**Local Government Referenda** — Everyone should have received an information brochure on a proposal to consider holding two referenda at the next local government election in 2012. The two referenda in question are related to dividing the council area into wards, or ridings, for the purpose of local government elections, and to the manner in which the mayor is elected. This is just the first step in determining whether or not a referendum on either issue is warranted. Ultimately, the decision will be made by Council vote, depending on the level of interest shown within the community.

In the coming months, Council will be holding information sessions to provide more detail on these two matters. It is important that these information sessions are well attended, as this will be the measure of whether or not there is sufficient community interest to warrant the expense of holding a referendum. We are assuming that one of these information sessions will be held a the Wamboin Community Hall, and we will advise the date and time through The Whisper, the electronic noticeboard and the website as soon as it is known.

Geary's Gap/Wamboin Landcare group, conjunction with Palerang Council Environmental and Weed Control Officers, will hold a *weeds information day* at Bywong Community Hall, Birriwa Road on Sunday 19<sup>th</sup> September commencing at 12.30pm.

The catalyst for this event has been the routine weed inspections by Council Officers on properties in our area and the Landcare group felt that it was an opportunity for those officers to present more detailed information on the vital need for weed control by all landholders.

Presentations by Neville Plumb and Micheal Pearce will cover identification, landholder responsibilities, and weed control methods, and will allow landholders the opportunity to ask questions on these and related topics.

A wide variety of publications, leaflets and other printed matter from Palerang Council, Dept. of Industry and Infrastructure [NSW] { ex DPI}, University of New England and Molonglo Catchment Mangement Authority, will be available, along with

some samples of the worst of the weeds in our area for participants to inspect and reflect upon.

For established landholders, a social occasion as well as the chance to bring themselves up to date, but for newcomers an important opportunity to learn about their responsibilities in weed management and control. The Greenways Renewal project group (GRoW) is making good progress in the following areas:

- 1. A new graphic map showing all the current Greenways with photos and descriptions of the area, is currently being developed and should be available soon.
- 2. A number of Greenways walks are being planned as we move towards warmer weather.
- 3. Members of the group are discussing the legal status of the Greenways and how they might be enhanced by the current Local Environnment Plan (LEP) being formulated by Palerang Council:
- 4. A revised vision and purpose of the Greenways, revisiting the initial purpose, is being drafted for comment.
- 5. Archive material on the history of the Greenways has been located and uploaded to the Bywong Community website.

#### Communities solving mobile phone blackspots?

There is an emerging possibility for communities to solve mobile phone blackspots for themselves. ABC Radio National Bush Telegraph program had an interview with Dr Paul Gardner-Stephen. He is a South Australian computer science lecturer has invented a world-first system that allows mobile phone access without using telecommunications towers or satellites. The system could help the many thousands of people living in network blackspots in rural Australia but could also be used in disaster zones where infrastructure has been damaged. Bywong Community Association would be interested to get

feedback from people if there is interest in pursuing this as a community.



For the present a Fire Permit is not required to burn off in the open <u>but</u> if you plan to light a fire in the open you must notify:

- 1. your neighbours, and
- 2. the Brigade Captain on 0409 991 340 or (02) 6238 1849 (ah) at least 24 hours before you light the fire.

Your thoughtfulness will help minimise neighbour anxiety and unnecessary brigade call-outs.

Management, including containment of a fire originating on your property, is your responsibility.

#### 2009 VICTORIAN BUSHFIRES ROYAL COMMISSION FINAL REPORT

The 2009 Victorian Bushfires Royal Commission presented its Final Report to the Victorian Government on 31<sup>st</sup> July 2010. The report extends to 4 volumes:

- (Vol 1) the fires and fire-related deaths
- (Vol 2 Pts 1 & 2) fire preparation, response and recovery
- (Vol 3) establishment and operation of the Commission
- (Vol 4) the statements of lay witnesses.

It is important to note that the Commission was engaged by the Victorian Government and therefore its Report/s including any recommendations are to the Victorian Government although some commentary and recommendations address national issues e.g. building codes/ standards/ bushfire research.

In a Media Release of the same date, under the banner 'Victorian bush fires a lesson for all', the NSW Minister for Emergency Services, Steve Whan said NSW 'will carefully review the final recommendations from the 2009 Victorian Bushfires Royal Commission'. Steve Whan mentioned that NSW had already introduced a series of reforms and initiatives to boost the community's bush fire protection in the wake of the 2009 fires and the interim Royal Commission recommendations (released in Aug 2009). He also noted that 'The Black Saturday bush fires were a shocking tragedy and it is incumbent on us all to learn from that terrible event'. He said that 'these (reforms) include the introduction of the nationally-agreed system of Fire Danger Ratings, including the new categories of Severe, Extreme and Catastrophic which provide clearer information and trigger points for the public before a fire starts. NSW has also adopted a new graduated system of Advice, Watch & Act and Emergency Warning messages to warn the community during a fire.' NSW has also 'introduced the nationally-consistent position of Prepare Act Survive, which focuses on preparation, having a properly prepared plan and the decisions around staying to defend a property from a fire.'

Naturally, Wamboin brigade members have also been monitoring the proceedings and outcomes of the 2009 Victorian Bushfires Royal Commission. As this brigade is part of the NSW Rural Fire Service (NSWRFS) we look with interest to any further announcements that maybe forth coming by the NSW government and relevant fire and emergency authorities. Given the size of the Final Report, we thought it might be useful to provide you with a 'synopsis' of the conclusions reached by the Royal Commission. The information below is largely from the (42 page) Final Report 'Summary' document and principally from page 4 to 8 inclusive. NOTE: due to space limitations for this article in The Whisper, the information presented below is limited to what we felt would be of particular interest to residents in the brigade's area i.e. residents of Wamboin, Bywong ,Sutton Park, Bidges Rd and Eagle Hawk localities. Readers who wish to understand and view the entirety of the Royal Commission's Final Report are encouraged to do so by reading or otherwise accessing or obtaining copies of the Report via the Commission's website.

Wamboin Brigade 'synopsis' of the 2009 Victorian Bushfires Royal Commission observations/ findings is as follows: On 7February 2009, the Black Saturday fires in Victoria resulted in the death of 173 people - two thirds of these victims were inside their homes. Broad classifications of these deaths have been made by the Royal Commission.

• 113 people died in their homes, seven in other buildings and a further 27 outside but near to their home. In total, death from 'staying' accounted for 85 per cent of total deaths on that day.

• The remaining 26 people died outside of buildings, including: 11 in vehicles; 10 near vehicles or on roads; one on a reserve and 4 away from locations of the fires.

The 'Prepare, Stay and Defend or Leave Early' policy commonly referred to as 'stay or go', remains the corner-stone of bush fire safety policy. However, for this policy to be effective, every household must have a Bush Fire Survival Plan. The plan must be capable of dealing with the fact that every fire is different and weather conditions can change quickly.

The following principles are applicable:

- leaving early is the safest option.
- 'vulnerable people' (less than 12 years or more than 70 years or people who are suffering from acute or chronic illness or disability1) must leave early, preferably the evening before.
- emphasis on preparation, whether staying to defend or leaving early.
- staying and defending is still a sound choice in less severe conditions and fires, providing you have a plan and the property is well prepared.
- consider how your bush fire plan will be effected if bushfire threatens on a work day, during school holidays or if you had other plans (such as a party).
- to stay and defend there must be at least two able-bodied, fit and determined adults present who are physically and mentally strong enough to cope with the demands of a sustained fire fight.
- a fall-back plan is in place if the primary plan fails.
- protection of pets and livestock needs to be considered.

Our community lives in a bushfire prone area. Year in, year out, your fire brigade has been encouraging residents to understand, appreciate and prepare for the risk of fire (including bushfire); many long-time residents have experienced a bushfire through their area. The information provided by the NSWRFS and by your brigade via the 'Wamboin Firefighter' newsletter, letterbox drops, street/ shed meetings, the brigade's information stall at the Wamboin Local Produce Markets, and more recently via the brigade's website, will only assist you if you act on it. Dealing with the risk of bushfire is a shared responsibility. If you haven't visited the brigade's website, please do so, or ring the Captain, if you have any queries. Web and telephone contact details appear elsewhere in this newsletter.

Finally, the NSW RFS advises that:

- Everyone living in a bush fire risk area must have a Bush Fire Survival Plan.
- Preparation is the key to survival.
- Understand the Fire Danger Ratings.
- Act on bush fire alerts and warnings.

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
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#### Land for Wildlife

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#### Telstra's Mobile Phone Coverage for Wamboin and Bywong

Many residents of Wamboin and Bywong have been dissatisfied with Telstra's mobile telephone coverage of our properties. Representations have been made to Telstra for well over a decade by the Wamboin Community Association and individual residents. Telstra, for its part, is aware of this situation and promised to provide a better service when it installed the Next G system. This has not happened yet.

Recently Telstra submitted a Development Application (DA) to Palerang Council proposing the establishment of a station on Millpost Hill. Millpost Hill is part of the Greenway system. The WCA understands that since then there was an indigenous land claim made to the Land Planning Management Authority (formerly Department of Lands) for ownership\* and there have been at least 20 submissions both opposing and supporting this DA.

The WCA discussed the DA at subsequent General Meetings and asked that Telstra meet with the community before the proposal was discussed at Council. Telstra agreed to this request.

On 20 August the WCA was informed by Telstra that the DA for Millpost Hill would be withdrawn. This decision was made after Telstra had received and investigated "feedback" from interested members of the Wamboin and Bywong communities on potential alternate site locations and had undertaken further analysis of other opportunities available in the local area. Telstra stated that it was focussing on identifying an alternative site location that delivers both the benefits of improved mobile services to the community while minimising the visual impact of the associated infrastructure. It is Telstra's intention to consult with the local community through Palerang Council and the WCA once a suitable new location and design is identified.

The WCA is aware of the different opinions within the Wamboin community about this proposal and wants a "best solution". There are a number of technical, environmental and social issues involved and Telstra regards this proposal as the most difficult it has had to resolve. Despite public statements by Telstra on consultation with community groups this has not, in fact, occurred. The WCA will continue to monitor this situation and has invited Telstra to discuss the new location and design with the community prior to submitting a new DA to Council. -- John van der Straaten, WCA Secretary

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




#### **Wamboin Fishing Club**
