The Local Environment Plan (LEP) – Why should you be interested? The LEP is the going to be the master control planning document for future development in Palerang and will have an influence on the size of blocks here and therefore most likely the population, the nature of the development allowed and it should also be responding to protect the environment and enhance our social and economic prosperity in the area. It's early days but better to get in early - Palerang Councillors are currently considering a WORKING DRAFT plan, put together by the Council staff and they will develop a final draft that will be certified by NSW Government and then put out for formal comment and consultation. Bywong residential areas have been given a zoning called Environmental Living (E4), which has a range of proposed objectives and development controls. 

The Wamboin Firefighter

A newsletter from YOUR volunteer rural fire brigade compiled by the Executive Committee, with help from many members of the Brigade

BRIGADE ACTIVITY DURING THE PERIOD

Thankfully, it has been a very quiet month with no fires or motor vehicle accidents to attend to. Perhaps the benign weather conditions and the end of the holiday season were factors in this great result. The very welcome and considerable rain in the second week of February was fantastic. Many properties received 100mls or more and this has helped to substantially boost the much depleted dam levels in the region. Surprisingly, there was little serious flooding across the brigade area (Bywong, Wamboin, Sutton Park and Eaglehawk localities) and, fortunately, no damage requiring brigade assistance. While the number of incidents the brigade has had to respond to is down, we have been busy on other fronts (apart from regular training and general maintenance activities).

A Community Engagement presentation was held at the Goolabri Country Resort on Saturday morning 30th January for residents in the localities of Sutton Park, Bidges Rd and Eaglehawk. Under the theme of *Prepare*. *Act. Survive*. attendees learned more about the:

- risk and history of bush fire in the region;
- new fire danger ratings;
- key components of a Bush Fire Survival Plan that each household needs to prepare; and
- preparations required as part of the 'Stay and Defend' or 'Leave Early' decision-making and actioning process.

Many in the audience took the opportunity to ask questions and seek advice. Two people brought along their trailer-mounted fire-fighting pumps together with fire hose and water crate for others to see.

On Sat 20th February, the brigade again set up its bush and house fire information stall at the monthly Wamboin Home Produce Market in Bingley Way to help residents with fire-related enquiries including preparation of a Bush Fire Survival Plan. More than a dozen residents took the opportunity to visit the brigade's stall in front of the fire station and obtain information and advice from the community engagement team.

Over the past several months, in addition to encouraging and assisting residents to develop their bush fire survival plans, the brigade has continued to gather data on properties and other features in the area. Most recently, as an insert to the February edition of The Whisper, you will have received a letter from the Brigade attached to which was a Property Fire Assessment questionnaire seeking details of your property. This is part of a much bigger effort to better understand what infrastructure is in our area, where it is located and any potential hazards. In one of the fastest growing regions such is ours, keeping abreast of property and infrastructure development is important to residents and the brigade.

Concurrently we have also been engaged in a major task to assist in the correct identification of inhabited rural addresses that will eventually be linked to the information contained in the responses to the Property Fire Assessment questionnaire. It is anticipated that this will enable firefighters to be better prepared before they arrive at a property. It will also assist the control staff to assign the most appropriate fire fighting vehicles to an incident. To put this into effect Brigade members have been to the gate of each property in the Wamboin, Bywong, Sutton Park, Bidges Rd and Eaglehawk localities to determine, among other things, the exact location of property entrances, and any limitations presented by the size and features of the entrance and driveway. The information you provide in the Property Fire Assessment questionnaire you have been asked to complete and return to us will complement this information. Apart from helping you consider features of your property that may assist you with your Bush Fire Survival Plan, the information you provide will help us on those occasions where, in the event of a (bush or house) fire or other incident on your property, the crew responding can be briefed as to what to expect.

For example, your property may be one of an increasing number of homes/ other structures that have some form of solar electricity; this provides special challenges to firefighters in that isolation of power can be more difficult and it is not always obvious that the property has got solar power. Being aware of this and the location of isolator mechanisms ahead of time can be advantageous for crews when responding to an emergency call.

Some things that you can do to help us:

- Make sure your property is correctly identified using the rural numbering system. The rural numbering system was
 implemented some years ago in order to make properties easier to locate in the event of an emergency. Make sure your
 number is clearly displayed and visible from the likely brigade approach side.
- <u>Please remove old RMB numbers</u> as they only confuse the situation and not just for the fire brigade.
- Displaying the property name (if there is one) and the owner's name also assists in identifying a property.
- We have noticed that some of the reflective number signs have already deteriorated please upgrade them to minimise confusion. It is quite possible that a fire fighting vehicle from an adjacent brigade will attend your incident, especially if breathing apparatus is needed. They will not be familiar with the area.
- The first place we check when arriving at a property under threat is the electricity meter/ switch box. Please place here a sketch map of your block showing key fire fighting features eg dams, pumps, outlets, sprinkler systems and valves. Any additional information that can be easily read and quickly understood can be invaluable to us eg how to operate a fixed sprinkler system or how to isolate your solar electricity system. When preparing your fire plan it is useful to draft it from the point of view of the reader being a total stranger.
- If you have a solar electricity system it needs to be clearly marked and identified with instructions on how to isolate it.
- You should not include in your meter box any personal or sensitive details, unless <u>you</u> consider them to be important. If you need further advice, please contact the Brigade Captain.

An issue we also ask you to consider: Can a fire brigade tanker access your driveway? Brigade tankers require a clearance that is 4 metres wide and 4 metres high. Does your driveway provide this clearance for its entire length? If not, it is unlikely that a large tanker will be able to access your property.

Please take the time to complete the Property Fire Assessment questionnaire (referred to above) that was included with the last Whisper and return it in the stamped self-addressed envelope that accompanied it. Include as much relevant detail as possible; and please include a plan of your block and key fire fighting features in the space provided on the reverse side of the questionnaire. The information you provide remains confidential and it is only available to a very limited number of RFS personnel.

SURVIVE. Your survival depends on your preparations, and the decisions you make.

Regardless of your decision, you must prepare your property to give you, your family and your home the best chance of survival. The RFS has produced guidance on the preparations and actions that you need to take in order to survive a bush fire. 

Bing is Back by Philip Machin

For all wildlife lovers this is a great story. In early December, whilst Graham was out walking, he noticed a medium sized Eastern Grey kangaroo staggering around on the verge on Bingley Way, Wamboin. He thought the kangaroo had been hit



earlier that morning by a passing car – and he was probably right. Unfortunately the motorist didn't contact *Wildcare* at the time and so it was lucky Graham came across the animal a few hours later. With the help of Graham, the injured animal was relocated. It was a hot day and interestingly he had found a cool place to lie down in the neck of a drainage pipe under the road – who says they are not intelligent? The kangaroo seemed healthy in every respect, but it had an injured face and it was stressed. Rather than euthanaise the animal a more experienced wildlife rescuer was called upon for a second opinion and to see whether there was hope of a successful recovery. Rosemary felt it was worth giving the animal a chance to get better and it was transferred to her property for rehabilitation.

Quickly named 'Bing' after Bingley Way, Rosemary said, "I had to sedate him to settle him down and to reduce the stress. It was then a question of making an assessment of his injuries. Suspecting a head injury of unknown severity it was largely a matter of wait and see as to how things would progress. Advice and examination from a veterinarian was arranged too."

Over a few days and then weeks it was clear that Bing was improving and his concussion slowly disappeared. Rosemary said, "There were some

worrying times early on when Bing would charge around the enclosure bashing into the fences and a tree, but he survived. Today he is back to full health and is ready for release back into the wild."

Bing is lucky. Graham took the time to contact *Wildcare* and the initial rescuer stopped short of euthanaising him there and then. More importantly he landed on Rosemary's patch and she has extraordinary skills and a great success rate in recovering badly injured kangaroos.

If you hit a kangaroo or any other animal on our roads, please take time to stop and check what can be done. Seek help or advice about wildlife from Wildcare - 6299 1966 or the Native Animal Rescue Group (Braidwood area) – 4846 1900.

Nature Notes – February 2010

What an amazing transformation since last month. When I wrote the Notes in January, the hot, dry and windy weather had parched the landscape to a depressing extent. And then the rains came – a storm in the first week of February and then several days of sustained rainfall during the next week, 125 mm in all at my place. The grasses grew with incredible speed, and, within a few days, the countryside underwent a green transformation. What a wonderful way to end the summer!

Although I hadn't noticed field mushrooms here for several years, the recent combination of moisture and warm days must have been just right for them. Several large circles have come up so far. There are similar, but poisonous, fungi in this area, so I don't include home-grown mushrooms on the menu. In addition to the ground fungi, there is also a large white plate fungus protruding from high on the trunk of an old Red Stringybark (*Eucalyptus macrorhyncha*) along the creek.

This year, some of the Stringybarks are flowering profusely, and the flowers are full of nectar. A group of these trees grow not far from my house, and, a few evenings ago, the air was heavy with the scent of honey. I haven't noticed many native insects on the flowers, but the honey-bees have certainly found them. The honeyeaters, too. The White-eared Honeyeaters were getting very excited, calling loudly to each other as they flew from tree to tree. They were sharing the feast with Eastern Spinebills, Red Wattlebirds and Yellow-faced Honeyeaters. This abundance of food may have brought in other visitors too. While I was collecting the newspaper a few mornings ago, two small flocks of small green parrots passed me and flew rapidly up the road. They were moving at such speed that it was impossible to get a good look at them, but I think they were probably Swift Parrots. I hadn't seen them here before, but they are nomadic and move around seeking areas where eucalypts are flowering.

Apart from the Stringybarks, not much else is flowering at present except for the little Native St. John's Wort (*Hypericum gramineum*) and *Cassinia quinquefaria*, one of the daisy bushes. The pyramid-shaped clusters of silky greenish cream flowers of the *Cassinia* are also strongly honey-scented, although this seems to vary a bit from plant to plant. During the recent drier years, these and other species of *Cassinia* have proliferated and provide a favoured habitat for some of the smaller birds, particularly the little Superb Blue Wrens and White-browed Scrub-wrens.

Standing by the edge of the dam recently, watching a turtle surface, I knocked a large piece of bark from a small Candlebark tree and was surprised to find a group of five Peron's Tree-frogs clinging to the smooth stem. The frogs seem to be surviving well in spite of the drought, judging by the number of different frog calls emanating from the dam after the recent rain.

Eastern Water Skinks (*Eulamprus quoyii*) inhabit the coast and coastal ranges, so we don't see them here. But they're not too far away. Some friends and I had an intriguing interaction with one when we were walking in Monga National Park, east of Braidwood, recently. We'd sat down on some fallen tree trunks for lunch when a Water Skink darted out from under a log and sat watching us. Although they eat tadpoles, beetles and other insects, and probably any other small thing that moves, they include native berries and fruits in their diet. We didn't have any of these, but flipped a few pieces of banana the lizard's direction and it pounced on and swallowed them. When someone stood up, it dashed onto the log and picked up some crumbs and chewed them. And, as we were leaving, the Water Skink dropped to the ground, picked up a piece of cooked chicken that had dropped out of a sandwich and took off with it. A chance meeting that gave us – and probably the lizard – a day to remember!





Whisper Advertising Rates to Increase as of May, 2010

Due to slight increases in Whisper printing costs over the years, Advertising Costs will go up as of the May 2010 issue. The new costs, based on the fraction of an A4 page used, will be:

The last rate increase was in February, 2002, when the price of a 1/8 page ad was raised to \$15, a half page to \$50, and a full page to \$100.

Advertisements are set to cover printing costs -- currently between \$500 and \$800 per month depending on the number of pages. Over the last dozen years or so advertising revenues have exceeded printing costs by about 20%, and all of this surplus goes toward projects for the community. These projects are voted on by residents at the Wamboin Community Association meetings on the third Tuesday of each month. Some projects in the last few years were the stone sign at the Sutton Road / Norton Road entrance, the community blackboards, and the metal signs and poles for the large area maps.

Instant Colour Press in Belconnen prints the Whisper each month at a very low cost relative to other printers contacted for the job. Without their generosity the Whisper would be much more costly.


The Whisper would also not happen except for the 50 or so residents who donate time to put it in their neighbours' mailboxes. Last month they also assisted the Fire Brigade, as their work carried the Brigade's insert as well as the Whisper.

"If you've never moved house you'll never know what it's like to be packed up in little boxes,

Torn limb from limb, suffocated in shredded paper

Newsprint, not even the stipulated white,"

So, as likely as not, you're sandwiched between Brezhnev's death

And "Bringing up Father"....."

and so it went on, a poem I penned nearly thirty years ago, in Malaysia, when I was facing yet another move.

I have just returned from the other side of our vast nation, from that speck of green stretched around a sparkling river, facing empty oceans and backed by a harsh interior. This time I was there for another move. "Duty of care" demanded that my frail, 93 year old mother relinquish her little home of six years and shift to the hostel in the same garden retirement village. She's been progressively moving from a big box to a smaller and even smaller box over the past thirty years, and now her life is wrapped up in one small room. This time, like the last, she was fiercely reluctant to move, but this time, unlike the last, my strong, determined little slip of a mother was not aided by a robust mind. One of the saddest moments was spent sifting through a lifetime of photographs recording family Christmases, anniversaries, weddings, graduations and magic moments of travel around the globe. I gave her some pretty snaps of a time she'd spent travelling with Dad in England. She tossed them aside, disdainfully. They meant nothing to her. I left with a heavy heart, wondering if there was a better way of handling the challenges wrought by ageing.

I had imagined, with all that beautiful rain, that this month I'd only be talking about happy things; a rushing, churning, milky brown torrent of water, scouring the creek bed and isolating our neighbours. I thought I'd mention the forlorn, grey and bedraggled kangaroos, with their bewildered joeys, cut off from my garden smorgasbord, and a sudden rush of water rising and swirling around trunks of great trees that had stood, only minutes before, on dry ground. And somewhere in the middle of that I thought about my favourite tree.

There is a tree that I pass on one of my walks that fascinates me. It's a tall gum, arching gracefully, with a scar, high up, left behind after canny cockatoos peeled back the bark in search of grubs. The hapless grubs left behind empty corridors, and, in turn, an enterprising swarm of bees moved in. It's been an active bee hive for many years. Just above the hive is a nesting hole which has been the nursery for generations of galahs. But we chanced upon another tree, the other day, which was rather special, too. It was an abandoned peach, beside the road, laden with fruit. We straddled the gutter hidden in the long grass, and like gypsies, filled our bags. With such bounty I had to make chutney, and then find jars to fill. It is a wonderful, bountiful time of the year. I am finally picking big, fat, red tomatoes and wondering if I'll need more jars for relish. There are huge mushrooms popping up everywhere, plenty of self sown silver beet and potatoes to be dug. One of my greatest joys is to see the excitement when our little ones dig in the dirt with their bare hands and find potatoes.

And so I'm back in Wamboin, a more benign Wamboin, with green splashed across flats and rises that have been grey and lifeless for years. It was good to see the sign at the bottom of the hill, and to be home. I'm thinking of sorting through my boxes of photos. I've been thinking of doing that for more than thirty years. Perhaps I won't bother. If I leave it long enough someone else may do it for me. Maybe I'll just wander outside and pull some weeds for the chooks.

I wouldn't live anywhere else.....
