

Entertainment Centre? Thanks to Community funding and the technical efforts of John-Pierre Favre and Darryl Bourke, the Community has been able to equip the Bywong Hall with a permanently mounted projector and large roll-down screen, in addition to generous floodlighting which will make the car-park a much safer and more welcoming area. The Community hopes that these improvements will help make the Hall more attractive to local casual users and increase its overall use and versatility.

What's you interest? The Community's last meeting decided to introduce more topical discussions to its meetings, and to investigate the demand for guest speakers on matters of local interest. The Y canvassed the possibility of evenings focussed on future plans for Macs Reef Road, solar and wind power, water limits and dams on rural residential blocks, weeds and the threat of Chilean Needle Grass, status of the LEP, injured wildlife and snake handling, and lighting rural residences. If you have a pet subject of interest in our local area, please let us know – speak to a Committee Member.

Brand New Council. The Community congratulates all those who were elected to the new Council at the recent election, and to our new Mayor Pete Harrison, from our sister Association in Wamboin. We have nothing but admiration and gratitude to those who are prepared to give their time and effort to steering the ship of our local government. We are pleased that the make-up of the new Council reflects such diversity, both in philosophy and geography, although we shall miss the presence and support of our local Community member Anne Goonan, who did not stand for re-election. Thanks Anne, and we are privileged to still have you as a leading and dedicated member of the Community. Pity that no-one from Bywong put their hand up to take Anne's place – we hope we can do better next time.

New Rules. The Department of Fair Trading has accepted the Community's proposed new constitution, which has simplified many of the requirements, particularly in regard to membership. The membership fee has been abolished, and membership has been limited to a year, so that we can be sure that our membership is current. Yearly membership can be taken out, or renewed, simply by asking a committee member, either at the annual or other meeting, a Community function, or informally at any other time during the year. The number of committee members has been increased to enable us to spread the load, so don't feel backward about putting yourself forward even if you haven't a lot of time.

Wamboin 15 years ago: from the Whisper of October 1997 Circulation: 600

In his column "Yarrowlumla Council News", Councillor Peter Greenwood reported at length on the 3-week hearing of the Land and Environment Court to determine the case of Tiocliff P.L. versus Yarrowlumla Shire Council over Council's refusal to grant an application for a quarry on Mt Bywong above Sutton. The hearing commenced in Sydney and after 2 weeks spent a day touring the site and local community area, 2 hearing days in Queanbeyan Court, then back to Sydney for the final days. Peter attended 4 days of the last hearing week.

In addition to exhaustive studies by Council staff and independent consultants' reports, Peter wrote, "I cannot praise highly enough the Sutton and Geary's Gap Community, who not only submitted many expert reports, but also attended the hearing both in the stand and in actually cross examining the applicant's experts.......It was extremely pleasing to see how the community group worked so well and so closely with Council staff to defend the Council's decision. It was a valuable lesson not only to me but to all those involved to demonstrate the difficult circumstances in which Council must operate when making controversial decisions."

......."In closing this report I must mention that Council is not anti-development and on many occasions has approved quarries, but in areas where it did not have the adverse impact of the current proposal." -- Peter Greenwood, Councillor.

Caza's Garden

What was an uncultivated bush block at **194 Denley Drive, Wamboin** just twenty years ago is now a beautifully designed and flowing garden featuring gorgeous vistas through the property and down to a lovely dam.

Garden owners Kevin and Carol Bell describe their garden as a team effort – Kevin came up with 'the big picture' and created the beds, while Carol did the planting.

"We have done all the hard yards ourselves, from garden edging to making the ponds, pathways, the pergola and arbour, the adobe features, and all of the steel and metal features throughout the garden," says Kevin.

Paths wind through beds full of thriving Australian natives, including wattles, banksias, callistemons and wax flowers. Other lovely features include a 23-year-old weeping cherry, camellias, Japanese maples, and a small fernery under the shade of a pittosporum.

There are five ponds, which start at the back of the house and lead down a granite pathway through a pretty wisteria-covered arbour. Light refreshments will be available.

FIRE PERMITS

With few exceptions, during the declared Bushfire Danger Period a fire permit is required for any fire in the open. FIRE PERMITS

We're now in the declared bush fire danger period for 2012-2013. With few specific exceptions, fires cannot be lit or maintained in the open without a permit.

If you are intending to dispose of green waste by fire and you can't wait until next winter to burn it, you'll need to arrange for a burn permit. Authorised (volunteer) members of the NSW Rural Fire Service can inspect your property, and if satisfied that disposal by fire can be managed safely by the property owner or resident, they can issue a burn permit.

Please be aware that permits cannot usually be provided at short notice and anyone wishing to obtain a permit should make arrangements well in advance of the proposed burn.


You must make

important decisions before the fire season

- Your Bush Fire Survival Plan is one of the best ways to help improve the safety of you and your family before the impact of, or during a bush fire.
- Preparation is not just about cleaning up around the house and having a plan. It is also about making sure you consider your physical, mental and emotional preparedness. Prepare yourself and your family for bush fires.

starts.	Regardless of your decision to Leave Early or Stay and Defend, you still need to prepare your property against the threat of a bush fire.
AGT. The higher the fire danger rating, the more dangerous the conditions.	 Part of knowing what to do is knowing the <u>Bush Fire Danger Ratings</u>. The Fire Danger Ratings should be your first trigger for activating your <u>Bush Fire Survival Plan</u>. The safety of you, your family and your home may depend on it. During periods of increased fire danger and when there is a bush fire in your area, it's important that you <u>stay up to date</u>. Information can be found in a variety of places and formats. For more details on what information is available visit the RFS <u>information during bush fires page</u>.
Fires may threaten without warning so you need to know what you will do to survive.	 The levels are Advice, Watch and Act and Emergency Warning. These alert levels are used as a fire spreads. During a fire, you need to follow your Bush Fire Survival Plan. That means you should have already decided if you are going to Leave Early or Stay and Defend your home. The safest option for you and your family during a bush fire is to leave early. Sometimes, things don't go to plan. That's why you need a backup plan. Neighbourhood Safer Places have been introduced for this reason. You should check if there is a Neighbourhood Safer Place near you and note it in your Bush Fire Survival Plan. During a bush fire, it's important you have ready access to items which may save your life. Find out what you should put in your Emergency Survival Kit. The heat from a bush fire can kill you. That's why it's important to wear clothing that will not only protect you from the heat but also from smoke and embers. Know what to wear during a fire to give you the best chance of survival. During periods of increased fire danger and once a fire starts, you need to stay up to date. Know where you will get information during a fire.

FIRE DANGER RATING



The Fire Danger Rating (FDR) is an early indicator of potential danger. It is an assessment of the potential fire behavior, the difficulty of suppressing a fire, and the potential impact on the community should a bush fire occur on a given day. The FDR is determined by the Fire Danger Index (FDI). The FDI is a combination of air temperature, relative humidity, wind speed and drought. When a FDR is advised, you need to take it seriously and be prepared to act. It should act as your first trigger for action.

The Fire Danger Rating signs for our area are located near the intersections of:

- Norton Rd and Sutton Rd (Wamboin),
- Macs Reef Rd and Harriott Rd (Bywong),
- Bungendore Rd and Joe Rocks Rd (Bungendore),
- Bungendore Rd and Summerhill Rd (Bywong), and
- Federal Hwy Service Rd and Goolabri Dr (Sutton Park).

Information During Bush Fires

During periods of increased fire danger and when there is a bush fire in your area, it's important that you stay up to date.

You can stay up to date by:

- Knowing the Fire Danger Rating for your area, especially on hot, dry and windy days.
- Look and listen for information on TV, radio, the internet, mobile phones and by speaking with neighbours, friends and family.
- If you receive a <u>Bush Fire Alert</u>, take it seriously and act promptly.
- Watch for signs of fire, especially smoke or the smell of smoke.
- Calling 1800 NSW RFS (1800 679 737)
- Don't rely on a single source for emergency information.

During periods of major fire activity, you can also check on the Major Fire Updates section of the NSWRFS website Remember – some fires start and spread so quickly that there may not be time for any warning. That's why you need to have a Bush Fire Survival Plan. A copy of the NSWRFS guide to preparing a Bush Fire Survival Plan can be viewed and downloaded from the NSWRFS website or, if you are reading The Whisper electronically, by clicking on the following link: Bush Fire Survival Plan.

Hazard reductions or controlled burns are part of the process of managing bush fire risks. You can find information on scheduled hazard reductions in a Local Government Area eg Palerang, by visiting the NSWRFS website and clicking on Current Operations then Hazard Reduction Burns or, if you are reading The Whisper electronically, by clicking on the following link: Hazard Reductions Advisory page.

Emergency Alert

During an emergency such as a bush fire, you may receive an emergency warning on your telephone.

The Emergency Alert system is a national system which can deliver voice message warnings via landline or text messages to mobile telephones. There is no need to register.

Messages are sent to landline telephones, such as home phones, based on the handset location. Messages are sent to mobile telephones based on the service address of the phone. In November this year this will change for Telstra customers where the message will be sent based on the location of the mobile phone. Other mobile service providers will gradually follow suit over the next 12 months.

BRIGADE ACTIVITY

Callouts: It has been a very busy period for we volunteer firies with the Brigade being responded to fifteen incidents since last month's newsletter. Five callouts were fire-related mostly in the brigade's area but also assisting neighbouring brigades in the Lake George Zone, three were 'good intent' calls or false alarms, and the brigade was called to seven motor vehicle accidents during the period.

Quite apart from the number of times the Brigade's appliances and crews have left the Fire Station in the past 4 weeks, emergency calls can, and do happen at any time, Mondays and Fridays were the busiest (5 and 4 callouts respectively) with Thursdays being the only day 'call-free' during the period.

Training: The Brigade attended three hazard reduction burns, one in Bywong, one at Stoney Creek and one in the ACT assisting the Rivers Brigade. A brief insight to the action at two of the three sites appears at the top of the next page.

'Get Ready for Bushfire' Information Session – Sat 15th September


The 'Get Ready for Bushfire' Information session widely publicised by the brigade to all residents in the brigade's area ie Bywong and Sutton (south of the Federal Highway) and Wamboin was held on Saturday 15th September at the Wamboin Fire Station. The purpose of the session was to help people understand:

- the risks of living in a bushfire-prone area;
- the responsibility they have to reduce the risk to themselves, their family and their property, and
- the need to predetermine and take action to survive a bushfire.

An instructive DVD (different from last year) was shown to further help guide residents and property owners on how to prepare for and survive the bushfire season after which the brigade's presenters highlighted the key aspects involved in preparing a bush fire survival plan. As on past occasions, the information/awareness session was complemented by a display of mobile firefighting equipment by local retailer Bungendore Rural Supplies plus working display of mobile pump and other fire-fighting equipment brought along by brigade members for residents to 'play' with. While the total number of attendees was small at 13 adults and 4 children, the Community Engagement Team was heartened by the positive feedback, and assurances by attendees that the session was a trigger for further action on their part.

If attendees needed a further dose of reality to the risk of their living in a bushfire prone area, at around 12.30pm, during general discussion and a question and answer period, brigade member's pagers lit up in unison with that all familiar emergency callout ring. In what would have to be one of the quickest responses ever from the Fire Station, the Captain had a crew of three firies on their way in one of the brigade's light tankers within a minute or so to support neighboring brigades tackle a bushfire near Hoskinstown.

This is a plea to our neighbours travelling out of Hogan Drive and Birchmans Grove. We live down the far end of Denley Drive and drive out past Hogan Drive and Birchmans Road every morning. At least once a week, approaching both these roads, residents coming out of the roads either fail to give way, give way at the last minute, or pull out through the intersection and onto the verge on Denley while we drive past. Nine years ago, the development on the end of Denley Drive added 35 new blocks to the road. 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News from WWOW -- The Wonderful Women of Wamboin

WWOW meet informally once a week over tea and coffee enjoying each other's company and meeting new friends. Over the last couple of months we enjoyed a variety of speakers.

In August WWOW enjoyed listening to a talk by one of our own, namely Sally Saunders. Sally is currently undertaking a 12-month intensive training program to become a guide at the National Gallery of Australia (NGA). So she was in the perfect



position to give an engaging and informative talk on the history of the NGA, the breadth of its collection and the vast diversity within its education program. Sally graduates at the end of the year, so we look forward to visiting the NGA and perhaps be lucky enough to be guided by our very own WWOW. The talent in our group is limitless.

Then in September, local lawyer Jan Leonard spoke to us about end-of-life issues. She said 'the law can serve us well if we plan ahead". We need to make decisions now regarding money, accommodation and any medical care we may require in our declining years. She recommended we have a General Power of Attorney and an Enduring Power of Attorney. "We are living longer than ever therefore dementia will affect more of us", Jan said adding that an Enduring Power of Attorney continues after we are incapable of managing our affairs. She also suggested we consider an Enduring Guardianship and an Advanced Care Directive. For more information search for 'planning ahead' on

And last week, local entity Chris Davies invited her sister Lesley Siegloff to talk about the evolution of nursing she has witnessed and been a part of over the last 45 years. Lesley is an associate dean and senior lecturer at Flinders University in South Australia but began her career as a registered nurse. So she is more than qualified to describe the journey of nurses from doctor's handmaid to highly educated health practitioner. Her talk generated much comment amongst our members, a number of whom were registered nurses. It was a great walk down memory lane but also an opportunity to acknowledge the academic and technological advancement nurses have achieved in health and science today.

Once again, we produced drainage bags for breast cancer patients post surgery. In the last couple of months we made 64 bags. One of us (possibly the author) isn't much of a seamstress but in August decided to have a go. After hurdling many difficulties eg incorrect tension, much unpicking, thread tangling and knotting, she managed to complete two bags and that was just sewing on handles. So take heart, anyone can contribute.

However, at the other end of the scale, two of our group with very nimble thimbles displayed a couple of stunning quilts they had recently completed. Liz Hendrickson must be the most prolific quilter I know. The pattern and colours in her quilt echoed those of a stained glass window. While Leatrice Behardien's quilt displayed an intricate series of panels depicting thirteen fairy-tale-type houses. Each panel took one month to complete.

At the recent Wamboin Bonfire Night, WWOW's curry stand proved as popular this year as in the past. In fact it was a complete sell-out yet again. 

DOG LOVERS


Dog Training and Behaviour course for Beginners IN BYWONG

A well-behaved dog is a pleasure to own. Spending a little time with your dog each day and knowing just what to ask of your dog is what this course will teach you. You will be learning about basic dog behaviour and psychology, as well as various obedience exercises, such as sit, drop, wait, come and walking on a loose lead. These classes will also discuss dealing with dogs and snakes and how to control dogs around livestock and wildlife, including advice on how to train your dog to avoid snakes.





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Mindless Cruelty Again

I know this is another kangaroo story, but it is one that should make us all sit up and take note.

Last year I wrote about attending a Wildcare rescue along Norton Road and discovering a dead kangaroo with a noose tied around its neck. There was evidence the animal had been dragged behind a motor vehicle. And whilst there seems to be few acts of cruelty to wildlife reported, some mindless idiot has done it again.

Three weeks ago a couple of good Samaritans driving to work saw a kangaroo with an arrow sticking out of it's thigh — munching grass on the side of the road near 840 Norton Road. Knowing that I am with Wildcare, they knocked on my door to ask me to have a look and see what could be done.

The kangaroo was a large male. And it had an arrow embedded in its thigh. It didn't seem overly concerned about the arrow but it was there nonetheless and must have been a source of pain and discomfort. My first thought was "what twit did this?" The likely outcome is the injury from the arrow will become infected and the kangaroo will go downhill from there until it dies. Optimistically the arrow will get knocked out, as it didn't seem to be deeply embedded, and the kangaroo might then recover. I did think about euthanasing the kangaroo with a licensed firearm, but it was not safe to shoot and it was quite mobile - hopping over the fence into the nearby property. Another option was Willdcare's dart gun, which can be used to sedate an animal, thereby allowing treatment to be given. I chose the latter option and left a note with the nearby property owner to keep an eye out and inform Wildcare if it is seen again.

As with last year's incident, the perpetrator is most likely a member of a local family who lives nearby. Perhaps you have someone in your family who owns a bow and arrow and likes to take pot-shots at anything that moves? Maybe you should quiz him (its got to be a him) as to what he has been up to and remind him that this is a mindless act of cruelty. Perhaps this is not the first time this person has targeted wildlife. Not surprisingly it is illegal to target wildlife in this way. And if you have any information about this incident, then you can contact the National Parks and Wildlife Service, tel. 6226 7166 and they can investigate.





You and Your Vote - An Analysis of the 2012 Palerang Local Government Election by Pete Harrison

The September Council election was the third for Palerang Council, the fifth if we include the two by-elections, and it's probably no surprise that things are becoming a little more predictable.

There are probably two primary contributing factors at play here.

First of all, our shire is maturing, after its uneasy birth eight years ago. In that first election, in 2004, many candidates were completely unknown to a large portion of the new shire, and attitudes within the shire were also probably similarly unknown to a large number of the candidates. In the second election, in 2008, there was clearly a desire for change, and most of the candidates were better known. Although certain idiosyncrasies of our voting system masked an accurate picture of community attitudes on that occasion, the makeup of the Council was more or less representative. Subsequent by-elections, however, confused the situation, so that once again we approached the 2012 elections with a level of discontent evident within the community.

Given the stability of the result throughout the count in 2012 (i.e. how small a role preferences played in the final result), it is probably reasonable to suggest that the makeup of the present Council more closely represents the balance of opinion throughout the shire than on previous occasions.

Based on the results of elections to date, it emerges that the shire is divided roughly 70/30, between those wanting more consultative and controlled development planning, and those wanting more planning freedom. With nine councillors, this represents somewhere between a 6/3 and 7/2 makeup and based on commitments made by candidates during the election campaign, this is precisely what we now have in our new Council.

It's worth noting, of course, that while Council deals with a raft of issues, and in many cases councillors are in accord with one another, planning issues historically tend to polarise views and expose councillors' fundamental philosophical differences.

The second factor at play is the voting system itself, specifically the option for above-the-line voting. Above-the-line voting allows residents to vote for a group of candidates, generally with a common social or political ideology, rather than requiring residents to vote (below-the-line) for a number of individual candidates. This produces a much more consistent, and hence predictable, distribution of preferences, since each above-the-line vote for a particular group yields the same sequence of preferences for the individual group members.

The results of the 2012 Palerang Council election are summarised, from the count sheets provided on the NSW Local Government Election website (www.votensw.info), in the adjacent spreadsheet.

In the 2012 election, 63% of the vote was cast above-the-line, up from 40% at the 2008 election, with the result that it was relatively easy to predict the result based solely on first preference votes. In fact, with a quota of 769 votes required for

automatic election, the ninth candidate was more than 150 votes ahead of tenth after distributing first preference votes, and that gap essentially remained constant throughout the count.

Moving on to the numbers themselves, for the 2012 Palerang Council election 8,469 of the 10,282 registered voters cast a vote, a slightly higher than usual turnout of 82.4%. Of these, 7,688 were formal votes. The informal vote rate, 9.2% (781), was relatively high for Palerang (usually about 6%), although some LGAs recorded rates as high as 16%. Reports from scrutineers indicate that this was largely due to confusion over how to vote, many people creating an informal vote by placing numbers both above AND below the line, and many others voting only for three or four of the ungrouped candidates, and thus not offering the five preferences required for a formal vote.

As it turned out, the allocation of first preference votes was a good forecast of the ultimate result. Listed below are the Groups and candidates that figured in the final analysis (the other 13 candidates have been omitted, not through any lack of respect but for brevity). Within the individual groups, the number of candidates with a chance of being elected could be determined by considering the Group quotas. For example, Group A, with 1.57 quotas,

could possibly have had two candidates elected, Group B, with 2.16 quotas, two and possibly three, and so on. Of the ungrouped candidates, the Ians, Marjason and Peters, with less than half a quota each faced an uphill battle, while Paul Cockram and Richard Graham looked a little more likely to make it across the line.

These were indeed the final 14 candidates in the count, and the last five were eliminated in exactly the order one would expect from inspection of the above table. David Holthouse was excluded on the 20th count, Greg George on the 21st, Ian Peters on the 22nd, Mike McColl on the 24th and Ian Marjason was then excluded as the lowest polling remaining candidate to complete the count. The only significant change in the order of election came with Ian Peters' exclusion, as most of his

preferences went to Paul Cockram (see spreadsheet) who then achieved quota ahead of Peter Marshall, even though he'd been trailing in most of the count to this point.

Of the other candidates, referring again to the spreadsheet, it can be seen that most of David Holthouse's preferences went to Trevor Hicks, staying within the Group as expected, and Greg George's were largely split between Peter Marshall and Paul Cockram, in line with the preferencing recommend by Group D for above-the-line and below-the-line voters. Although most of Mike McColl's preferences exhausted (only 30% of the Group A votes included a second preference), those that remained went mostly to Peter Marshall, again in line with the Group A recommendation.

In the end, Pete Harrison, Mark Schweikert, Belinda Hogarth-Boyd, Garth Morrison and Keith France were all elected on first preference votes, Trevor Hicks and Paul Cockram achieved quota during the preference count, and Peter Marshall and Richard Graham, while not achieving quota, were elected as the remaining candidates with the highest number of votes.
