

#### Wamboin Community Association President's Paragraphs



Well, last month was supposed to be my presidential swan song, but since we are yet to formally elect a replacement (I am assured that you will have a new correspondent by the December Whisper), I'm back again for an encore!

**Noxious Weed Control** — With spring fully sprung, and vegetation bursting into flower, now is the best time to identify some of our more common noxious weeds like Serrated Tussock. Council's 'weed men' will be in attendance at the November Home Produce Markets (Saturday 17 November) to help residents identify the noxious weeds that are common in the Wamboin/Bywong area, and to provide advice on how you can help to control these weeds.

It is the responsibility of individual land holders to control noxious weeds on their properties in accordance with statutory requirements. Often, noxious weeds get out of control simply because land holders don't recognise them. This is a great opportunity for both new and long time residents to familiarise themselves with the different species they are likely to encounter.

**Telstra Presentation** — With all the discussion about the NBN in regional areas, and delays in installing the new mobile phone tower in Denley Drive, we thought it was about time to again invite someone from Telstra out to talk to us. Chris Taylor, Telstra Capital South East Region Area General Manager (got all that?), will come along to our November meeting (Tuesday 20 November—brief GM commencing at 7.30pm, followed by Telstra presentation) to talk about Telstra's plans for services in the Wamboin/Bywong area, including mobile phone coverage, improvements in the current broadband network, and NBN deployment in our area.

Telstra's presentations have, in the past, been very informative, if not always providing the answers some people would like. This is nonetheless a good opportunity to find out what is happening on the telecommunications front in our area, and to gain some understanding of the technologies involved.



#### The Launch...October 7th

The lovely old rustic community hall at Sutton has witnessed many occasions over its long life and has many stories to tell, and now it can add a new tale to its repertoire.

On the crisp sunny morning of October 7th, the historic hall was converted into a chapel, filled with flowers and people celebrating the launch of the SRMD (Sutton Road Mission District), the merger of the Anglican churches of St Peters, Sutton, and St Andrews, Wamboin, and marking the separation after many, many years from the ACT church of St John's, Reid. Amongst the happy throng were well wishers from the local communities, former members, parishioners from St John's, and clergy and lay ministers who have led services in both churches for many years. Despite the broad smiles, however, there was a tinge of sadness. For 104 years, St John's has nurtured the Christian community within the vicinity of Sutton Road, and the strong links and friendships forged



will hopefully endure as

the SRMD moves into a new era.

Archdeacon Caroline Campbell and Dr David McCarthy led the celebration, with Bishop Trevor Edwards preaching the sermon. Local identity Bill Owen played the organ, and after the service, to the accompaniment of the popping of champagne corks, all were treated to a delightful musical interlude by Amy Shellard.

Moving from under the umbrella of St John's has been a long and at times uncertain path, but the congregation, "one church, two campuses", is looking to the future with renewed vigour and enthusiasm in an organisation more in tune with the rural communities. It was announced at the end of the

service that the Revd. Dr Peter Grundy has been appointed to be the locum priest. Peter has been involved with both congregations for many years and news of his appointment was warmly received. There are plans in the pipeline for some interesting / exciting events. Watch this space!

#### **Councillor's Corner**

**Property Identification Codes** — While this is not exactly (at the moment) a Council issue, it is related, and will be of interest to anyone who carries stock (even just a few chooks, a horse, pet lamb or goat) on their property. For some time it has been a requirement in NSW for owners of cattle, sheep, goats and pigs to have a Property Identification Code (PIC) when trading or moving these livestock.

From 1 September 2012, anyone who keeps livestock in NSW will be required to obtain a PIC for the land on which the livestock are kept. Clause 37 of the Stock Diseases Regulation 2009 requires all livestock owners/managers, and occupiers of land which carries cattle, sheep, goats, pigs, bison, buffalo, deer, camelids, equines (i.e. horses and donkeys) or poultry to have a Property Identification Code regardless of whether the livestock are moved or not.

**About PICs:** A PIC is a unique eight character identifier assigned by Livestock Health and Pest Authorities to properties that carry livestock. The PIC system allows for the tracing of livestock for disease and chemical residue purposes.

A PIC is derived as follows:

- The first character is the letter 'N', for New South Wales;
  - The second character is a check digit that allows computers to automatically confirm that the PIC is valid and has been correctly entered;
- The next two numeric characters identify the Livestock Health and Pest district;
- The final four numeric characters are your individual property number.

This code also enables the property occupiers to purchase identification devices, identify the property for movement recording and enrol in industry quality assurance programs.

#### Wamboin 15 years ago; From the Whisper of November 1997, Circulation: 600

As it was one of those routine months, with everything ticking along according to plan - apart from the delay in achievement of the new street numbering system - this little report has been revisited. The family name has been omitted this time, and it wasn't such a little event for them!

"A First for Wamboin": On 23 December 1982, the first true Wamboinian arrived - the rest of us being FIRST CONVOY or latter day immigrants. He decided to arrive during working hours (which of course is not the norm) while his Father was at work. He also managed to time his arrival when practically the whole of Wamboin was absent on various duties elsewhere. Fortunately his mother was not left totally without assistance - her 4 year old son was with her. Frantic telephone calls resulted in a National Institution having to close its doors as Father was dispatched with all haste, and various Ambulance services had urgent committee meetings to decide who was responsible. Father arrived home first and with the wide-eyed guidance of his son, a natural birth was accomplished. A police escorted ambulance arrived in due course to find Mother and new son well, big brother in awe and Dad...? "Shucks, nothing to it."

How many others have been born in Wamboin in the 30 years since this? It would be interesting to know.

The original report of this momentous event was in the Whisper of February 1983 - the Whisper then appeared only when there was enough news to make it worthwhile.

# PREPARE. ACT. SURVIVE.

Since last month's newsletter, the weather has been variable which is fairly much on par with this time of the year as the seasons transition through spring toward summer. Waking up on Friday morning October 12 to a good dusting of snow was certainly one out of the box. On the other hand, the weather conditions have led to the Fire Danger Rating going to High and Very High. Why? It's an indication of the concern that the NSW Rural Fire Service (NSWRFS) has with the heavy fuel (chiefly grass) load and the difficulty of dealing with wildfire in the anticipated strong, gusty winds we subsequently experienced. As we move toward the warmer months, communities to our north are already witnessing the outbreak of a worrying number of serious and significant wildfires initially in Queensland and northern and western NSW and then around Sydney. The Bureau of Meteorology's latest seasonal outlook (Nov – Jan) is suggesting a trend away from El Nino to a more typical summer. But the warmer weather in the months ahead can be expected to bring its challenges. Ours is a bush fire prone area; we each need to take heed and make appropriate preparations.

#### **BUSHFIRE SAFETY**

It is your responsibility to prepare yourself, your family and your home for the threat of bush fire. You need to make a Bush Fire Survival Plan and prepare your property to give yourself, your family and your home the best chance of survival. It's also important to bear in mind that the higher the fire danger rating, the more dangerous the conditions are expected to be. Fires may threaten without warning so you need to know what you will do to survive.

Your Bush Fire Survival Plan will help you take action and avoid making last minute decisions that could prove devastating during a bushfire. If you've taken the time and effort to prepare and practise your bushfire survival plan, well and good, all you need to do is ensure its currency. If you have yet to prepare your Bushfire Survival Plan, we encourage you to do so now. Last month's newsletter contained further information that you may find helpful. If you don't have a hardcopy of the October edition of The Whisper, it can be accessed electronically via the Wamboin Community Association website - details appear at the front of The Whisper. #### KEEPING YOURSELF INFORMED

Last month we highlighted several of the ways you can keep yourself informed during periods of increased fire danger eg taking notice of the Fire Danger Rating for the region for the upcoming day; looking and listening for information on television, radio, mobile phones, internet, speaking with neighbours, friends etc.

Adding to last month's article, the NSWRFS is on the Net in a range of ways these days, so if you have a mobile device such as an iPhone, iPad. Android, tablet or smart phone, information is available via:

#### **BUSH FIRE ALERTS**

Alert Levels are used to get messages to the community when there is a fire, using a wide range of mediums such as the web, radio and television. They are contingent on the understanding that bush fires can start and spread so quickly that there may be no time for any warning at all. That's why everyone needs to have a Bush Fire Survival Plan and be prepared to put it into action quickly.

During a bush fire, Alert levels provide an indication of the level of threat from a fire. You'll find these on the NSWRFS website and on radio and television. There are three levels of Bush Fire Alerts:

#### Advice

A fire has started. There is no immediate danger. Stay up to date in case the situation changes.

#### Watch and Act

There is heightened level of threat. Conditions are changing and you need to start taking action now to protect you and your family.

#### **Emergency Warning**

An Emergency Warning is the highest level of Bush Fire Alert. You may be in danger and need to take action immediately. Any delay now puts your life at risk.

For some fires, you may hear a warning message over the radio or television, such as a siren, or you may receive a text message or phone call. Other fires may start so quickly that there will be no time for any warning at all.

Bush Fire Alerts are not always given in the above order. If you receive a Bush Fire Alert, take it seriously and act promptly.

#### **BRIGADE ACTIVITY**

#### **Callouts**

The brigade was responded to two emergency incidents during the period (Thurs 11th Oct and Sunday 28th Oct) both of which were motor vehicle accidents. On each occasion the crews and vehicles despatched were turned around en route to the incident after having been advised there was no fire risk involved.

#### **Training**

Activity during October focused on the issues associated with fighting fire on a fire line; the criticality in understanding and observing fire behaviour and, in particular, appreciating the potential for rapid development of a line of fire when a wind change turns a flank fire into a head fire. In such cases, firefighters may have little time and space to find a safe refuge in the burnt area behind a suppressed portion of line, or an exit elsewhere before the fire overwhelms them.

#### **Donation from the Wamboin Community Association**

The Brigade would like to thank the Wamboin Community Association for the generous donation of \$1,700 in October made possible by virtue of the very successful and strongly supported Annual Bonfire and Fireworks night in September. 

#### The Henge at Sutton

Macs Reef Road has been here for a long time and many animals and people have lived along its hilly and stony sides. Hopefully enough of them not to mind some new company or some reminders of even older human constructions from other earthly places.

Robbie and Tracey Wallace know a lot about rocks, stones and making roads, so a road cutting through stony hills seems a good place for them to live and run their earth moving business with many powerful ways to move very heavy things.

Some constructions in the past took decades or even centuries to build. Robbie and Tracey and their equipment worked for four weekends in June 2012 to make "the henge" that lies on top of the last hill Macs Road passes on its north side before ending at another mammoth construction project, the Federal Highway. The world's famous Stonehenge was built around 5000 years ago and would have taken longer. Robbie has read that it was preceded by wooden versions, discovered by archaeologists in more recent times.

Robbie encountered the stones at a site he was working on a bit past Hall, but across the border, in NSW. He recognised their similarity to the Stonehenge boulders.in England. Tracey and he both thought they could turn this idea into something more real. They did it because they both have a fascination for the older "henge".



Robbie used his earthmoving trucks to bring the stones to Bywong in a series of trips. The stones weigh from 12 or 13 tons down to 120 kilos. They are not as tall as the more massive ones at Stonehenge, but many of them are around 2 meters tall. They are carefully arranged in a circle 20 meters in diameter, laid out with thought to Stonehenge's 33 meter ring, but without an effort to replicate its horizontal stones across the tops of the vertical ones. They concreted each stone into the ground under the eyes of a certifying engineer to make the henge safe for humans.

They like to enjoy their "Henge" at sunset, and have been able to take some stunning photos both at this time and also on beautiful foggy mornings. They hope to find ways that neighbours and people from farther away can enjoy being on a grassy tall hill with a circle of solid standing stones. Robbie and Tracey have applied to Palerang Council for a DA that will enable them to host neighbours and sightseers. The Council has already said they will

need to provide a disabled toilet and a regular toilet, fencing and a car park. They hope to place these a good bit away from the hill's top, because they would like to keep the solitary ambience of the stones and the grass and the hilltop as simple as they are now.

They are thinking about possible ways to make the stone circle available. Maybe open it on Saturdays or Sundays and buy a coffee van so as to offer something to people who come to the site by car, by motorbike, by bicycle or on foot. Maybe offer it for weddings. Maybe find local wineries willing to host a tasting and sales session on the hilltop. Maybe Macs Reef Road neighbours could come for a picnic. Maybe even a bonfire at the winter solstice.

None of these ideas are firm yet and the DA is still under consideration by the Council. 

#### **Fondue in Bywong**

Earlier this year a dozen residents of the area decided to form a gastronomy club for the purpose of enjoying a variety of food from all over the world and socialising. The format and idea of the club goes roughly like this:

Every 2 months a couple of the members cook and serve a meal for all the others (singles are welcome too and they can team to form a 'meal couple'). We meet every on a Friday evening at the recently refurbished Bywong community hall. The hall has an ample supply of crockery, cutlery and is fitted with a huge brand new gas/electric stove. In the cold winter months, the overhead gas heaters keep the atmosphere and conversation warm.



So far this year, we had 3 superb meals starting with a Coq au vin prepared by the Favres. Two months later we had a Lebanese feast consisting of a variety of Middle Eastern vegetarian and meat dishes prepared by Anne Goonan and recently Peter and Elli Zimmermann presented a magnificent Swiss fondue made with the real thing - imported Gruyere cheese. The meals have all been preceded by a succulent entrée - 'Pate en Croute', 'Assiette des Grisons' and a variety of dishes comprising Lebanese Mezza.

Deserts have been: 'Pears in red wine', 'Vermicelli of chestnut with cream and chocolate on a meringue base' (like Monte bianco) and a version of Lebanese Knafeh which was a white cheese slice accompanied by aromatic syrup. We believe that in the next few months, we will be treated to a

Scottish evening, an Indian affair, a kind of Italian pasta party and even an Ottoman treat. There would be nothing wrong with serving a leg of lamb with mash potatoes and veggies but nobody has volunteered to do that yet.

Following the suggestion of our celebrated 'Grand Fromage', chef Peter Zimmermann for the fondue party, we set 4 tables with a max of 4 people per table. Twice during the evening, after the entree and after the main meal, people swapped seats in a mathematical way (which seemed logical at the time but we are yet to figure out) and which allowed each member to spend at least one course with the different members of the dinner crowd.

The great advantages of such a club is that (a) You can hear each other talk across the table, a rare thing in most restaurants these days. (b) We taste food from all over the world. (c) We socialise and catch up with the gossip and.... (d) this comes from yours truly, the only TA member of the club, ...the yearly cycle cost is only \$25 for 2 people for the hire of the hall and their cost in cooking a meal. For that you get to eat at least 6 fabulous meals.

We think that such clubs have to be limited to between 12 and 16 people. Over that number it becomes too big a task. If there were a few such clubs around, it would make good use of our hall and its facilities and we could even look at swapping members around after a yearly cycle in a mathematical way which we have yet to figure out but which would allow a greater variety of meals to be had by all.

There is a need for a mathematician to join such a club as well as a whole bunch of epicureans.



I took part in my mother's funeral and we celebrated her life.

She was a new mother during the dark days of World War Two and went on to have a wonderful, fulfilled life. This visit was an experience rich with memories. I revisited the grand country home of my father's childhood and was amazed that despite the still glorious view, it had shrunk with time to almost mean proportions. And as I shivered in a biting evening wind I pictured life in those days... unreliable tank water, wood fires for heating and cooking, no washing machines or easy iron clothes, no fridge or freezer or convenience foods...somehow the romance evaporated. They no doubt felt they had a good life, a fine roof over their heads, a loving family, food on the table and a bountiful garden, but by our standards life was tough, mundane and at times pretty raw. But my nana escaped to her flower garden whenever she could, and in the end it is family, friends, and a purpose that matter most in life.

I've come home with a suitcase full of bits and pieces that I don't need, but I'm not yet ready to part with them because, useless though they are in my present life, they are nevertheless redolent with memories. And memories are a precious part of who we are.

My spring garden is tugging at my sleeve. It's time to lose myself amongst the weeds and flowers again, get my hands dirty and let my mind wander as I commit those images to memory....and remember other things long past.

I wouldn't live anywhere else....and I'm glad I'm living through these times..... especially in Wamboin!
