



Car Boot Sale. Yes, it's nearly here again! While you've still got time, use it to negotiate which of your old shed treasures can go to the Bywong Car Boot Sale, and which have such sentimental value that they must continue to clutter up your shed. The committee is now deep into planning mode to ensure that the Car Boot Sale will be as good as or better than ever. Proceeds go to the Fire Brigade, who will be on display, and to other local groups. The date is Sunday 24 February. See the ad in this issue for details.

Macs Reef Road. The Community thanks all those locals who came to our last meeting for the consultation on a proposal for temporary closure of Macs Reef Road. We also thank our Mayor Pete Harrison for conducting the event, and Council's officers for a detailed and informative presentation and for listening to the concerns of affected residents. About 70 people attended the meeting to hear the reasons for Council's proposal.

With the help of a carefully prepared slide presentation and large wall charts and photographs, Palerang Director of Works Gordon Cunningham explained how Council could save both time and money on the major works needed to repair the hill section of the road by closing the road to traffic for about six weeks. We heard how a period of total closure could reduce the need for a longer period of single-lane traffic delays. Mr Cunningham and Council engineers were particularly concerned to hear from those who live on the hill and nearby. We thank all those who contributed to discussion.

The Community was very happy to host this event, and was proud of the fact that its recent gifts to the Hall – chairs, projector and screen – contributed to its success. We hope that this example of the value of a local residents' body might prompt more to join. Don't forget, it's free – you have only to ask!

We see this consultation as a welcome sign of Council openness and hope to see it continue.

Great LEP Forward? Another forum where Council is currently consulting people concerns the draft Local Environmental Plan (LEP). In our February news we advised people to have a look at the proposed new Plan. Apparently some of you did so, and have expressed concern to the Community about the rezoning of your property from Rural Residential to E4 Environmental Living. The Rural Residential zoning, however no longer exists in the new NSW State Government guidelines for LEP, and E4 is the closest fit. So most residents in the new E4 zones will find little or no change to their conditions of tenure. Most people seem comfortable with this.

As part of its community consultation, Council has invited submissions from people who fear they may have been disadvantaged. Those who are in doubt about how they might be affected may also seek a short interview with one of Council's planners to ask for specific clarification. While the actual classifications themselves are laid down by the NSW State Government, Council are looking for your comments on how best to describe them for our community. We encourage you to write to Council if you have concerns about their draft.

Young Riders in Bywong. Gearys Gap Pony Club, whose home base is Bywong, will hold its next Rally Day at Bywong Hall on 10 March. The February Rally saw a good turnout of forty riders. Elsewhere in this Whisper you will find a full account of the Club's activities.

Parcel non-post. Following the Christmas rush, when parcel deliveries at Bungendore Post Office ceased completely, things appear to have returned to normal. We note that Australia Post has even printed a smart new notification card, specifying that parcels may be collected at Bungendore, rather than leaving us to guess whether it is at Bungendore or Queanbeyan. While this is an improvement, there is still concern that our postpersons, who now operate out of Queanbeyan, seem unable, or reluctant, to deliver even the smallest of parcels to our boxes. The Community decided at its last meeting to raise the matter formally with Australia Post.

Next meeting. The next meeting of the Community is on Monday 11 March in the community hall at 7.30 p.m. We can't offer another Consultation, but please come anyway.

Sutton Road Upgrade

This title in the February Whisper in conjunction with the short contribution from the ACT government it headed surely takes the cake.

Good for a laugh, so long as Palerang ratepayers aren't funding the fiasco.

To a retired civil engineer like myself, the fantasy was little short of awesome.

Simply put, damaged stormwater pipes and 'inconsistent' subgrade material should not be a surprise during construction.

In the bad old days, before deskilling within government, the project investigation phase would include subgrade evaluation and testing ahead of the development of appropriate technical specifications, including selection of materials and of construction methodology.

This isn't rocket science – Australian flexible pavement practice goes bck to the 1950's and beyond, based on test track work by the then U.S. Corps of Engineers.

Make no mistake. This project debacle represents wasteage on a grand scale ... not forgetting the protracted 'inconvenience' to road users.

And the 'holding treatment' is not holding. If the pavement roughness gets much worse, Wamboin residents will need to be aware of the safety implications, as the pavement depressions can have the unwanted effect of throwing lighter vehicles into the wrong lane.

FIRE PERMITS. With few exceptions, during the declared Bushfire Danger Period a Fire Permit is required for any fire in the open. For further advice and to seek a Fire Permit, contact the local Fire Control Centre (Lake George Zone FCC in Queanbeyan) on 6297 1840 during weekday business hours. BUSHFIRE SEASON UPDATE

Thankfully, the intense heat and wildfire activity experienced across the region during January has reduced these past weeks but that said, there is no room for complacency. At the time of finalising this article, Sunday 24th February, there's been a welcome drop of rain but the Fire Danger Rating (FDR) is in the HIGH range. The FDR is an assessment of the potential fire behaviour, the difficulty of suppressing a fire, and the potential impact on the community should a bush fire occur on a given day. In our region, historically, March is the most dangerous period for bush and grass fires. The ground has warmed through the summer months and the fuel load, i.e. grass, bush and leaf litter is at its driest. Add a little wind and we have a nasty cocktail. This is a fire prone area; it is important that all residents remain vigilant and follow their Bush Fire Survival Plan.

Calling the Emergency Call Service – mobile phones



Occasionally, attempts by callers to contact the Emergency Call Service are frustrated when using a mobile phone. The following information on Australia's Emergency Call Service has been extracted from the Australian Communications and Media Authority (ACMA) website. ACMA is a government agency responsible for the regulation of broadcasting, the Internet, radio telecommunications and telecommunications. ACMA regulates and monitors the provision of emergency call services.

Triple Zero (000) is Australia's primary emergency service number and should be used if urgent emergency assistance is required from either police, fire or ambulance services. Triple Zero (000) can be called from any fixed or mobile phone and certain VOIP services.

However, the nature of mobile handsets and mobile networks means that in some circumstances calls from mobile phones are not as reliable as calls from a fixed network. Special roaming capabilities of the vast majority of mobile phones Triple Zero (000) mean that when you are out of your service provider's coverage area but are in another carrier's mobile phone network coverage area, your call will be carried on the other carrier's network. But, it is important to realise that if there is no mobile coverage, you will not be able to reach the Emergency Call Service via a mobile phone. Australia also has a secondary emergency service number for use with digital phone technology:

112 is the GSM international standard emergency number that can only be dialled on a digital mobile phone. Mobile phones enable individuals to call the Emergency Call Service from most places in Australia. As with the Triple Zero number, it is important to realise that if there is no mobile coverage on any carrier's mobile phone network, you will not be able to reach the emergency call service via a mobile phone, regardless of which number you dialled.

BRIGADE ACTIVITY

Callouts. February has been a relatively subdued time for brigade members when compared to the busy and demanding activity in January. Since the last newsletter the Brigade has responded to 3 incidents.

On Saturday 2nd February, just after 7pm, along with several other brigades in the Lake George Zone, a Wamboin crew responded in one of the brigade's large tankers to a fast moving grass fire in hilly country beyond Tarago. The fire burnt through several hectares of farmland and threatened a number of buildings before being brought under control. Our crew and tanker returned to the Fire Station at approximately 11pm.


On Wednesday 13th February, shortly after 12.20pm, brigade members' pagers were activated and crew in heavy and light tankers responded to a bush/scrub fire in difficult terrain on a property in Old Mines Rd Sutton. Other brigades also attended including a tanker and crew from the Sutton Rural Fire Brigade plus vehicles and crew from the ACT. Aviation support (helicopter and bucket) also helped quell the fire. Fortunately, the weather was relatively benign. Had it not been so, the fire would have been far more difficult to contain. It is possible that the fire may have been triggered by a lightning strike a day or so prior. The last of the Wamboin crew returned to the Fire Station at 5.45pm.

The third callout for the period occurred just before 4.45pm on Sunday 17th February and involved a single vehicle motor accident on the Federal Highway Sutton just beyond Geary's Gap. Other emergency services also attended.

Training News. There were two set training sessions during February. Early in the month the focus was on practising Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) and the use of the Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) that are now carried on all of the brigade's vehicles. The second training session later in the month focused on grass fires and branch (nozzle) work with a practical exercise that involved revisiting the scene of a fire that occurred in January on agricultural land in the heart of Wamboin. The session also provided additional experience for drivers and crews on the back of each fire tanker.

Community Education. Saturday 16th February - the brigade ran a Community-Wide Bush fire Information Session at the Fire Station. Given the spate of bush and grass fires in the area since the start of the year many residents who attended were keen to digest the information provided by the various presenters with a view to starting, reviewing or building on their Bush Fire Survival Plans. The 30 members of the community who attended the brigade-led information session were treated to an excellent presentation by a property owner who experienced first hand the reality of wildfire on her land in Cherry Tree Lane on the Lake George escarpment during January. Many thanks to the various presenters and to the brigade's Support Crew for

their time and effort leading up to and on the day. Our thanks also to Bungendore Rural Services for again supporting this brigade initiative with its display of fire fighting equipment including pumps, hoses, nozzles, fittings and tools.

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Nature Notes February 2013

After a rather dry February, the last few days of the month seem set to provide us with enough rain to get the grass growing and green again. The Galahs were enjoying the first few light showers a few days ago, hanging upside down from branches, flapping their wings and cackling their appreciation of the rain.

Recently a pair of King Parrots has been visiting my place. They were quite friendly, and came in close to the house for a feed of sunflower seed. I hadn't seen them for several days when Denise rang to say that there seemed to be three young King Parrots and an adult at her place, just up the road from here. Unfortunately, an unidentified raptor seemed to be keeping an eye on them. I saw the hawk here a day later, but it flew too quickly into the trees and out of sight for me to get a good look at it. I still haven't had further visits from the adult King Parrots so, hopefully, they are keeping an eye on their brood.

The Little Pied Cormorant that has frequented my dam sporadically now seems to have chosen it as its main residence. Most mornings when I walk down to pick up the newspaper it is either on the dam or roosting watchfully on one of the dead wattles on the dam wall. A few days ago, it was joined by a Long-necked Turtle enjoying some sunshine as it perched on a half-submerged log at the edge of the dam. And several times recently there has been a large White-necked Heron in the vicinity as well.

The rather shy Swamp Wallabies and Red-necked Wallabies here seem to be getting more tolerant of human presence and occasionally graze just down from the house. A female Red-necked Wallaby and her little joey have been here several times this week.

One of the resident (and definitely not shy) female kangaroos has a joey this year with a rather strange colouring. The fur on its back and sides looks as if it has been shorn short in places and is a distinctly reddish colour. The joey has just started emerging from the pouch, and the only explanation that seems probable for the strange colour is possibly lack of pouch cleaning on its mother's part combined with very hot days that may have caused staining or damage to the joey's fur. It will be interesting to see if the colour persists as the joey grows older. Wamboin is full of surprises.



Councillor's Corner

Draft PLEP — A number of councillors, myself included, have received communications from concerned residents following my article in the February Whisper. I guess that's good from a couple of points of view: people read The Whisper, and many have also taken the trouble to look at the new draft Palerang Local Environmental Plan (PLEP). There appears, however, to be a degree of misunderstanding about the intent of the exhibition phase of the new Plan, and perhaps to a lesser extent, the background to the new Land Use Zones.

At the risk of boring those to whom I've already written, I thought I'd provide a little more background.

First up, it's important to understand that the exhibition phase of the PLEP development process is not some sham of a consultation exercise. It is genuinely intended as a means of seeking public input on the Plan, and in the process identifying anomalies that have crept in through the various editing an amendment cycles of the draft document.

Next, since most problems seem to have arisen as a result of perceived land use restrictions, one must realise that only the land uses that are described in the dictionary (see p.91 et seq) of the standard instrument can be used in defining permissible uses in any particular land use zone. As part of the standard instrument, the dictionary cannot be modified. The fact that the terms in the new dictionary are entirely different to those in previous LEPs is at the root of many the issues that have been raised—in mapping land uses from the 1(d) zone in the YLEP to the E4 zone in the PLEP, there was rarely an exact match.

The omissions most commonly noted by local residents were the specific identification of grazing and bee keeping as activities that should be permissible without consent in the E4 zone. This appears to have been a simple oversight, and can easily be rectified by moving Extensive Agriculture, a land use that includes both grazing and bee keeping (see p.99 of the draft PLEP), from 'permitted with consent' to 'permitted without consent'.

Some residents have become overly anxious about this issue, extending the reasoning to imply that because [as it stands] consent is required for commercial grazing, they would not be able to keep a horse. At this point then, it's important to note that it is a general planning principle that land uses that are ancillary to the primary use of the land are permitted without consent. In this context, when consent is granted for a dwelling, it is also implicitly granted for ancillary land uses. In a rural areas, as are all the areas zoned E4, grazing of cattle, horses, goats etc., animal breeding, keeping poultry, bee keeping etc., which are ancillary to the primary, residential use of the land, are all permissible without consent. Obviously, if a lot is dominated by a particular, commercial land use, such as a vineyard, the primary land use might cease to be residential and consent may then be required for that particular land use.

Finally, it is important to note that the new PLEP will not stop anyone doing anything that they are lawfully doing now. Known as existing use rights, these rights are articulated in the Environmental Protection and Assessment (EP&A) Act (Sections 106–109B) and Regulation (Clauses 39-46). As subordinate legislation, a Local Environmental Plan cannot extinguish these rights. Further, these rights remain with the land and so transfer to a new owner on the sale of a property—no additional consent is required to continue such an activity.

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

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

TELEPHONE SERVICE INTERRUPTIONS – PLEASE LOG ALL FAULTS

Whisper readers who subscribe to the Wamboin Community Noticeboard on-line forum (see "JOIN THE COMMUNITY CONVERSATION" below) will have read over 40 posts in the last 6 weeks from local residents, discussing issues with our land-line and internet service in the Wamboin, Bywong and Sutton communities.

Ranging from recurring 6236 9XXX exchange outages to unsatisfactory internet performance, the issues are clearly causing some angst within our community.

A document outlining phone-number specific issues and general feedback was compiled by Pauline Chambers, based on feedback on the on-line forum. That document was forwarded by the President of the Bywong Community Association (BCA), Darryl Bourke, to Chris Taylor, Telstra's Area General Manager, Capital South East region.

If you would like your issue added to the list for submission to Telstra and you're not an internet user, please contact me on 6236 9560 and I will ensure your information is passed on. If you are an internet user but haven't posted details of your phone issue on the on-line forum, you can email me at aussiejb@yahoo.com and again, I will pass your details on.

Telstra's Chris Taylor has actively engaged with our community in the past, including bravely presenting to a 'spirited' audience at the November Wamboin Community Association (WCA) meeting (you will find the report of that presentation in the December 2012 / January 2013 Whisper).

Initial feedback suggests that the service history Chris might find in Telstra's service records doesn't support the perceived level of community outrage being expressed in the on-line forum.

Whilst some of the dissatisfaction expressed in the forum relates to the difficulty of navigating Telstra's fault logging processes, it is vital that a fault is reported to Telstra (or your third-party retail service provider) each and every time you experience a service outage or disruption - even if the service has subsequently been restored. The fault may be recurring and intermittent, so even if your phone is now working you can report the details of the recent service interruption and ask that you be informed of the reason for outage.

Telstra can only validate the level of concern being expressed by dissatisfied customers in our community by seeing the volume and nature of faults being logged in their system.

The recent 6236 9XXX exchange outages are a prime example. Starting in early January, there have been numerous intermittent outages of all 6236 9XXX services. The outages lasted from 15 minutes to many hours. Sometimes, by the time you managed to climb Millpost Hill or hang out your neighbour's upper-floor window to get a 1-bar mobile signal and dialled 132 203 (Telstra faults), your home phone service was back on and you'd hang up without logging the fault. A number of 6236 customers, including me, have reported that this is what they have been doing these past weeks.

The other issue I and others faced was actually getting past the Telstra call centre scripted responses. The first thing you are asked by the call centre operator is "have you unplugged all equipment attached to your phone line?". When you say that you are not going to do that because you've already checked with 7 of your neighbours and they're all affected, the call centre processes can struggle to respond.

If you are going to log a fault, it may be worth performing an isolation test to ensure that another piece of equipment isn't causing the fault. Then you can say that you have already performed such a test. Persevere - don't be intimidated by technical terminology or be put off by any initial reluctance to log a fault.

In some circumstances, the fault may be the customer's responsibility. Some examples might be a lightning strike which affects the line or connections within the 'customer-side' equipment, or electrical interference from other equipment in your home, or rodent damage to wiring. In these cases, Telstra's (or your service provider's) processes will assist in analysing the fault and determining appropriate resolution. Remember, the attending service provider can charge a service call fee if the fault turns out not to be on the carrier's side of the network.



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Macs Reef Road Upgrade to Start in Late March Based On Information and Drawings Provided by Palerang Council Written up here by Ned Noel

"As part of its 2012/13 management plan and budget, Council voted some \$1.125m toward the rehabilitation of Macs Reef Road, between Newington and Bankers Roads. Planning for this important project is now well advanced with site works expected to commence late in March and carry through into June this year – weather permitting.

"The scale of the project is likely to have some considerable impact on traffic movements through this area of Macs Reef Road and one strategy currently under consideration is the complete closure of the road between Newington Road and Bankers Road during the earthworks component of the project—a period of approximately six weeks from early April to mid May.

"In response to initial feedback from the Bywong community, Palerang Council will hold a public consultation session in conjunction with the February meeting of the Bywong Community Association, at 7.30 pm, Monday 11 February at the Bywong Community Hall, Birriwa Road, Bywong."

(The above words come from a council announcement that was provided for the February Whisper but was omitted due to a mistake on my part. As a second best "Plan B", the notice was delivered on Sunday, February 3, into 400 mailboxes in the areas judged most affected by any closure, printed in the Bungendore Mirror, posted on area websites, placed in the online version of the Whisper, and published on the Wamboin Electronic Noticeboard. – Ned Noel)

At the February 11 meeting Council's Director of Works, Mr Gordon Cunningham provided an illustrated overview of the project and engineering staff were on hand to answer questions about the project and about Palerang's overall construction program.

The general feeling at the end of the meeting seemed to be to support the 6 week closure on the grounds that it would lessen the danger of accidents on the steep worksite and shorten project duration. It would also allow allocation to core construction work of the more than \$100,000 that keeping the road open every day and night would require. This cost would be necessary to pay for traffic control measures during the construction period and, during the weeks when the pavement is removed from the slope, the time required each evening to prepare the hill for unsupervised overnight use and the time required each morning to reset the site for the day's construction work.


Mr. Cunningham made a number of points at the meeting and heard many questions and comments from an estimated 70 attending residents. These points were reviewed again at a later session at Council Offices on February 21 by the Project Engineer, Mr. Barry Osmond. He went over them with me for this article to help present them clearly and accurately so as to inform residents. The main points are:

- Traffic on Macs Reef Road now exceeds 4,000 movements per day, making it Palerang's busiest road, even busier than the Kings Highway.
- The section to be upgraded, from just west of the tip entrance to just east of Newington Road, is badly in need of this major upgrade.
- The upgrade will require a very significant funding package now set at \$1.132 million, put together from about 5 different buckets of money, including use of all of the year's NSW annual funding to Council for maintaining significant regional roads.
- Many other roads in council area are crying out for work which is overdue in any desireable maintenance program, but money for roads is insufficient to meet such schedules.
 - An overtaking lane would push cost to over 2 million dollars, so it has not been included.
- The final plans for Macs Reef Road's intersections at Newington Road and the Waste Transfer Station and at Bankers Road are still being considered.
- The 6 week closure period is meant to be conservative, making some allowance for weather and other holdups. Unusually bad weather or other unforseen problems could cause additional delays in this schedule.
 - Closure presently planned to start on Monday April 8 and run thru Saturday, May 18
 - This start time for the road closure is chosen because Easter week will have passed and holiday traffic will have ended.
 - Significant publicity and signage will warn of the closure and will be maintained while it is in effect.
- During closure school buses will be allowed. This is because rescheduling them would cause considerable inconvenience to families if schedules for 6 buses in the morning and 5 in the afternoon had to be altered and lengthened. The bus company will be in touch with parents about any schedule changes required.
 - Residents with driveways in the 2k construction stretch will continue to have access to their homes.
- After the closure period work will continue for a number of weeks, but the road will be open to traffic with traffic control measures as required. During this period extended delays for road users are expected.

Palerang Council, through Mr. Barry Osmond, provided for the benefit of residents the drawings and traffic count graph that accompany this article. (The map below, from Google Maps, shows the section to be upgraded. – Ned Noel)




Traffic movements on the road are now exceeding 4000 per day, with growth over the decades illustrated by this graph from Palerang Council.





Palerang Council has provided for interested draft engineering drawings of the upgrade for residents. Barry Osmond, the Council Senior Works Engineer who oversaw the provision of this information, did note that these are draft drawings, with some changes likely before they are finalised for the construction that will start at the end of March.

Because there are about 18 of these A3 drawings it seemed too expensive to print them in the Whisper. Instead miniature versions of most of them are shown here. The full size drawings are available at:



Included are ... Five drawings showing a "from above" view of the upgraded road's pavement and shoulders:









Eleven drawings that show "side views" of the upgrade. It starts about 20 meters west of the tip entrance. It will carry us into and up the steep hil. It will then take us down and up the varying levels between that hill's crest and past Newington Road, at which point the new work will finish.



Two other drawings show, respectively, (a) a planned cross section of the road's surface and a planned gabion wall beside it and (b) two cross sections of the proposed road in areas which have a substantial cut and a substantial fill.

As I sit at my desk looking out at a low, dark sky, listening to the soft patter of rain on the metal roof I am glad that I had a sudden rush of blood to the head this morning. I leapt out of bed and through bleary eyes scattered the contents of a long opened bag of lawn seed onto a bare patch of ground that had been troubling me for some time. A friend had confided that her Grandmother, steeped in Nordic myths and legends, had told her as a child that there are "fairies in the rain", and it had rained on and off all night. But it wasn't just the potential fairy magic that had encouraged me.

Over the past few weeks I have noticed a change in the rabbit population. Their behaviour had changed. They appeared both tamer and bolder. Then it dawned on me that they were probably losing their sight, suffering from Myxomatosis. Although I did feel some sympathy for the poor little bunnies, it did also give me hope that finally I might be able to grow some grass. I trust, however, that there are indeed a lot of fairies in this recent rain. Reading the instructions on the packet as I consigned the empty bag to the bin, it occurred to me that perhaps I'd overlooked a few vital steps in my seed sowing preparations and that I may need more than just help from the fairies. Hopefully the seeds can't read, and come from hardy, agricultural stock as well!

My vegetable garden hasn't happened this summer, but I have valued the fruits of other gardens. Last week at our market I bought magnificent capsicums, tomatoes, beetroot, apples and rhubarb, and a beautiful bunch of basil which put my few spindly plants to shame. But our ducks and chooks have started producing again, and suddenly I am into my recipe books looking for anything that needs a lot of eggs. Although I'm a "bit of this and a bit of that" type of cook, and rarely follow instructions to the letter, I love recipe books. Recipe books acquire a certain patina; like good wine they improve with age.

The best and most loved recipes are usually hidden between two glued together pages. There are smudges and spills, notes scribbled in the margins, measurements crossed out, bits added and countless scraps of paper tucked between the leaves with instructions in different hands; neat, flamboyant, hurried, cryptic. I claimed my mother's crumbling recipe books when she'd forgotten how to use them, and found a treasure of social and culinary history. There were names of aunts, cousins and friends attached to recipes, dishes and food that evoked memories of childhood parties and celebrations, references to cuts of meat no longer seen in supermarkets and handy hints that read like a foreign language. My mother would find a modern recipe book equally confusing! It made me stop and think, however, when a young friend said she got her recipes only from the internet. In a flash there was the recipe she wanted, and in a flash it was gone. Sometimes I use the internet for a quick recipe, but what a difference to thumbing through a falling apart book!

And as the gossamer like rain changes to a steady drumming on the roof, I am starting to fear for those fairies. Perhaps, like the lawn seeds, they'll end up floating away in the creek and someone downstream, like magic, will score a lawn.....but I wouldn't live anywhere else!
