Wamboin Community Association President's Paragraphs



Macs Reef Road WTS — My ignorance was showing through last month when I referred to a native title claim on the proposed WTS site. The claim was in fact an Aboriginal land claim under the NSW Aboriginal Land Rights Act 1983. My timing was a bit out too: the DA process will still take several more months to complete, due to the nature of the development, and construction is due to commence early in 2013.

Weed Identification — Following the recent round of property visits by the Palerang Council 'weed men', several people have asked about assistance with weed identification. I have discussed this with Council staff and the weed men (Neville and several Michaels—I did suggest to Neville that it might simplify matters if he would just change his name to Michael too) have indicated that springtime will be best for this exercise, with the characteristic seed heads being more obvious then. The current plan is for the weed men to come along to a Market Day in October/November with samples, and to then maybe visit a couple of local properties to identify weeds 'in the wild'. We will advertise any relevant details in The Whisper closer to the date.

With the three female councillors leaving and over-representation by an older age group, Palerang could do with some diversity! I urge you to think seriously about it.

"For me, one of the most rewarding and enriching aspects of being a Councillor is the contact with people from across the shire. At the same time I was learning about the parts of Palerang I never knew about such as Snowball, or Gundillion. I've watched movies at Araluen, got my feet wet in Captain's Flat, and clocked up kms on the Burra roads!"

Successful Councils Represent Their Community's Diversity

This statement appears on the page of the Division of Local Government (Department of Premier and Cabinet) along with a list of reasons why we need more diversity in Councillors. The elections for Palerang Council will be in September 2012

A good team is made up of a range of individuals with their varied strengths. It is 'interesting' work being a Councillor - at best the experience is challenging, rewarding, enlightening and most times- satisfying. With your specific awareness of you own locality you can ensure that its concerns are better represented. As a member of the Palerang community you will be an advocate for and become more engaged in the wider Local Government Area. This is 'grass roots' government - at the local level. Please give some thought to putting in for your Palerang community.

A couple of thoughts for you to consider are -

- the under-representation of women in Councils. While they are approx. 50 % of the population, only 27% of councillors are women
- the lack of younger age groups in Councils given the median age of the population is approximately 37. Councillors tend to be drawn from the 50-69 age bracket



TO REPORT FIRES OR SMOKE SIGHTINGS



Planning a burn off – notifications and other considerations

The Brigade would like to thank residents who have been doing the right thing with their planned burn offs and informing their neighbours and the local Fire Control Centre at least 24 hours in advance of the planned burn.

Outside the declared bushfire danger period (normally 1^{st} October -31 March) a Fire Permit is not required to burn off in the open. If, however, you do plan to light a fire in the open, you need to notify:

- o your neighbours at least 24 hours before you light the fire, and
- o your local Fire Control Centre (Lake George Zone FCC in Queanbeyan) on 6297 1840 during weekday business hours at least 24 hours before you light the fire.

Your thoughtfulness will help minimise neighbour anxiety and unnecessary brigade call-outs

Management, including containment of a fire originating on your property, is your responsibility. If you are contemplating a pile burn please ensure there is a sufficiently cleared area around the pile, that you are appropriately dressed, and have an adequate continuous water supply to contain or extinguish the fire. You will find that a pile that is no greater than 2 metres long, no greater than 1.5 metres high works best; it will be more manageable and produce less heat.

Should the fire escalate to become more than you can handle, don't hesitate, ring Triple Zero (000).

No Plan Dan



'No Plan Dan' – you've probably seen him – typically he's on the television news; always during the bush fire danger period – up on a roof in all his glory. Thongs, singlet, shorts, weeping hose; determined against the odds to quell the raging bushfire that is nipping and sniping and raining embers as it threatens to devour the house and, were he to think about it for a second, himself.

'No Plan Dan' hasn't really planned for the bush fire season. The RFS experience is that, 'sure, he'll tell you he has a plan, but it won't be fully thought through. It won't be written down.' He might have a copy, possibly even two, of the NSWRFS Bush Fire Survival Plan that the NSWRFS has been promoting and making available for several years, but they sit around incomplete or untouched.

It is really important that you prepare for and know what to do during a bush fire. Knowing what to do could save your life and the lives of your family members and pets. We need you to help protect

your community by making sure you are prepared and have a current Bush Fire Survival Plan.

Our aim and our hope is that there be not one 'No Plan Dan' or 'I Really Must have a Plan Fran' in our community. Do you have a fully thought through Bush Fire Survival Plan? Have you discussed it with your family? Please use the remaining winter months to ready yourself, your family and your property for the coming bush fire danger season.

Rural fire brigades including ours use winter to check brigade supplies, and make sure that all our machinery and equipment is in good working order. If your bush fire survival plan involves your reliance on taps and pumps and nozzles and hoses or other equipment and tools, it's a good time for you to do the same.

There is a real risk of grass fires this coming bush fire season because of the grass growth over last summer. Grass fires can spread rapidly, catching people off-guard. Ideally you should maintain short green grass around your house and buildings.

BRIGADE ACTIVITY

Callouts:

The Brigade received one call-out during June. On Saturday 9th June at 12.38am the Brigade pagers were activated in response to a motor vehicle accident on Macs Reef Road near Harriott Road in Bywong. The accident involved just the one car and a kangaroo. Fire crew attended in one of the Brigade's heavy tankers as well as the Captain in the Brigade's Personnel Carrier. Crewmembers returned to the Fire Station shortly after 2am.





Training:

Training activities in June focused on the use and application of foam as a fire-fighting tool; familiarisation of the foam system connected to the fire fighting pump on the brigade's tankers and, later in the month, area reconnaissance.

Hazard Reduction:

On Sunday 9th June, the brigade assisted a resident with a notified burn where some of the newer members of the brigade got to experience how much heat can be generated even in a relatively small fire; they also learned how effective a small amount of foam 'laid' between a fire edge and unburnt fuel can be in minimising the risk of the spread of fire to the surrounding vegetation.





On Sunday 16th June, the brigade joined Sutton and Gundaroo rural fire brigades in a hazard reduction exercise on a property west of Sutton Village. Unfortunately, circumstances conspired such that only a portion of the planned 10 hectare burn was possible.

In slightly better conditions, on Saturday 23rd June a Wamboin crew assisted the Bungendore Brigade in a successful planned burn.

Annual General Meeting:

The Brigade held its Annual General Meeting on Tuesday 12 June. In place of the usual practice of a number of people presenting discrete reports at the AGM, the brigade prepared an integrated Annual Report for 2011-12 with a view to providing members with a seamless picture and record of Brigade activity during the year. The Report is also a useful reference tool for planning and review purposes. An electronic copy of the Annual Report has been distributed to all members. Anyone else who would like to receive a copy of the Annual Report should contact the Brigade Secretary by email: secretary@brigade.wamboincommunity.asn.au with your request and provide your contact details.

During the meeting, President Ian Coillet and others acknowledged and thanked the brigade's supporters including the people of Wamboin and Bywong, and areas of Sutton that fall within the Brigade's area; the two Community Associations of Wamboin and Bywong, as well as the various businesses, individuals and other groups for their interest, participation, generosity and encouragement. Assisted by this ongoing support, the brigade continues to be in a sound financial position and has not needed to go to the community since 2009 to formally seek donations. While the past two relatively quiet bush fire seasons in the brigade area have helped reduce the drawdown on brigade funds, some of the key equipment items and professional services purchased during the year included truck-mounted plus portable fireground radios, pagers, Medium Rigid driver licence training, emergency oxygen kits, hose fittings and a map printer.

Thanks were also extended to brigade members for their commitment and support, and to the families of members for their support and understanding.



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KANGAROO MYTHOLOGY

Recent discussion in the *Whisper* shows that even people well-disposed to our resident wildlife may subscribe to some unexamined myths and assumptions about Eastern Grey Kangaroos.

One is that kangaroo populations can "explode" and quickly grow to plague proportions. This is a biological impossibility for a species that can carry only a single live young annually and where high infant mortality is the norm, 70% being a figure mentioned. Much more likely in this region and in the ACT is that kangaroos aggregate as they are pushed around by development or seek shelter from a lethal gun culture on surrounding rural properties.

Another myth is that there have never been so many kangaroos in the history of Australia (why not when Europeans were able to graze squillions of sheep on the same native pastures?) and that improved pasture and dams have prompted so-called "overabundance" (a value not a scientific assessment).

Bathurst ecologist Ray Mjadwesch spent two years exploring the data and the literature on kangaroos and makes persuasive arguments countering these myths. For instance he highlights a natural kangaroo growth rate of about 3-8%. This presents a mathematical problem for managers who suggest a 15%, 30% or 40% kill rate is a sustainable number (40% being suggested in the ACT management plan), based on questionable counting methods and assumptions. You'll find his whole thesis and research at www.kangaroosatrisk.net and a story in the June issue of the *District Bulletin*.

Ray found the idea of population expansion thanks to European settlement is widely held and self-serving. He shows that in fact after 20 years of "harvest" the industry keeps population numbers looking stable only by moving into new territory like SE NSW since 2004

What does the historical record indicate? He writes: "historic accounts generally describe the kangaroo as "abundant", "plentiful", "numerous," and provides a page of example, a few of which are repeated below.

1788 NSW Port Jackson "Kangaroos are very numerous here"

1790 Tench "They're sociable animals and unite in droves to the number of 50 or 60 together"

1802 Barrallie "The hills were covered by kangaroos".

1813 Blaxland: 8 mentions of kangaroo in 18 page journal, the party ate kangaroo for much of their crossing of the Blue Mountains

1814 Sydney Gazette "the immense forests which formerly abounded in the wild animals"

1814 Historical Records of Australia (1921) referring to Evans crossing the Blue Mountains "he saw numerous kangaroos"

1814 Cox "Timber thin and kangaroos a plenty"

1815 Macquarie [Bathurst] "On return we saw some Emus and Kangaroos", "We saw a large Flock of Emus in Princess Charlotte's Vale, and a great [number?] of Kangaroos, Pigeons, Quails and a few Wild Geese"

1818 Oxley "flocks of kangaroos like sheep. I do not exaggerate when I say that some hundreds were seen in the vicinity of this hill."

1819 Howden "Kangaroos appeared in great numbers"

1820 Oxley "tiring of killing kangaroos he might have hunted emus with equal success"

1820 Macquarie "We saw a vast number of the large Forest Kangaroos in this mornings Excursion"; "We saw and hunted many Flocks of Kangaroos in the course of this days Ride and killed three of them"; "In the course of our Ride we fell in with 3 or 4 small Herds [of kangaroos], some of which we hunted, and the Commissioner enjoyed the sport amazingly"

1828 Sturt "There were very many kangaroos, the intervening brush was full of kangaroos"

1831 Mitchell (frequent reference to kangaroos, including "...numerous pigeons and also kangaroos shewed...")

1833 Bennett "Kangaroos and emus were numerous"

1833 Cross in WA "numerous herds of kangaroos"; "kangaroos and birds in abundance"; "kangaroos and birds in great abundance"; "saw many large kangaroos on the plain

1839 Mitchell (numerous references to kangaroos, including "swarms" along the Murray)

1841 Bridle (1969) describesHall (Grampians) "kangaroos abounded in the forests" & "kangaroo soup, in its abundance, ceased to have any attraction for us"

1850s Wheelright (1979) describes HW Wheelright (hunter, naturalist and writer) as having, in combination with another party "shot at least 2000 kangaroos within a short distance to the south-east of Melbourne"

1870s Schumack "plague proportions" in the ACT region

1897 Saville-Kent "the larger species of kangaroo, where abundant, so seriously tax the resources of the Australian pasture lands as to necessitate that adoption of stringent measures to keep them in check", resulting in "the complete extirpation of the 'Boomer' throughout a large extent of the prairie-like tracts of Australian pastoral land on which it abounded previous to the advent of the settler"

Some historic accounts of kangaroos: (compiled from Marjorie Wilson OAM (2004), Auty (2004), Croft (2005) and by Mjadwesch (for this nomination)). Note: the author has not chased down source documents and personally sighted all of these accounts.

Ray concludes that humans have in fact displaced kangaroos. He writes of himself: "The author works as an ecologist, often out in the field, often in rural and remote areas, conducting flora and fauna surveys 99.9% of the time all the author can see is people, houses, roads, fences, paddocks etc. For 99.9% of the population, they can truthfully say the same 100% of the time. A tiny fraction of the human population, the author amongst them, can sometimes look out of the window and see kangaroos." Wamboin and Bywong residents are indeed fortunate to be part of that tiny fraction.

Councillor's Corner

Earthworks (again) — I had an enquiry recently about the conditions that had been imposed in relation to a new rural residential development. Seeking to take advantage of a contractor working in the area, the applicant had constructed an access roadway and building pad on the new property prior to receiving notice that their DA had been approved.

There are two problems here. The first is that, as a general rule, if you intend to undertake earthworks that require the use of a machine, there's a fair chance that you'll require development approval (although landscaping, gardening and paving are generally exempt) and, as such, no work should be commenced until the relevant DA is issued. The current LEP defines earthworks as "filling or excavating land to the extent that existing drainage patterns or the use to which the land may be put, or both, are changed, and includes the construction of dams and access tracks and the rehabilitation of erosion gullies by backfilling". That's a pretty broad definition.

The second problem is that the conditions set for earthworks in a particular situation can vary depending on the applicable Catchment Management Authority—the conditions imposed by the Southern Rivers CMA (eastern Palerang) may not be the same as those imposed by the Murrumbidgee CMA (western Palerang). Both tend to apply conditions above and beyond those that appear in Council's own planning instruments (LEP and DCP). The upshot of this is that it's important to understand local CMA conditions—they will all be specifically identified in any DA—before undertaking any earthworks. Don't leave this to a contractor—they might be familiar with the conditions applicable in one CMA, but not another, or they mightn't be concerned at all... At the end of the day, compliance is the responsibility of the property owner, not the contractor. In the present case, while the works satisfied basic Council requirements for an unsealed roadway (maximum gradient 15%), they did not satisfy the requirements laid down by the local CMA (maximum gradient 10%). These conditions were all laid out in the DA approval letter, a good reason to have waited for it before starting. The result was a requirement to seal the road, or build a new one, either option costing many additional tens of thousands of dollars.

To add insult to injury, unapproved development can attract fines that start at \$1,500, and invalidate your insurance policy. If you're not sure whether or not a development activity requires approval, check with Council first—it doesn't cost anything to ask.



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

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

It's always a rather special feeling, turning off the bitumen onto the red gravel road, driving through the trees and suddenly being home. We'd been away for several weeks, but home was still there, just waiting for us.

It was refreshingly different. We soaked it up.

As I was scratching through a scatter of yellow, orange and brown litter, crisp and soggy beneath stark naked trees, I came upon a memento of summer past...a champagne cork! Winter is a quieter, slower time in the garden. I read somewhere that the true beauty of a garden is that, unlike the chaos and messiness of normal life, it is a place where you have control. I have never been in control of my garden! I am forever one step behind, mopping up in its wake and hoping that the gods will smile kindly on my little patch of dirt rather than mock my feeble efforts. Perhaps it is being out of control that I cherish most in my garden.

It's always good to get away...but it's even better to come home, especially to a winter garden.....I wouldn't live anywhere else...and by the way, does anyone know of a holiday camp for ducks on parole? We might need a new camp next time.
