**Road signs.** The first of our new roadside signs have appeared, and the remainder will follow shortly. Rumours that we plan to change the colours according to the seasons are unfounded. The changes and variations in hue which homing locals might have noticed are due to differences between colours available for painting on the computer and the palate available to our professional sign-writers. All the old signs will soon be replaced with the new ones, which incidentally provide more space for writing. The signs were paid for from a grant from the Veolia Trust.

Advertise your Bywong business! At its November meeting the Committee decided to encourage all local small businesses to appear on our website. The committee decided that businesses which supported the Community's work could advertise free on the Community website, subject to an annual review, and that advertising would also be available for a fee for those businesses which might not be able to support the Community. Our website will contain details of this offer.

**Constitutional change.** We continue to work on simplifying our constitution and making it more accessible for members. Some of the amendments which the committee is proposing deal with subscriptions, membership lists and their availability, resignation procedures and committee member numbers. We shall send a summary of these proposals out to members, and put the full text on our website. Watch out for our Special General Meeting meeting, in February or soon after, at which members will be able to discuss the changes.

**Greenways.** The Community has sent a detailed proposal to the Lands Department suggesting four possible new greenways in the areas of Millyn Road, Bungendore/Macs Reef Roads, Morrison/Forest Roads and Wamboin West. The Community has worked with Council on these proposals, and is awaiting NSW State Government clarification of the status of associated Crown Roads.

**Waste management.** Council used Bywong Hall to consult the community on the latest status of the waste management transfer station planned for the site of the current Macs Reef landfill. Locals drifted in to the hall during the afternoon and early evening and were able to discuss concerns with Council officers and representatives of the consultants for the project. Some illuminating diagrams and illustrations were on display. The way is now open to for Council to proceed with the preparation of a definitive Environmental Impact Statement, which is under way.

**Next meeting.** The Community's next meeting will be at 7.30pm on Monday February 13 in the Bywong Hall, Birriwa Road.

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


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
#### Dog Training and Behaviour course for Beginners IN BYWONG

A well-behaved dog is a pleasure to own. Spending a little time with your dog each day and knowing just what to ask of your dog is what this course will teach you. You will be learning about basic dog behaviour and psychology, as well as various obedience exercises, such as sit, drop, wait, come and walking on a loose lead. These classes will also discuss dealing with dogs and snakes and how to control dogs around livestock and wildlife, including advice on how to train your dog to avoid snakes.

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#### Nature Notes November 2011 Jo Walker

The welcome rainfall of more than 50 mm towards the end of the month has spruced up the vegetation. And, with a bit more dampness forecast, it's likely we'll have a green landscape for Christmas.

Black Wattle trees (*Acacia mearnsii*) have been flowering along Sutton Road and, slightly later, into Wamboin. They are flowering so well this year that two trees I planted near the creek are mostly hidden in a cloud of cream flowers. This is a strange wattle, as it starts producing seed-pods from the previous year's flowering when in bud for the next season. The trees have produced more than the usual crop of seed-pods this year, but there won't be many left to ripen as the Sulphur-crested Cockatoos evidently find the green fruit delicious. The Gang-gangs feed on developing wattle seed-pods too sometimes. Another planted tree, the red-flowered *Eucalyptus leucoxylon*, is providing a feast too at present, with Noisy Friarbirds and a host of Red Wattlebirds squabbling over the nectar-filled blossoms.

But, it wasn't a good month for all of the birds. A pair of Magpies built a substantial nest in a large eucalypt near the house and were sitting on their eggs or guarding the nest for about a week. Then they were gone, after a few cursory inspections of the nest one day before it was abandoned. There are several Currawongs around and, recently, the occasional Raven has turned up, so I suppose one of them took the eggs.

The golden flowers of the Sticky Everlasting Daisy (*Xerochrysum viscosum*) are brightening up our roadsides, looking especially attractive where they are growing amongst the taller white-flowering Cauliflower Bushes (*Cassinia longifolia*). Unfortunately, seasons that are good for our native plants also favour some of the prevalent introduced weeds. This year, Centaury (*Centaurium erythraea*) has come up everywhere. One of its common names is Pink Stars. It's an attractive little plant with heads of bright pink flowers – but it's not one of ours and I'm spending hours pulling it out right now before it flowers. The hours of stooping and pulling have had one advantage though. I've found several patches of *Polygala japonica* in damp grassland areas after not having seen it for several years. It grows almost hidden amongst the grasses and has tiny purple flowers. It is in the same family (Polygalaceae) as the twining blue-flowered creeper, *Comesperma volubile*, which also grows here, and, at the moment, is covered in small green seed-pods.

One of the Eastern Grey Kangaroos here seems to have adopted a joey. Her own joey was one of the first to leave the pouch this year, and was already semi-independent. Then her mother appeared one morning with a small, paler furred joey peering out of the pouch. One of the other does, one of her sister in fact, seems to have lost her joey. So it looks as if it might have been rescued by its aunt. Wamboin is full of interesting happenings!





The Wamboin Volunteer Rural Fire Brigade facilitated a "Firefighting for Non-Firefighters" community information session at the Wamboin Fire Station on Saturday Nov 5. While the entirety of the brigade's area is prone to bush fire, some locations are of greater risk than others.

The brigade letter-boxed 150 properties in the 'highest risk' locations and invited these residents to pre-register for the event. Thirty residents attended.

Jenny Filmer, an active bushfire volunteer for over 40 years, currently employed at the NSW RFS Lake George Zone office in Queanbeyan, was the key presenter, supported by members of the Wamboin Brigade including its Community Safety Team.

The Brigade's President, Ian Coillet said 'that Jenny's presentation was based on personal experience, focused on things residents need to know when they live and travel in a bush fire prone area, and basic practical information to help improve their resilience and be better equipped against the impact of bushfire during the summer.'

He went on to say that 'after questions and a coffee break, residents spent around an hour familiarising themselves with several working examples of pumps, hoses, nozzles and basic fire-fighting strategies and techniques'. Greg Simms from Bungendore Rural Supplies (BRS) was also on hand with a generous static display of pumps, hoses and nozzles and other firefighting products and to answer questions and offer advice and suggestions to residents.

The President went on to say that 'feedback from residents indicates that overwhelmingly the information session was very informative and the 3 hour investment of their time was well worthwhile. In fact, at one stage even Greg Simms from BRS remarked that he had picked up a few pointers he would convey to staff to pass on to customers."

#### **BRIGADE ACTIVITY LAST MONTH**

#### Callouts

Just the one incident since last month's Newsletter and, ironically, it was on Remembrance Day (Nov 11). With the advantage of several members having just gathered at the Fire Station for what was to have been the scheduled Friday afternoon (2pm-4pm) working bee and navel review, it took just 6 minutes between the brigade being asked to respond to an emergency call at 2.14pm before they as crew in one of the large tankers Wamboin 1A (*One Alpha*) were on their way to a reported fire in the vicinity of the Federal Hwy and Doust Rd Bywong. Twenty-eight minutes later the tanker arrived at the scene of a fire on the embankment in reasonable-sized timber, bush and grass on the western side of the Federal Highway. Fortunately the fire had been contained and brought to heel by the Gundaroo brigade that was first on scene. After ensuring the Gundaroo crew had adequate water reserve in their tanker our fire-fighters returned to the Fire Station and stood down.

On the weekend of 12-13 November, thirteen members of the brigade participated in the Lake George Zone Navigation Exercise (Navex) - an event designed to combine navigation skills, safety and day-to-day procedures. Eight members participated in two of the brigade's tankers that formed the Wamboin Strike Team. A further 5 members participated in various ways as part of Navex's Incident Management Team.

Navex is conducted as an introduction to the fire season and allows members to learn new skills, improve old ones and meet fellow fire fighters. Navex is NOT a competition. The emphasis is on getting through the scenarios safely, drawing and building on competencies as an individual, and as a member of a crew and a player in a wider incident response team! Sometimes

not all teams get to finish all scenarios... that's ok as long as they've had a good weekend and learnt something along the way. Navex is a totally 'away' weekend with participants camping out on the Saturday night. As it turned out, we ended up at the very good facilities of the Bungendore Showground. Navex location and details are kept secret leading up to the exercise, to allow participating teams to practice their navigation to unknown locations.

Some 13 brigades participated including some from outside the Lake George Zone that is always good.

There were 10 scenarios on offer over the two days involving a: motor vehicle accident adjacent to a railway, mapping/navigation, electrical safety, emergency response, property protection, hybrid vehicles, gas cylinder emergency, pumping, issues related to asbestos, hand tools and an optional night navigation. The scenarios and workshops were variously in the ranges to the south-east of Bungendore, in and around Bungendore and in the Carlton Estate that lies between Queanbeyan and Bungendore. Of course, there were the usual few surprises/complications that we've come to expect with Navex and, indeed, almost any real-life emergency response scenario.

Everyone who participated agreed, it was another Navex that was well worthwhile. To quote Elizabeth Wrench, a brigade member who attended Navex this year and in several year's past and who put up her hand to do a spot of crew leading on one of the days...' Once again, as it always happens when it runs, Navex 2011 did not disappoint.' And in a note of encouragement to fellow brigade members who did not attend this year, her message to them is... 'I, for one, will be attending all Navex weekends available to me but will gladly forfeit a place in favour of others experiencing the same benefits Navex brings to all fire-fighters.'

#### Wildlife Capers

For any new member of the Wamboin and Bywong community, it is worth catching up on ideas as to how to live up close and personal with wildlife. We have a good deal of different species in our region – and let's hope it stays that way. Why not check out the *Living with Wildlife* article on the Wamboin Community Association website under Community Groups (wamboincommunity.asn.au)?

Living in the countryside brings with it added responsibilities. This includes living in balance with nature and being a guardian for the flora and fauna that is left. Those people amongst us who only want to bash, squash, torture and kill animals need to be challenged by friends and relatives. Over the last 200 years Australia has lost 27 mammals - never to be seen again. Caring for our wildlife – even the Eastern Grey kangaroo, will ensure our great grandchildren have a chance to see the animals we take for granted.

With many people commuting into Canberra it is a must to be really vigilant on the roads and drive slower in areas where you know, or suspect, wildlife (typically kangaroos) will hop or run out – particularly at dawn and dusk and through the night when animals are on the move. Unfortunately some roads are not well designed and motorists have to face the sun in the morning and going home. In places there is dense undergrowth on the sides of the road that stop you spotting animals.

Most people don't have accidents and it might be that they are just lucky or are indeed more careful. As a career aviator I know it is all to easy to get 'tunnel vision', let the speed nudge up and start to focus on a speck on the windscreen. Reducing risk and keeping the eyes moving is a great way to see more!

Most people do the right thing. And it's been great to have so many people contact Wildcare (Tel: 62991966) for help in dealing with injured or trapped animals. Well done to everyone who have been stopping to check animals to see if they are dead and whether they have a Joey onboard. I've heard from many people stopping to move turtles, lizards and echidnas off the road in the direction they were going. This is great! You do not have to be a member of a wildlife group to give animals a helping hand. Having a towel in the car can help you pick up or calm an animal.


At the Bywong Christmas Drinks get-together on 3 December, five more property owners were presented with their Land For Wildlife (LFW) sign. This recognises a commitment to set aside all or part of your land for wildlife habitat. The

process involves getting land assessed to find out what flora and fauna you have. The visit can also help talk through problems such as erosion and habitat improvement. So far we have run a LFW pilot scheme in Wamboin & Bywong, but it is hoped to expand this over the coming years. Interested? (see

By the way, keeping the area around the house, sheds and yard clear of long grass, shrubs, rubbish, woodpiles, too many potted plants, old cars etc, will help you see what is around – particularly venomous snakes that may be passing through. #### **Councillor's Corner**

It's been a quite month in the lead up to the Christmas break, which is probably a good thing! Palerang Development Control Plan — With Palerang's new, consolidated Local Environmental Plan nearing completion, attention has turned to the Development Control Plan, a supplementary planning instrument that provides more detailed planning guidelines for specific types of development. As with the current LEPs, Palerang's current DCPs, all 20(!) of them, were inherited from the various shires that contributed to the formation of the Palerang LGA eight years ago. The immediate task, as with the LEP, is to consolidate these documents and create a single DCP. While the LEP specifies the broad objectives of individual land use zones, the DCP provides more detailed guidelines relating to particular types of developments in particular areas. While the LEP identifies permissible and prohibited land uses, and fundamental development constraints like minimum lot sizes and maximum building heights, the DCP addresses gritty details like building envelope location, dwelling set-backs, building materials, erosion control requirements, road standards, and much more. The LEP is the primary, legal planning instrument that is directly under local government control. Any DCPs that apply within a local government area are subordinate to the prevailing LEP—they simply provide more detailed specifications of items identified in individual LEP clauses. Just to complete the picture, the LEP is, in turn, subordinate to any relevant state government planning instruments, namely State Environmental Planning Policies (SEPPs), and all of these planning documents are prepared in accordance with the NSW Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979. More information on any of these, and in fact copies of any of the state planning documents (an instant cure for insomnia!), are available on the Web—just enter a search for the relevant document name.







#### Let's Shout About The Whisper

#### By Lofty Mason

Continuing my efforts of looking back at the beginning of local Wamboin groups as recorded by the first copies of The Whisper.

**The Fire Brigade.** I stress that the following information as regards The Wamboin Fire Brigade is made with sole reference to the first eight copies of The Wamboin Whisper.

**The first Whisper, dated July 81,** reported a meeting of the Wamboin Bushfire Brigade Sub-Committee at Dave Robertsons on 17 June with the following results:

a. A training exercise organised for 17 October.

- b. A membership drive to ensure all Wamboin residents were financial members. The subscription was set at \$15 per year. It was noted that Sutton Brigade (*Wamboin was a part of the Sutton Brigade*) had invested \$6,000 dollars in our area.
- c. The Sub-Committee members and their areas of responsibility were: Dave Evans; Gallagher Place and Proud Place. Denis Shaw; Cooper Road and Campbell Place. Barry Beames; Canning Close and Western Norton Road. Ron Jeffery; Poppet Road. John Laker; East Norton Road and Bingley Way.
- John Finn and Dave Robertson who were the Wamboin Deputy Captains would also look after the new Merino Vale area.

It was noted that a working bee to complete the fire shed in Cooper Road was held on Sunday 21 Jun. (*Note: Dean Evans, aka Dons' Dad, is often reported as Dave Evans*)

**The second Whisper, October 81**, reported that the planned burn-off exercise on the reserve land at the end of Canning Close was attended by teams from all surrounding districts. It also gave a reminder that a permit was required for any burning off during the bushfire season.

The third Whisper, March 82, had only a short note expressing disappointment at the number who had not paid the \$15 subscription.

**The fourth Whisper dated August 1982** gave a run down on how the Brigade operates and ran ads for the sale of Knapsack sprays and for the recruitment and training of Fire Tender drivers. It also carried a list of five teams showing 79 Brigade members. (*When you consider there were only 120 residences in Wamboin I think this is quite a surprising percentage of active members*).

The sixth Whisper, Feb 83 recorded that the second Fire Fighting vehicle was fully operational and that both vehicles had been deployed during the Mt Ainslie blaze. There was a note that all residents should be members of the Brigade and carried a request for volunteers for week-end rosters.

**The eighth Whisper, Dec 83** congratulated the team from Wamboin who won the Phil Hardy Trophy at the Yarrowlumla Shire Bushfire Brigades Picnic Day. This trophy was for the team with the highest aggregate points earned on the day. (*My note: I still have my trophy for that day*). The section finished with a warning of the fire danger due to fuel growth. (*Next Whisper I will précis the notes on the Community Association*)

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#### WAMBOIN 15 YEARS AGO; From the Whisper, Dec 1996 Circulation: 500 IN MEMORY OF JOHN FINN

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"John Finn died late in October '96 after a long illness.

However, this is not about his death but about his life and his input to Wamboin. Many residents of Wamboin first met Finny when he drove up thier drive to welcome them to the area and to 'sell' the importance to becoming a member of the Bushride Brigade. In those days, Wamboin was a part of the Sutton Brigade however John believed that because Wamboin residents were mainly of a city background they needed a more formal training that was being offered in the Sutton Brigade.

Operating from the fire shed in Cooper road, Finny brought pressure against the Shire Council who were insistent that large area Brigades were the way to go. Finally, despite all opposition, on 01 July 84, Wamboin became an autonomous Brigade. The still utilised demountable was immediately set up as a headquarters at the rear of the recently completed hall and Finny started an intensive training program for new crews. I must admit John drove us hard in training. He realised our lack of skills, knew what was needed , how to do it, and what was the final aim. He somewhere along the way, inspired to a mob of townies to become a professional Brigade team.


At this time the total assets were two old trucks, and a fitted out ute which was on loan for very little money. Fund raising in itself became a full time activity. In February '85 through the Kowen Forest connection, John was able to secure the loan of our first 4 wheel drive vehicle - the Bedford 'Mr Whippy'. so called because of the bells in the wheels when paid ! Operations room staff were trained and a 'Canteen Committee' group were established. A brand new, fully fitted Toyota replaced the Captains Ute and the Brigade was up and running; But just in time..

Saturday, 02 March '85 a fire which had escaped from a Canberra tip raced towards Wamboin on a 4k front. The trained firefighters, the operations room staff, the ladies supplying meals and drinks from the hall, the teenagers who pitched in to help and all residents of Wamboin banded together as a team to ensure that when the last of the fires were extinguished on the Tuesday, no houses had been lost and no one had been seriously injured. We can thank John for that. As an after thought, this was about the only Tuesday night that John had let us off from training.

John continued to work for theBrigade giving his support in the setting up of the Wamboin Rural Golf Club which started life as a social activity of the Brigade. However his to fairways and greens clearly demonstrated that as a green keeper he was a Fire Captain. John continued supporting Brigade activities untill overtaken by ill health. He was made an honorary life captain of the Wamboin Bushfire Brigade early this year.

Looking back I see John as a leader with vision who not only could see the big picture but also personally painted a part of it. Farewell Finny, and thanks."

Now I'm not an environmental scientist, or an engineer, but it seems to make no sense to me that we still build these homes while we talk and talk and talk about being eco friendly, energy efficient and carbon footprints.

But it's the season to be jolly and to celebrate the end of the year, catch up with family and friends and enjoy all that Wamboin has to offer. Two inches of soft soaking rain has been a tonic. I have pretty pink and white salvias flowering, and rock roses, lavender, white daisies and herbs. The petunias are just starting to flower. Those roses that resisted my efforts with the mattock a few years ago are beautiful although some nasties have been amongst them. Seaweed sprays must be doing something but I think I'm being naive.

In the chook yard the girls have kept up their production and I've had large brown eggs for Christmas cakes and puddings. And next year we should have eleven mature ducks for Christmas dinner, but I doubt it. A kindly friend knew they'd find a good home here and in a weak moment we accepted. At the moment they're cute ducklings and loved by the grandchildren.

And so that special time of the year is with us again. I wish you all a very happy Christmas, and Wamboin houses bursting with visitors over the holiday period.....I wouldn't live anywhere else....and will I shop super sized again?....I shudder at the thought.
