERMIT WILL BE REQUIRED FOR ANY BURNING OFF IN THE OPEN. EVEN IF YOU ARE ISSUED WITH A PERMIT WILL ALSO NEED TO NOTIFY YOUR NEIGHBOURS AND YOUR BRIGADE CAPTAIN AT LEAST 24 HOURS BEFORE YOU LIGHT THE FIRE.

From the Captain's Desk

As I sit here on a quiet Australia Day evening the cooling Easterly has brought more than just a drop in the temperature. The almost regular wind change has also brought something else with it. Over the past few days, a few minutes after the Easterly

arrives, many residents have called to ask where the fires are. It may seem difficult to appreciate but the smoke and smell of bushfires are not local fires. The smoke is coming from a fire in the Budawang National Park on the state's south coast. It is likely that the smoke will be a regular occurrence for some time as the Rural Fire Service has reported that "rain is the only way that the fire will be put out. The fire, sparked by lightning nearly a week ago, has burnt out 1,200 hectares of bushland, about 30 kilometres north-west of Batemans Bay. The fire on the northern side can only be water bombed, as the nearest road is 47 kilometres away."

The smoke and smell is also a timely reminder for all of us to get prepared. Although the official fire season started last October it often

is closer to February and March that conditions change in our area and the fire danger starts to rise. You should have noticed that the five fire danger signs around our brigade area have been hovering around High for some time. Please consider the messages below and prepare yourselves and your property.

In case you missed the last public meeting to discuss how you can prepare for the fire season on the 20th of December last year, and due to the fantastic attendance, we will be conducting another meeting on Saturday the 21st of February at the Wamboin Fire Shed. The session runs from 10:30am until 12:30pm with refreshments and sausages sandwiches afterwards. From all accounts the many people, as shown below, appreciated the opportunity and learned much at the December meeting. We would be pleased to see you there on the 21st.

While the call-outs have been few, your brigade is busily preparing for a major training exercise to be held in and around the Lake George escarpment area on March 14. Several other brigades have been invited.

It isn't often these days that brigade numbers increase from inside our ranks and so I cannot let the opportunity pass without sending my sincere congratulations to Col Prest and Sam

Pavitt following the birth of their second child, Ewan. Their daughter, Abi, is a regular visitor to the brigade and it won't be long before her little brother joins her to find a large collection of honorary aunts and uncles.

Although what follows is repeating some information we published some time ago, the message is just as important now as it was then. There is some valuable information on the NSW Rural Fire Service website (http://www.bushfire.nsw.gov.au) and the information below can be found there.

How to carry out Hazard Reduction

Reduction of fuel does not have to be as drastic as removing all vegetation. Environmentally this would be disastrous and often trees and plants can provide you with some bushfire protection from strong winds, intense heat and flying embers.

There are three main methods of hazard reduction:


- hand clearing
- mechanical clearing
- burning

In many circumstances, hand and mechanical clearing methods should be considered the best way to protect assets. These methods can be safer than burning, and easier to organise and maintain:

- Raking or manual removal of fine fuels will remove fuels such as fallen leaves, twigs and bark on a regular basis.
- Mowing the grass will keep grass short, green and well watered.
- Slashing and trittering is an economical and effective method of fuel reduction. However it's best if the cut material must be removed or allowed to rot before summer starts. Slashing and mowing may leave grass in rows, increasing fuel in some places. Trittering, or turbo mowing, also mulches the vegetation leaving the fuel where it is cut.
- Ploughing and grading can produce effective firebreaks, however, the areas need constant maintenance. Loose soil may erode in steep areas, particularly where there is high rainfall and strong winds.
- Removal or pruning of trees and shrubs involves selective fuel reduction (removal, thinning and pruning) and retention of vegetation, which may have beneficial effects by acting as windbreaks and radiant heat barriers.

How bushfires affect houses

Three ways houses are set alight by bushfire Houses are set alight through embers, radiant heat and direct flame contact.




Embers (sparks)

Embers (sparks) are the main cause of houses catching alight during bush fires. Extreme fire weather days are accompanied by strong to gale force winds, which carry burning debris. Embers therefore gain entry to houses through broken windows or gaps in and around walls or roof cladding and ignite the contents. Embers also lodge on and ignite horizontal timber decking, guttering, steps and window sills. They can be blown up against and ignite timber used for supports, underfloor battens, posts and steps.

ACTION

- · Have a Bushfire Survival Plan.
- Have a portable battery operated AM/FM radio to receive information during the fire.
- · Don't enter the bush if smoke or fire is in the area.
- · Stay calm and report all fires on 000!
- · Check if elderly neighbours need assistance.
- · If possible, block your gutters and fill with water.
- · If you choose to self-evacuate, do so early.
- If ordered to evacuate by the police you must obey, so have pets and valuables packed and ready to go.
- Wear long sleeves and long pants, natural fibres and sturdy footwear.
- Close all windows and doors, block spaces beneath doors with wet towels or blankets.




Radiant Heat + Direct Flame

The hotter a fire the greater the amount of radiant heat and the faster the fire will spread by radiation.

Direct flame impact usually occcurs when something combustible is near the house. eg. shrubs, wood piles or outbuilding.

ACTION

- Wear long sleeves and long pants made from natural fibres and sturdy footwear
- · Have eye and breathing protection available for everyone
- Keep a torch and portable AM/FM radio at hand, in case power fails, to monitor weather
- · Turn off gas and power
- · Hose down walls, gardens etc before the fire arrives
- · Block downpipes and fill gutters with water
- Fill all sinks, baths etc with water to use on spot fires in case mains water supply or domestic electric water pumps fail
- Bring hoses/fittings and other fire suppression tools inside, so they can be used later
- · Close all doors and windows and block gaps with damp towels
- · Move flammable curtains and furniture away from windows
- Shelter in a part of the house most distant from approaching fire front until fire has passed then actively put out spot fires
- Once fire front has passed, go outside to check for spot fires and ember attack



After the Fire Has Passed

Ember attack is the biggest threat to houses. This can last for several hours after the fire front has passed. Unattended houses are very susceptible during this stage. People who have relocated can return during this stage. Experience shows that people and houses that are well prepared will survive the passage of a bush fire.

ACTION

It is the owner's responsibility to secure the site following a fire.

After the fire has passed and for several hours after the fire front has passed, patrol your property and put out spot fires started by flying embers.

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

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DEVELOPMENTS IN WASTE MANAGEMENT FOR WAMBOIN

Last year I wrote a couple of articles in the Wamboin Whisper and the Bungendore Mirror on the Palerang Council's 20 Year Waste Management Strategy and the Council's proposals for the future management of waste from Wamboin. In short, Council's plan was to establish a waste transfer station in Bungendore and, once it became operational, Council would close the Macs Reef tip. It was also proposed that a series of recycling stations would be located on suitable sites around Wamboin and Bywong. A further option offered by Council staff was a roadside collection service.

Wamboin residents have indicated clearly, in a survey and at public meetings, their dissatisfaction with these proposals. A roadside collection service was considered unmanageable for many people, particularly the older generation with long and rough driveways. Council has found that the recycling stations pose legal (& environmental) difficulties so, I understand, the program is unlikely to be extended. That leaves the residents of Wamboin, Bywong and parts of Sutton with the only option of transporting all their waste to the Bungendore transfer station on the closure of the Macs Reef tip.

The recent rescission-motion turmoil at Council focussed the Wamboin Community Association on Council's waste management strategy and, in particular, the Macs Reef tip situation. The WCA Executive took the opportunity to make representations at Council's Extraordinary Meeting on 15 January 2009 on the inflexibility of Council's thinking and implementation of the waste management strategy and for the Councillors to seriously consider the needs of the residents of Wamboin and Bywong with the withdrawal of the service to the communities provided at the Macs Reef tip. Together with the WCA's arguments for a transfer station at the site, Councillors were reminded that these communities comprise over 25% of the population of Palerang and provide a larger percentage of the rates. The Bywong Community Association made similar representations at this Meeting on the proposed closure of Macs Reef tip.

The WCA holds that the best solution would be the establishment of an appropriate transfer station at the Macs Reef site which could complement a more comprehensive transfer station at Bungendore. Council already has established a transfer station at Captains Flat and is proposing one for Nerriga to cater for populations very much smaller than those at Wamboin and Bywong. The NSW Department of Environment and Conservation published in 2006 a Handbook for the Design and Operations of Rural and Regional Transfer Stations which provides a series of case studies of transfer stations for small and large communities. This Handbook can be downloaded and is recommended reading should you wish to compare the policies, procedures and practices of Palerang with other Councils. The aim of the WCA is to have the Macs Reef tip rehabilitated into a transfer station employing new technologies and best practice. Other Councils have done so effectively and it is within the competencies of Palerang's engineers to do so too.

The current situation is that Council staff has offered to meet with representatives from the Wamboin and Bywong Community Associations in a workshop forum to discuss the options for our communities. This proposal was given the seal of approval by the Councillors at the 15 January Extraordinary Meeting. Palerang Councillors have asked that Council staff report the results of their discussions to a General Meeting of Council. It is the intention of the WCA to schedule a community meeting immediately following these discussions so residents can be informed of the results from the workshop(s) and decide on a course of action to meet their needs. 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
WAMBOIN PRODUCE MARKETS

Council Communication Improving

Moves to improve the communication between the Palerang Council and the residents of Palerang need to be applauded. The Palerang website, www.palerang.nsw.gov.au now offers the option for residents to subscribe to its mailing list and receive emails regularly. This is a huge move forward for residents connected to the internet as they will now receive updates on Council activities.

When the council takes actions, as recently occurred, where it called an extra ordinary meeting at short notice, the people on the email list received advice of the meeting. The other amazing thing is that I received an email today, a day after the extraordinary meeting, updating me on the results of the meeting. It takes weeks for the minutes from council meetings to be released, so this is a great improvement in communication for the Palerang Council.

Yesterday's meeting passed two rescission motions on maters previously approved by the council. The matter of rescission motions, and the lack of certainty of decisions these bring, is a matter of concern. At least now with the email list, residents will be better informed of the actions of the council that make decisions on their behalf, and may have a better chance to influence the decisions of the council.

Kangaroo Shooting

I read with interest the comments made by Nora Stewart, President of the Bywong Community Association (*Wamboin Whisper* Bywong Community News, Dec 08), about the killing of kangaroos close to houses in Bywong. Nora pointed out the legal and licensing requirements for people intent on shooting kangaroos. But it occurs to me that there is a much more subtle aspect than simply allowing landowners in rural residential areas to unilaterally kill off the wildlife.

This area is no longer a broadacre clapped-out sheep station with just a smattering of housing. There is an ever growing population with all the infrastructure, stock and domestic animals that go with it. Safety is a primary concern for all of us. A licensed landowner and shooter are responsible for their actions. Can we assume they have fully appreciated the risks to other property, stock, companion animals and people? In another newspaper (*Pallerang Bulletin* Rural Residential Wildlife Under the Gun, Dec 08) Nora described how one shooter was discovered using a spotlight to identify animals at 2.30 in the morning and just 150 metres from her house. How does a shooter using a spotlight in the dead of night see what is beyond the target he is aiming at and the pool of light? The risk of hitting something down-range or either side may not be great, but the consequences if the unexpected should happen is severe. Bullets can go a long way - even if they go through an animal's body first.

Most of the people I know in the Bywong/Wamboin district want to keep the wildlife. Its one of the reasons people ventured out here in the first place. There is no need for us to kill it off. If it is a worry to some property owners, then non lethal methods should be employed rather than reaching for the gun. It is a great disappointment that some property owners cannot bring themselves to forewarn their neighbours about their intended clandestine acts - perhaps they are worried they would have to justify their actions.

It seems the National Parks and Wildlife who issue licences to kill wildlife and the NSW Police who are responsible for firearm safety have some work to do to decide how broadacre culling policies can be safely applied in rural residential areas. In the meantime, I suppose wildlife friendly people will have to remain vigilant and try to stop their neighbours killing wildlife that belongs to everyone.

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RURAL LANDS PROTECTION BOARDS

Over the last couple of years the Wamboin Community Association has been instrumental in protesting to the New South Wales Government over the rating system employed by the former Braidwood Rural Lands Protection Board. In particular, the WCA considered the reduction of the minimal rateable area to 4 hectares from 10 hectares, without any community consultation, to be unacceptable.

Representations were made by the WCA to the Ministers for Primary Industries and Local Government and to the consequent Review of the RLPB system by the Hon Richard Bull in 2007. This Review recognised the validity of the case which the WCA put to it and to the Government and the Government undertook to make a number of reforms to the existing system. On 2 December 2008 the NSW Parliament approved major reforms to the RLPB system. These reforms make substantial changes to the structure and governance of the system and include:

- renaming boards as "livestock health and pest authorities";
- replacing the State Council with a State Management Council;
- amalgamating the 47 boards into 14 livestock health and pest authorities;
- replacing the annual conference with a State Policy Council, made up of representatives from the 14 livestock health and pest authorities; and
- providing a more equitable and clearer method of calculating rates.

For many properties in Wamboin, particularly those under 10 hectares which do not carry stock, it means that from 1 January 2009 the owners will not be required to pay rates. Also, the method for calculating rates will be based on a per hectare basis rather than on a notional carrying capacity. This change to a rate per hectare will be introduced from 1 January 2010.

I understand that Wamboin now comes within the jurisdiction of the South East Livestock Health and Pest Board. Some staff from the former Braidwood RLPB will still be located at Braidwood but the financial administration will be based -- John van der Straaten, Secretary, WCA.

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
