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# **Bywong Community Association**

I wrote an article for the last Wamboin Whisper about the Les Reardon Reserve and the Hall at Bywong. This article contained a number of errors and I take responsibility for those. In an effort to correct the story, I have approached long-time resident Peter McCullagh to write of his experience of Les Reardon and the Reserve.

# Les Reardon and his Reserve

Les Reardon served the people of Yarrowlumla Shire in many ways for many years. He was a Shire councillor for some decades and, for a substantial part of that period, the Shire President. His other formal contribution to the wider region was as the Yarrowlumla delegate to the Southern Tablelands County Council. County councils, which were based on a dozen or so shire councils, had responsibility for electricity reticulation, maintenance and supply. Les was President of the STCC for more than a decade, concurrently with his period of leadership of the Shire. Both of these responsibilities entailed many hours per week (nominally remunerated) but listing them fails to tell the full story about the man.

Les liked people and nothing made him happier than being able to help them. From the early 1970s on he was the last broad acre farmer in a district that was rapidly becoming home to the '40 acre farmers'. Many of these people had minuscule awareness of rural living. They frequently needed advice and/or 'hands-on' help and Les was extremely generous in providing both. It was often considered by those aware of these contributions that his own farm suffered, and this was almost certainly so on some occasions.

It is interesting to reflect, at this time of rediscovery of 'conflict of interest', on Yarrowlumla Shire Council practice in the 1970s. Les Reardon deliberately refrained from undertaking any subdivision during his period as President while much of the land in the district was subject to small acre development. Applications from family relatives would come to the Council table from time to time and, invariably, as soon as the paper hit the deck, Les would declare his relationship and potential conflict of interest. My impression, during 3 terms on the Council, was that Les' potential interests deliberately came off second best.

After standing down from the Council around the mid-1980s Les was subject to major illness for the remainder of his life but bore this with great fortitude. He continued to want to help people. I recall his discharge letter from the South Sydney Hospital where he had been recovering having had bilateral below knee amputations. The discharging doctor wrote to record how much Les, in his wheelchair had set out to encourage other patients in his ward.

So much for the man: what about his Reserve? Yarrowlumla Shire Council applied a policy of obtaining, from anyone submitting a development application which would create new blocks, a contribution towards providing additional community services commensurate with the extra demands likely to be generated by the consequent increase in numbers of residents. The form of the contribution could be either in cash, on a *pro rata* basis determined by the number of new blocks created or, less frequently, as a block of land which could be developed by Council to serve future community needs. The choice between these alternatives would generally depend on the location of the proposed development and its proximity to any land already reserved for community use. Obviously, other factors such as topography and accessibility also influenced the decision between cash and land

The size of the contribution extracted from the developer was quite substantial. Taking the Birriwa Rd development as an example, one block out of 8 or 9 went to the Council. One can assume that this cost was factored into the sale price of the remaining blocks. In the late 1970s, the Council had been searching for a block that would be suitable for general community purposes in the rapidly developing Bywong district. I recall that we were considering buying land on the open market, or asking for some from the Lands Department but, despite quite a few excursions, nothing could be found. The arrival of the subdivision application relating to what was to become Birriwa Rd was welcomed as an opportunity to obtain suitably located land for any future community use. It also provided the Council with the opportunity to recognise Les' contribution.

Before writing this note, I checked that my memory about the origins of the Les Reardon Reserve were accurate by talking with Howard Doust, who served the Shire as Engineer for many years (a service recognised in the naming of Doust Rd). In negotiating the transfer of the Reserve block to the Council, it was explicit that it was to be dedicated to general community use, which could be determined over future years by residents in the area. Howard remarked that he was aware of only one instance in which a developer's contribution of land was allocated for other than general community use (that occurred in Wamboin when, of two blocks simultaneously available, one was earmarked for equestrian use and the second for other use).

As a postscript to recalling Yarrowlumla's performance in relation to subdivision, I remember instances in which development was undertaken involving the sale of existing portions. Council had no power to prescribe the nature of any access road that was constructed to service these portions, nor could it extract any contribution towards future community use. Consequently, the blocks may have sold for less than others in subdivisions which had incurred a contribution to the Council. The downside was that the Council, I believe very reasonably, did not accept any future responsibility for maintenance – an ongoing case of *caveat emptor*.

Please use and enjoy Les' Reserve. That is what he wished.


Planting tip: Put bags and stakes around new plants to protect them from the weather and from being eaten or trampled.

#### From the Captain's Desk

A few weeks ago Col Prest, John Taubman and Keith Wrench spent three days participating in a Lake George Fire Zone
Task Force assisting at the Jingera Rock Fire. What follows is their short report. Given the recent tragic loss of life in the fires in Victoria, including David Balfour from the ACT Fire Brigade, part of their report makes a hauntingly prophetic statement.



Jingera Rock is in the South East Forest National Park, approximately seven kilometres south-east of Wyndham and 25 kilometres west of the coastal town of Pambula. The fire started on 24 January during a lightning storm in the area. At 2pm on 30 January, the fire was declared a Section 44 Bush Fire Emergency which meant that fire fighters from around the State could be requested to provide support to local crews fighting a major fire in their area. Col, John and Keith joined 23 fire fighters from other brigades in our area and took 6 fire fighting trucks to the fire.

The task force travelled to Bega on Sunday afternoon, received a briefing at the Bega Fire Control Centre and then went to assigned accommodation at a local motel. Three to a room was about average and after three days of working, eating and sleeping together you get to know your firie mates quite quickly! The task force worked with fire fighters from the ACT as well as Remote Access Fire fighters from NSW Forests.

The priority was to contain the fire in as small an area as possible. To the east of the fire there are extensive logging operations containing valuable commercial assets and huge fuel loads. To the west of the fire is the township of Burragate and a number of outlying properties. The strategy was to build a containment line of burnt forest around the entire fire, so that eventually, it will burn itself out regardless of wind direction. Fire fighting resources were divided in to two twelve hour shifts. Controlled fires were lit on the ground and also from the air by helicopters dropping incendiaries. Once a containment line was established, the perimeter of the fire was "blacked out" to at least 30 metres in. Blacking out is the process of extinguishing any remaining fires and cooling any hot spots to prevent re-ignition. The work is hot; very dirty and full protective gear must be worn at all times to guard against injuries. One of the biggest dangers is trees falling to the ground unexpectedly after being weakened by the fire. At the end of three days a good containment line was built to the west, north and east of the fire. Work continues to build a containment line at the southern end of the fire.

Col, John and Keith returned to Wamboin on Thursday lunchtime and were grateful to be met by members of the brigade support crew who cleaned and replenished the fire truck ready for its next operation.

Sending such task forces provides assistance and respite to local crews fighting major fires and provides a good opportunity for members of our brigade to experience large scale incidents.

More recently many members of the Wamboin brigade, as happened in many rural fire brigades across the country, volunteered to go to Victoria to help their colleagues fight fires in the biggest natural disaster Australia has endured. A rotation system was developed for NSW Rural Fire Service areas to send personnel, trucks and equipment to help in the crisis. Our Zone's turn came late last week but the numbers of people requested to be deployed from our Zone was much lower that we would have liked. However Andrew Dunn and Bruce Stewart left for Victoria in one of the brigade's smaller tankers as part of the task force for a 5 day commitment. Relief crews from our Zone will be deployed in a few days, including Dave Cochrane and Darrol Dykes from your brigade. I would like thank Chris Murdock who at very short notice made himself available to take Andrew's place if he was unable to go.

On Saturday 21 February your brigade held another community information session at the fire shed. With thoughts of the fires in Victoria it was not surprising that approximately 300 people attended to learn more about getting themselves and their properties prepared for a fire. Even though the start of the meeting was delayed for some time due to the high number of people needing to register, it was fantastic to see how patient and understanding everyone was in waiting. Several key messages were delivered. The first was that we all need to understand that because of where we have chosen to live, it may take up to half an hour for emergency services to get to our properties. This means residents and their properties have to be prepared and factor this in to their fire action plans. The second message is the decision on whether to leave early or stay and defend properties. The third message concerned how to go about preparing properties for a fire and the fourth considered the correct personal protective equipment to be used when defending properties. We were fortunate to have a representative from


Country Energy at the meeting to explain about the hazards of fallen power lines. The audience was left with a very graphic illustration of dealing with ground potential hazards and exiting vehicles if and when fallen power lines are on the vehicles. While the subject is serious I think many people in the audience could start a new dance craze when practicing the jump-from-the-vehicle jive and the avoid-the-ground-potential-hop, but they will have remembered a very important lesson! After the meeting many people stayed on to ask lots of questions, enjoy the culinary marvels organised by Clare Hobbs and the magnificent members of the Support Crew, while many people took the opportunity to understand more about the operation of several fire fighting pumps being demonstrated by members of the brigade around the dam near the Community Hall. I am also sure that my new young friend, Oliver may become a member of a brigade in the years to come after he enjoyed a short slow trip around the community "oval" in the brigade's main tanker after the question session finished. Oliver was resplendent is his Fireman Sam costume and I certainly enjoyed his rendition of the musical theme from the show he sang as we travelled around under lights and the occasional siren.

A feature of our community meetings is that we took the decision some time ago to provide "door prizes" to some lucky people attending the information meetings. The prizes have been fire blankets, fire extinguishers and books on the impacts of bush fires. On this occasion however we were able to go one better in providing fire related prizes through the extremely generous actions of four companies. Peter Zimmerman, a local resident and owner of Café D'Lish in Deakin, made an offer that I could barely refuse. He offered to pay for half of a fire fighting pump as a door prize if another company would cover the other half. At the meeting not only did another company cover the other half of the pump but two other companies offered to cover the cost of the hose kit to go with the pump. The lucky winner of this important part of equipment was Judith Beard. On behalf of our brigade and our local communities I would like to sincerely thank Café D'Lish, Cosmorex Coffee, Leapfrog Leadership and Gough Watson Business Services for their generous and inspired support.

I would also like to pass on a thank you to Priam Australia for supplying, without charge, the delicious meat and sausages for the barbeque. All five companies more than deserve to be included in the Captain's List of companies providing support to and for the work of your brigade.

While the community information meeting was not meant to be a fund raising event for your brigade, several people asked about how to send donations to their brigade. Tax deductable donations can be sent to the Treasurer of the Wamboin Volunteer Rural Fire Brigade, 112 Bingley Way, Wamboin 2620. Receipts will be sent.

Other people asked about the local Ultra High Frequency (UHF) Citizen Band (CB) radio channel 6 maintained by the brigade for use by the brigade and members of the public. This radio channel can be used by the small 1 to 5 watt hand held units available form many electronics, communications and 4x4 shops. However, people should be aware that this and many other UHF CB channels no longer operate in the 27Mhz range.





**The Decision to Leave Early or Stay and Defend.** The decision to stay and defend your home or leave early is not easy. Many issues have to be considered and these issues vary from person to person and from property to property. A well-understood and well-rehearsed plan must be developed before any fire season.

The NSW RFS advises that buildings are more likely to survive a bush fire if they have been well prepared and someone is there to actively defend them. It is therefore imperative that, regardless of the decision to "Stay or Go", we need to prepare our properties so that they can be defended when bush fire threatens.

If the decision is to "Stay and Defend", we need to appreciate that we will need to cope physically, mentally and emotionally. We also need the skills, knowledge and confidence required to protect our homes when a bush fire threatens.

If the decision is "Leave Early" we need to leave as soon as is practicable. Our decisions will have to consider family members who may be very young, disabled, elderly or who could have difficulties leaving in a hurry. Advice will be broadcast on the local AM ABC radio station (666) and also via the local UHF CB Channel 6, for example. Telephoning the 1800 NSW RFS Information Line on 1800 679 737 will be another source of information. The Roads and Traffic Authority can also be contacted by telephone on 132 701 for information about road and traffic conditions and avoiding areas where fires are occurring.

What is "early", I hear you ask? As a rule of thumb, if we can see smoke, it is too late to leave. If planning to leave early, you must decide where you will go, how you will get there, and what trigger you will use to initiate your plan. If you plan to leave early you must recognise that on days of very high or extreme fire danger, bushfires may break out nearby and spread at a rate that provides very little time to relocate.

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We may not need to go far to be safe but wherever we intend going, it should be determined well before the need arises. A neighbouring property may provide a safe refuge. This may involve less disruption than travelling to a more distant location and would allow us to return quickly to our property. If trips are planned during the Bush Fire Danger Period, we should check ahead to see what the weather conditions will be like in the area.

Properties should be prepared for bushfire regardless of whether we intend to stay and defend our properties or relocate to a place where we feel safe. Proper preparation will improve the safety of firefighters and their ability to defend a building successfully even if we are not there when a bushfire threatens. Well-prepared properties are also more likely to survive in the event that we or firefighters are not available to protect them.

The most important aspect of preparation for us and our property is the creation and maintenance of a defendable space within which a building can be defended against bushfire embers and radiant heat. Within this defendable space, bushfire fuels must be reduced to prevent or significantly reduce the ability of a fire to burn (and consequently spread to buildings). Properties should be prepared so that they provide a safe refuge to shelter from radiant heat and ember attack. A properly prepared building should be our first choice when a bushfire threatens. Most buildings lost in bushfires ignite from small fires caused by sparks and embers. These ignitions often occur immediately before, during, or up to several hours after, the passage of the main fire.

Research indicates that a well-prepared home is often the safest place to shelter from a fire front. Last minute evacuation is the most dangerous option of all. Research also has proven that we are safer in our house than in a car during a bush fire. Cars provide extremely poor protection from bush fires.

Bush fires are a shared responsibility between residents and firefighters. So it's up to all of us to prepare our Bush FireWise Action Plan and make the decision to stay and defend, or leave early.

Although I have taken up a lot of space in this edition, I believe the importance of the messages warrants our editor's understanding and indulgence.

I know that my previous experience will provide an opportunity to help bind this group into the more stable, focused team that is required to meet the challenges into the future.


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### Lake George Day VIEW Club by Lydia Teodorowych


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#### Wamboin Muse Jill Gregory

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WILDLIFE SAFETY DOWN TO EVERYONE by Philip Machin

Wildlife groups such as *Wildcare* and the newly formed *Native Animal Rescue Group* (NARG) based around Braidwood continue to be impressed with the interest shown by people wanting to look after our wildlife. There are more and more calls coming into their telephone help-lines for advice or to report injured animals. But there have been a few reports in the media recently that indicate a small minority of people in our community just don't get it and go out of their way to be cruel to animals. In a recent report the President of Wildcare mentioned a number of incidents in Queanbeyan where a kangaroo had been dragged along the road, a wallaby attacked by children, possums found with broken necks. And an incident on the Kings Highway where a dead kangaroo's feet had been removed.



There are reports of cruelty to wildlife elsewhere. In eastern Palerang, around Braidwood, wombats have been deliberately killed and their ears cut off. Lesley of Wamboin, who is a *Wildcare* member, said "some time ago a kangaroo was seen with an arrow in its back – and another arrow was discovered on a neighbouring property next to a group of alpacas! Just this week a shingleback lizard (pictured at left) was found still alive, but with what appeared to be a bullet wound in its back. Both these animals had to be euthanaised."

The NSW Parks and Wildlife Service have a responsibility to protect wildlife and the Police have responsibilities to address cruelty to animals and any firearms breaches. But ultimately it is down to everyone to be vigilant and either take action to stop cruelty to animals themselves or immediately contact the police should they see something happening. It doesn't matter whether it is private or public land,

Wildlife belongs to all of us and it is protected by Law. The authorities can't be everywhere and we all need to play our part in keeping our wildlife safe. Please help to protect and save our wildlife by talking to family members, friends and neighbours if they appear to be doing the wrong thing.

#### Skippy? Do we care.....

Last month I wrote a letter to the *Whisper* about how disappointing it was to have a few Wamboin and Bywong property owners act unilaterally to kill off our wildlife. I also mentioned the problem of firearms safety in our ever developing rural residential area.

The Queanbeyan office of the Department of Environment and Climate Change (DECC), who issue licenses to cull wildlife, have written to say that no less than 17 licenses have been issued to property owners in our area in recent times to kill 865 kangaroos. So if <u>your</u> mob of kangaroos has 'disappeared', you now know why. One wonders what reasons have been

given to justify the arbitrary killing of so many kangaroos in our area – and what checks if any were made by DECC staff before issuing the license? I don't see any significant primary production taking place that would warrant eradicating all of the kangaroos in a particular location, so it must be applicants who want the last blade of brown grass for their horses and the few stock animals they may have. I doubt there is any financial hardship involved given the clapped out and rocky nature of our land.

It is clear from the contacts made to Wildcare for help and assistance that many Wamboin and Bywong residents want to live with kangaroos and other wildlife. They are thrilled to see the wonders of the natural world on their doorstep and want to help protect and look after it. It's not a big ask for everyone to be more tolerant and find ways to coexist with all of our wildlife and not simply reach for the gun. In our community setting, it surely is the height of selfishness for a few people to take unilateral action to kill off wildlife that belongs to everyone.

As for firearms safety and the ability to safely fire a weapon at the dead of night in our rural residential area..... that remains a problem. - Philip Machin, Wamboin



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# Les Reardon Reserve and its Community Hall

Page 5 of the Whisper for February 2009 needs quite a lot of corrections.

Thank you for offering me space to make these. Gearys Gap Pony Club last year celebrated its 30th birthday and from the many letters received, and the number of old members who turned up to join in the celebrations held with the Zone 16s 50th birthday party, it is evident that many people have fond memories of the early days. The foundations laid then have left their mark, I believe, on both the Pony Club and the community.

My husband Brian and I bought a block on Creekborough Road in 1974 and moved into our house in October 1976. After entertaining up to a dozen children with their ponies at weekends we called a public meeting in 1977 to suggest forming a pony club. Gearys Gap Pony Club was affiliated with the Pony Club Association of NSW in 1978. The foundation families were listed as Carpenter, Donald, Gamble, Maguire, Nash, Ridley, Thompson and Salmon. These were quickly joined by the Burbidges, Eves, Lees and others.

By 1979 there were over 20 families. Rallies were held at our place, then the Donalds, then the Maguires. The search for club grounds began straight away.

Les Reardon, while he did much to help us, did not donate the land where the club now meets. After watching several suitable pieces of crown land alienated and sold we (of the Pony Club) asked the Yarrowlumla Shire Council to buy us a piece of land. At this stage there were no other community groups looking for land or any other form of council assistance.

A deal was done with the developer at Birriwa Road whereby the Council put in the roads at the subdivision in return for a block of land for the Pony Club. The Environmental Design School at the University of Canberra was recruited to plan the grounds. During the process of public consultation, people living in the area, including some from the Pony Club, suggested that the land should be made available for wider community use, and that perhaps the club house proposed by the Pony Club should be a community hall. The plaque above the entrance doors to the hall attests to the fact that hall and grounds were granted by Council for the use of the Gearys Gap community. However, later, when Council needed to advise the Geographic Names Board of many locality names fast emerging with subdivisions, the group by then managing the hall called the area Bywong.

The push for land came from the Pony Club. There was no community of Bywong until after the land was obtained, unless it was an area across the Highway in Yass Shire centered on Bywong Station. Councillor Les Reardon worked with the Pony Club to obtain the land, and it was he who many years earlier had suggested that either Gearys Gap or Newington would be the most historically correct names for the Club. If Les Reardon had given the land I believe he would certainly not have called it Bywong! The land was taken over as public land by Yarrowlumla Shire Council and a s.355 Committee set up to care for it. The rationale from the Council was that the Reserve be for activities for which people could walk or ride (bycicles or horses) to the Reserve. If you needed to get into a car to join whatever was to be available, then we were asked to gravitate to Bungendore or Sutton to avoid the duplication of facilities like tennis courts which might not be viable with a smaller catchment. The Reserve also has a strong link with the Greenways.

Anyway, let us enjoy what we have got! I just thought my fellow Northern readers of the Whisper might like a little history from the early days.

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
