The Fire Brigade, as everyone knows, does not discriminate on grounds of locality when it comes to putting out fires, and most people know that the Brigade also belongs to Bywong, which provides many of its members. The Brigade continues to be a major ingredient in the success of this great annual event, and the Brigade Captain David Cochrane took part in the planning operation at last month's Community meeting.

Boot Sale: At its February meeting the Committee was able to check that preparations were going according to plan. This year we plan to move more of the Community presence into the Hall enclosure, and ensure that suitable locations are provided for our community supporters such as Landcare, Gearys Gap Pony Club, Wildcare and the Rural Fire Service.

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Councillor's Corner

LEP Maps — I have recently augmented the LEP section of my website (http://peteharrison.id.au/lep) with updated drafts of the various maps that are used in conjunction with the Palerang LEP. There are also a couple of new ones there, including: Flood planning, Heritage, Land acquisition, Watercourse. At this stage, the Flood Planning and Land Acquisition maps only apply to the Bungendore area, but the Heritage map identifies all of the built and natural heritage throughout the shire that is controlled through the Local Environmental Plan. With the increased interest in water conservation, the Watercourse map also identifies all of the watercourses and reservoirs that are recognised in Palerang in this context.

Dual Occupancies — There's been another change on the Dual Occupancy/Secondary Dwelling front. It turns out that the provisions surrounding Secondary Dwellings were primarily intended to simplify the approvals process for 'granny flat' style developments, and were inappropriate for the full blown style of second dwelling that Council had embraced with their recent changes to the relevant clauses of the draft PLEP.

Following advice from the Department of Planning and Infrastructure, Council has essentially reverted to the previous arrangement of allowing Dual Occupancy development, but now with an additional clause that restricts subdivision of such developments in the rural and environmental zones, including the E4 zone that will be applicable to rural residential areas. The size restriction that previously applied to Dual Occupancy developments has also been removed.

WAMBOIN 15 YEARS AGO From the Whisper, March 1997 Circulation: 500

From the Wamboin Community Association President's Report: "WCA members, along with Council staff and Councillors attended a site meeting at the hall on 17 February. The intention of the meeting was to identify problems and discuss improvements in the areas of works, services, planning issues, etc. Residents will be pleased to hear of the following improvements scheduled for Wamboin: sealing of the last gravel section of Norton Road before winter, an extension of the upgraded gravel surface of Fernloff Road, sealing at the intersection with Norton, and adding the Wamboin oval to Council's mowing programme for spring '97. Council has made available \$5,000 to the Pony Club. A further \$12,000 is available to the Wamboin Community Hall for capital improvements, this amount being the last of the Section 94 funds."

(1 September - 31 March)

THERE IS A <u>REAL RISK</u> OF UNCONTROLLED FIRES IN OUR AREA

PREPARE. ACT. SURVIVE.

So far, so good.....

Fortunately, the weather during the fire danger period in our area has largely followed that of last year – a cool, reasonably damp summer devoid of hot and strong prevailing winds. The 28-day forecast suggests a probability the conditions experienced generally across the Southern Tablelands these past couple of months might continue for a little while. That said, in our region, historically March is the most dangerous period for bush fire for this is when the fuel load i.e. grass, bush and leaf litter is at its driest. Our message therefore is - *do not become complacent*. Fire in the bush and in grassland can happen at any time and anywhere. As residents living in a bush fire prone area it is important that we all remain vigilant, and maintain and follow our individual Bush Fire Survival Plans.

SEVEN KEYS TO SURVIVAL

Understanding bushfire behaviour

It is important to understand the characteristics and behaviour of bushfires, which are influenced by vegetation, topography and climate. What do you know about bushfire behaviour?

Recognising days of high fire danger

Bushfires can be more dangerous on certain days. Learn to recognise the characteristics and terminology of these days. Do you know the signs?

Preparing your home and property

Even if your Plan is to leave early, a well prepared home is more likely to survive a bushfire. How prepared is your property?

Creating Bushfire Survival Kits

Kits keep all the things you will need together and accessible. Create: Relocation Kits (what to take with you); Survival Kits (what you need to help survive the day); and Recovery Kits (what you need for the 24–48 hours following a fire). What would you pack?

Considering your Physical and Emotional preparation

It's important to be realistic about what you can and can't do. Ensure you and your family understand fully what a bushfire can mean in terms of fear, stress and threat to personal life. How prepared are you?

Acting on days of high fire danger

Put your preparation and plans into action on days of high fire danger. What will you do on a day of high fire danger?

Writing and practising your Bushfire Survival Plans

Your plan is central to your survival. Have you got a Plan?

The above 'Seven Keys to Survival' is an extract from the CFS Fact Sheet 1.2. The messages are equally applicable to us all.

NSWRFS AIDER PROGRAMME

Aged residents and residents with disabling conditions in particular are more vulnerable to the impact of bush fires. Where someone does not have the capacity or support to reduce bush fire hazards, the NSW Rural Fire Service (RFS) may be able to help.

Assist Infirm Disabled and Elderly Residents Programme (AIDER Programme)

The RFS 'AIDER Programme' (Assist Infirm Disabled and Elderly Residents) is a one-off free service, supporting vulnerable residents to live more safely and confidently in their home on bush fire prone land. AIDER work is a once-only service and includes such things as clearing gutters, thinning vegetation, removing leaf and tree debris, trimming branches from around and overhanging the home, mowing or slashing long grass.

BRIGADE ACTIVITY

Callouts:

It has been a quiet period since our last newsletter with the Brigade being called out on one occasion.

On Thursday 2 February, just after 2pm, members' pagers were activated; two brigade appliances were despatched to a motor vehicle accident involving two vehicles on Smiths Gap – above Bungendore.

Community Safety/Education:

Following on from the successful "Fire Fighting for Non-Fire Fighters" community information session at the Fire Station in November a second workshop was held on February 4. Widely publicized with promos in the two previous editions of the Whisper and information on the community and brigade websites, WCA Electronic Notice Board and community blackboards, plus leaflets to targeted areas, the workshop was fully subscribed with 40 people pre-registering.

Again, Jenny Filmer from the NSWRFS Lake George Zone office was the key presenter supported by members of the Brigade including the Community Education team. Jenny's presentation drew on her personal experience and her more than 40 years of active bushfire volunteering. She addressed things residents need to know when they live and travel in a bush fire prone area and provided basic practical information to help improve resident resilience and be better equipped against the impact of bush and grassfires during the summer.

Following a short break, under the tutelage of brigade members, residents moved to the oval and spent time familiarizing themselves with basic fire-fighting strategies and techniques and operating several working examples of pumps, hoses, nozzles. Greg Simms from Bungendore Rural Supplies (BRS) was again on hand with a generous static display of pumps, hoses and nozzles and other fire-fighting products. He was kept very busy fielding questions and offering advice and suggestions to residents.

Several residents availed themselves of the Brigade's offer to visit their property to discuss their approach to property preparation and answer questions specific to their particular situation.

Thanks go to all involved including Jenny Filmer, the Brigade Support Crew and Community Safety/Education team and other members present on the day or who had loaned their mobile pump displays, Bungendore Rural Supplies and, of course, the 40 or so residents who elected to attend the workshop to soak up all on offer and share their experiences, ideas, and concerns.

have been won by one of the sponsors with a breathtaking 76/62 but, as is tradition, this sponsor declined the award.


Len Ivey took out first with a 82/67, second was Matt O'Brien with 98/68 and third place was awarded to Tim Barter with a 82/70.

Telecommunications: Meet with the Pollies: Sustaining Our Towns and PLANS will cohost a Public Meeting on Wednesday 28th March 7pm at Bungendore Council Chambers with Dr Mike Kelly MP and Mr John Barilaro MP (subject to approval of parliamentary leave) attending.

This meeting will be the launch of the SOT/PLANS Report on Remote Work Options around the ACT. Residents at Captains Flat will be able to join the meeting via a Skype link. Contact the Captains Flat Community Association for further information.

Travelling cinema coming to a hall near you: From May through to October 2012 PLANS is finalizing the logistics to bring three programs of films with the theme 'Cool Futures' to community halls throughout Palerang. The first program which we hope to run in April-May is a family-friendly series of animations and short films. We have already agreed to work with the community associations in Wamboin and Captain's Flat to co-host the Travelling Cinema and are looking for interested community groups in other locations throughout Palerang to co-host with us. Portable projection equipment will be provided

along with the program of films, hall fees and advertising. We just need help to host the evening in your community. The Travelling cinema will be at Wamboin community hall Bingley Way on Friday 4th May at 6pm. Entry by gold coin donation.

PLANS is the Land for Wildlife Regional Provider: Land for Wildlife is a non-binding agreement for a landholder to aim for best management of their native vegetation, with support provided by the program, with membership indicated by a green diamond sign on the property gate. In 2011 we had a successful trial of the program in Wamboin and Bywong with fifteen properties joining the program. We have just confirmed funding to continue the program into 2012 in Bywong and Wamboin, and will be considering a second area within Palerang to initiate the program in. We would be interested in hearing from Landcare or other community groups who think there may be a significant interest in their area.

DIY Home Energy Monitoring Kits in Palerang libraries: Sustaining Our Towns and PLANS have provided Do It Yourself Kits to Braidwood, Bungendore and Queanbeyan libraries for borrowing. The kits include a simple appliance energy consumption monitor that plugs into a power point between your appliance and your supply. There is also an infra-red laser that you can use to identify hot/cold spots around the house (gaps in your insulation?), and a room-by-room guide to ways to cut your home energy bill.

Sustaining Our Towns and PLANS are funded through the NSW Government's Environmental Trust.



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LET'S SHOUT ABOUT THE WHISPER

Continuing my efforts of looking back at the beginning of local Wamboin groups as recorded by the first 8 copies of The Whisper.

The Community Association (WCA). I stress that the following information as regards The Wamboin Community Association is made with sole reference to the first eight copies of The Wamboin Whisper.

The first Whisper, dated July 81, reported that 'the next meeting of the Wamboin Community Association is planned for Wed 22 July'. This was followed by a request for any resident who has 'any points which need to be raised' should contact either Ray Pennay or John Finn.

The second Whisper dated October 81, reported a meeting which was held at the Fire-shed in Cooper Road. A committee was elected to represent community matters and to take action as required. The first committee members were: James Armstrong, Ross Clay, John Finn, Derek Gough, John Geenwell, Hugh Logue, Ray Pennay, Bob Shelley and Ian Woonten.

No. 3 Whisper dated March 1982 noted that the WCA had successfully requested for the improvement to the Sutton/Norton Road junction. Also reported was the decision to hold a public meeting at the Bingley Way Community Site on 3 April 1982. As well as being a social occasion the new Constitution would be circulated and an election of office bearers would take place.

No. 4 dated August 1982 stated in the heading that The Wamboin Whisper was '*The official organ of the Wamboin Community Association*'. The WCA were fairly busy, organising a tree planting in the recreation area and working on plans for the funding and construction of a Community Hall.

No. 5 dated December 1982 invited all residents and friends to the Bingley Road Site for Carol Singing. The evening being to support the Salvation Army. The selling of pine Christmas trees to raise funds for the WCA was also suggested. A New Years Eve get together at the Woontons was also advertised.

No. 6 dated February 1983 spelled out the aim of the Whisper. 'To promulgate matters of mutual interest with particular reference to what your elected Community Association Executive is doing on behalf of all of us to further our common interest and welfare'. (Sounds good to me. LM).

The elected members of the WCA were as follows: President: John Finn, Vice-Pres: Derek Gough, Secretary: Ray Pennay, Members: Ross Clay, Bob White, Jim Braidwood, Cheryl Shelly, Robin Heron, Ian Woonton, Pam Padovan, James Lorimer and James Armstrong.

No. 7 dated July 1983 reported that following a request from the WCA the Shire Council had agreed to provide two bus shelters. The WCA also formed a building sub-committee to work on the building of a Community Centre. The initial grand plan worked out to a cost of \$80,000. Since only \$12,000 was available it was obvious considerable variations would be required.

No. 8 dated December 1983 reported a successful Carols night at Wamboin Park and an invite to a New Years Eve Party at the Armstrongs. The construction of a Community Hall was again on the agenda. A 60 X 30 steel shed with a full-length veranda and concrete floor was the favoured solution. The repair and connection of an existing toilet hut was also mentioned.

THE STABLE DOOR



There's something immensely satisfying about picking blackberries...it'sa bit like fishing. I cross the creek in the early morning when the shadows are long and the grass is wet with dew, and I can pick a small bucket before breakfast. It's a time to just be, a time to listen to nothing but the tinkling rosellas against a background hum of bees; a space where you can let your mind empty before the clutter of the day. I remember with affection my country Nana picking blackberries in the gully. She'd throw a long, wide plank into the bushes, hitch up her skirts and wade in, defying the vicious, grasping thorns to emerge, triumphant, with a bucket of shining black fruit to make blackberry jam. I should make jam, but like the rest of the modern world I find it hard to defer gratification. I can't save them...they beg to be eaten straight away! Forbidden fruit always tastes better, especially when it's free.

The other day, after confidently announcing that we rarely see the noxious weed inspector, he paid us a visit. He was a very pleasant chap but we were nevertheless glad that we'd sprayed the St John's Wort and had grubbed out many of the other plants on the unwanted list. But we hadn't tackled the blackberries. The fruit was still green and shrivelled amongst the white flowers but it was full of promise. I decided on an environmentally friendly course of weed control. First I would pick as many blackberries as I could to limit the spread of this noxious weed's seed, then I'd assess what further action was necessary. I've done my best, so far, and I'll keep trying, but I'm not getting much help from my careless feathered friends.

It's a busy time of the year, dealing with the wonderful produce of our orchards and gardens. We've picked and eaten mushrooms, and recalled with a thrill the taste of real mushrooms. Our nectarines finished but then the un-netted peaches ripened. Soft, yellow and full of flavour they have been enjoyed by both us and the birds. In the days before modern netting, it must have been heart breaking to see a cash crop wiped out in one clandestine raid. Scarecrows and dangling bits of sparkle offered little defence against bird strikes.

I'm still waiting for summer to arrive, but with full tanks and a trickle of water joining the pools in the creek, I'm not feeling deprived. It's a bountiful time of the year.

I wouldn't live anywhere else....and perhaps if there'd been a few blackberry patches strategically placed around the House on the Hill to divert some of our elected representatives, their recent undignified spat may have been forestalled.

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
