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# **Bywong Community News - December 2009**

Christmas drinks – 5<sup>th</sup> December from 6-8.30pm at the Bywong Community Hall. All residents welcome and please bring a plate of food to share.

School bus stop shelter at Gum Flat Lane/ Birriwa Road intersection – no dice. Local residents and the Bywong Community Association met with council Traffic Management Committee on Monday 16 November to try to negotiate to have a local bus shelter sited where the bus currently stops at the Gum Flat Lane/ Birriwa Road intersection, rather than halfway up Birriwa Road, as preferred by the committee.

Unfortunately, the bus shelter is going to go half-way up Birriwa Road, despite the fact that parents strongly indicated that this does not provide a proper safety solution.

Residents outlined some of the safety issues for the Macs Reef Road, and the committee indicated that nothing could be done – no improvements such as removing foliage/ trees, putting in mirrors for traffic pulling onto Macs Reef, moving the bus stop on Birriwa closer to the current stop Road, no reduced speed limit (you have one already- RTA) or any concession at all. We were told that we would have to change to suit local traffic increases and that this was as a result of our choice of lifestyle.

There were seven (7) in attendance from the committee including Terry Brandson, Howard Crozier, Jim McLachlan, police, RTA, Bill Ellison and Ken Bromley from council. Also, Shane from Deanes Buses attended.

The upshot is that if the community had not applied for funds for the bus shelter (\$10,000), the bus stop would not have been "audited" and would have stayed where it was i.e more convenient, if still not safe for children.

Councillor Goonan has responded to this decision by requesting that council consider putting the shelter in Birriwa Road on a temporary basis until a more satisfactory location can be agreed by all. This proposal is going to the next Council meeting on 3 December.

**Waste management update- good news.** The process for reviewing the current Macs Reef Road tip site to be replaced with a waste management transfer station continues, with a report from Jim Greethead, who is ably representing Bywong Community at the waste management working party.

Good news for waste management transfer station at Macs Reef site -- An environmental survey conducted by Good Environmental Systems identified *no potentially serious issues that might prohibit development* due to unacceptable impact on the natural environment. A full Environmental Impact Study might still be required as part of the Development Application.

Remediation Work on the Tip Site - Mr Ellison (for Council) assured the working party that the work:

- a) could not be delayed and incorporated into the general redevelopment of the site, and;
- b) would not prevent the construction of an appropriate WTS on the site.

It is expected that a draft report on the waste transfer station (WTS) will be presented to the working party for comment first week January 2010, with a final report completed by the end of January 2010.

Macs Reef tip is not full - Mr Ellison informed the working party that at current usage rates, the landfill will remain in operation until the WTS is complete provided that there is no delay in WTS development. He also noted that there have been delays with the development of the Bungendore WTS which is unlikely to be complete before the end of 2010 and that the Woodlawn facility will require the approval of an appropriate development application before it can accept waste from Palerang.

Bywong Community Hall – thanks to volunteers. Significant amounts of graffiti was removed last week from the walls and paved areas of the hall by Anne Goonan, Peter and Mary McCullagh and Hans Bachor. I would like to thank them sincerely for their effort.


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## **Wamboin Fishing Club**

## BRIGADE ACTIVITY DURING THE MONTH

November was a busy month for your Brigade. It started with 'NAVEX' which is a whole of Lake George Zone training exercise held over the weekend of 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> November in the hills behind Braidwood. Some 22 fire brigade vehicles participated and representatives from the Lake George Zone, Murray Irrigation Area, ACT Bush Fire Brigades and a contingent from New Zealand attended. NAVEX is aimed at preparing crews for the upcoming fire season. Over the 2 days crews are presented with several life-like scenarios to which they are asked to respond. Being a two day camp-out focusing on learning, effective strategising, and teamwork, NAVEX is intended to complement individual

Brigade training. Seven Wamboin Brigade members attended. We also hosted one of the New Zealand fire fighters in our team. Wamboin members included Col Prest, John Taubman, Nick Hunter, John McGrath, Steve Richards, Anne Lea, plus Naomi Whyte from New Zealand. As in previous years, crew members returned home with new and/or honed skills.

A fire was started by lighting on Saturday 12<sup>th</sup> November in the Bundanoon Creek, Fitzroy Falls area. Members of the Lake George Remote Area Fire-fighting Team (RAFT), which included the Brigade Captain Andrew Dunn, were deployed on Sunday along with members of the Mulwaree and National Parks RAFT. The teams were flown to the fire ground by helicopter and ground crews cut a fire break using rake hoes (McLeod tool) – i.e. a fire fighting rake, chainsaws and a 2 stroke blower, to clear away leaf litter and other fine material. The fire was brought under control by Sunday afternoon but only after it had burnt out 10 hectares.


On Friday 20<sup>th</sup> November the Brigade responded two tankers to a grass fire in Fyshwick. In all, five tankers from the Lake George Zone assisted the ACT Fire and Bush Fire Brigades in bringing the blaze under control. Brigade members Richard Hobbs, Peter Greenwood, Matt O'Brien, John McGrath, John Taubman and Phil Sadler attended. On Saturday 21<sup>st</sup> November, late in the afternoon, Lake George Zone was requested to provide a Task Force to assist with bush fires to the north of the ACT. A heavy tanker from Wamboin joined four other heavy tankers from the zone to form Strike Force 'South 10'. The Wamboin team consisted of Brad Arrowsmith, John Taubman, Steve Richards and Grant Boore. The Strike Force departed Queanbeyan Fire Control Centre early on Sunday morning and proceeded north – our final destination at that stage unknown.

Eventually, the Task Force was directed to the Rylstone/Kandos area on the western edge of the Wollemi National Park more than 100 kilometres north of Bathurst and arrived mid afternoon on Sunday. Initial tasking was property protection but this quickly escalated to direct attack on the grass fire.

There followed three and a half days of intense and varied fire fighting with minimal property damage. No homes were lost and nobody was injured. The most notable aspect was how well the farmers were prepared for bush fires and the team spirit amongst the property owners. They clearly had a bush fire plan and implemented it with calm proficiency.



Probably the highlight of the deployment was the discovery of a very 'dazed and confused' baby ring-tailed possum with burnt paws. After suitable nourishment of water and apple, a suitable temporary home was found for him in a hollow stump.



The Task Force returned to Queanbeyan on Thursday afternoon after a five day deployment and some of the most intense fire fighting seen by the Brigade in many years.

On Saturday November 28<sup>th</sup> a fire broke out in difficult terrain in the Krawaree area (between Captains Flat and Araluen). Late on Saturday afternoon Wamboin was requested to provide a medium tanker. Keith Wrench, Darrol Dykes and John McGrath departed late afternoon, returning late evening.

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
#### **Macs Reef Landfill Site - Current Situation**

The Palerang Waste Management Group, comprising three Councillors, Council staff and community association representatives, will report to Council at the December Council Meeting on progress towards a transfer station at the Macs Reef landfill site.

An environmental survey has been completed by Good Environmental Systems which will form part of an eventual Environmental Impact Statement (EIS). This survey is a preliminary document that identifies potentially serious issues which might prohibit development due to unacceptable impact on the natural environment. In the event, no such issues were identified. A full EIS will only be required if the development is declared a Designated Development, due to prevailing environmental factors. If an EIS is required the NSW Department of Planning will identify a list of issues that will need to be investigated and addressed in the proposals for the works.

The next step now is to determine a cost for the proposed transfer station. A consultant has been selected to produce a Concept Options Report and it is expected that a final report will be ready for Council by the end of January.


Council has advised that should a decision be made to proceed with the development of a waste transfer station at the Macs Reef landfill site, the site would remain operational until the development was complete. Council also has indicated that there had been delays with the development of the Bungendore Waste Transfer Station and it was unlikely to be ready for use before the end of 2010. -- John van der Straaten, Secretary, WCA.



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#### **Nature Notes November 2009**

Although it's raining sporadically this morning, we've had very little rain and a few very hot days this month. The grass that was so green in October has dried, but the native grasses are seeding well this year.

The daisy plants that have been extending their range throughout Wamboin during the dry years are in full flower, adorning the roadsides with yellow and white patches. The most prominent ones right now are the tall Cauliflower Bush (*Cassinia longifolia*), bearing clusters of white flowers, and the smaller golden-flowered Sticky Everlasting (*Xerochrysum viscosum*). The low-growing Hoary Sunray (*Leucochrysum albicans*) – those are the ones growing all around the intersection of Weeroona and Denley Drives – have almost finished flowering and are scattering their seed further afield. There are still patches of the suckering, button-flowered *Chrysocephalum apiculatum*, and the taller *C. semipapposum* is bearing its yellow, clustered flower-heads.

Amongst the trees, the Black Wattle (*Acacia mearnsii*) is carrying its scented cream flowers (recovering after a hot, windy day a week or two ago shrivelled and blew away some of the flowers). Some of the Scribbly Gums (*Eucalyptus rossii*) are flowering heavily this year. Maybe this profusion of flowers is what tempted a little Sugar Glider to drift across to a tree near the house a few evenings ago. It was almost dark, and I mistook it for an owl until it landed on a slender tree trunk and scampered upwards.

It's interesting that so many of our local native plants have either white or yellow flowers. One notable exception at present is the Fringe Lily (*Thysanotus tuberosus*) with its large, purple, fringed flowers. The similar (but non-fringed) Chocolate Lily (*Dichopogon fimbriatus*) may also occur in Wamboin, although I haven't yet seen it here. It certainly grows in the region, sometimes in purple, chocolate-scented swathes through grassland areas.

On the bird front, the Koel has been calling in the area for the past week or so. This large, fruit-eating cuckoo is a rather shy bird. I've only glimpsed it twice, although its presence is confirmed by the repeated and very loud 'coo-wit' call. Koels stay around for several months during summer, and have only included our area in their itinerary during the last four or five years, possibly because of the proliferation of vineyards, olive groves and orchards in the region.

Another cuckoo, a Brush Cuckoo, was calling from a tree in the driveway recently. It had taken off before I could fetch the binoculars to have a closer look at it, but it has a very distinctive call – a series of seven or eight notes on a descending scale. The call has a rather complaining tone, described more kindly as mournful in most descriptions!


A pair of King Parrots made an appearance here a few evenings ago, and spent some time feeding on the well-developed buds of a *Melaleuca liariifolia* bush. These are fruit-eating parrots (although they obviously include flowers in their diet), and they too seem to have only recently begun making forays into this area.

Since I started this article, the rain has begun falling steadily. What a welcome sight.
