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Wamboin Community Association President's Paragraphs



With things being pretty quiet over the holiday period, there's not a lot to report. Planning work for the new waste transfer station at the Macs Reef Road landfill site is proceeding well, and will be reported in more detail after the latest developments have been presented to Council.

WCA representatives also attended a community meeting in Braidwood on Monday (Jan 31) evening. There is serious concern there over plans for Council to reduce its staff presence in Braidwood, centralising resources, where possible, in Bungendore. While this may seem to have little to do with our own community, and whatever you might think personally about the idea, the plight of any individual community within the shire has an impact on Council decisions, which in turn has a direct impact on our own community. The WCA hopes that by attending such meetings, and contributing when we can, we will help to build a better understanding between the vastly different communities that make up our shire.

Clean Up Australia Day — As usual, will be on the first Sunday in March. The local clean-up exercise is again being coordinated by Lofty Mason, between 9.00 am and noon, with details provided elsewhere in this issue of The Whisper. Please come along and help, even if only for half and hour, or just take a stroll down your own local street/road/drive/close/way (did I get them all?) and pick up any rubbish. Roadside litter just encourages roadside littering—a tidy community will at least make some people think twice about littering.

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





We appreciate the local community's support at both these functions.



GRASSFIRES

Just in case you were unaware, the pointy end of the bushfire danger period in our area is typically February/ March. The weather conditions that we have experienced over the last 3 months have, worryingly, created a fertile environment for grass fires. Despite the relatively benign conditions there have already been two grass fires in the Brigade's area. Depending on the conditions prevailing at the time, grass fires can be very difficult to contain, and they can be very fast running. History provides ample evidence of our area being prone to grass fires. The evidence also points to most grass fires being caused by human activity, which means that they are preventable. Here's a few of the basic considerations that all of us should keep in mind:

- 1. Always know the Fire Danger Rating for the day and make sure everyone in your household is also aware of what the rating is and what it means. You might consider this a standard dinner conversation or get the kids to find out what the rating is from the Internet.
- 2. Do not use equipment that may cause a spark or ignite grass during the heat of the day. Always mow in the cool of the day preferably early morning.
- 3. On days of Total Fire Ban do not mow or use any equipment that may cause a spark.
- 4. If using a ride-on mower or slasher carry a knapsack spray with you. If the knapsack spray is too heavy only half fill it with water.
- 5. Continually check mowers for a build-up of grass especially near the exhaust.

We understand the NSWRFS will shortly be finalising a short publication on grassfires which, when it becomes available, we'll include the details in a future newsletter. In the meantime, because of our proximity to the ACT, particularly its rural lands, we thought it useful to highlight some pointers from one of it publications. The following information has been extracted from the ACT Rural Fire Service, Grassfires Fact Sheet.

Know how to protect yourself and your property

Grassfires spread rapidly and can quickly threaten lives and property.

If you live in a grassland area you need to have a Bushfire Survival Plan and prepare yourself and your property for grassfire.

Understanding grassfire risk:

- Grassfires are a type of bushfire that can be extremely dangerous.
- Grassfires travel and spread very quickly at times travelling more than 25km an hour. They can cover huge
 distances in a short time.
- Grassfires tend to be less intense than a forest fire, however they can still generate enormous amounts of radiant heat.
- The taller and drier the grass, the more intensely a grassfire will burn.
- As grass is a fine vegetation type, fire burns through it faster than through forest.
- Short grass under 10cm is a much lower risk.
- Living in a grassland area with dried-out brown or golden-coloured grass that is over 10cm high is a bushfire risk.
- The shorter the grass the lower the flame height and the easier the fire will be to control.
- Grassfires can start early in the day as grass dries out more quickly than forest when temperatures are high. Therefore the danger period for grassfire is longer than in forests during any 24 hour period.
- Grassland includes pasture, crops, areas of open native grassy woodland as well as those areas of open space in and around the suburbs.

Protecting yourself from grassfires

- The speed at which a grassfire can start and spread can catch people off guard.
- The radiant heat from a grassfire can kill anyone caught out in the open.
- The safest place to be during a grassfire is well away from the threat.
- If you are threatened by a grassfire, always protect yourself by covering up all exposed skin with protective clothing such as:
 - 1. Long-sleeved shirt and pants made from a natural fibre such as cotton or wool,
 - 2. Sturdy boots and woollen socks,
 - 3. Tough leather gloves,
 - 4. A wide-brimmed hat,
 - 5. A face mask or towel to cover your mouth and nose, and
 - 6. Eye protection such as goggles.
- You need to shield yourself from radiant heat behind a solid structure such as a building or large rock outcrop if in the bush etc.

Protecting Your Home and Property from Grassfires

- Reduce the height and proximity of grass to these buildings and other assets by using one or a combination of the following:
- 1. Slashing,

- 2. Mowing,
- 3. Grazing,
- 4. Spraying and poisoning, and
- 5. Create fuel breaks by removing all fuel (vegetation) down to the soil.
- Narrow fuel breaks are ineffective at stopping a fire. By reducing the grass and other vegetation around your buildings and other assets you can create a space in which you can defend them. Fire breaks should be at least 20 m wide, this will often be 10m each side of a fence line.
- It is important that you create and maintain a defendable space around all the assets you want to protect. By carefully reducing and managing the grass and other vegetation in this defendable space you are limiting the ability of a moving grassfire to ignite a building through direct contact with flame or radiant heat.
- It is too late to begin spraying and slashing as the fire approaches, you must prepare now.

Machinery Can Start Grassfires

- Grassfires can be started accidentally when using machinery such as chainsaws, lawnmowers, tractors and welders over summer.
- The hot exhaust of a vehicle parked on a road verge or driving through a paddock with long grass can also start a fire.

NSW RURAL FIRE REGULATION

The following is an extract from the NSW Rural Fires Regulation 2008 number 22.

Other safety requirements:

- (1) A person must not, in connection with any agricultural, pastoral or other land use, drive or use in any grass, crop or stubble land any motorized machine unless:
 - (a) the machine is constructed so that any heated areas will not come into contact with combustible matter, and
 - (b) the machine is maintained in a good and serviceable condition so as to prevent the outbreak of fire. Maximum penalty: 20 penalty units.
- (2) A person must not, in connection with any agricultural, pastoral or other land use:
 - (a) drive or use in any grass, crop or stubble land a motorized machine on which it is practicable to carry prescribed fire safety equipment, or
 - (b) carry out welding operations or use explosives or an angle grinder or any other implement that is likely to generate sparks, unless the person carries on the machine, or has in the vicinity, prescribed fire safety equipment that is maintained in a serviceable condition.

 unless the person carries on the machine, or has in the vicinity, prescribed fire safety equipment that is maintained in a serviceable condition.

Maximum penalty: 20 penalty units.

(3) In this clause:

"prescribed fire safety equipment" means:

- (a) a knapsack spray pump of 16 litre minimum capacity filled with water, or
- (b) a fire extinguisher (liquid type) of 9 litre minimum capacity, or
- (c) a dry powder type extinguisher of 0.9 kg minimum capacity.

LOCAL CONDITIONS

With La Nina influencing the weather pattern on Australia's eastern seaboard it, as you know, has brought generally cooler conditions and much more rain than we have experienced during the past many years of drought conditions. While the Wamboin/ Bywong/ Sutton region has to date been spared from devastating floods being experience elsewhere we hope that all of you have noticed the height and thickness of grasses and pastures and the potential fire danger this represents as we move into the pointy end of the bush fire risk period. As part of your year-round bush fire survival plan you should be doing all you can to minimise the risk and spread of bush or grass fire on your property. The Fire Brigade is acutely aware of the level of fuel build up this season and in the past several weeks have been out and about honing their grass-fire knowledge and skills as the selection of photos below shows.

TIPS TO HELP YOU PREPARE. ACT. SURVIVE.

PREPARE. You must continually reassess you bush fire plan.	 Know and understand your bush fire risk. Prepare yourself, your family, your home and property for bush fires. Prepare a Bush Fire Survival Plan.
ACT. The higher the fire danger rating, the more dangerous the conditions.	 Know the fire danger rating for your area and what you need to do. Put your preparations into action – don't wait and see. Check your Bush Fire Survival Plan.
SURVIVE. Fires may threaten without warning – know what you will do to survive.	 The safest place is away from the fire – your survival is the highest priority. Follow your Bush Fire Survival Plan and make decisions to protect you and your family. You need to know what to do if you are caught in a fire. You may be threatened by a fire without warning. Know the bush fire Alert Levels, monitor conditions and keep up to date.



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Nature Notes December 2010 and January 2011

All the rain we've had over the last two months has made for a green summer and lots of new growth on the local trees and shrubs. We were only on the edge of the downpour that resulted in the flooding of Queanbeyan, but the Wamboin creeks must have increased the volume of the Yass River with their flows. A few days after water had poured over the floodway of my dam, I noticed something large and yellowish lying amongst the sedges in a washout. It turned out to be a large (and, unfortunately, freshly dead) Golden Perch. How did it get there? Well, twenty-five years ago, soon after I purchased my piece of land, fifty Golden Perch fingerlings went into the dam (after a journey from a fishery at Narranderra to Queanbeyan railway station). There was a huge storm during the next week, and I assumed they'd all been washed into neighbouring dams as, over the years, there were no sightings of any of these fish. So, what a surprise to find a 3 kg specimen after all that time. My creek runs under Poppet Road, through several properties, then does a north turn under Norton Road and continues on to the Yass River. I wonder if anyone else found an unexpected fish?

The cream trunks of the Scribbly Gums (*Eucalyptus rossii*) are noticeable in the landscape at the moment as they are shedding most or all of their bark this year, even the very old trees – possibly because of the growth they have experienced after the welcome rainfall. This moisture doesn't seem to have helped the Red Stringybarks (*E. macrorhyncha*) some of which are still dying back – this has been happening for some years now in the local area with the drought being blamed for their condition, but perhaps there is something else causing the problem.

The Native Cherry or Cherry Ballart (*Exocarpos cupressiformis*) is living up to its name this year, with several trees at my place bearing a good crop of tasty orange and red fruit. Crimson Rosellas amongst the foliage suggested that they were a source of a snack for the birds as well as me.

The various honeyeaters had a good time this summer, with many of their favourite shrubs flowering profusely. They seem to be rather territorially aggressive birds, with Eastern Spinebills, White-eared Honeyeaters and Red Wattle-birds spending a lot of time chasing each other away from a plentiful food source. The Red Wattle-birds continue to build their fragile stick nests in exposed positions. Surprisingly, they manage to rear more than replacement levels of young, although one pair of birds who built their nest in clear sight of every creature lost their eggs recently –probably to a watchful Currawong.

Lots of day-flying, black and white moths (with orange and black banded bodies) have been fluttering around near (and sometimes inside) the house for most of the last month. These are *Nyctemera amica*, and their spiky, dark-coloured caterpillars have been feeding in their hundreds on *Senecio quadridentatus*, one of the native Fireweeds, sometimes to the point of complete defoliation. At present, there are almost as many Common Brown butterflies (*Heteronympha merope merope*), often rising in a fluttering cloud from the shade of a bush where they shelter in the heat of the day.

A profusely-flowering white *Kunzea ambigua*, planted in my driveway, attracted swarms of flies and beetles. The flowers, heavily laden with nectar, are honey-scented, a perfume noticeable at some distance. One morning, there were more than a dozen Fiddler Beetles (*Eupoecile australasiae*) feeding there. These are large scarab beetles, dark brown and shiny with curved bright yellow markings on their wing cases and thorax, a striking sight..

With so many birds nesting and trees fruiting, it's odd to realize there is a noticeable auditory absence in our area. Not one Koel has been heard calling during this cuckoo's usual visiting season, at least not on this side of Wamboin.

Post Christmas and January is always a delicious time. The pudding plate is empty, the dog has the ham bone and you feel justified in pulling up the drawbridge and losing yourself in the pile of Christmas books and chocolates that have amassed over the festive season. But, stirring in the dim dark recesses of my brain is something from perhaps the first law of Physics ...something about matter being neither created nor destroyed but possibly changing from one form to another. The pudding may have disappeared from the Christmas plate, but it seems to have reformed on the hips!

Normally I would have worked off the excesses of Christmas in the garden, but first it was too wet and the ground was too soggy to do much, and now it has suddenly become too hot and dry. But it hasn't stopped the masses of beautiful butterflies from invading the garden; big black and white ones with a flame of red, busy orange and brown ones and others like little petals of white, rising, falling and spinning in circles above the flower beds. Then there are the spiders, countless tireless toilers, stretching gossamer webs across paths to snare an innocent gnat or guileless gardener, and embroidering window corners and cracks.
