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



Laminitis in Horses By Dr. Natasha Hovanessian

Have you ever had a horse with laminitis, also known as founder? If so, you probably realise it's an extremely painful condition of the hooves that can be life-threatening. Laminitis occurs when there is inflammation of the laminae, the tissues in the hoof which attach the pedal bone, (the bone inside the hoof), to the hoof capsule. With inflammation and disruption to the blood supply to the laminae, these attachments break down and the pedal bone can rotate and drop through the sole of the hoof. Laminitis most commonly affects the front feet, however can also occur in the hind feet, and it may occur in one foot or all four feet. If recognised in its early stages, long term deleterious effects can be avoided. The exact nature of the laminitis trigger factors, apparently reaching the lamellar tissues via the circulation, has yet to be clarified

Although the exact cause(s) remain elusive, laminitis occurs with a number of conditions including sepsis, pneumonia, colic, diarrhoea, burns, retained placenta, foot trauma and corticosteroid administration. Additionally, laminitis can occur from carbohydrate/sugar overload with excessive grain or grass ingestion, which many ponies are susceptible to. Another common presentation of laminitis is in association with hormone or metabolic conditions including Cushing's Disease and Equine Metabolic Syndrome (insulin resistance).

Advice should be sought from a veterinarian as soon as possible, i.e. within hours, as early intervention can prevent life threatening deterioration of the condition. Management and treatment of laminitis by the veterinarian may include rest and strict confinement on deep, soft bedding, application of foot pads, direct cooling of the limbs (cryotherapy), dietary alteration, pain and inflammation management with medications and farriery techniques to correct forces placed on the coffin bone and hoof wall. Radiographs (x-rays) are often advised to monitor the condition and tailor the farriery recommendations.

Although some cases may respond relatively quickly to treatment, other cases may take weeks and possibly even months for a complete recovery. Depending on the severity of the laminitis, gradual corrective trimming/shoeing and anti-inflammatory therapy may return the hoof to normal. Working closely with your vet and farrier can ensure a more successful outcome.

Prevention is always than the cure, especially for laminitis. Unfortunately, once a horse has had laminitis it is prone to future episodes. Although it may seem unkind, some horses and ponies should not be allowed access to grass and not be given meals with much grain and concentrates. Maintaining a healthy body condition and avoiding obesity, with proper nutrition and exercise, as well as good general health including vaccinations, deworming and dentals to avoid illness are important. Regular farrier attention and prompt veterinary care for conditions such as grain overload, retained placenta post foaling and diarrhoea is also essential.

WCA Communications with Telstra

At this time of the year I write to Telstra's Chief Executive Officer, David Thodey, reminding him of the undertakings that he and his predecessors gave to us at public meetings to improve the mobile telephone coverage of the Wamboin area. I write to him now because it is his pre-Budget consideration time and if I didn't do so he could consider that the squeaky wheel doesn't rate anymore.

Earlier, Wamboin nearly had an installation on Millpost Hill but because of community concerns the location was changed to a property off Denley Drive. The mobile 'phone tower did not eventuate because the new regime in Telstra decided to invest in 4G instead of further infrastructure. We were informed by Mr Thodie that this was a business decision but that we were still fourth on the list of priority areas to be serviced. We know from inside information that Telstra bean counters consider that there is insufficient mobile 'phone traffic in the area to warrant this minor investment.

Now with a change of Government, the new Federal member for Hume, Angus Taylor, has recognised our dissatisfaction with the Wamboin area mobile 'phone coverage and is encouraging us to make submissions to a Federal Discussion Paper by 5pm 28 February 2014. This Discussion Paper is available from the Department of Communications' website at http://www.communications.gov.au/mobile_services_coverage_programme.

The WCA December General Meeting has asked that letters be sent to the Minister for Communications, the Departmental Secretary and to the Member for Hume on the matter of the poor mobile 'phone coverage of the Wamboin area. I have drafted these letters which will be sent shortly. Currently, I am drafting a submission on the Federal Discussion Paper and would encourage those persons interested in improved Telstra coverage to do as well.

PS. I have no Telstra mobile 'phone coverage at our home and from the map provided by Telstra when the Millpost/Denley towers were mooted we would still not have even one bar reception!

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
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LAKE GEORGE DAY VIEW CLUB 2014

Wheels of Wamboin

Please note change of date to 17th May - due to Easter

Due to Easter being on the third weekend of April the Wheels of Wamboin event has been moved to the 17th of May for this year. Many car clubs and owners have expressed that they will be away for Easter so we have decided to move to the following market Day in May.

So what automotive anniversaries are being celebrated in 2014? Dodge celebrates 100 years this year, the iconic Mustang turns 50 and another company was started by four brothers: Alfieri, Bindo, Carlo, and Ernesto. Maybe you'd recognize their last name - Maserati. This month we will have a look at Dodge.

The two brother's John and Horace Dodge got started supplying Detroit-based automakers (including Ford) with frames, engines, and transmissions in 1903 before developing their own brand and launching Dodge Brothers, building complete automobiles from 1914. They introduced a number of early innovations including all steel construction (the vast majority of cars worldwide still used wood-framing under steel panels), a 12-volt electrical system and a sliding-gear transmission. Dodge Brothers cars were ranked at second place for U.S. sales as early as 1916.

In 1920 tragedy struck as John Dodge was felled by pneumonia in January and his brother Horace then died of cirrhosis in December of the same year. With the loss of both founders, the Dodge Brothers Company passed into the hands of the brothers' widows. Throughout the 1920s Dodge gradually lost its ranking , slipping down to 7th in the U.S. market. Dodge Brothers also emerged as a leading builder of light trucks. The company was sold to investment bankers Dillon, Read & Co. in 1925 before being sold to Chrysler in 1928. Dodge vehicles mainly consisted of trucks and full-sized passenger cars through to the 1970s. Some famous Dodge badges include the American Charger, Challenger, Coronet, Super Bee, Dart, Phoenix and the current V10 Viper. Dodge also produces the Ram sports truck. Dodge re-entered the Australian market in 2006 with the Caliber, their first offering since 1973. Current models include the Nitro, Avenger and Journey. In 2009, Italian automaker Fiat formed a partnership with Chrysler and given the official name Chrysler Group LLC, of which Dodge remains a part. 

The Eagle Has Landed by Pam Shearmur



When we were first in Wamboin in 1992, we quite often saw wedge-tail eagles flying over the top of the ridge where our neighbours are now. At that time it was scrub inhabited by sheep and kangaroos. Our patch too was bare – there were three mature trees on it. Since then one of our mature trees has been ringbarked and killed by galahs and some 35 houses have been built, nonetheless there are more trees around, less open space for those 'eagle' eyes to catch the slightest movement and of course, our sightings have been less and less.

Sitting at the computer is a great place to see our wildlife. It seems at some point most things cross and movement out of the corner of the eye draws attention to it. While I was out, Jeremy noticed an eagle on the drive. It wasn't clear what it was eating - I hoped it was a rabbit and not a lizard since we have a lot of lizards around and I like to believe the anecdotal evidence that they help to keep snakes away. Friends who have chickens and cattle have

had at least ten snakes through the summer thus far, one close to the house living in some steps made of sleepers. Scary stuff. We have only seen about four (and a half) snakes in more than 20 years. I've no doubt there are many more around but I am very happy they keep out of sight. With my fingers crossed I hope it stays that way. (The very dead half was poking out of a very rocky piece of the hill.)

I was very sorry to have missed the eagle, such a rare occasion. I don't think Jeremy could quite believe it but he did have the presence of mind to take a photograph:

FIRE PERMITS

During the Bush Fire Danger Period (1^{st} October – 31^{st} March) a Fire Permit is required for any fire in the open (other than a cooking fire in a properly constructed fire place with a 2 metre cleared border around it). During days of Total Fire Ban (TOBAN), permits are suspended and no fires can be lit for the duration of the TOBAN. Permits are also automatically suspended on days of Very High fire danger or above. Permits may also be suspended on days of High fire danger after taking into account changed or deteriorating weather conditions. Do not light a fire without first checking the Fire Danger Rating and weather conditions for the area. UPDATE ON THE BUSHFIRE SEASON

The landscape is tinder dry. Grass and bush fires are about. The forecast is for further hot conditions ahead. In our region, historically, late February/ March is the most dangerous period for bush and grass fires. Should you not have done so already, now is the time to sit down and go through the family bushfire survival plan, clear away any materials/debris that may pose a fire threat if your home comes under ember attack, and check your fire-fighting equipment and any other items you may need in the event of fire. Make a point of listening to news/weather reports and, if you can, tune into local radio for updates on fires in the local area. If you have a mobile device such as an IPhone, IPad, tablet or smart phone, current fire information is available via free Mobile Apps. promoted by the NSW RFS, e.g. '*Fires Near Me*' which provides information on current incidents in the ACT and the surrounding NSW region, as well as the rest of the country. This application also provides information on Total Fire Bans. You should also know the Fire Danger Rating for the area where you live or are travelling through. In addition, be familiar with the Bush Fire Alert levels. As part of your planning, don't forget your pets; keep plenty of water out for them in a shaded area and keep them nearby in case you need to leave home quickly. In addition, on Monday 20 Jan., four brigade members and one of the Brigade's small tankers, Wamboin 7B(ravo), was despatched as part of a (5 day) Strike Team from the Lake George Zone to help fight the fires south-east of Wagga Wagga.

Community Engagement

At the Wamboin Markets during December and January a number of residents popped over to the Brigade's Information Shopfront to discuss their bushfire plans. One resident arranged for a member of the Brigade's Community Engagement team to visit their property to provide guidance on their preparations. There will not be a market day shopfront in February; in its place is the planned community-wide information session (details above).

Training News

The focus in December was on assisting 22 candidates from Wamboin and other brigades in the Lake George Zone prepare for their Bush Firefighter and Bush Firefighter Support course and helping with the assessment day on Sat 14 December. Our brigade facilitated the course that involved trainers from Wamboin and other brigades in the Lake George Zone. The assessment day was held on a property on the Lake George escarpment and involved all the candidates in five fire tankers from Wamboin and other brigades being assessed across a range of scenarios and skill sets. Training in January included a briefing on brigade involvement in a grass fire at Jerrabomberra, a night navigation exercise, reconnaissance, static water identification, map reading, property protection, teamwork, and crew drill in a fire burn-over situation.

Improvements at the Fire Station

Brigade members have recently completed the installation and fit-out of additional bench-top and cupboard space upstairs in the Training Room. Thanks go to several members who assisted but particularly to Peter Greenwood for his drafting, material selection, project coordination and drilling efforts. An additional washing-up basin and hot water service were recently installed downstairs to improve the Support Crew capability to deal with larger groups at the Fire Station. Again, thanks to several members for their time and help and especially to Don Evans for his running on these projects.

Any Gang-gangs around your place? David McDonald

The December/January issue of *The Whisper* included some delightful photos, submitted by Deborah Gifford, (reproduced below) of a favourite bird of S-E Australia, the Gang-gang Cockatoo. It is a small, grey cockatoo, the male has a



bright red head and crest while the female's head and crest are grey. Its call is distinctive, described in an authoritative source as a 'Creaky, rising screech that sounds like a rusty hinge: "ky-or-ark". A soft growling is made when feeding' (http://tinyurl.com/praw5ho).

2014 is the 50th anniversary year of the Canberra Ornithologists Group (COG). It is running a survey of this species in the Canberra region as its key project for the year.

COG needs your help to shed light on the activities of the Gang-gang Cockatoo as little is known about the ecology of the species within the ACT region, about its abundance, movements or what affects movement patterns, about its food preferences or seasonal distribution, or the frequency or success of breeding events.

Wamboin/Bywong residents can greatly help this project by recording any sightings of the Ganggang within an area defined by a rectangle from Yass and Goulburn to the north to Adaminaby in the south, and Lake Bathurst to Wee Jasper (east-west), see map at <u>http://canberrabirds.org.au/Maps/MapCOGAoI.pdf</u>.

Any notes on the location, date and time of the following would be helpful:

* Numbers in a group * Ages and sexes of birds * Feeding sites * Nest sites * Fledged young.

Observations can be entered on a specifically designed data sheet which should be returned to COG for analysis. Data sheets can be downloaded from http://tinyurl.com/ohz4uc3.



Editor's Note: Our federal MP for the seat of Hume asked locals to document mobile phone reception problems as he tries to work for better coverage for our area and other areas around the county. Naomi Robertson of Weeroona drive, as have some other residents, responded with the letter below. Angus Taylor subsequently wrote to thank her and to say that he would use her letter and similar information from many citizens to work to make things better.

Honourable Member of Parliament Angus Taylor and the Committee on Mobile Phone Coverage:

First of all, may I thank you, Honourable Angus Taylor, for undertaking the important, indeed essential, initiative of improving mobile phone reception in your electorate, and most particularly in the Wamboin/Bywong communities.

It is easy for me to comment on mobile phone "black spots" since I am currently living in one at 379 Weeroona Drive in Wamboin. Prior to moving here a bit more than a year ago I lived (for 2 1/2 years) in an area of almost equally unreliable coverage at 65 Weeroona Drive, Wamboin.

To say that we have NO mobile phone coverage here would be inaccurate, but the best I can say is that coverage is sporadic and seems, literally, to depend on which way the wind is blowing. We suspect that the signal is bouncing off a large windmill to the east of our house, and when the wind is from the west the vanes of the windmill are in a good position to conduct the signal. If the wind is from some other direction, we have no reception. I am not making this up.

Since living here we have also discovered that: (1) Telstra is the only provider with which you have a prayer of getting service. Optus phones do not work here at all and (2) The handset also makes a difference. Until about a month ago I was carting around a deplorable-looking, scratched and seriously outdated Telstra "blue tick" phone because other phones that we had tried at the house did not work at all. Seriously, I was embarrassed to pull this phone out in public, but it did work here maybe one-quarter of the time, which is better than other phones we had tried. Recently I upgraded to a Sony Xperia Z1 which is gorgeous and has some delightful features but still only works about one-quarter of the time when I am at our house.

Unpleasant phone experiences in Wamboin include, but are not limited to, the following: (1) Complete inability to place a call, regardless of where one goes within the house, or regardless of how many rituals (such as climbing up on furniture or waving the phone in the air) one engages in (2) Inability to receive a call or text message, resulting in a barrage of "RU OK????" messages once one emerges from the "black spot" (3) Inability to place a text message without climbing to the highest point on the property (approx. 900 meters) (4) The thrill of actually having the phone ring, only to have the call drop out as soon as one answers it (5) Actually finding the most propitious spot on the property to conduct a call, only to have the person you are speaking to repeatedly state that you are "cutting out"

I don't think that I can overstate the effect that such poor mobile phone reception may have on one's social or business contacts. However, most importantly, a lack of service puts those of us who live on bushfire-prone, rural properties in danger of our lives if we cannot communicate with emergency service providers, friends, neighbours and family in the event of a fire emergency.

Sadly, bushfires are not the only emergency that can affect a rural property dweller. At any time, adverse health events (e.g., heart attacks or stroke), accidents or falls, snake bites, crime or a variety of other misfortunes could have us desperately trying to place a call and being thwarted, and perhaps killed, by poor mobile phone reception. If Telstra and other providers are not concerned about us as individuals, they may become concerned when hit by a major law suit.

Although this could be considered a separate issue, I would also like to add that the "service" one receives in Telstra's walk-in shops is so shockingly poor as to be almost legendary. Aside from the fact that their staff wear ridiculous outfits that make them look like they are heading for a hillbilly hoedown, I have found that only about one in ten of these (invariably) young people is even remotely competent. When I recently attempted to replace my phone I visited three different Telstra shops and found only one service consultant who could actually sort out the mess that others had placed me in by switching my phone plan, disabling service on my old phone without telling me, inexpertly downloading contacts, wanting \$60 to fix this problem while a guy in the phone accessories shop near Woolies in Gungahlin did all this for \$10, and just generally being rude and condescending. The only reason I continue to deal with Telstra is that, as stated above, theirs is the only service that has even a remote chance of working here in Wamboin: change this and we should see all of the providers lifting their game (and either training their staff or getting rid of those who are disrespectful toward customers).

Finally, may I say that there is an equity issue in providing reliable mobile phone coverage to those of us within a stone's throw of the national capital. Naturally, my son, who lives in Acton in the very shadow of the Telstra tower, has good reception, and he and others may say that if we choose to live in a hilly, outer-metropolitan area we can expect some glitches. Our neighbours have spent more than \$1,000 to install an antenna that gives them reliable service, but I would ask why Telstra should expect each of us to spend this kind of money just to obtain service that is available to most other Australians without additional expense. Surely a well-placed tower would alleviate the reception problems of most of Wamboin/Bywong without us having to pay for what could literally be the difference between life and death in an emergency.

Thank you for reading this tale of woe. Mr. Taylor, if you wish to use this letter or any part of it to influence decisionmaking in regard to mobile phone reception in Wamboin/Bywong, I would be honoured. And if anyone I've addressed wishes to contact me, you may do so via this email address, or on our home phone (6236 9767) since (dare I say it again?) our mobile phone service is unreliable

The January competition will be a shot-gun start, 3 club event sponsored by Wyagiba Trading. All are cordially invited to join us for an afternoon's rustic golf.





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

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Nature Notes January 2014

With the temperature hovering for five days between 38 and 40 degrees in the middle of January, the grasses are well and truly scorched and the rest of the landscape looks rather bleached. Even some of the Cauliflower Bushes (*Cassinia longifolia*), just about the hardiest local species, are shrivelling and dying in places.

The heavy load of seed-pods on the *Acacia dealbata* (Silver Wattle) ripened during December and early January. The Gang-gangs and Sulphur-crested Cockatoos had been feasting on the immature seed-pods, but there were still sufficient to carpet the ground when they dried and opened to shed their seed. As the ground under nearly every tree was littered with piles of dried pods and black seed, there should be small forests of Silver Wattles in a few years.

The Cherry Ballart (*Exocarpos cupressiformis*) were still full of red and orange 'fruit' towards the end of December – the 'fruit' is actually the stem holding the round hard seed, but it swells into a soft edible 'fruit' and is quite delicious. Unfortunately (for me anyway) the Pied Currawongs and Cockatoos, and probably a few other birds, ate the lot within a week.


Another food plant for the birds at present is Burgan (*Kunzea ericoides*), the shrub that was covered in snow-like drifts of white flowers just before Christmas. It is now full of green semi-mature fruit which the Crimson Rosellas have found. These birds usually spend some time at this time of year feeding on the seed capsules of *Pomaderris angustifolia* and other plants within the same genus, but there was almost no seed on them this year after a very hot spell just as the seed was beginning to mature shrivelled and destroyed the capsules. As many of our local native plants develop seed during December and January, the effects of increasingly high temperatures could become a real concern.


The summer went by without many Bogong Moths or Christmas Beetles turning up here. It was, however, a good year for all sorts of flies. They could be seen in clouds around flowering eucalypts and shrubs, and their buzzing was audible at some distance. It is a long time since I'd heard a cricket in these dry conditions, but after the recent light rain a Mole Cricket was whirring loudly in the garden near my back door. I'm not sure how long they live – or even if it is the same one – but for many years now one has called from that precise spot.

A rather interesting insect – or rather two – appeared on the shadehouse covering recently. They were two mating Giant Stick-insects (*Acrophylla titan*). Although not brightly coloured (the female was an ashy-brown colour and the male tancoloured with a cream stripe along his side), they would have been hard to miss as the female, with her front legs extended, was 20cm or more in length.

So far this year, I've seen three Brown Snakes already. The most interesting and rather large one was stretched out along the top of the roller door in my garage watching me intently as I filled some bins!

The wombat that appeared here at the end of November is still visiting. I haven't seen it yet, but it makes its presence obvious by marking its tracks with copious droppings. Slightly less welcome here was some little animal that recently spent the night in my shadehouse converting some healthy-looking seedlings to 2mm stumps – but it's still wonderful to live amongst the wildlife here.





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Councillor's Corner

Building Approvals — I had a call recently, asking if I could help resolve a problem associated with the issue of an Occupation Certificate for a new home. Councils are often criticised for bureaucratic intransigence in planning matters, but this is a good example of regulations that exist to protect potential owners.

The Building Professionals Board (BPB) was established as a NSW Government Authority in 2007 to improve the quality of construction and subdivision in NSW through a system of accredited certifiers. The associated processes are designed to provide confidence that buildings and subdivisions meet national standards and building codes. BPB accredited certifiers must be insured, work to a Code of Conduct and complete training each year.

If you intend to renovate, demolish, build, develop or use land you should generally seek advice, from council or a building professional, on whether or not approvals might be required, and if so, what form these might take.

If your proposal is classified as 'exempt development', you will not require approval. If development approval is required, this may be satisfied by the issue of a Complying Development Certificate (for 'routine work' that complies with relevant controls under the Building Code of Australia) or a Development Application (DA).

If consent is granted for a DA, you will need a Construction Certificate, issued by council or a BPB accredited certifier, before you begin work. Commencement of construction without a Construction Certificate would be a breach of the Environmental Planning & Assessment Act, and a Construction Certificate cannot be issued after construction has commenced. Further, without a Construction Certificate, an Occupation Certificate cannot be issued at the completion of the building work.

Giving all that a little more context, approval of a Development Application (development consent) indicates that the DA has satisfied the relevant planning regulations. The issue of a Construction Certificate confirms that construction plans and specifications comply with the relevant standards and the conditions of the development consent, and that any pre-development conditions have been met. The issue of an Occupation Certificate confirms that works were completed in accordance with the specifications provided in the Construction Certificate.

A Principal Certifying Authority (PCA), accredited by the BPB, is the only person or body who can issue an Occupation Certificate, and they must be appointed before work commences. The PCA acts on behalf of the owner, or a prospective owner, not the builder, inspecting work during construction to ensure that it is generally consistent with the approved plans and is fit to occupy having regard to required building standards.

In the matter that was brought to my attention, the builder had failed a critical stage PCA inspection prior to a concrete pour, because an area of the work was flooded at the time of inspection. In spite of the fact that a failure notice was issued, the builder continued with the pour, with the result that a critical inspection was effectively missed. In such cases, the NSW planning legislation prohibits the issue of an Occupation Certificate, with the result in the present case that the bank refused to release the final payment on the associated loan.

In situations like these, council comes under immense pressure to 'bend the rules'. In some cases, the matter can be seemingly trivial, but this is never obvious, and by bending any rules council, and that means the general rate payer, essentially becomes liable for any failure that may arise in the future as a result.

This is not a happy situation for anyone involved. The lesson is to appreciate the importance of, and to ensure that your builder complies with, the relevant regulations, especially those involving inspections, throughout the build. Failure to comply with an early inspection requirement can mean that the final build can never be approved.

If a problem arises, deal with it immediately. Solutions, while perhaps inconvenient, generally exist. Don't assume that issues can be resolved when the build is complete—sometimes the applicable legislation will make that impossible.
