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
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Wamboin Community Association President's Paragraphs

Laminitis in Horses By Dr. Natasha Hovanessian

Have you ever had a horse with laminitis, also known as founder? If so, you probably realise it's an extremely painful condition of the hooves that can be life-threatening. Laminitis occurs when there is inflammation of the laminae, the tissues in the hoof which attach the pedal bone, (the bone inside the hoof), to the hoof capsule. With inflammation and disruption to the blood supply to the laminae, these attachments break down and the pedal bone can rotate and drop through the sole of the hoof. Laminitis most commonly affects the front feet, however can also occur in the hind feet, and it may occur in one foot or all four feet. If recognised in its early stages, long term deleterious effects can be avoided. The exact nature of the laminitis trigger factors, apparently reaching the lamellar tissues via the circulation, has yet to be clarified

Although the exact cause(s) remain elusive, laminitis occurs with a number of conditions including sepsis, pneumonia, colic, diarrhoea, burns, retained placenta, foot trauma and corticosteroid administration. Additionally, laminitis can occur from carbohydrate/sugar overload with excessive grain or grass ingestion, which many ponies are susceptible to. Another common presentation of laminitis is in association with hormone or metabolic conditions including Cushing's Disease and Equine Metabolic Syndrome (insulin resistance).

Advice should be sought from a veterinarian as soon as possible, i.e. within hours, as early intervention can prevent life threatening deterioration of the condition. Management and treatment of laminitis by the veterinarian may include rest and strict confinement on deep, soft bedding, application of foot pads, direct cooling of the limbs (cryotherapy), dietary alteration, pain and inflammation management with medications and farriery techniques to correct forces placed on the coffin bone and hoof wall. Radiographs (x-rays) are often advised to monitor the condition and tailor the farriery recommendations.

Although some cases may respond relatively quickly to treatment, other cases may take weeks and possibly even months for a complete recovery. Depending on the severity of the laminitis, gradual corrective trimming/shoeing and anti-inflammatory therapy may return the hoof to normal. Working closely with your vet and farrier can ensure a more successful outcome.

Prevention is always than the cure, especially for laminitis. Unfortunately, once a horse has had laminitis it is prone to future episodes. Although it may seem unkind, some horses and ponies should not be allowed access to grass and not be given meals with much grain and concentrates. Maintaining a healthy body condition and avoiding obesity, with proper nutrition and exercise, as well as good general health including vaccinations, deworming and dentals to avoid illness are important. Regular farrier attention and prompt veterinary care for conditions such as grain overload, retained placenta post foaling and diarrhoea is also essential.

Macs Reef Road. Whilst the Community has applauded Council's work on the hill on Macs Reef Road, the reopening of the direct route to the coast almost immediately produced a return of the garnish of rubbish remembered from former days. This time drink bottles and cartons seem particularly prevalent. The Community is now considering notices urging travellers to take their rubbish home. We are open to suggestions for the wording – perhaps we could rival the wit generated on the Canturf billboards at Bungendore?

We are still awaiting a response from Clean Up Australia to our request to be granted a group registration for our participation in the annual national Clean Up in March.

Our popular coast road also seems to be producing a higher than usual rate of road kill, including numbers of well-grown kangaroos, but also tortoises, shinglebacks other smaller locals. The November meeting of the Community discussed erection or promotion of signage alerting motorists to the problem. Jean-Pierre is to prepare a suggestion for signage. Our campaign will not extend to bush flies – has anyone noticed a recent upsurge?

Another reminder that the Community's chalkboards on Macs Reef Road are for community notices. They are not intended for the childish airing of intemperate slogans promoting personal prejudices or grouches.

Dance across the highway. Our Community is talking to the Sutton Community Association about the possibility of a joint bush dance to be held in March. These events (a similar one takes place in Burra) are not fund raisers – they aim to break even and costs are low as food and drink are BYO. Watch for more details.

First Aid kit. The Bywong Hall Committee has agreed to a request from the Association to provide a first aid kit for the Hall. This will be installed shortly.

Pony Club News. Geary's Gap Pony Club members have been out and about competing at Zone show riding and State One Day Events, with some good results. The Club's Rally Day was held on 10 November. The Christmas Rally Day has been moved to 15 December to avoid a clash with State Show riding championships which are being held at Bungendore on 7 and 8 December. Preparations are under way for the Club's annual camp to be held at Bungendore from 2 to 6 January.

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

FIRE PERMITS

During the Bush Fire Danger Period a Fire Permit is required for any fire in the open (other than a cooking fire in a properly constructed fire place with a 2 metre cleared border around it). During days of Total Fire Ban (TOBAN), permits are suspended and no fires can be lit for the duration of the TOBAN. Permits are also automatically suspended on days of Very High fire danger or above. Permits may also be suspended on days of High fire danger after taking into account changed or deteriorating weather conditions. UPDATE ON THE BUSHFIRE SEASON

As you will be aware, it has been a difficult and extremely busy start to the bush fire danger season across New South Wales. There have been several large and devastating fires including some that have led to loss of human and animal life, and destruction of hundreds of buildings and thousands of hectares of land. At the time of preparing this article, while the cooler temperatures and recent rain have brought short term relief there is a need for us to remain vigilant and be prepared throughout the fire season. It is of great concern that there have been fires across NSW of such magnitude so early in the bush fire season. The recent Spring rain, while very welcome in the current situation, brings with it the prospect of further growth to an already heavy grass and leaf litter fuel load. With this comes an increasing chance of wild fire occurring as the grasses cure and bush dries out in the warmer months ahead. We can expect fire danger levels and the chances of fire occurring to increase between now and the end of March.

PREPARE FOR THE BUSH FIRE SEASON NOW!

For those of you who have yet to finalise your Bush Fire Survival Plan, now is not too late, and hopefully the bush fire events of the past several weeks across New South Wales will have triggered you to do so. Research indicates that when threatened by bush fires, people will often leave it too late to make critical decisions and have few safe options left. Your Bush Fire Survival Plan is one of the best ways to improve the safety of you and your family before the impact of a bush fire.

Thinking "I will leave early" is not enough.

Your plan will help you take action and avoid making last minute decisions that could prove deadly during a bushfire.

Reasons for having a Bushfire Survival Plan

The majority of people who die during bushfires are caught fleeing their homes at the last minute. **Preparing your Plan** allows you to identify the triggers to leave early or prepare to actively defend your property.

Bushfires can be scary and overwhelming. It is not the time to be making major decisions. **Preparing your plan allows you to make major decisions in advance and will help keep you focused in the event of a bushfire threat.**

During a bushfire, you will most likely be worried about your loved ones. A prepared and *practised* Bushfire Survival Plan will help family members know where others are and what they'll be doing.

You might find at the last minute that you don't have the clothing, equipment or resources to enact your plan to leave early or stay and defend. A prepared and practised Bushfire Survival Plan will help you to identify the resources you need.

Bushfires can be unpredictable and the best-laid plans can go wrong. We strongly recommend you prepare plans for

'Leave Early' and 'Stay & Defend' options. A well-prepared Plan will include contingencies and back-ups if your primary plan fails.

A written and *practised* Bushfire Survival Plan is the most important part of your preparation to survive a bushfire.

To help you with this, the NSW Rural Fire Service offers a template for a Bush Fire Survival Plan. You can view, download and print a copy by visiting http://www.rfs.nsw.gov.au Alternatively, contact the Brigade's Community Safety Officer, Geoff Foster, on 0428 574 467 and ask for a hardcopy of the NSW RFS Bush Fire Survival Plan booklet.

Some of the things you should do now around your property include:

Prepare your house

- Embers flying through the air are a major threat on a bad bush fire day. In a bush fire many houses are destroyed through ember attack, when burning twigs and leaves carried by the wind land on or around the house. Even houses away from the direct path of the fire can be affected. Look for the places embers could start fires on the roof, under the floor and around windows and doors and take action to deal with them.
- Check the condition of your roof and replace any damaged or missing tiles or metal
- Clean leaves from the roof, gutters and downpipes and have downpipe plugs ready so you can fill the gutters with water
- Enclose exposed underfloor areas
- Store wood piles well away from the house
- Make sure the pressure relief valve on LPG cylinders face outwards (so leaking gas and possibly flame wouldn't be directed towards the house)
- Ensure you have hoses set up at key points around your house
- Consider and make ready alternative options if you are relying on electricity to power your water pump and the power goes off during a major fire (eg petrol pump, generator)
- Remove and store any flammable liquids or other items away from the house
- Check the condition of external walls, cladding and seal any gaps

Prepare you garden

- Keep garden mulch away from the house and keep grass short
- Cut back any overhanging trees or shrubs from the house and other buildings
- Thin plantings around buildings

Prepare your property

- If you intend using your driveway as an access or escape route and to help make it easy for a fire tanker and crew to attend in an emergency situation, ensure there is clear access/egress
- Clear vegetation from around sheds and other buildings
- Consider creating fire breaks on roadside strips and around fencelines aimed at calming or even stopping a fire spreading onto or escaping from your property
- Plan beforehand what you will do with livestock and pets in the event of fire or an increasing fire threat
- Machinery such as ride-on mowers, tractors and slashers can start grass fires. It is important they are:
 - o Free from any faults and mechanical defects that could start a fire
 - Fitted with an approved spark arrestor
 - O Carrying a working water fire extinguisher or knapsack (note: powder type extinguishers offer little help with a spreading grass fire)
 - Operated only when weather conditions are suitable. Generally, early morning when the temperature is cooler and there's more moisture in the air is the best time to mow.

In addition, as we've focused on in the previous two newsletters, it is very important to keep yourself informed and stay up to date during periods of increased fire danger. You can do this by monitoring the Fire Danger Rating for the area, especially on hot, dry and windy days, understanding the Bush Fire Alerts and looking and listening for information available from a range of sources including radio eg local ABC AM 666, Wamboin Rural Fire Brigade website, NSW RFS website, mobile phone apps, talking with your neighbours. Total Fire Ban

At this time of the year, come the warmer weather and people spending more time cooking and entertaining outdoors, a question more frequently asked concerns the rules applying on days where there is a Total Fire Ban. The NSW RFS





Commissioner declares Total Fire Bans based on the advice of the Bureau of Meteorology and other information. During the Bush Fire Danger period, the decision to issue a Total Fire Ban is usually made in the afternoon for the following day. A Total Fire Ban may be issued on the actual day if weather conditions get worse. A Total Fire Ban usually starts from midnight and lasts 24 hours BUT in continuing severe fire conditions it may be extended.

During a Total Fire Ban **No fire** may be lit in the open.

Fire Permits are immediately suspended.

No fires in the open includes incinerators and barbeques that burn solid fuel, e.g. wood, charcoal or heat beads.

You may use a gas or electric BBQ, but only if:

- It is on a residential property within 20metres of the house
- It is in a designated picnic area and the BBQ is approved by Council, National Parks or State Forests
- It is always attended by a responsible adult
- The ground within two metres of the BBQ is cleared of all materials that could burn
- You have an immediate and continuous supply of water available.

No general purpose welding, grinding, gas cutting and soldering can be done in the open.

Your Fire Permit resumes once the Total Fire Ban is lifted.

How do you know if a Total Fire Ban is declared for your area? Total Fire Bans are declared for NSW Fire Areas. NSW Fire Areas group together a number of Council areas with similar conditions and terrain. Total Fire Bans are indicated on the Fire Danger Rating (FDR) signs adjusted by members of our fire brigade. There are 5 FDR signs by the roadside at the key entry points to the brigade area for Wamboin, Bywong, Sutton Park and Bungendore. You can also view the FDR on the brigade's website at: http://brigade.wamboincommunity.asn.au as well as on the NSW RFS website at http://www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/ plus television and radio (news and weather reports).

Lighting a fire on a Total Fire Ban day is a serious offence and can result in fines of up to \$100,000 and/or 14 years imprisonment.

Motorists and cigarette butts

We hope you are not a 'tosser'. A number of residents have raised their concern at the amount of cigarette butts along local roads and Norton Rd in particular. Throwing a cigarette butt from the window of a vehicle is like throwing a lit match into the bush – it is a recipe for a fire disaster. Whether the culprits are local residents or people passing through – the butt and the consequences are left with us – the wider community.

To Whom It May Concern – don't be a 'tosser'. There are severe penalties for littering and up to gaol time for starting a fire.

BRIGADE ACTIVITY

Incidents since last month's newsletter

Since the last newsletter our key operational focus has been to assist the Rural Fire Service and other resources from NSW and interstate support the National Parks and Wildlife Service in the battle to contain a large wildfire in the rugged Budawang National Park and Wirritin Ridge north-east of Braidwood. Our Brigade offered crews on rotation day and night as and when requested. Fortunately some decent rain in the first half of November helped the fire fighting cause but not before the fires that had been burning for many weeks

had worked their way through more than 9,000 hectares. Many thanks to our firefighters who participated or remained on standby and to the Brigade's incredible Support Crew who came to the Fire



Station at all hours to refresh and replenish the fire tankers as our firefighters returned from the fireground.

In our own brigade area, there were three incidents (Sunday 10 Nov – Federal Hwy, Sutton Monday 11 Nov – Bungendore & Joe Rocks Rd, Bungendore and 21 Nov Sutton Rd Sutton). Fortunately all these required resourcing for only a short time.

Community Engagement

On Saturday 16 November the Brigade set up its Info Shopfront at the Wamboin market. Members of the Community Engagement Team fielded enquiries from several residents including newcomers to the area. Resident questions ranged from Bush Fire Survival Plans, to property preparations, how to start a pump and organising a property site visit.

During November several members of the Community Engagement Team continued the brigade practice of conducting property visits on request to help provide guidance to residents on their property preparations. The brigade has been providing



this free service for a number of years. If you'd like to arrange a visit, please contact the Community Safety Officer, Geoff Foster, by email communitysafety@brigade.wamboincommunity.asn.au or ring 0428 574 467.

Brigade members are also assisting a growing number of Community FireWise Groups of neighbours or residents who live in a shared bushfire risk environment and who are forming together to share information within the group for mutual support.

Training News

Training during November covered fire fighting strategies and tactics in the event of fast running grass fires. It also included a check of the equipment and supplies on each of the fire tankers following the ongoing rotation of crews and tankers during the month at the large bush fire in the Wirritin Ridge/ Budawang National Park north-east of Braidwood.

A number of our people have also been assisting others members including those in other brigades in the Zone to undertake formal training courses.

Councillor's Corner

You and Your Rates — This subject comes up from times to time, in various forums. It can be a complex issue, and I can't possibly cover everything in just a few paragraphs.

While it's probably less of an issue for rural residential properties, a rates notice generally includes several line items: typically ordinary rates and a list of applicable charges. Under current legislation, councils may levy specific charges to cover all reasonable costs associated with the delivery of waste, water and sewerage services, but most other functions that council performs must be funded primarily through the levying of ordinary rates. While waste services charges apply to varying degrees in rural areas, water and sewer charges generally do not, and on this occasion I would like to focus only on so-called *ordinary rates*.

Ordinary rates are a tax that must be based on a property owner's *ability to pay* and/or the relative *derived benefit* associated with the functions of council. Most councils, including Palerang Council, rely solely on the first principle, a property owner's *ability to pay*, in the levying of ordinary rates. Moreover, this ability to pay is measured, for better or worse, by the unimproved land value of a ratepayer's property, as determined by the NSW Valuer General.

As a result, ordinary rates can change (usually increase) via several mechanisms:

- 1. Annual CPI Increase -- Determined using the Local Government Cost Index calculated by the Independent Pricing & Regulatory Tribunal (IPART). This is typically 2.5-3.5% p.a.
- 2. Special Rate Variation -- Under the rate pegging regime that exists within NSW, any rate increase greater than the Annual CPI Increase must be approved by IPART. Any application for such a rate increase must be supported by, amongst other things, a demonstrated need and community support.
- 3. Change in *relative* property value -- The Valuer General values properties periodically and issues that information to councils, who then use this to update their rating policy. It is important to note that, largely due to the rate pegging policy that exists in NSW, an increase in land valuation does not necessarily lead to a rate increase. If all property values change by the same percentage, there will be no resulting change in individual rates. Only when the value of one property changes relative to another will there be a resulting change, and this may be an increase or a decrease.
- 4. Change in council rating policy -- Due to the large range of property values within Palerang, council currently levies the ordinary rate based on a combination of unimproved land value and a fixed amount per property, within four rating categories: residential, business, farmland and mining. This basic policy has remained essentially unchanged since 2006. Note that rating categories, and thus rates, are entirely independent of LEP land use zones. Properties are included in specific rating categories—residential, business, farmland or mining—based on the actual primary land use practiced on an individual property, not on the prevailing land use zone.



Nature Notes November 2013

Summer seemed to be well on the way at the beginning of the month, with temperatures above thirty degrees for a couple of days and dry weather. This was followed by a few really wintry days and some welcome rain. After more than 70mm this month so far the countryside is still pleasantly green.

One of the later flowering wattles – *Acacia mearnsii* (Black Wattle) - is adorning Sutton Road with clouds of scented cream flowers. In damp areas locally the Billy Buttons (*Craspedia variabilis*) have passed their peak flowering period and are now shedding fluffy grey seeds. Their bright yellow flowers are being replaced by the golden flat-topped flowerheads of the little Scaly Buttons (*Leptorhynchos squamatus*). It wasn't the best year for orchids here, but I did find a few stands of yellow, brown-blotched Tiger Orchids (*Diuris sulphurea*) here.

Fringe-lilies (*Thysanotus tuberosus*) made an appearance in the third week of the month. One morning, as I was walking down to get my newspaper, I saw eleven of these plants displaying their large mauve fringed flowers. Some plants in the lily families flower at specific times of the day. *Tricoryne elatior*, the Yellow Rush Lily, seems to open its flowers about midday onwards. Once, when walking on a reserve near Gundaroo, we saw no sign of Rush Lily flowers in the morning, only to find the area dotted with tiny yellow flowers on the return trip. The Fringe-lily doesn't seem to be as predictable, as it seems to flower at different times of the day from one day to the next. This may be due to the amount or strength of the daylight it experiences.

The Wedge-peas (*Gompholobium huegelii*) are still producing their large yellow flowers. A plant at my place has grown up through a shrub and is almost a metre tall with about forty flowers adorning it at the moment.

Fan-tailed Cuckoos are still calling, their rapid downward trill audible at some distance, and Brush Cuckoos have just started to make themselves heard (their call is a series of sharp notes on a downwards scale). At the moment, there are some fledgling Red Wattle-birds trying out their wings, helped along by an aggressive pair of Noisy Friar-birds.

Late in September, I saw a pair of Spotted Pardalotes examining a hole in a rocky slope. Because these birds seem to prefer to nest in a tunnel in a vertical bank I thought they would eventually find a site elsewhere. But, early in November, I was inspecting a plant close to where I'd previously seen them. Suddenly, there was a flutter of wings close by and a Spotted Pardalote landed on a wattle branch about two metres from me. It was quickly followed by its mate. They both had their beaks full of small insects, and, while I watched, first one little bird and then the other entered the hole I'd seen them examining two months ago. There was a lot of cheeping from the tunnel as their nestlings enjoyed their meal. A week later the hole in the bank had fallen silent, so, hopefully, a new generation of Spotted Pardalotes is investigating the shrubs for insects.

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
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Owlet-Nightjar in Bywong

Around our house we have built and installed many boxes for sugar gliders and all the various types of birds that live in this area. Any material that looks remotely like usable sheeting ends up as a nesting box somewhere on a tree. Our most successful boxes are located high up in the carport where Grey Shrike-thrush nest every year. You will know if you have such birds nesting around your house when you find the mirrors on your car covered with bird droppings. We have also built some 5 star accommodation for the Cunningham skinks which abound around our house (and unfortunately inside our ceiling space where in hot weather, we can hear them crawling along under the insulation) There could be some truth in the theory that they will chase snakes away as we have never seen any snake near the house despite the fact that the creek 30m below us is teeming with frogs.

Recently we have noticed that one of the boxes attached to the wall of the house could be inhabited by the common but rarely seen Nightjar-owlet. Scratching the box would immediately provoke a quick escape by some bird flying so fast that I couldn't identify it.

A few weeks ago, I scratched the box where I suspected that a Nightjar-owlet was nesting and got ready with my camera to capture whatever was in the box before it flew out at great speed. The result is shown here as photo 2.

sent the photo to a few people in the area and some replied that they doubted that the creature shown was a nightjar owlet and could be a possum or sugar glider. I was prepared to doubt that the original photo I took of the animal was indeed a nightjar until Sunday November 17 when I noticed a familiar head poking out of a large possum box located some 40m from where I spotted the bird originally. It disappeared quickly when it saw me, but this time I came back prepared and pointed my camera at the opening before someone scratched the box and out came the bird to see what was going on. The 'confirming' shot is shown as photo 5.

David McDonald, our respected local ornithologist, points out that the Owlet-nightjar that we have in this area is classified in a family of its own (Aegothelidae). Apparently there are no local records of true nightjars.

Note that boxes can house different species of animals at different times. When I built the boxes, I followed recommendations about the hole and box sizes which suggested that different birds would lodge in the box depending on the diameter of the opening. That theory worked until we saw some galahs enlarging the opening of a box by chewing away the plywood edges of the hole, despite the fact that very close-by was a box designed specifically for Galahs (see picture 3 which shows the chewed section of the opening). The kookaburras shown here used to be fed by us and came to the windows waiting for food, a practice which we don't recommend. The photo was taken some years ago. Soon after we stopped feeding them to our great pleasure they happily returned to their old way of life. We also have a nesting box for them somewhere high up a gum tree which they use all the time as proved by the amount of 'guano' found on the ground below the box.
