

Bywong Blessings. We can't think of a better place to be at Christmas than Bywong, so enjoy it! We from your Community wish you all the best, and hope you will join us for some or all of our activities in the coming year. We hope you will also join us in making some of them happen – or suggest to us new activities we could undertake which might be of interest to you and your family.

Clean Up Bywong. We have a good record for the annual scouring of our roads for rubbish left by passers-by who do not share our pride in country. Make sure your diary for next year reminds you of the clean-up on 3 March next year! The Community will also be looking at giving a boost to re-cycling by offering cash payments for containers recycled at the March Car Boot Sale. We hope that this might help to increase public awareness, and even lead to bigger things in the future.

More Rubbish. Just in case you were wondering, the answer is Yes" – our tip is back into recycling paper as well as bottles, even though this is not spelled out in the notices. Both are collected together, so all recycling can go into any bin in the recycling area, but it would be helpful to concentrate the paper recycling in the yellow-lidded bins, as this will protect it from becoming soggy when it rains. And if you're recycling cardboard boxes, crushing or folding them is going to be necessary to make best use of the bins.

While we're on rubbish matters, community members have been appalled to see locals arriving to dump their household rubbish in bins at the Bywong Hall. Similar anti-social behaviour has already resulted in the withdrawal of other bins in the Shire. The Hall Committee, after considering various alternatives, has reluctantly decided to remove the bins after consultation with the Pony Club, which pays for them. Hall users will in future be asked to take their rubbish home. **More local records?** We now believe that Macs Reef Road holds the record not only for the highest traffic flow in the Shire, but also for the greatest number of potholes. Wamboin Community Association member Keith France, who attended the last Bywong meeting, found support for a joint approach by Wamboin, Bywong and Sutton to try and achieve some action on this growing problem.

Not All Roses. Apart from potholes, Bywong appears to be suffering from other problems, two of which were aired at the Community's last meeting. One was the deterioration in the Australia Post parcel service, now offering minimal or non-existent home delivery services and unsatisfactory pick-up arrangements due to uncertainty between Bungendore and Queanbeyan and restricted opening hours in Bungendore for working people. Bungendore Post Office shares our concern. Complaints should be directed to Australia Post. Other residents have been bothered by shooting near their houses, which we may need to address on the general wider front of special rules for rural residential areas.

Local Tourism? We read with interest the proposals for public access to the Stonehenge type temple on Macs Reef Road. Might this be the future of the area – tourism "light". We admit that we do have relatively few places to visit in our local area, although we notice the Greenways are beginning to attract a few more walkers and joggers.

In the absence of any local regular meeting event in Bywong (apart from our annual and iconic Car Boot Sale), why not venture the extra kilometre and visit the Wamboin market days, where you can buy produce and other goodies, have a leisurely breakfast or morning tea, and talk to fellow citizens of Wamboin and Bywong. Market days are well advertised in the Whisper, and we're sure the organisers are open to additional sellers.

Next Meeting. Our next meeting is on 10 December at 7.30 in Bywong Hall, Birriwa Road. Everyone is welcome.

Summary of a Presentation by the Telstra Manager for the ACT and Southern New South Wales, Chris Taylor, at the Wamboin Community Association General Meeting on 20 November 2012

Created through a joint effort by John van der Straaten, Ned Noel, Pete Harrison, Peter Evans and Daryl Bourke

For several years, Telstra has considered building a new mobile phone tower in Wamboin. This has involved considerable interaction between Telstra and the Wamboin Community Association and Palerang Council. Several years ago, a Development Application (DA) for a tower on Millpost Hill was withdrawn after problems arose. A more recent DA, for a tower on the property on the southwest corner of the Denley Drive/Birchman's Grove intersection, was approved by Palerang Council in January of 2012.

Unfortunately, funding for the construction of this tower has not yet been allocated. By January of 2012, Telstra was dealing with heavy and increasing loads on its mobile network nationwide and had made the strategic decision to focus its budget on upgrading existing infrastructure to meet user demand and to keep network integrity. As a result, since mid-2011 very few new towers have been constructed and no funding is expected for new towers this financial year. Nonetheless, since Council has granted development approval for a tower at the Denley Drive site, and Telstra has adjudged the tower to be a viable investment, it is expected that it will be high on the priority list when funding is made available for new infrastructure construction.

With Telstra's strategic direction set for the current financial year, there is not a lot more that can be achieved by lobbying Telstra to support our case. Letters to politicians, however, or Telstra CEO, David Thodey, may assist our cause. While there are cases where local organisations have contributed to the construction costs to help override Telstra's budget priorities, these costs are around \$500,000 and the problem of a budget for on-going operational costs remains. A point that is often overlooked is that, since privatisation, Telstra has no obligation to provide mobile phone services to anyone. Telstra, like all other telephone service providers, provides services on a purely commercial basis. There is also no obligation, on Telstra, or any other service provider, to provide coverage for emergency services. Where they provide coverage, a service provider is obliged to provide emergency access to their network, but there is no obligation to extend a network simply because coverage for emergency services is not available in a particular location. It is not a "right" to have guaranteed mobile phone coverage.

Chris Taylor made a number of other points during his presentation. He also spent considerable time answering questions. The remainder of this article attempts to summarise these points and provide some additional information.

ADSL: The Telstra ADSL facilities, which serve parts of Bywong and Wamboin, are being upgraded to support ADSL2+ in December 2012. ADLS2+ 'land line' services can support transmission speeds of more than 20Mbps (ADSL supports speeds of around 8Mbps). The actual speed of the service, however, will depend on many factors, primarily on the distance from the exchange or RIM (Remote Integrated Multiplexer) (the length of the copper wire between your house and the exchange/RIM), dropping from over 20Mbps within a kilometre, to less than 10Mbps at 3 km, on a 'good' line. (continued from previous page) In-building Mobile Phone Coverage: For residents with a serious need for mobile phone coverage, a \$800 Smart Antenna can be purchased for your home. It can significantly boost a marginal mobile phone network signal. If you live in the northern part of Wamboin or the southern part of Bywong and if you are interested, phone Telstra on 132200 to receive assistance in assessing whether your location can benefit from this device. http://telstra.com.au/mobile-phones/coverage/network-information/smartantenna/index.htm

4G: Telstra will be rolling out its 4G network in the Canberra and Queanbeyan areas in 2013. The 4G network targets more heavily populated areas, supporting much higher data service loads, the primary growth area in mobile services. Currently Telstra's 4G is a data-only product. Voice over 4G is not yet part of the equation. http://telstra.com.au/mobile-phones/coverage-networks/network-information/4g/

National Emergency Warning System: Location-based mobile telephone warnings are sent using mobile telephone network data that locates the active mobile handsets in a geographical area defined by an emergency service organisation. Mobile telephone carriers issue the warning provided to them through Emergency Alert.


Telstra Help Lines: Telstra realises that locating its call centres off-shore has some drawbacks for users. However, nationally Telstra gets 7,000,000 calls a day, so the offshore call centres were the only practical/economical option. About 99% of these calls are handled satisfactorily by these overseas call centres, with only 1% requiring referral back to Australian Telstra officers.

Blue Tick: Mobile phones with the Telstra "blue tick" certification perform better in marginal areas like Wamboin and Bywong. An example of a new phone with the blue tick that has proven to be good in regional areas is the Telstra Smart Touch Phone. It is available currently at the Queanbeyan Telstra shop.

Wamboin Phone Disruptions: Lightning strikes are a fact of life in rural areas, and copper wire, where ever it is, attracts lightning. There have been cases where lightning strikes have literally blown hundreds of metres of copper wire out of the ground, not to mention the impact on the exchange equipment/RIM connected to this wire. Heavy rain also plays havoc with the ageing copper cable infrastructure. As the network migrates to optical fibre and wireless transmission technology, the impact of bad weather and lightning strikes will diminish.

NBN: The NBN is coming, but it is still unclear when it will reach Wamboin and Bywong, and whether optical fibre or wireless technology will be deployed in these areas. Across the country, in populated areas where optical fibre is used to provide NBN services, the copper wire network will eventually be removed. In areas where NBN services are provided via wireless or satellite technology, Telstra's copper network may stay but will only be used for voice services. Under the current arrangement with NBN Co, Telstra cannot provide any competing broadband service using its own infrastructure if NBN infrastructure, fibre, wireless or satellite, is available in a given location.



Getting a printed copy of the Whisper to Wamboin, Bywong and East Sutton Mailboxes costs a lot – and those of you in the list below pay a big chunk this price, month after month, in time, and, unless you do this work while walking or running or biking, in vehicle running costs. It seems reasonable to occasionally ask you for your views or your vote on the Whisper's delivery system (you). The immediate trigger for this request right now is that over time some residents have pointed out that the Whisper could save your time, the environmental cost of many vehicle kilometres and 1274 x 36 A4 sides of paper required for printed Whispers by moving to a pure or partial on-line system. Residents could just use the internet to view the Whisper at www.wamboincommunity.asn.au and, if desired, print it out.

Along with most of the CommunityAssociation regulars, I have learned to see considerable value in the current hard copy distribution system.

However, sometimes new or long simmering views about better ways to do things can be good ones. Nature Notes November 2011

The welcome rainfall of more than 50 mm towards the end of the month has spruced up the vegetation. And, with a bit more dampness forecast, it's likely we'll have a green landscape for Christmas.

Black Wattle trees (*Acacia mearnsii*) have been flowering along Sutton Road and, slightly later, into Wamboin. They are flowering so well this year that two trees I planted near the creek are mostly hidden in a cloud of cream flowers. This is a strange wattle, as it starts producing seed-pods from the previous year's flowering when in bud for the next season. The trees have produced more than the usual crop of seed-pods this year, but there won't be many left to ripen as the Sulphur-crested Cockatoos evidently find the green fruit delicious. The Gang-gangs feed on developing wattle seed-pods too sometimes.

Another planted tree, the red-flowered *Eucalyptus leucoxylon*, is providing a feast too at present, with Noisy Friarbirds and a host of Red Wattlebirds squabbling over the nectar-filled blossoms. But, it wasn't a good month for all of the birds. A pair of Magpies built a substantial nest in a large eucalypt near the house and were sitting on their eggs or guarding the nest for about a week. Then they were gone, after a few cursory inspections of the nest one day before it was abandoned. There are several Currawongs around and, recently, the occasional Raven has turned up, so I suppose one of them took the eggs.

The golden flowers of the Sticky Everlasting Daisy (*Xerochrysum viscosum*) are brightening up our roadsides, looking especially attractive where they are growing amongst the taller white-flowering Cauliflower Bushes (*Cassinia longifolia*). Unfortunately, seasons that are good for our native plants also favour some of the prevalent introduced weeds. This year, Centaury (*Centaurium erythraea*) has come up everywhere. One of its common names is Pink Stars. It's an attractive little plant with heads of bright pink flowers – but it's not one of ours and I'm spending hours pulling it out right now before it flowers. The hours of stooping and pulling have had one advantage though. I've found several patches of *Polygala japonica* in damp grassland areas after not having seen it for several years. It grows almost hidden amongst the grasses and has tiny purple flowers. It is in the same family (Polygalaceae) as the twining blue-flowered creeper, *Comesperma volubile*, which also grows here, and, at the moment, is covered in small green seed-pods.

One of the Eastern Grey Kangaroos here seems to have adopted a joey. Her own joey was one of the first to leave the pouch this year, and was already semi-independent. Then her mother appeared one morning with a small, paler furred joey peering out of the pouch. One of the other does, one of her sister in fact, seems to have lost her joey. So it looks as if it might have been rescued by its aunt. Wamboin is full of interesting happenings!


DOG LOVERS

The Wamboin Firefighter newsletter is produced by the Wamboin Rural Fire Brigade for the benefit of residents and property owners in the brigade's area i.e. the localities of Wamboin, plus Bywong and Sutton (south of the Federal Highway).

With few exceptions, during the declared Bushfire Danger Period a fire permit is required for any fire in the open. THE THREAT AND DANGER OF GRASS FIRE

The threat of fast-moving intense grassfires is a major concern this fire season. The fire brigade has warned residents of this risk on several previous occasions including in earlier newsletters, the community-wide information session the brigade held at the Fire Station in September and the monthly Brigade Information Shopfronts at the Wamboin Local Produce Markets, There is mounting evidence in our region, and elsewhere in NSW as well as in the other States that grass fires are problematic this year.

Grass fires can be especially dangerous because they start quickly and spread rapidly, catching people off-guard. They can be very hot and produce large amounts of heat that can kill anyone caught out in the open.

Preparing for grass fires

There are things you can do now to protect yourself and your property from grass fires.

The first step is having a Bush Fire Survival Plan. This will help you not only understand the level of risk in your area but also help you and your family prepare for it. Everyone's Bush Fire Survival Plan will be different, so it's important to talk about it with your family and ensure everyone in your house knows what your plan is and where you might go during a fire.

You should also prepare yourself by ensuring you have an Emergency Survival Kit, which you can use or take with you if a fire starts. Things you might want to include are a battery powered radio, a torch, spare batteries, first aid kit, candles, woolen blankets, emergency contact numbers and a bag for valuables. You can then add items like clothing, money, ATM cards and medicines if you need to leave before or during a fire.

Once you've prepared yourself, you should prepare your property. Things to consider include:

• Having well maintained firebreaks mowed, ploughed, slashed or even grazed along fence lines or around your home, shed and storage areas that can slow a fire's spread.

- Have a well-maintained area around your home, such as lawns, paths or gardens. Keep the grass cut.
- Seal under floor spaces to stop embers entering under your house.
- Make sure you've got water for firefighting, in case a fire is on your property. Have water tanks filled and connected to a pump.
- Have a diesel (or petrol) pump. Electric pumps won't work during a fire if the power goes out.
- Store things like fuel or woodpiles well away from your house.
- Check the access to your property. Ensure cattle grids or bridges can hold the weight of a fire truck.

• Make sure you've got adequate levels of insurance for your home, contents, machinery and crops or stock. Sparks from machinery such as tractors, slashers, harvesters, welders, chainsaws and grinders can start grass fires. To help reduce the risk of fires starting or spreading:

- Check machinery is free from any faults and mechanical defects that could start a fire.
- Ensure machinery is fitted with an approved spark arrestor.
- Carry a working water fire extinguisher or knapsack.
- Limit the use of equipment during hot, dry and windy conditions.

• Slashers shouldn't be used unless conditions are mild or are accompanied by an independent means of suppressing a fire.

• Grinders shouldn't be used unless conditions are mild or the surrounding area is dampened down to prevent an ignition.

These are just some of the things you can do to reduce the risk to your property. If you haven't already prepared a Bush Fire Survival Plan, the NSW RFS has a booklet that includes a template that you might like to have a look at. The booklet can be viewed and downloaded from the NSW RFS website at http://www.rfs.nsw.gov.au

What to do during a grass fire

If you see a fire, report it immediately to Triple Zero (000). This means the NSW RFS can get the right resources like firefighters and trucks there as quickly as possible. The earlier you report the fire, the earlier local brigades can get to it and start protecting you and your community.

The safest place to be during any fire is well away from it but because grass fires can start and spread so quickly, it's important you know what to do if a fire starts.

Grass fires can generate large amounts of heat, so make sure you protect yourself by covering up all exposed skin with protective clothing like:

- Long sleeved shirt and pants, made from a natural fibre such as cotton.
- Sturdy leather boots and woollen socks.
- Leather gloves.
- A wide-brimmed hat.
- A face mask or towel to cover your mouth or nose.
- Eye protection such as goggles.

Make sure you drink plenty of water to keep hydrated and be aware of your level of physical fitness. You should also be aware of the risk of heat exhaustion, heat stroke and sunburn during a grass fire.

If a fire starts, follow your Bush Fire Survival Plan. Monitor your local radio station for updates and check the NSWRFS website for advice and information at <u>http://www.rfs.nsw.gov.au</u>

BRIGADE ACTIVITY

Callouts

The brigade has been called to one emergency incident since the last newsletter. On Saturday 10th November just before midday the brigade responded to a report of a grass fire on a property in Macs Reef Rd. It appears the fire had been triggered while a resident was cutting grass on a ride-on mower. Although on this occasion the brigade's quick response vehicle was on scene within 12 minutes of the brigade being advised, the fire had quickly spread. The relatively benign conditions meant that the fire remained within the boundaries of the property but had conditions been windier this might have been a different story. With the later arrival of one of the brigade's heavy tankers (28 mins from time brigade first advised) and support from Bungendore Rural Fire Brigade, the fire was quickly extinguished.

While mowing or slashing grass is a good way to prepare your property, we ask that you be mindful of the risks associated with mowing. In a generally dry environment as exists at present, grass can easily ignite by friction if caught around moving or hot parts of a ride-on mower or slasher, or from sparks from an exhaust or the cutter blades in rough and rocky terrain. It is important to also consider prevailing weather conditions and the time of day you undertake mowing activity. Finally, there is a requirement under NSW Rural Fires Regulations to carry on the machine, or have in the vicinity, prescribed fire safety equipment i.e. a knapsack spray pump of 16 litre minimum capacity filled with water, or a fire extinguisher (liquid type) of 9 litre minimum capacity, or a dry powder type extinguisher of 0.9 kg minimum capacity.

Hazard Reduction

During the month three members of the Wamboin Fire Brigade and members from several other brigades in the Zone assisted Captains Flat Rural Fire Brigade with a critical hazard reduction burn on one of the hilltops overlooking the Captains Flat township. The aim of the exercise was to reduce the fuel load and risk of ember attack on the village in the event of a wildfire.





Training

We have already had a number of grass and scrub fires this season. It is in these circumstances that fire over-runs or burnovers most often occur. Training activity during November focused on the issues of safety on a fireground particularly in the context of fire over-runs. The brigade conducted safety drills involving all the vehicles. There was a thorough revision of the crew safety equipment on each vehicle including operation of the crew protection spray bars. Each vehicle's equipment operates differently. Over-run drills were conducted on each vehicle.

A trip to 'The Henge'

Residents who live along Macs Reef Rd and others who travel it no doubt have observed the strange but familiar grouping of rocks on a property at the junction of Macs Reef Rd and the Federal Highway. The property owners generously invited all residents along Macs Reef Rd and the fire brigade to a sausage sizzle on Sunday 4th November for a closer look at the rock formation. Naturally, many residents and members of the brigade's Community Engagement Team accepted the invitation. According to reports, more than one hundred people came along and what a great few hours it was for all marvelling and wandering among the rocks and meeting each other. Many of the residents also took advantage of the brigade's presence to discuss issues and receive advice and printed materials to assist them with their bush fire preparations. The brigade would like to acknowledge and thank the visiting residents and the owners of the property for the gold coin donations which were passed to the brigade to help fund its operations.


Wamboin 15 Years Ago From the Whisper, December, 1997 Circulation 600

Some of our present congregation were on the WCA committee at the time of planning and building the Hall; our association has been a long and happy one. Our first service was in the Hall on January 20th 1985, so we are among the earliest users.

Some of us remember the time when community user groups were rostered to clean the Hall. We therefore realise the work involved and especially appreciate what Joan Mason and more recently, Judith Evans, do for the community. We have frequently arrived on Sunday morning to find a note from Joan asking Saturday users to leave the Hall clean for the Church, and we know she has come very early some Sunday mornings to be sure it was in good order. (Services were at 8.15am then). Joan and Judith, the St Andrew's people thank you very sincerely.

The Church is unlikely to be completely finished by Christmas, but we will have our very first service there on Christmas Eve. In addition to celebrating the birth of Christ, we shall celebrate the gift of a Church building to the community. It is your Church, please come and celebrate Christmas there."

Footnote: Following that Christmas service, attended by 196 people, the building was returned to the builder, Wamboin's Ken Kelly, who completed the work and gave it back to us in time for February's services and its Consecration by Bishop George Browning on March 8th, 1998.



Councillor's Corner

Palerang Local Environmental Plan — Following some minor amendments by the new Council, the draft Palerang Local Environmental Plan (PLEP) has finally been certified for public exhibition. Council is now in the process of scheduling a series of public information sessions, to be held throughout the shire to brief residents on the new planning instrument. The draft PLEP will be released for public comment on Wednesday 5 December and the public information sessions will be run in the weeks immediately following (check Council's website at www.palerang.nsw.gov.au for details). The exhibition period is being extended to compensate for the Christmas/New Year break, and will run until Friday 8 March. Following a review of public submissions, Council will make any necessary amendments prior to final submission of the Plan for adoption, expected to be before the middle of 2013.

Given the public nature of the process by which the draft PLEP has been developed, it is expected that document will be generally acceptable as it stands. The exhibition period, however, is the first opportunity most people will have had to review the finished draft in its entirety and thus to assess the internal consistency of the document. As such, interested residents are encouraged to download a copy of the document from the council website and submit their comments before the end of the exhibition period.

This is the first major revision of planning regulations in some parts of the shire in over 20 years. The irony of the situation is that, just as Council completes this new planning instrument, the state government has announced that it intends to introduce a completely new Local Government planning system in the next 12 months. The planning system reforms would do away with Local Environmental Plans and Development Control Plans, the current mainstays of current Local Government planning, in favour of a simplified Land Use Plan. Anyone suffering from insomnia, if I haven't cured that problem already, is referred to the Planning Review website at http://www.planningreview.nsw.gov.au for details on the status of the reform process.

The more cynical amongst us might suggest that, since it's taken almost 12 years to get standard instrument LEPs in place (and there are still many councils that don't have them) any new planning system is hardly likely to be adopted across the board in just 12 months. Time will tell...


