



Hello everyone, welcome back. It seems that April was as busy a month as March was.



# **Lighting a fire - Quick Facts**

A quick guide to your responsibilities when lighting a fire or undertaking activities that may result in a fire

There are significant penalties if you light an illegal fire, or if your fire escapes and causes damage to property or the environment.

It is therefore essential that you are aware of the legal and safety requirements before you conduct a burn or use equipment that is likely to ignite a fire.

When lighting any fire you should ensure that you are wearing appropriate clothing, have a water supply available on site and that you have a cleared area around the perimeter of the fire. You must also use all practical means to prevent or minimise air pollution.

The following table provides a general guide to what you need to consider before lighting a fire.

If you require any further information, please contact the NSW Rural Fire Service or Fire & Rescue NSW.

Can I light a gas or electric BBQ on my property?	Yes	<ul> <li>Yes, as long as:</li> <li>It is under the direct control of a responsible adult; and</li> <li>The ground within 2 metres of the barbecue is cleared of all materials which could burn.</li> <li>As well as the following additional requirements for gas BBQs:</li> <li>It is on a residential property within 20 metres of the house or dwelling; and</li> <li>You have an immediate and continuous supply of water available.</li> </ul>	

This document is intended as a guide only. Exemptions may apply in some circumstances. If an approval or permit is in place, their conditions will take precedent over the above and following information.



The hall bookings officer apologizes to those who have recently been unable to access the availability calendar for the



**Blockade runners**. We are now well into the Age of Inconvenience sparked by the closure of the hill on Macs Reef Road. Early days saw a number of motorists still trying to drive through, despite the signage, but the periodic night attendance of a police car, which resulted in a number of on-the-spot fines with automatic demerit points, seems to have damped enthusiasm. Most people are now aware that the road is only open to the ten local residents and their visitors. Council has clarified this arrangement by replacing the "Local Access" signs with "No Through Traffic". We shall all be pleased when the closure ends, but most of us still feel it has been better than a much longer period of one-way traffic with long delays.

Meetings. The Community meets monthly in the Bywong Hall. All Bywong residents are welcome to attend and times and dates are published in the Whisper. Our next meeting is at 7.30 pm on Monday 13 May. We would hope that greater local attendance at our meetings might avert the rush of activity that occurred in the final period for comment on Council's Draft Local Environmental Plan, to which we drew attention in our last report. While this draft plan has been 'in the making' and open for comment prior to 2010, with regular reporting by the local press, other matters can arise in a shorter time frame and with less fanfare. We encourage locals who have items of interest or concerns affecting our community to bring these to our meetings.We are happy to host information nights and promote open discussions, such as the recent Council information sessions about the Macs Reef Road project.

The Wamboin Firefighter newsletter is produced by the Wamboin Rural Fire Brigade for the benefit of residents and property owners in the brigade's area i.e. the localities of Wamboin, Bywong, and Sutton (south of the Federal Highway).

# THE BUSHFIRE DANGER PERIOD <u>HAS ENDED</u>

Outside the declared bushfire danger period a **Fire Permit** is not required to burn off in the open. <u>But</u>, if you do plan to light a fire in the open, you must notify:

- your neighbours, and
- the Queanbeyan Fire Control Centre 6297 1840 (weekday business hrs)

at least 24 hours before you light the fire.

Your thoughtfulness will help minimise neighbour anxiety and unnecessary brigade call-outs.

Management, including containment of a fire originating on your property, is your responsibility. If the fire escalates to become more than you can handle, don't hesitate, ring the emergency number directly below.

## **BUSH FIRE SURVIVAL**

Although the end of the Bushfire Danger Period was declared at the end of March, preparation of your home and property against the ever-present threat of wildfire is a year-round (not last minute) activity. It is your responsibility to ensure that you, your property and your family are as well placed as possible to survive bushfire. In last month's newsletter we offered several suggestions of things to do in and around the home and property that will better place you and your family ahead of the next Bushfire Danger Period. ### **HOUSE FIRES**

#### Have you given your family the best chance of surviving a house fire?

Tragically, every year around Australia a number of lives and homes are lost to fire during the months. Although winter provides a respite from the risks and dangers of bush fires, it presents in the home due to the increased use of stoves, ovens, heaters, clothes dryers and other electronic

In last month's newsletter, we foreshadowed the prospect that with the night temperatures wouldn't be long before people started firing up their slow combustion heaters and open Given the smoke that's drifting from chimneys it's clear that many households are already feeling of cooler nights. In last month's newsletter we also indicated we'd provide some additional tips help you make your home winter fire safe and these are set out below.



- **Take care in the kitchen.** Never leave cooking unattended and always turn pot handles in (so they cannot be inadvertently knocked).
- Supervise children. Children need to be protected from fire, and from the potential for starting fires.
- **Heat your home safely.** Keep portable heaters at least one metre from flammable items such as curtains, furniture, toys, clothing and bedding. If you have a fireplace or slow combustion heater in your home make sure the chimney/flue is cleaned annually to prevent a build up of flammable material such as creosote, nests and other obstructions, and ensure the fire burns properly. Always use a fire screen in front of an open fire and close stove doors. Don't leave children or pets unsupervised in a room where an open fire or combustion heater is in use.
- **Hot ashes.** Take care and suitable precautions when disposing of hot ashes. Ashes remain warm for a long time. Residual heat deep in ashes can lead to an unplanned fire if placed on combustible material outside.

- **Dispose of cigarettes safely.** Wet down cigarette butts before discarding. Never smoke in bed.
- Electric blankets. Check that electric blankets are in good condition, with no frayed cords or damage. Turn them off when not in use.
- **Take care with electricity.** Have an electrician check the electrical wiring throughout your home. Keep your home appliances in good working order and don't overload power points.
- Lint filters in clothes dryers. Clean the lint filter of your clothes dryer each and every time you use it.
- Install a smoke alarm. Smoke alarms save lives! Make sure that your smoke alarms are less than 10 years old, that you keep them clean, and test them regularly. If battery-powered, replace batteries at least once a year. If you have been using April 1<sup>st</sup> (i.e. April Fool's Day) as your cue, the batteries should have been done last month!
- Plan your home escape. Create a home fire escape plan and practise escaping from your home.
- Use home security that lets you get out quickly. If your home has deadlocks fitted to doors, keep a key in the deadlock so that you can escape quickly in the event of a fire.
- **Check portable fire extinguishers.** Install a portable fire extinguisher and fire kitchen or other areas where fire is possible. Check the pressure gauge on the regularly.
- **Be prepared.** Know which fire safety equipment to use, know how to use it all family members (if they are of a suitable age) know how to use the equipment.

# Train Your Family in Evacuation Procedures:

Follow the escape plan (you do have one don't you?)

- Alert all others in the building.
- When there is smoke, crawl low to get under the smoke.
- Test for the temperature of each door by using the back of your hand; if the handle is hot do not open it.
- Close the door as you leave a room to prevent fire and smoke from spreading.
- Never go back inside the house, once out stay out!
- Meet at the pre-determined assembly area such as a prominent landmark.
- Make sure all the family know how to call emergency services i.e. ring Triple Zero (000); to think about what they may need to say and to speak clearly.
- If possible, meet the fire service as it arrives; you have invaluable knowledge that can greatly assist them.

#### Teach your children to 'Stop, Drop and Roll'

Advice to anyone whose clothes are on fire:

- Stop. Don't run as this will fan the flames.
- Drop to the ground and cover your face with your hands.
- Roll over to smother the flames. Further information on any of the above can be found by visiting the NSWRFS website at <u>www.rfs.nsw.gov.au</u>

#### **BRIGADE ACTIVITY**

#### Callouts

Since the last newsletter the fire brigade responded to 7 incidents.

*Thursday* 4<sup>th</sup> April at 6pm: the brigade pagers lit up and four members in a heavy tanker (Wamboin 1 Alpha) were despatched in response to an emergency call involving an alleged motor vehicle accident in the vicinity of the Federal Highway and Macs Reef Rd, Bywong. Despite an extensive search nothing was found. The crew returned to the Fire Station just before 7pm.

*Thursday 11<sup>th</sup> April at 12.45pm*: nine of the brigade's firefighters in four brigade vehicles responded to an emergency call involving a grass fire on a property in Donnelly Lane, Bywong. The fire was contained within the (well maintained) property and without damage to any structure. Last of the crews returned to the Fire Station at 2.45pm.

*Friday 19<sup>th</sup> April at 10.45am*: six members and two brigade tankers attended a fire call in Newington Road, Bywong and helped contain and extinguish a low-level fire working its way through ground cover in a small pine plantation.

*Tuesday 23<sup>rd</sup> April at 7.56am*: the brigade's pagers were set off and five firefighters in one of the brigade's heavy tankers (Wamboin 1 Alpha) departed en route to a smoke sighting near the intersection of Federal Highway and Donnelly Road, Sutton. Two crew in the second of the brigade's heavy tankers (Wamboin 1 Bravo) stood by at the Station. As the situation was already being dealt with on site, the need for the Wamboin tanker was cancelled; the crew travelling toward the scene was turned around and returned to the Fire Station at 8.38am.

*Sunday* 28<sup>th</sup> April: a busy day. As planned, the Brigade's maintenance working bee at the Fire Station got underway at 9am with members working assiduously through the brigade's fleet to ensure the vehicles and fire fighting equipment and supplies are as they should be and tackling the several other tasks identified for attention in and around the station.

All was going to plan until 11.40am when the brigade pagers lit up with news of a fire on Spring Creek Road to the south east of Bungendore. Due to the difficult terrain the brigade was requested to send its two light tankers (Wamboin 7 Alpha and Wamboin 7 Bravo) where the vehicles and crews teamed with several other brigades to help contain the outbreak that was burning in hilly bush land.

At 1.28pm, the Brigade was requested to respond to a report of a fire on a property on Macs Reef Road Bywong. Crew in one of the Brigade's heavy tankers. Wamboin 1Alpha and the Striker/Mop-up vehicle (Wamboin 9) attended along with units from the Sutton brigade, who had also been called to deal with the fire. Meanwhile, Wamboin 7 Bravo had been released from the Spring Creek Rd fire and re-tasked to Macs Reef Rd to assist.

While the Macs Reef Road fire was being dealt with, reports started to come in of a fire near the Kings Highway to the east of Bungendore. Several units were dispatched from around the district, including Wamboin 7 Alpha which had by this time been released from the Spring Creek Road fire. It was well after dark when 7 Alpha returned to Wamboin at 7pm.

With three significant wildfire incidents in our area in one afternoon, it's a reminder that while the fire season is officially over there is still plenty of fire danger for us to contend with. We all need to take especial care when working outside with tools that generate heat or trigger sparks e.g. grinders, mowers and slashers.

#### **Hazard Reduction**

During April the brigade was involved in two hazard reduction burns.

On Friday 5<sup>th</sup> April the brigade participated in a successful fuel reduction burn on a property on the Sutton Road on the edge of the Wamboin escarpment.

On Saturday 27<sup>th</sup> April Wamboin crew in two of the brigade's light tankers assisted Sutton Brigade with a burn on a property in its area.

#### **Councillor's Corner**

**Local Government Reform** — Some readers may be aware that last year, the NSW government established the Independent Local Government Review Panel (Review Panel) to undertake a review of, and to formulate options to improve the strength and effectiveness of local government. The Review Panel has released several discussion papers, the most recent last week, entitled *Future Directions of NSW Local Government—Twenty Essential Steps* (Report).

The Report draws on feedback from the previous discussion papers to propose a range of options for local government reform. The Report is substantial, so I can do little more than scratch the surface in the following paragraphs. Suffice to say that the recommendations are wide-ranging, and need to be considered in context.

The local media headlines immediately following the release of the Report, however, focused on one issue only—the recommendation for Queanbeyan and Palerang Councils to amalgamate. There is a much bigger picture here, however, and this is merely a recommendation of how one might strengthen Queanbeyan's position and create a more viable regional centre. Moreover, this is only one of many amalgamations recommended in the report, and while timeframes are provided for many, there is none provided for the Queanbeyan-Palerang proposal. It may happen, but at the moment there's no indication that it would or should happen before 2016 unless there was overwhelming support from within the respective communities.

Regardless, the initial focus appears to be the Sydney metropolitan councils. There are then 52 small regional councils [pop<sup>n</sup> 5,000-10,000] for which the Review Panel recommends a range of reforms, including amalgamations, targeted for implementation by 2016.

In order to encourage regional cooperation between councils, the Report proposes the formation of new regional County Councils. These would be more multi-purpose bodies than the existing County Councils, comprising clusters of Local Government Areas (LGAs) with a strategic regional focus. The current proposal would have Yass Valley, Upper Lachlan, Goulburn-Mulwaree, Wingecarribee, Palerang and Queanbeyan LGAs in the Capital County Council.

Included under the Review Panel's terms of reference was the consideration of the financial sustainability of each LGA, as assessed by TCorp (the central financing authority for entities in the NSW public sector) in a report released earlier in April. The TCorp report determines a Financial Sustainability Rating (Very Strong, Strong, Sound, Moderate, Weak, Very Weak, Distressed) and Outlook (Positive, Neutral, Negative) for the 152 LGAs in NSW. A rating of Moderate or better, with an outlook of Neutral or better is considered to be sustainable.

Palerang was given a Moderate rating, with a Negative outlook, while Queanbeyan was given a Weak rating, with a Neutral outlook. Only 34 of 152 councils in NSW had a rating higher than Moderate, and only five councils had a Positive outlook, with 73, almost half, rated Negative. A large part of the Negative outlook for regional councils is related to the infrastructure 'black hole', the inadequacy of funding for the maintenance of infrastructure like roads and bridges. In considering the TCorp findings, the Review Panel assessed that 70 councils in NSW were 'at risk' with respect to ongoing financial sustainability. Palerang is not one of these councils.

This is merely the tip of the local government reform agenda iceberg (without wanting to draw any analogies involving a steamer of dubious reputation). There are still as many questions as there are answers, and the answers that are there are still a bit rubbery.

I will endeavour to provide more detail as it comes to hand.

**PLEP** — Just a quick comment in response to claims made in a letter in the April Whisper. Anyone who has taken an interest in the activities of the WCA and read The Whisper regularly during the development of the draft PLEP will be aware that the subject of alternate land use zones for our area was first raised locally by Cr Goonan in 2010 (following a discussion paper released by Council in 2008), with a letter printed on p.23 in the April 2010 Whisper (check The Whisper Archives on the WCA website). Details of the different zoning options were added to the WCA website at the time and are still there today (see reference on p.14 of the April 2010 Whisper). The subject was also discussed at length at WCA meetings. Any claim that this matter has been hidden from residents ignores the information that is readily available to anyone who has a genuine interest in facts.

And, for the record, of the more than 3000 [council] emails I have received this year, by my count a grand total of 32 residents, from across the entire shire (pop. ~15,000), have contacted me directly in relation to the draft PLEP. There were 446 individual submissions made in response to the exhibition of the draft, and council is now considering their content.

## **Autumnal Cluttering**

15m load delivered before summer and now it's that much cooler we are getting serious about getting it down. I don't do the bulk of it but what I do is my way of getting back into some sort of exercise – well, it's a start!

It seems we aren't the only ones who enjoy the mulch. A couple of weeks ago there was a whistling and a chirruping, a flutter and a flurry and 21 red eyed choughs descended. The collective noun is a clattering or a cluttering and certainly they clatter around and clutter up the garden – so well named I think.

Now I've been told by a reliable source that once the group reaches around fifteen or sixteen they divide so what are this lot doing? I guess they have split – one lot in the front of the house and the others in the back - occasionally. We don't mulch the front at the moment – it needs a lot of work before we get to that but the

back of the house is where we trundle the stuff to. Already the garden is fenced to stop the 'roos. They don't so much eat things, though the gardenia left within reach must have given someone an upset tummy, and I know that the lemons are in great need of protection not to mention the roses, some of which, unprotected, are pruned each year to good effect but there are others I'm too fond of to see what would happen. My main complaint about them is that they lay on things if allowed in. ....but now it's the choughs. We all know how they behave. This woodchip tossed nonchalantly over the shoulder,

those bits of sugarcane gathered in the beak and apparently spat out – and daily the gravel paths are almost indistinguishable from the garden beds and only a gentle rake and careful gathering and tossing back every couple of days keeps any semblance of order – not that my garden is that ordered anyway. Bulbs put in three weeks ago lay sadly back on top of the garden and put them back as often as I might, the next day inevitably there are more dug up – not harmed just pulled out. The blackbirds who suddenly appeared a couple of years ago have a similar pattern of behaviour as far as the mulch is concerned but they are more solitary so the amount of tossing that goes on is rather more limited and anyway they seem to have disappeared during the current invasion.

We have found the choughs very funny to watch. They love the

birdbath which now needs filling at least once a day; it needs cleaning out too. Where does the grit in the bottom come from? We love the communal behaviour, several descend on the birdbath at a time and when they've supped and bathed they adjourn to the table and chairs for what appears to be their afternoon feather inspection and clean-up. It looks for all the world like a business meeting though the business in hand seems rather serious and there is little chatter to be heard.

This afternoon we counted twenty-four of them, should I say four and twenty blackbirds - we wont bake them, we



enjoy them too much and what is a bit of tossed mulch between friends? No doubt the grubs and insects they are eating would have done more harm than they have but twenty four – so Mr. Professor who told me they split up what do you make of that? This morning we heard a tapping noise which sounded a bit like the black cockies breaking open the cones for the pine nuts. Carefully following the sound I found a chough banging a very old mango seed on a rock. I disturbed him and he flew off with it but moments later he'd found another stone.

Late this afternoon I literally had to break up a fight between two of them – I took a broom to the pair and the 'victim' hopped away briefly, only to chase the aggressor straight away - stupid or what!

Usually the choughs only stay a few days at a time but we are either very privileged or very unlucky this year. However we'd be very grateful if everyone around Denley Drive would put down mulch very soon – we've enjoyed having them here and seeing their antics but now we would be very happy to see them go – PLEASE.

## WAMBOIN 15 years ago: From the Whisper, May 1998 Circulation: 600

It was a routine month in Wamboin in 1998, but a repeat of the "15 years ago" which appeared first in the **Whisper No 7**, **July 1983** is perhaps of interest.

These public access ways will become increasingly important as the locality becomes more developed. Greenways is a generic term that includes Crown road reserves (both open & enclosed), Crown land reserves and council-owned greenways.

Action - Looking at our "action list" from our first meeting 3 years ago (see below), I am happy to say that we have resolved most of our original issues, except physical signage on the greenways. We also need to continue work on mapping & we will make these two areas priorities for the next year or so.

Walks - We celebrated the anniversary with our fifth public walk, the autumn greenways walk - thirteen hardy souls +



greenways walk- thirteen hardy souls + 2 dogs ventured out along a new route to Millpost Hill via Birchmans Grove and 'twas lovely. A light twinkle of rain and rainbow met us towards the finish of our 10km walk. My thanks to everyone who came.

#### NOTES FROM OUR FIRST MEETING 20 APRIL 2010 Identified needs from issues raised:


- 1. Improve the signage at access points and at key points of Greenways trails **TO BE DONE**
- 2. Clarify where all the current Greenways are exactly and mapping this accurately DONE & mapping is coming
- 3. Establish the history and legal status of the current Greenways network DONE information all uploaded to Greenways page on Bywong Community website
- 4. Establish the process of legal ownership between Palerang Council and NSW Government DONE see above.
- Roads people expressed interest in for Greenways in Bywong/ Wamboin area at our first meeting
  - End of Snowgum Road clarify where there is a greenway currently **DONE there is a council greenway there.**
  - Donnelly Lane/ Donnelly Road and Millyn Road joining these up for a Greenway **DONE our next walk in June** 2013 will be there
  - Birchmans Grove walked through it on our autum walk!
  - Gumflat Lane/Bohmers Lane clarify current situation DONE locked gate in the middle but useful as greenway between Macs Reef and Bungendore Rd (North)
  - Woolshed Lane to Norton Road clarify current situation DONE new Warramunga greenway now open
  - Joe Rocks Road down to the Bungendore Showgrounds DONE this will never come about as the terrain is too dangerous.

#### Ways forward to include in our strategy for renewal

- Using the Local Environment Plan (LEP) process as a way of confirming the current Greenways network by zoning the areas as recreation **NOT NEEDED**
- Re-establish the FRiends of Greenways group (FROG) all present agreed to be part of this; **DONE**
- Gain support from other interested groups to help such as Landcare, birdwatching groups, ecologists, etc **DONE** with Landcare we could always have more interest!
- Organise walks in groups around the Greenways DONE we have had 5 so far, with 3 more planned for 2013
- Establish a Greenways Renewal Working group (GRoW), as follows DONE

About 30 volunteers turned up to plant 300 native trees and shrubs along the Warramunga Close greenway on Sunday 17 March, and 17 volunteers planted 145 native trees and shrubs on a greenway half way along Weeroona Drive on 7 April. The Geary's Gap/Wamboin Landcare group propagated the plants in our Landcare nursery and supplied them to the greenways plantings free of charge.

Seventeen years ago, almost to the day, when I first set eyes on this property, fired up with visions of the good life among the gum trees, it was a very different place. The creek was running, the dam was filled to overflowing and a pretty English cottage garden rimmed the modest house. Across the creek there was a productive orchard and a fenced area for vegetables. Beyond this was the bush. The bush is still there, but the orchard has died and there are rabbits and weeds instead of vegetables. The creek has all but disappeared and the dam is shrunken. The house garden, however, has crept steadily into the bush, linked by paths. Tough native plants, like correas and grevilleas, have replaced most of the exotics of old. The house has grown, and a few sheds have sprouted. Our patch has evolved as we have learned to bend and adjust to nature's whims. But the rhythm of life continues without missing a beat.

Once again there is the whine and snarl of chainsaws. Wood smoke hangs in the still evening air, sunlight scatters morning mists and a frost leaves behind its tell tale signs. Memories of scorching summer days fade quickly as I abandon my sandals and search for woollen socks. The changing season always seems to catch me by surprise.

And there are other markers of the season. I tumbled out of bed this morning at an hour I would usually prefer to ignore, piled on layers of clothes in the cold and dark, and headed off, a lone car on a moonlit road. It was Anzac day and we were going to the Dawn Service in Queanbeyan. As always, it was a simple, home grown, distinctly Australian affair, and may it stay that way! As the freezing blackness lifted and the Southern Cross paled and sank lower in the sky, I shivered and thought of all the other similar services of remembrance occurring in country towns across eastern Australia. "We will remember them."

When I arrived home some time later and peeled off my overcoat, I was glad that it had been such a cold morning. Cold always makes the occasion seem more poignant, but this time I was glad for more personal reasons. My jumper that I had thrown on while numbed with sleep was not just on "back to front", but it was "inside out" as well!

And a final marker confirming that the more things change the more things stay the same: true to form, the ACT Government was there with its speed cameras on Sutton Road, nicely timed to catch New South Wales motorists travelling an almost empty road on their way to take part in what I hope remains a very Australian tradition...the ANZAC Day parade. Well done ACT...that's real mateship for you! ...But I still wouldn't live anywhere else...... and it might really rain one day.
