

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
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Bywong Community News

Another very busy month for the Bywong Community starting with the Clean Up Australia Day on 1 March, a waste management workshop with Council on 19th March and the Car Boot Sale on Sunday 29th March. I would like to thank our hard-working committee who have all excelled themselves this month.

Clean-Up Australia Day - what a load of rubbish!

Thanks to the 45 or so people worked hard to clear our main roads of rubbish and it was nice to see all those who attended the BBQ at the Hall afterwards. Very special thanks to the angel Jenny Johnston who so efficiently organized everyone with their bags, water and sunscreen.

Macs Reef Road Tip Closure – Community Consultation

Macs Reef Road tip is due to close this year with the current option for residents of this area to take waste to the new Bungendore waste management transfer station. In January, Council agreed to discuss consulting with our community to discuss the possibility of a locally-sited option. Representatives of Bywong, Wamboin and Sutton Community Associations met with Council on Thursday 19th March to commence discussions about waste management options for our locality. The preferred option being put forward by the communities was to rehabilitate the Macs Reef site and make this into a full waste transfer station. Council management are pushing kerbside collection, which we believe is not practical or cost –effective. Council will discuss this further at their next meeting on 2 April and we are looking forward to fuller consultation with the community. We have been collecting your views via a short survey – please contact us if you would like your views put forward.

Upgrade to Bywong Community Hall at Les Reardon Reserve

The Les Reardon Reserve Committee is working hard to progress the Federally funded project for additional toilets for the Hall. The Committee is developing a list of priorities of other repairs and improvements to the Hall in order to be able to take



advantage of other public funding that is available now. The Hall is available for hire, the grounds are open to the public and lead to the Greenways and the community arena up behind the Hall is available to local people to use with their horses.

Bywong Gold Mine Sale

The Association has written to the NSW Dept of Lands in Goulburn to get confirmation about the sale of the Bywong Gold Mine, and what this may mean for the area.

Bywong Car Boot Sale – What a cracker! The Bywong Community car boot sale last Sunday 29th March had a cool start to the morning that quickly became hot, with the usual coating of Bywong dust courtesy of our four-legged friends. This was probably our biggest and most successful event to date with about 120 sellers taking part resulting around \$4000 raised for the community.



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CARING FOR WILDLIFE?

Wildcare and the Native Animal Rescue Group (NARG), which operates around Braidwood, often come across orphaned and injured animals that have been handed in after being cared for by members of the public. But in practice it is not so easy to raise or keep alive an animal without specialist knowledge and training. Many mammals, including kangaroos and



wombats, need a particular milk formula and this has to be given at certain times of the day in exact quantities. There is also the need for the right environment, medication and other supplementary food. It's no good using cow's milk, as this will totally upset an animal's digestive system and cause further problems. Similarly reptiles, such as lizards, need a particular diet and housing to thrive. Birds can quickly die if they are not treated correctly.

By Law members of the public have to hand over wildlife to a reputable agency, such as a licensed wildlife group or a Parks and Wildlife ranger and within a couple of days. Unless licensed by the NSW Government it is illegal to keep wildlife. And for good reason. As well as providing the right food and housing, wildlife carers need the skills to

'train' animals to get them ready for eventual release back into the wild. Baby animals tend to grow quite large and eventually they become unmanageable. Large animals that have been hand-raised the wrong way will have little chance to be rehabilitated and released back into the wild.

The best approach is to join the local wildlife group and find out how to do things properly. Rescuing, caring for and releasing orphaned and injured animals is immensely rewarding, so why not get onboard?

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Letter from Anne Goonan

On Tuesday 17th March I was declared elected to Palerang Council. All three candidates contested this election well, and I congratulate Richard and Mark on their efforts. I would like to thank voters for their support and trust. I am particularly grateful to those who raised their voices in my support, and put themselves 'out there' for me. In close communities it can be a 'big ask' to publicly indicate one's 'political views' and I sincerely appreciate the efforts they made on my behalf, through letters of support, manning polling booths, or hosting the dreaded corflute signs! I also thank my family for their input during the election period and their ongoing support.

It is difficult when candidate ideologies are so similar and yet so different. Primary votes for the three candidates were quite evenly spread - 2,556 2,394 2,276. This would indicate that the voters in Palerang were almost equally divided in their views of what is important. Given that we three were all independent candidates —where were the differences? Leaving the gender issue aside, and the locality connections....it seems to me that the most important thing is the need for a balanced analysis of each issue — within the guidelines that underpin the decision making process, and the overarching legislation that directs such evaluation. This is closely followed by the essential elements of sustainability and the 'green' view, continued consideration of the farming sector and their particular needs, and finally the view that not all development is bad.


As promised, I will judge each issue carefully and consult with you as much as possible, doing my level best to represent you, the community.

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Wamboin Pony Club News - March 2009

It has been a very busy start to the year for Wamboin Pony Club members. Whilst the year did not officially start until our first rally day on 8 February, we had already had quite a few members competing or participating out and about the region. Ceilidh Armer (Eventing) and Lauren Slater (Mounted Games) both were selected to attend the State Pony Club camp held each year in January over a week in Sydney. Both riders received the benefit of intensive coaching from some of the top level coaches in the country. Also in January, quite a few of our younger riders participated at the Bungendore Show, with some great results – Rebecca Williams, Tyla Harris and Sammy Quick all took home rosettes.

February saw the start of Pony Club events for 2009, the first competitions being sporting events. Wamboin PC has always performed well in this field and results this year have continued in the same vain. At the Michelago Sporting Spectacular, Jack Durr came away with the Highpoint Award for his age group, as did Lauren Slater for her age division. 10 riders from the club attended the Zone 16 Sporting Championships. Two riders won their age championship – Lauren & Katie Slater and many riders attending their first sporting championship had some great results:

- Victoria Evans qualified for all 3 finals in the Under 11 age group
- Amy Evans achieved some very fast times in a number of events
- Andrea Thompson qualified for a final in her age group
- Rebecca Moore qualified for a final in her age group.

The team of Jack Durr, Penny, Lauren & Katie Slater won the Club Teams Competition as Wamboin Blue and the Wamboin White Team of Ally Durr, Victoria & Amy Evans placed 9th overall.

March is the month for Show Jumping, and again a strong contingent of Wamboin riders were out representing their

club at the Zone 16 competitions. Two types of show jumping competitions were held, jumping equitation (which is like dressage but over jumps) and the more well known show jumping. Just two riders were able to represent the Club at the Equitation day, being held on a Saturday. Lauren and Penny Slater received some good scores from the Judges and Penny received the Reserve Champion in the 60cm grade. The following day was the Show Jumping Championships and nine Wamboin riders took part. In the 45cm grade, Laura Worden and Victoria Evans ended the day on equal points for the Champion, so on a count back to separate them, Laura won out as the E Grade Champion and Victoria picked up the Reserve Champion. In the 60cm grade both Penny Slater and Amy Evans performed well, both taking home some awards. In the 75cm grade, Lauren Slater had some very good results to finish 3rd overall in that Grade.

In the teams Show Jumping competition for the Hoofbeats Trophy (which has been awarded since 1977), Wamboin took out first and fourth place. Winning the trophy, for the first time ever for Wamboin, was the team of Laura Worden, Lauren Slater and Jess Baldwin. Finishing in fourth place was the team of Victoria Evans, Penny Slater, Nicole Smith and Brodie Worden. That's two out of three Zone 16 Team Competitions won by Wamboin Pony Club, pretty impressive for a club of 30 riders (you might note the writer is quite proud, being Club President and all!).

Out of the saddle and the Wamboin Club has also had a win or two. The club was successful in securing a funding grant from the Veolia Mulwaree Trust for a two year program of improvements to facilities at the Club grounds in Canning Close. A sum just shy of \$9,000 was granted to the club and a large percentage of this figure will be spent on improvements to the club house. Of course, this will not happen without many hours of volunteer work from our parents and friends. Work has commenced and the Club members are very grateful for the support from the Veolia Mulwaree Trust for this project which will see the Club able to extend the programs we can offer our members. The Club executive has also resurrected the Sect 355 Reserve Committee through the Palerang Council and it is hoped that the Council, who owns the land and benefits from all the improvements the Club makes on it, will be able to support some improvement work also. Members of the broader Wamboin Community might not realise that the Reserve which is the home of the Wamboin Pony Club, is one of the few around without electricity, which just goes to show just how resourceful we are at catering and providing for activities for our members at our grounds.

Til next time, watch out for your local champion pony club riders around Wamboin, they really are a talented group of young people! And if you pass them riding along the local roads, please slow down, 80km an hour is way too fast to be passing riders on horses – even our champion Wamboin horses and ponies can be unpredictable on occasion so please drive safely and with caution and a lot less speed when riders are on the road edge, that way everyone will be guaranteed of getting home safely.

THE FIRE DANGER PERIOD HAS BEEN EXTENDED TO 30 APRIL 2009.

A FIRE PERMIT WILL BE REQUIRED FOR ANY BURNING OFF IN THE OPEN. EVEN IF YOU ARE ISSUED WITH A PERMIT WILL ALSO NEED TO NOTIFY YOUR NEIGHBOURS AND YOUR BRIGADE CAPTAIN AT LEAST 24 HOURS BEFORE YOU LIGHT THE FIRE.

RING 000 (Zero-Zero) TO REPORT FIRES OR SMOKE SIGHTINGS.

From the Captain's Desk



Due to the low rainfall, the expected weather conditions over the next few weeks and the conditions in the grasslands and forests in our area, the fire danger period or fire season has been extended to the 30th of April 2009. Apart from continuing to be alert to the risks of bushfires, fire permits will still be needed if you intend having a burn off during April. If the fire danger levels remain high during April and you have vegetation you need to remove, please consider removing it first before thinking about a fire permit. The account of the recent grass fire below will help you understand the reluctance to issue the permits.

A few weeks ago, at about 4pm one Sunday afternoon, many brigades in our Zone were called to a grass fire on a property just outside Bungendore along the road to Tarago. While the cause of the fire is as yet unclear, the speed of the outbreak was a real concern. The first crews on the scene were able to slow the spread

of the fire and prevent it from reaching some reasonably heavily wooded areas. If the fire had not been stopped at that point it would have been a little difficult to contain. The crews following quickly behind the first tankers on the scene then spent the rest of the day getting the remainder of the fire under control. It took a further two days patrolling the fireground to ensure the fire had been completely blacked out. The fire spread over an area approximately 1.5kms long and varied in width from 500 metres to 800 metres.


A week or so before the major grass fire your brigade was called out to attend to another grass fire in Bywong. The message below is an old one but is still relevant today.

On the last Sunday in March your brigade helped the Bywong Community Association with the now famous Bywong Car Boot Sale. As well as helping out organise the parking for both sellers and buyers, it was a great opportunity to demonstrate how to extinguish a typical kitchen fire as well providing a lot of information about protecting properties and preparing yourself and your family if a fire threatens the property.

During the next few weeks a letter will be delivered to your mailbox explaining the activities your brigade has been involved in since we last wrote to residents almost two years ago. The letter also explains that the brigade is seeking donations to help build or purchase a number of important things that will help your brigade better serve and protect our community.

Seriously though, in case the pictures don't mean anything to you, they are, from left to right, a fire blanket (batteries are not needed), a smoke alarm (which does need batteries) and a fire extinguisher (batteries are not needed). 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FURTHER DEVELOPMENTS IN WASTE MANAGEMENT FOR WAMBOIN

You might recall that in the February edition of the Whisper, I provided an account of representations from the Wamboin and Bywong Community Associations to Palerang Council for a review of the Council's Waste Management Strategic Plan to enable the establishment of an appropriate transfer station at the Macs Reef tip site.

Further representations were made to the February Meeting of Council and Councillors resolved that community consultations be held with representatives from the Wamboin, Bywong and Sutton Community Associations. Councillors sought a report following these consultations on whether Palerang should develop a seventh transfer station at Macs Reef tip and directed that the report should indicate the scale of transfer station needed and the timetable for its construction.

Representatives from the three Associations quickly met to consider options for this consultation with Council and all agreed that the communities had clearly expressed a preference for a transfer station at the Macs Reef tip site; there was to be no loss of amenities to the residents, ie. the landfill operation would continue until the transfer station is operational and; the capital costs for the transfer station would be shared Palerang-wide.

A Waste Management Workshop was organised by Council staff for 19 March which was attended by most Councillors, Council's Director Infrastructure Planning and two representatives each from the Wamboin, Bywong and Sutton Community Associations. Council's preferred option, on the closure of the Macs Reef tip, was for all residents of the communities to take all their waste to the Bungendore transfer station. However, other options proposed by Council were for a kerbside collection service for household waste and co-mingled recyclable materials with all other material being taken to Bungendore; a small transfer station for hand waste only with co-mingled recyclables and all other material again being taken to Bungendore and; a full resource recovery transfer station duplicating the Bungendore transfer station.

The community representatives considered that none of the Council's proposals was suitable in the form presented and instead proposed that Council develop a transfer station, Option 3 in the Strategic Plan, which had been recommended for Captains Flat and the other transfer stations. It was essentially Council's third option with additional facilities adding little cost but providing significantly better waste disposal arrangements. It was envisaged that the transfer station would comprise an elevated covered platform from which residents would drop off their waste; skips for recyclables (glass, plastics, paper/cardboard, etc); specified locations for white goods/metal, oil, batteries, electronic goods and green waste. All building materials, chemicals, soil/fill, motor vehicles, etc would be taken to Bungendore.

The discussion between Council staff, Councillors and community representatives was searching and at times rigorous as the options were thoroughly considered and evaluated in the context of an essential community amenity. Councillors and Council staff were clearly made aware that the options for the transport of regular waste from Wamboin, Bywong and Sutton (part) to Bungendore and a kerbside collection service were unacceptable to most residents. The Option 3 style transfer station was considered to be a practical option for the area and could be developed to employ best practice for a waste management system into the future.

Palerang Council's Director Infrastructure and Planning currently is preparing a report to Council. I understand that this report will be available on Council's website and from Council's Office before it is considered by Councillors at a Council Meeting.

Kangaroos

In response to a letter by Phil Machin in the last Whisper.

In the last Wamboin Whisper, you asked others in the district to comment on the local culling of kangaroos by shooting. I have the privilege of living on 40 acres in Wamboin and do not have a firearm. I was brought up on the land in outback Queensland on a sheep and cattle station where wild pigs, emus, dingoes, kangaroos and a host of other fauna abounded. In its natural state, temporary water holes existed along some of the larger creek beds but by enlarge, surface water did not exist most of the year. Then along came white man with his big crawler tractors and pulled large areas of native eucalypt forest with huge chains and dug dams across the creeks. Grasses grew where trees once stood and near permanent water now appeared every few kilometers. What happened next? Rabbit and kangaroo numbers exploded. Eventually, myxomatosis killed off most of the rabbits and the dingoes and foxes took most of the rest. But the kangaroos continued to breed. Where their numbers were once controlled by the natural agents of food supply and access to water, no such boundaries now existed. That is, until the next drought. Huge numbers of kangaroos died of hunger around dried up water holes and dams.

So what was the answer? Commercial 'roo shooters came to the rescue. Thousands of kangaroos were taken from our properties each year and turned into pet food. The roo population stabilized to a manageable number where our existence as graziers and farmers and nature were able to get along just fine. Multiple mobs of 50 to 100 roos were still common in every paddock and the most visible effect of the continual harvesting was a decrease in the big buck population. Now, it is quite possible that a more scientific or selective approach could have been taken to the harvesting process but nonetheless, it was a necessity and solved the problem at the time. Mobs of roos still wandered past the homestead each morning and night and camped under the trees all around. Like most real owner graziers, as opposed to the rapers and pillagers of some big business run stations, we managed the land, destocked it in droughts and did the best we could to look after it.

But, here we are in rocky Wamboin, where every little property has a dam but many have little grass. The Southeast Livestock Health and Pest Authority tell me that I have to pay a levy based on a notional carrying capacity of 27 standard stock, whatever that means. Folks, at this time, my block would be hard pressed to sustainably feed 27 extra mice because the roos are eating the place bare. I have no stock but I do have over a 100 roos on a regular basis. They are creating totally bare spots and erosion tracks on my hill and the native grasses are struggling to get a seed head up before a hungry little mouth chomps it off. Don't get me wrong, I love seeing the roos on the front lawn with their joeys. I regard the roos lying around under the trees as part of the charm of the place. They are "my" roos and I like them, but there are often too many of them for the land area. This is going to be a hard winter for these animals, with little feed stock heading into the cold months of minimal grass growth. We still have a nearly full dam but little tucker.

So, what do we do? It appears that some of us are prepared to stand by and watch animals starve and suffer rather than act like responsible custodians of a land we have been lent for the years we live here. That is neither responsible nor humane in my view. Instead of bleating when hard decisions need to be made, I suggest that those paralyzed by indecision and an inability to grasp the reality of the situation, try to apply their minds to practical solutions that are environmentally and ecologically sustainable, morally defendable, safe, and most importantly, practical.

Firearm safety and the compact nature of our rural residential home is a significant issue for sure. I agree that the use of high power rifles is not defendable in most of Wamboin, and I speak as one who has done a lot of shooting when I was young – pigs and foxes mostly, but rim fire rifles and shotguns can be used in some areas safely in my view. Shotguns are effective and can be short range when the correct cartridges are used but they are loud and may distress some. As I said at the beginning, I don't have a firearm but I have a serious roo problem, and who is going to solve that for me? Shall I sit by and watch as the older and weaker roos die of starvation in the creek or should I get my gun license back and actively manage (legally) – definitely not eliminate - my local roo population?

I can understand the distressed writer in the last issue, who seems to be suggesting that reducing roo numbers by shooting is undesirable and dangerous, but I will conclude by asking those who feel this way to provide a practical alternative. If you don't have an alternative, your arguments and comments lack substance and amount to little more than pointless hand wringing. I too welcome constructive comments from practical and environmentally aware locals because I don't wish to kill any of "my" roos either but I can't sit by and watch them die of starvation if the drought continues into winter either. Let's hope it doesn't come to that.

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Voting in the March 14 Palerang Council By-Election

Following from my analysis of the 2008 election count, here's a brief run-down on the results of the March by-election. The final numbers, extracted from spreadsheets provided by the NSW Electoral Commission were as follows:

There were 9,513 residents on the electoral roll, making the turn out for the by-election 79.1% As the candidate who received the least number of primary votes, Mark Horan was excluded after the primary count.

After the distribution of Mark Horan's preferences, Anne Goonan was declared elected.

There are a couple of interesting observations to make from this result. First, as some predicted, Anne won the count in all of the western booths (with the exception of Captain's Flat), supported by the rural residential population, while Mark won in the eastern booths, supported basically by the farming population. While he didn't win in any booth, Richard ran a strong second everywhere, suggesting that his campaign was quite effective in gaining the vote from the broadly distributed Community First support base.

The other observation, the high number of ballots that exhausted during the preference distribution, is not, perhaps, that much of a surprise. It has been suggested that the instructions provided at voting booths were not very clear, and that many people may not even have realised that this was a preferential ballot. Whatever the reason, almost 60% of the voters who nominated Mark Horan as their first choice, provided no second preference. It is quite possible that many of these will have been people who simply didn't care which of the other candidates were successful, if Mark wasn't. As it was, however, if their votes had followed the same trend as those that did offer a second preference, they would not have changed the result. It is also interesting to note that all candidates drew a respectable level of support from across the whole of Palerang. This might tempt one to suggest that any east/west 'cultural rift' is diminishing with time, as respective interest groups discover that they perhaps have more in common with some of their more distant neighbours than with those next door. If this is the case, it will certainly make for an interesting time as we prepare for a referendum on whether or not to introduce wards for future Council elections.

And while I've been stirring the tomato relish pot bubbling on the stove I've had time to ponder the collective noun for kangaroos. "Mob" sounds so tame...wouldn't an "oversupply of kangaroos" be more to the point.

I wouldn't live anywhere else....but I wouldn't object if a few of my marsupial friends chose to live elsewhere.

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
