## Wamboin Community Association President's Paragraphs



Wamboin Bonfire and Fireworks Display — The weather could hardly have been better, and the excellent turnout (estimated at well over a thousand) made this the most successful evening ever. The bonfire, another all-time best, was still glowing at 10.00pm when the last of the crowd filtered away. I must also commend (almost) everyone who attended for their consideration in keeping the Hall site virtually litter-free.

**Recycling Station** — The recycling bins at the Community Hall are provided by Council to help our community maintain a responsible approach to waste management. These bins, however, are provided for the disposal of recyclable materials, as identified by the attendant signs, only.

Recyclable materials are not taken to landfill sites, but to the Mugga Lane recycling depot for processing. From time to time, however, individuals see fit to dispose of general waste at the community hall, or to place household rubbish in the recycling bins. When the recycling bins are 'contaminated' with general waste, the contractor who empties the bins is obliged to take his entire load to a landfill, rather than to the recycling depot, completely defeating the purpose of the recycling station. Waste of any description that is not placed in the recycling bins is not removed by the garbage contractor, and would just be left to litter the Community Centre environs if not for the efforts of more community-minded residents who take it upon themselves to remove this rubbish.

One particular item that seems to be finding its way into the recycling bins with unfortunate regularity is soiled disposable nappies. Please be aware, if there was ever any misunderstanding, that these are not considered recyclable material. Nor is it often practical for more community-minded residents to remove such items from the recycling bins and take them to a landfill site.

Our community will only thrive if we all work together. It may not be very pleasant to have to dispose of soiled nappies, but it's no more pleasant for anyone else. And inappropriate dumping at recycling stations certainly doesn't encourage Council to continue to provide these local facilities.

Please consider others when you dispose of your waste. Place only recyclable materials in the bins at the recycling stations, and if you haven't contracted someone to collect your general household waste, please don't leave it at a recycling station for others to clean up—please take it to one of the tips yourself.

**Dogs** — The matter of stray dogs has come to the fore again this month. While anecdotal evidence suggests that in some cases straying dogs allow neighbours to meet and get to know one another better, in other cases they have exactly the opposite effect. In extreme cases, where a stray animal presents a threat to person or livestock, the law allows a landholder to injure or destroy the animal to prevent attack. This is invariably an unpleasant event for both the landholder and the animal's owner, not to mention the dog itself.

Unfortunately, stray dogs are one of largest contributors to tensions within rural communities. If you keep a dog, please consider other community members and be aware of your responsibilities under the Companion Animals Act.



## **BUSHFIRE PREPARATIONS**

#### PREPARE. ACT. SURVIVE.


**PREPARE.** It is your responsibility to prepare yourself, your family and your home for the threat of bush fire. Every home must have a <u>Bush Fire Survival Plan</u> encompassing the decision to either "Leave Early" or to "Stay and Defend" to ensure you are prepared and know what to do in the event of a bush fire. You also need a contingency plan in the event your primary plan is not able to be implemented.



**ACT.** You need to act decisively in accordance with your Bush Fire Survival Plan when bush fires threaten. **SURVIVE.** Your survival depends on your preparations, and the decisions you make.

Regardless of your decision, you must prepare your property to give you, your family and your home the best chance of survival. The RFS has produced guidance on the preparations and actions that you need to take in order to survive a bush fire. ## FIRE DANGER RATING



The Fire Danger Rating is an early indicator of potential danger. It is an assessment of the potential fire behaviour, the difficulty of suppressing a fire, and the potential impact on the community should a bush fire occur on a given day. The FDR is determined by the Fire Danger Index (FDI). The FDI is a combination of air temperature, relative humidity, wind speed and drought.

When a Fire Danger Rating is advised, you need to take it seriously and be prepared to act. It should act as your first trigger for action.

The signs for our area are located near the intersections of:

- Norton Rd and Sutton Rd (Wamboin)
- Macs Reef Rd and Harriott Rd (Bywong)
- Bungendore Rd and Joe Rocks Rd (Bungendore)
- Bungendore Rd and Summerhill Rd (Bywong), and
- Federal Hwy Service Rd and Goolabri Dr (Sutton Park).

## **BUSH FIRE ALERTS**

Bush fire alerts are about getting messages to the community when there is a fire, using a wide range of media such as the web, radio and television. Bush fires can threaten suddenly and without warning, so people must be prepared to take action whether they receive an official emergency warning or not.

The decision to issue a Bushfire Alert is based on the threat posed by a fire. It considers the current <u>Fire Danger Rating</u> and the predicted rate of spread of the fire, which can vary depending on topography, fuel type, prolonged drought and other local conditions.

The messaging levels are designed with safety in mind, whilst acknowledging that over-warning can lead to complacency and delays in people taking action.

## SCHOOLS CADET PROGRAM

The Brigade has been involved in the NSWRFS Schools Cadet Program at Queanbeyan and Karabar High Schools OVER THE LAST 3 MONTHS. The aim of the program is to teach students in Year 9 'life skills' and working as a team. Other benefits include greater bush fire awareness and understanding the work that emergency service volunteers undertake in assisting the community. Twenty-five students from these two schools participated in the 10 week program that covered trucks and equipment, pumps and pumping, firefighting, working with other Emergency Services, motor vehicle accidents and extraction of trapped people, community safety, structure and gas fires, first aid, navigation and communications.

As part of their graduation on 21st September (Queanbeyan High) and 23rd September (Karabar High), participants demonstrated their skills to fellow students, school staff, local councillors, other agencies and RFS regional and staff members.

The program is Zone based with Bungendore, Stoney Creek, Burra, Queanbeyan City and Wamboin Brigades assisting with the provision of trucks and mentors for these two schools. Group Captain Chris Powell, Ian Coillet and John Taubman participated in the program from the Wamboin Brigade.



#### Letter

I am a concerned resident with an ongoing problem that has festered for many years. It is a matter of uncontrolled dogs.

I have taken my concerns to Yarralumla council several times and also more recently to Palerang council by way of telephone calls to both a councillor and to the council officers. I at one stage contacted the Queanbeyan Police for their advice on the matter.

Now once again the behaviour of these dogs has arisen.

Our garbage has been raided and scattered over the area going towards the residence of the owners of these animals. A dead kangaroo was found in our dam. When I retrieved it, I noticed the hind legs had been bitten repeatedly, probably scaring the kangaroo into the dam for refuge. The poor animal probably drowned in total fear of its life. A few days later we went looking for the carcas. We found it had been eaten away to nearly nothing.


During these events my dog has barked and acted in a state I would describe an erratic and not a normal state for him. He is a red heeler and is under control at all times because we realise the need for dog controls in a rural area where some neighbours have animals such as horses and sheep.

"Keep records of each attack, time of day and the sighting of these dogs" I was told by one of the authorities. "Capture and hold these dogs then call the pound", said another. The police said "you are within your rights to shoot them if they are on your property and threatening your family, yourself or your animals."

So here I am writing to the Wamboin Whisper in an attempt to raise the community's awareness of the problem. Cooper and Poppet road residents who aren't already aware of the problem, you should be warned that there are dogs that WILL attack your stock, your garbage and possibly your selves. They have done so in an increasingly frequent and vicious nature. Please publish this so that perhaps some one can be saved the distress of finding a loved one being attacked.



## Muddies Break Though for 1<sup>st</sup> Premiership by Peter Evans

After losing four grand finals in the past five years the Mudchooks have broken the drought and posted the club's first premiership. The game was played in atrocious weather conditions with driving rain and howling wind, which seemed to suit our boys and eventually ran out convincing winners of the 2010 Monaro Second Division grand final against 2009 season premiers Boorowa Goldies by 30-6.

A big crowd of loyal and enthusiastic supporters braved the elements (and broke out the gumboots) to encourage the Mudchooks to score five tries to nil on a pitch that resembled Lake George back in the mid nineties. At times it looked like players were water skiing. To score this many tries in the rain, on a heavy, muddy ground with a very slippery ball was an amazing effort and capped an extremely successful undefeated season for the Bungendore team. The Boorowa players were obviously tired and carrying some injuries from the previous two finals games and put up a gallant effort, but the Mudchooks were just too strong, too committed and carried the seasons form to victory.

The forwards showed awesome power and control to completely dominate their opposition in every facet of the game. Loose head prop Scott Cottrell ruled the scrums and was the first try scorer for Bungendore with a driving run only four minutes into the match. Scott kept his body height low and drove ahead for 10 metres through the Boorowa defence to crash over the line. John Turner, playing at lock, continued his great season scoring a try in the second half from a powerful pick and drive.

They say that forwards win rugby games and that backs determine by how much, and in this game, despite the poor playing conditions, the Mudchooks backs played some remarkable running rugby. The backs' excellent ball skills and support play was best illustrated by the brilliant try scored by Dancing Dave McDonald in the second half. At the end of a back line move that started behind the Mudchooks 22 metre line, Dancing Dave was racing down the side line in support of Luke Payten calling for Luke to "put in a box kick". Running at full speed, Luke chipped in-field over the heads of the opposition and Dave raced past them to gather in the ball and score. During the game fly half Brett Watson continually bamboozled the opposition and scored a try out wide in the second half while half back Luke Payten won the Man of the Match Award and also scored a great try.

This season the Mudchooks played 14 games to finish the season undefeated scoring 68 tries for a total of 436 points, with 128 point being scored against them. The Bungendore Rugby Football Club would like to thank all the sponsors, supporters and volunteers for their generous support and help this year. The next challenge is to defend the title in 2011.

## Nature Notes – September 2010

Good rainfall continued into September with almost 60 mm in my rain gauge so far this month. Not quite as welcome was the day of gale-force winds at the beginning of September that brought down three large eucalypt trees on my place – all well away from the house fortunately!

The expanses of bright green grass are now liberally dotted with the white and maroon flowers of Early Nancy (*Wurmbea dioica*), and the swaying golden heads of the Billy Buttons (*Craspedia variabilis*) are just appearing. And, of course, the wattles are still producing splashes of colour on the hillsides and along the roads.

The local birds are frenetically building nests or feeding their young. A few weeks ago, there were two 'roos basking in the sunshine on the slope across the creek. They were soon joined by a White-eared Honeyeater which proceeded to divest them of some of their fur for a nest. It landed on their backs, grabbed a tuft of fur in its beak and rose, flapping its wings furiously, until the soft fur came loose. It was flying back and forth to its nest with its booty for nearly half an hour. The 'roos occasionally reached round with a vague swipe of the paw, but seemed pretty unconcerned with the bird's actions.

The Magpies built their nest, as they have done for many years, in one of the old Red Stringybark trees along the creek. Sadly, one of the adults was lying dead under the tree just as the nestlings were starting to call for food. Fortunately, the other adult stayed around and continued to rear them. The pair of Red Wattle-birds whose territory covers the grevilleas and mistletoes at the top of the hill have built their usual rather flimsy nest high in a large grevillea there. Up along the creek, a pair of White-browed Scrub-wrens built a well-hidden domed nest in a dense clump of *Carex appressa*. This was in an area where the water rushed down a while later in one of the heavier downpours we were experiencing at the time – but the little birds had chosen well with a site just above the water-line. Just above the dam on my place there is a deep section of gully – last week I saw a little Spotted Pardalote disappearing into the shadows with a beak full of bark fibre. These attractive small birds build their nests in a tunnel, up to 60 cm long, excavated in the banks of creeks or in cliff faces.

The lizards have been out and about for a while now – some of them tempting fate by sunning themselves on the local roads. I removed a Bearded Dragon from a Wamboin road a few days ago – it had obviously risked its life before, as it had a rather short stubby tail rather than the long tapering one it should have been sporting. Shinglebacks are lumbering around, Jacky Lizards darting along fallen logs and Grass Skinks searching avidly for the odd insect, but the Cunningham's Skinks are yet to make an appearance on their family log.




