LOCAL ROADS AS SPEEDWAYS AND OFFICIAL LACK OF CONCERN

In December, the *Palerang and District Bulletin* ran two articles about the sorry record of crashes and unsafe driving on Macs Reef Rd and about the Palerang Council's Traffic Committee's record of ignoring or trivialising community concerns about children crossing Macs Reef Rd to catch buses – just one reason to slow the greatly increased through-traffic in some places for the safety of neighbouring residents and drivers themselves. The community has asked that at the very least existing speed and traffic rules are enforced, which seldom occurs. Council's Traffic Committee includes representatives from the



NSW Road and Traffic Authority (RTA) and the Queanbeyan Police as well as Council engineering staff and Councillor Howard Crozier who is supposed to represent community concerns.

Representatives of the Bywong Community Association, as well as residents on and near Macs Reef Rd, have expressed considerable concern about the unsafe driving they witness and the Traffic Committee's high-handed dealings with the community and, in a recent case, misrepresentation of community concerns when reporting back to Council at large on its decisions.

The photo shows the approach from the west to the Macs Reef Road and Denley Drive intersection. On this hill a busy road, a wildlife corridor, and a crossing for school children compete.

The *Bulletin* is in summer recess until the March issue but is sharing the following letters it received on the Macs Reef Rd situation, to continue the community

conversation on this matter. Editor Maria Taylor told the *Whisper* that she has also received concerned phone calls and anecdotal information about speeding and reckless driving on the residential roads of Wamboin.

Council next meets on 4 February.

Heart-stopping road experience

I was pleased to see the prominence in "The Bulletin" given to the problems on Macs Reef Road. I live right on the area between Denley Drive and Birriwa Road mentioned as a "horror stretch" although why it was singled out, I don't know – the maniacs drive as badly the whole length of the road, to my observation. I was recently overtaken, at dusk by two cars at once – and I mean two abreast – over double lines on a bend, with a car fast approaching in the opposite direction. I stopped my car, waiting for the shock waves. Amazingly, none came but tailgating and speeding, overtaking on double lines and driving across the centre line seem to be de rigueur for drivers from the ACT and NSW, often loaded up for the coast and, curiously, often utes and girls with P-plates. I will never know why the bucolic lanes of Norton Road have 80kmph limits and the race track of Macs Reef Road has 90 – and we almost never see police.

It really feels like taking your life in your hands out there, especially at dusk when the kangaroos are busy and, oh, the poor lizards!!! In my incident, maniac 1 overtook me (doing just under 90 as it was dusk) on double lines on the bend near where there was that fatal crash a few years ago. I thought a crash was so inevitable I pulled up, turned off my car and dialled 000 with my finger hovering over the green symbol and braced myself, but they all managed to squeeze past and off the maniacs fled into the night. I drove home at about 5 kmph after that.

Traffic load on Macs Reef Rd unsafe

Your coverage of the road rage on Macs Reef Road is both timely and relevant.

Currently, Macs Reef Road is a weight restricted, speed limited, residential access road that was only superficially sealed in the late 80s as part of the Bi-Centenary roads program. In its present form, it is just not capable of safely bearing the increased Defence traffic that transits daily to and from North Canberra/Bungendore. And, as you rightly point out, the aggressive and inappropriate attitude of speeding drivers, local or otherwise is cause for concern, especially for those of us who live on or adjacent to Macs Reef Road.

It simply beggars belief that Palerang's Traffic Committee can seemingly ignore the bleeding obvious and instead indulge in bureaucratic navel gazing and buck passing. The comment attributed to the RTA representative ("It's a lifestyle choice") is particularly unhelpful. According to the NSW RTA's own web site, research has shown that the risk of a crash causing death or injury increases rapidly, even with small increases above an appropriately set speed limit. Speeding is the single biggest cause of deaths and injuries on NSW roads. It is a factor in around 40 per cent of road deaths in NSW, killing around 200 people across the State each year. Speeding increases the risk of a crash and the severity of the crash outcome.

The strategy is simple. Set an appropriate speed limit, ensure drivers know what the limit is, and enforce the limit. Obviously, local police can't enforce the speed limit 24/7, although I've noticed a welcome increase in Highway Patrol presence in recent times. In addition to police patrols, Council should press the RTA to install fixed speed cameras at specified intervals or sets of multiple cameras with number-plate recognition software which can check the average speed of a vehicle between two points.

Drivers with little regard for local residents

It was interesting to see concerns regarding the lack of care some road users display. When we have to turn into our drive opposite a double line we are often passed by motorists who seem to have little regard for the road rules. We would not normally take more than a few seconds to move off the road so could not delay the other road users by more than that. Surely a few seconds won't make that much difference in a busy schedule, and it is worth it for the safety sake. I notice the RTA has been erecting these large black digital signs around the state including Bungendore. While I can see that they add to the beauty and character of the town, it is difficult to imagine how telling motorists to stick to the speed limits with a big digital sign will be that effective. A more effective use of funds may have been to install a 24 hour speed camera or two along the Kings Highway. It is also interesting to see the signs at the HQJOC roundabout, although they are almost covered in grass, you can still see that the traffic conditions have changed and that there is a new roundabout. Changed from a few years ago perhaps, and new to people who have not driven the highway for three years. -

BRIGADE ACTIVITY DURING THE PERIOD

The holiday period has been busy for your local Brigade, though thankfully for the brigade and the community there have been no fires in our Brigade area.

In early December the Brigade assisted in yet another out-of-area deployment - this time to the Glen Irie fires near Armidale. Brad Arrowsmith, John McGrath, Group Captain Chris Powell, Stephen Richards, John Taubman and Elizabeth Wrench rearranged their other lives for the task. The group was flown to Armidale on Tuesday 8th December and returned on Friday 11th December. Out-of-area deployments provide further invaluable training and hands-on experience for brigade members as well

as helping them to increase their skill levels.

Over the holiday period there were several motor vehicle accidents in our area. The first was late in the evening of the 19th December with a report of a car on fire in Kowen Forest which, as you know, is immediately adjacent to the southern boundaries of Wamboin. The prospect of a fire in the forest is potentially a very serious situation. The Brigade despatched both large fire tankers, two medium tankers and a Command vehicle. Police and NSW Fire Brigades also attended but had to turn back due to the ruggedness of the terrain.

By the time our crew arrived (in the early hours of Saturday morning) the vehicle had been burnt out; mopping up and blacking out was all that was required. Fortunately, the high humidity and low temperature at the time saved everyone from a very serious situation.





The Ecology of Kangaroos: what does the research tell us?

The next meeting of Sutton Landcare Group will consider the issue of Kangaroo Ecology. The meeting will commence at 7.30 pm on Tuesday February 9th in the Sutton School library. The meeting will be addressed by two expert researchers in this field - Dr Don Fletcher and Claire Wimpenny.

Don Fletcher is an ecologist with ACT Parks, Conservation and Lands where he works to help shed light on kangaroo management issues, and other questions relating to wildlife species considered either endangered or overabundant. He has a PhD from the Institute for Applied Ecology on the topic 'Population Dynamics of Eastern Grey Kangaroos'.

Claire Wimpenny is an ecologist with particular expertise in the capture and care of eastern grey kangaroos, and also assists in research on vegetation, grassland earless dragons, corroboree frogs, feral pigs, and small mammals. She worked in the zoo environment before 'coming out' to help further our understanding of wildlife ecology.

There are a range of views in the community on the contribution of kangaroos to the sustainability of our grassy box woodland and farming environment and the appropriateness of the local kangaroo population. We are privileged to have two experts to take us through the issues and the research findings.

The last nursery session was well attended, and we did a great job of weeding all the little pots in the nursery as well as preparing seedling trays of eucalypts. We also had a productive impromptu meeting, where we discussed our plans for the year.

Next Plant Sale: Saturday 20 February at the Wamboin Market, 9am -12 noon. All plants cost \$3 and will grow in this area.

Planting tip: It's too hot and dry to plant. Make sure young plants are surrounded by a bowl deep enough to pour a bucket of water into, and add some mulch and maybe some water crystals. Then you shouldn't need to water more than once a week. View your yard and garden critically with a view to safety from fires. Remove dead plant material; prune trees and shrubs so that they aren't too close to the house; and remove clutter from sheltered house corners. Use living mulch - that is, ground covers. Myoporum (Creeping Boobialla) is a robust ground cover that spreads quickly and covers large areas well. Other fantastic ground covers, with beautiful flowers, are brachyscome (with mauve daisy flowers) and spyridium (with tiny velvety flowers and shiny dark green foliage). The Rural Fire Service has a useful brochure, "Trees & fire resistance; regeneration & care of fire-damaged trees".





Nature Notes – January 2010 Jo Walker

A hot, windy month with hardly a drop of rain is not a good start to the year. The last few days of temperatures well above thirty degrees has bleached the landscape. In fact, the last two months have been marked by the absence of events that usually occur at this time of the year.

One of the most noticeable of these was the lack of seed produced by many of the local plants this year. Local Pomaderris shrubs, especially *Pomaderris angustifolia*, usually produce masses of seed, and Crimson Rosellas often spend hours nibbling the seed from the small capsules. This year, the capsules simply dried up and fell off without producing seed. The Burgan bushes (*Kunzea ericoides*) usually hold their white flowers for several weeks and are abuzz with flies and beetles. But, this year, two or three extremely hot days shrivelled the flowers almost as soon as they appeared. Even the wattles and pea plants produced few viable seed.

There also seemed to be little action on the butterfly front. I did see a couple of Wood Whites (*Delias aganippe*) flitting around the Cherry Ballart (*Exocarpos cupressiformis*) looking for an egg-laying site. But, although there were plenty of male Common Browns (*Heteronympha merope merope*) flying around a few weeks ago, I saw only one female butterfly of this species. Usually, there are plenty of caterpillars of the Painted Lady Butterfly (*Vanessa kershawi*) on the *Senecio quadridentatus*, the Grey Fireweed that occasionally occurs in weed-like quantities. This year, there seemed to be very few of these caterpillars, and even those disappeared very quickly – probably snapped up by hungry birds.

On a more positive note, there are plenty of little Superb Blue Wrens and White-browed Scrub-wrens around, twittering and mobbing in the thick vegetation along the creek. Several Red Wattle-birds have built nests here this year (rather fragile, untidy structures) and have reared some young birds. I haven't seen (or heard) any baby galahs though, and only two Crimson Rosella juveniles have appeared on the scene.

The Cunningham's Skink family, whose home is a large old Yellow Box log along the creek, is increasing. It's sometimes possible to see six or seven of these robust lizards basking on their log or peeping from a hole, and, a few days ago, there were two very small additions to the family. Cunningham's Skinks are about 30 cm long, dark brown to blackish in colour with lighter spots or patterns and a rim of white around the eyes. The top side of the tail is markedly spiny. They give birth to live young.

A few evenings ago, I was gazing out of the window at dusk when a medium-sized brown raptor (possibly a Brown Goshawk) swooped down and caught a young rabbit feeding unwarily on the hillside. Rabbits seem to be the one food source that is possibly on the increase this year.

Where to Now - Wamboin ...

When Chris, the kids and myself arrived in Wamboin in the early 80's, it was under-developed in more ways than one. Marauding mobs of munching Merinos left by the original land owner had eaten everything from the ground up to the full reach of their woolly heads. We were only able to dislodge them by threatening to offer the owner one of his own sheep back from our cooking pot. The Wamboin Bushfire Brigade was still part of the Sutton Brigade and run locally by a bunch of dedicated desperados lead by an early hero of Wamboin, John Finn. However, we still managed, with some very pre-loved equipment, including two old ex-army tanker trucks to save all the 45 fire threatened houses in Wamboin from the 1985 bush fires that ravaged the north side of Norton Road (which incidentally did not yet join up with Bungendore Road).

There was no Community Hall or fire shed in Bingley Way. The social landscape was different back then. When I asked one person, then recently arrived from Canberra, if he enjoyed the friendly community – his answer was that he had moved out of the ACT to escape the community and only wanted to be "with nature" and avoid any neighbours as much as possible!

Since those early beginnings, things have changed out of sight. We now have a Bush Fire Brigade that is one of the best run and equipped in the State. St Andrews Church has been built (courtesy of another early hero, David Robertson), and not only provides spiritual support but a meeting place for community groups, including the Wonderful Women of Wamboin. Wamboin has a longstanding and active Community Association and of course "*The Whisper*". The Wamboin Markets go from strength to strength. We also have a broad range of local businesses, including everything from bed and breakfast to beekeepers, IT security to international wine export, antiques to architects, vineyards, wineries and restaurants.

Communications have continued to improve (no thanks to Telstra). High speed broadband internet should be on the way some time soon? This has and will continue to encourage people to work from home, either for a city business or their own.

We already have a number of major social events on the Wamboin calendar. The Fireworks in September is an icon event supporting local groups such as the Pony Club and Scouts and attracting people from all over. Let's hope it continues into the future. The Curry Night and Fireman's Ball are excellent. So what's my point here?

Well I believe we should not stand on our laurels, but continue to develop a calendar of events that enriches our community. Events such as arts and music, wine and food, crafts and gardening, sports and outdoor would be well worth considering. I believe we should involve the expertise of local businesses. Any potential event is likely to receive limited government assistance, so sponsorship and support would be initially important. If there is sufficient interest I would like to invite community members to come together in the near future at Shepherds Run for a meeting to brain-storm potential new events (would Wednesday 17 February suit?) There is a huge pool of talent here and some very good practical ideas are certain.

'OPERATION TROOPLIFT' – A UNIQUE PROJECT TO SUPPORT OUR TROOPS OVERSEAS



You can also join both clubs and attend a day and an evening club for greater social exposure and interaction.



Baby Possum Saved

Remember the rain on Christmas Day? It was quite torrential in many areas and it had some unexpected effects. Tony and Trudy who live near Bungendore were out inspecting their garden on Boxing Day only to find a mother Ringtail Possum



and her two babies on the ground. Normally they are tucked away in tree hollow or a nest made out of grass and leaves. But this family was on the ground cold, wet and miserable. They appeared to have been washed out of one of the nearby trees. Tony and Trudy were able to pick up one of the babies, which weighed in at 150 grams, as it looked to be near death probably from hypothermia. They wrapped her tiny body in a towel and placed it near a hot water bottle to try to get her dry and warmed up. Wildcare was called out and the whole possum family was taken into care for some much needed rehabilitation.

Immediate first aid was given by way of reuniting the family in a cosy container kept warm with towels and heated wheat bags. Surprisingly with some food and slow heating they dried off and livened up in just a few hours. They were then transitioned to a possum box inside a large aviary, so they could exercise and move around. The carer ensured there was a ready supply of young tree shoots and native flowers to eat.

The tiny babies are still being fed by mum and after five weeks weigh in at 200 grams. They all look very healthy and it's a fantastic result. Very soon Wildcare will seek to release them back to where they came from. Possums can be territorial, so it is good they can go back to an area that they know well. Tony and Trudy did say that would be OK!

But their new naked trunks, shining creamy yellow in the moonlight, look magnificent.

I never really feel the holidays are over and the New Year has begun until we've done with rejoicing because we're young and free, and the kids are safely returned to their institutions of prescribed learning. I rather wish, though, that the acknowledgment of our youth and freedom didn't come wrapped in an Australian flag and that we didn't have to be hoodwinked into believing that massed sausages for breakfast, on a predictably hot morning, is fun, and part of being Australian. I spent Australia Day, savouring my freedom, toiling in the "golden" soil of the garden, marvelling at the beauty and defiance, against all odds, of the blue and white agapanthus and red hot pokers, and feeling depleted of youthful vigour by day's end.

I have enjoyed the holidays, some pleasant bush walks, a dip in the briny and a morning spent cycling before a welcome beer at our friendly "local". To add to this, my faith in Santa was restored on Christmas day, but I have completely given up on the weather man. He's full of lies and idle promises. The next time he predicts rain, I'm going to hang out the washing, wash the car, flush the toilet regardless, turn on the watering system and make hay!

But I wouldn't live anywhere else....maybe I'd become complacent if I did.
