Weepy Eyes in Horses by Dr. Natasha Hovanessian

It seems there are many horses at the moment with weepy eyes, and most of these cases have resolved relatively easily. However, because eye conditions can progress rapidly and result in loss of vision, we should always be cautious when horses have discharge running down the face. A few of the main reasons for weepy eyes will be discussed in this article. Keeping a flyveil on your horse (particularly in summer) may reduce spread of infectious eye conditions by flies, but the eyes must be inspected twice daily to ensure they appear normal.





Clear (serous) discharge

Blocked Tear Ducts

There is a narrow drainage system from the inside corner of the eye down to a small opening in the nostril called the nasolacrimal duct. This thin duct (tube) can easily become blocked from inflammation, infection, foreign bodies, trauma or growths compressing on it. This results in discharge streaming down the face and can become constant. Often the duct can be unblocked with a catheter and saline wash.


Conjunctivitis

Inflammation of the conjunctiva (the pink tissues around the eye) may be a condition in itself or related to another problem in the eye. Whatever the cause, usually there is discharge from the eye and the tissues become bright pink or red. Treatment will depend on the cause, but often a bacterial infection, foreign body in the eye or irritant-induced/allergic condition is responsible and antibiotics are part of the therapy plan.

Corneal Ulcer

When an object traumatises the surface of the eye (called the cornea), a defect on the eye, referred to as an ulcer, may result. This is potentially a very serious problem and if not treated promptly can result in loss of vision and a need to remove the eye if persistently painful. It may be the horse has rubbed its eye on a tree branch, nail sticking out of a fence or any object that could abrade the eye. A cloudy/white eye means there is a lot of inflammation present in the eye and it should be attended to by a veterinarian promptly, particularly as it's extraordinarily painful for the horse. Most mild abrasions heal with frequent antibiotics placed in the eye and anti-inflammatories. More serious injuries may require surgery for placement of a graft to cover the ulcer and culture of the surface of the eye may be necessary. It is important not to administer old ointments lying around into a sore eye, as they may contain steroids which will hinder ulcer healing or contain the wrong type of antibiotics for the condition. Ongoing inflammation in an eye, from causes including corneal ulcers, can lead to a condition equine recurrent uveitis, where there is chronic, painful inflammation in the eye.

Parlimentary Secretary Visits – On Tuesday 6th May our federal Member of Parliment, Angus Taylor, arranged a meeting at the Wamboin Community Hall for representatives of some groups to meet with Paul Fletcher, Parlimentary Secretary to the Minister for Communications. Along with a number of others I attended this meeting the purpose of which was to discuss communications difficulties in our local area and thereby raising the awareness of these difficulties to the federal level. State Emergency Services were also represented. Paul Fletcher listened to what each representative had to say and the message was very clear; that there is a real black spot problem in these areas which does need addressing. I felt that the meeting was a positive one but naturally I cannot say whether our local black spot problems are any closer to being solved. At least our problems have been acknowledged at the parlimentary level. A more in-depth summary of what took place at the actual meeting can be found further in this issue of The Whisper. As President, I thank Angus Taylor for organising this meeting and bringing in the considerable support of Paul Fletcher. It was good to see some federal representation in our local area over an important and on-going problem .

Wheels of Wamboin – The Markets were exceedingly busy this month, due in part to the 2nd Wheels of Wamboin. The weather was great and the cars were interesting and varied along with antique stationary motors. A much more detailed report of the day (including such information as who won the people's choice award etc) will be included further on in this Whisper. 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The Dual Sport Motorcycle Riders Association ACT Branch (DSMRA) would like to notify all residents in the Wamboin area that

Kowen Forest will be CLOSED to the public between

5pm Friday 20th JUNE 2014 to 12:00 midnight Sunday 22nd JUNE 2014.

This closure does not apply to the areas known as Sparrow Hill, Orchard Block or the car park recreation area at the bottom of Molonglo Gorge.

The forest will be closed for a non-competitive motorcycling event - the DSMRA's Kowen Forest Ride 2014. This ride is organised as an annual membership drive for our association. It also raises money for charities such as the Snowy Hydro Rescue Helicopter and ACT SES branches.

The DSMRA's annual Kowen Forest Ride, originally scheduled for APRIL, was postponed due to rainfall above the limit set by TAMS to allow the event to proceed, and has now been rescheduled to 20-22 JUNE 2014.

Event Information:

All bikes are registered and each rider must have a valid motorcycle licence. All riders are required to comply with the 40km/h speed limit and will not enter the motorsport exclusion zone, particularly the area adjacent to the northern boundary of the forest on "Wamboin Break".

The section of Seven Mile Road adjacent to Wamboin will not be used as a transport section for DSMRA riders, however we have been advised current forestry operations will continue in that area.

Preparations for the DSMRA event will commence from 10:30am Friday 20 June 2014. Riders who have travelled from interstate and intend to camp (at the old Depot site), and suppliers delivering event infra-structure, will start to arrive from this time. Notices will be put up before the event advising of the forest closure. "FOREST CLOSED" signs will be deployed at more than 50 locations around the forest perimeter.

<u>As Kowen Forest is declared closed by TAMS</u>, the DSMRA advises residents, walkers, runners, hikers, horse riders, bicycle riders and any other recreational forest users, <u>not to enter the forest</u> during the closure. Entering the forest during the closure may endanger you, domestic animals, and the DSMRA riders.

As this is not a spectator event there will be <u>NO PUBLIC ACCESS</u> via Seven Mile Road, Kowen Rd (the main gate), <u>Millpost</u> Lane (at either the seismic station gates or the sheep boundary gate), Charcoal Kiln Rd, or any other entry point, for the specified closure period.

The forest will be re-opened to the public from Monday morning after the event.

Please be aware there will be increased traffic on Kowen Rd and areas around the Depot site for preparation on the days before and the tidy up after the event.

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WAMBOIN NEEDS CLEVER PLAN TO FIX MOBILE PHONE BLACKSPOTS

Press Release from the Office of MP Angus Taylor

Federal Member for Hume Angus Taylor has pledged to work closely with the Wamboin community to find a clever plan to fix mobile phone blackspots.

Mr Taylor hosted a visit to Wamboin (and Boorowa) this week by Federal Parliamentary Secretary on Communications Paul Fletcher, who is responsible for the Government's \$100 million Mobile Coverage Programme. "I recognise this is one of the top priorities for people living outside the major centres across my electorate. At the Wamboin meeting we had representatives from Windellama, Bywong, Bungendore, Murrumbateman and Wamboin itself.

"Paul heard very clearly what the issues were around mobile blackspots. He heard small business owners, farmers and community organisations about the impacts on business. He heard from the mayor about impacts on economic growth. He heard from parents and emergency services representatives about the impacts on welfare and lifestyle.

"The main message back from Paul was that we needed to gather information which would make it easier for the telecommunications carriers to fix the problems; can existing television or RFS (Rural Fire Service) towers be used for mobile transmission, are landowners happy to grant road access to base station sites, can councils help with planning approvals. He said Government would look at putting money on the table as an incentive to the carriers – Telstra, Optus and Vodaphone - to bring plans to fruition. As he pointed out, the average cost to build a base station (or tower) from scratch is about \$600,000 and this varies wildly depending on location. Infrastructure costs are a fraction of that, if a tower is already there.

"He also said the Mobile Coverage Programme will involve a competitive selection process in the second half of the year, amongst telecommunications carriers and in relation to potential sites. We need clever plans to leverage as much funding as possible from the carriers.

"I will work hard with councils, community groups and landowners to get the best result."



The stationary engine display brought back many memories from a foregone era and provided the background music of chuffing and puffing for the day. These engines were the backbone of many farming districts from shearing to pumping and hark from an era when Australia really did ride on the produce from rural communities. The first car on the scene was our own coffee guru's bright yellow Lotus 7. From here they just kept coming. An amazing parade of vehicles rolled up one after another. The oldest car was a 1925 Willys Overland and probably the newest was a Kawasaki motorbike purchased a week before the show.

The British marques featured several MGB's, a MGF, a Type Y under restoration, a Anglia, a super rare and immaculate Armstrong Siddley utility, a Bentley, a Humber also under restoration, Morris's, Mini's, a beaut and rare Daimler SP250 and a recently restored Riley. A great representation of Jaguars included a modern XK coupe, a XK140 roadster, a wonderful red Mark II and a very original XJ6. The Germans were there with several Mercedes Benz's, Volkswagens and a tidy BMW coupe and Italy chimed in with an X-19 Fiat and a nice Alfa Romeo Brera convertible. The Mustangs turned out

for their 50th anniversary and featured a superb 67 coupe with a 390 big block along with a several fastbacks and a rare 6 cylinder coupe. A bright red Dodge AT4 353 truck made an appearance for the 100 years of Dodge in 2014. A great 1960 Plymouth Belvedere and a 1966 Plymouth Furv convertible s rocked in with a 56 Ford F100. A bit of military nostalgia featured a WWII era Willy's jeep and an Austin Champ Scout Wagon.

A good showing of Falcons were there



with a superb XP wagon, two tubbed XP utes, two perfect XY sedans, a sweet XR ute, a neat XB GS and a couple of clean V8 XC's. The modern era was represented by some BA and FG GT's showing what a pity it is that Ford will soon cease manufacturing these great Aussie performance cars. The Holden's were there with a HX panel van, a rare VP Senator 5000i (or was that a Councillor) and great HQ coupe and a couple of EH's. Just to demonstrate the variety a rare Aussie built Bowell Nagari was on display along with two superb Ariel motorbikes and a Harley.

The people's choice award once again went at a superb 1955 Swallow Doretti but not the same one as last year. This Swallow was red and owned by the brother of last year's winner! The Swallow is only 1 of 276 cars ever made and now two of them have won the award. The Wheels of Wamboin was followed by the first Mille Miglia tour to Gundaroo. A number of cars made the drive and stretched their legs. A fine afternoon sitting on the veranda of the Gundaroo Pub was had by all before a run back to Bungendore finishing up at the Royal Hotel. Callouts

There were three callouts in May. The first was on Monday 5 May at 8.47pm and involved a single vehicle accident on Macs Reef Rd. The second callout was on Friday 9 May at 6.13am, when the brigade was called to an accident involving a vehicle and motorcycle on the Federal Highway beside Lake George. The third callout – Thursday 22 May at 11.20am - followed a request of the Palerang Council ranger and, under direction from the Fire Control Centre (FCC), led to a crew in one of the brigade's heavy tankers attending a pile burn that included building materials that were suspected to also include asbestos. The fire was extinguished. Hazardous material procedures were followed under direction of a District Officer from the FCC.

Community Engagement

Sat 17 May - several residents, including newcomers to the area, took the opportunity to discuss their property preparations with members of the Community Engagement Team at the Brigade's information shopfront located between the busy Wamboin Markets and the very popular Wheels of Wamboin event on the community oval where there was a great turnout of groupies/ fanatics and the simply curious who ogled and drooled their way around the exciting line-up of machines.

BURNING OFF

A continuing reminder at this time of the year - outside the Statutory Bush Fire Danger Period, you may light a fire in the open without a **Fire Permit**. **But**, if you do plan to light a fire in the open (other than a cooking fire in a properly prepared and attended site), regardless of its size, you are still <u>required by law</u> to notify the local Fire Control Centre <u>and</u> your adjoining neighbours (including those separated by a road, lane or waterway) of your intention to burn <u>at least</u> 24 hours before lighting up. Your neighbours may be exposed to the smoke from your burn and may need to make preparations to avoid any negative impacts (medical conditions, impacts on sensitive crops, livestock and pets). To notify our local Fire Control Centre (in Queanbeyan), call 6128 0600 (weekday business hours only – no later than mid-Friday for the weekend/ closed on Public Holidays).

Fire management, including containment of a fire originating on your property, is your responsibility. The area around the fire site has to be cleared of any flammable material, you need to wear suitable clothing, you must remain in attendance while-ever the fire is alight, and have an immediate and sufficient water supply available to control the fire. There are significant penalties if an illegal fire is lit, or if the fire escapes and causes damage to property or the environment.

If you would like further guidance you can ask the Fire Control Centre (6128 0600) for additional advice, or contact the Brigade Captain (0409 991 340) for copies of the RFS pamphlets 'Lighting a Fire – Quick Facts', 'Before You Light That Fire' or 'Standards for Pile Burning', or view and download the same pamphlets from the NSW RFS website at http://www.rfs.nsw.gov.au

If a fire that you have lit escalates to become more than you can handle, don't hesitate; immediately call the Emergency Triple Zero number (000).

Answers to Fire Safety Quiz

Q #	True OR False	Explanation
1.	True	South-eastern Australia has the reputation of being one of the most fire prone regions in the world. The Australian climate is generally hot, dry and prone to drought. In the southeast, occasional strong winds often associated with summertime cold fronts can lead to extreme fire danger. Because we live in a bushfire prone area, it's important to check the Fire Danger Rating daily during the bushfire danger period, and have a bush fire survival plan. Other bush fire prone areas in the world include California and Spain.
2.	False	Rainfall fuels the growth of vegetation – especially grass – meaning that higher rainfall can result in greater fuel loads for fire. In years of wet weather NSW often sees an increase in the number of large grass fires and bush fires. It only takes a couple of weeks of hot, dry and windy weather to create dangerous fire conditions.
3.	False	No one can guarantee that it won't happen to them. If you prepare and nothing ever happens then you have lost nothing. If you don't prepare your family and home in order to best protect them from a bush fire you may live to regret it.
4.	True	Fire Danger Ratings can be different between the A.C.T. and surrounding areas of NSW due to varying landscapes and weather conditions.
5.	True	You may use a gas or electric BBQ, but only if: It is on a residential property within 20 metres of the house It is in a designated picnic area and the BBQ is approved by Council, National Parks or State Forests It is always attended by a responsible adult The ground within two metres of the BBQ is cleared of all materials which could burn You have an immediate and continuous supply of water available.
6.	False	Clearing up around your property is just one part of planning and preparing for bushfire. You need a well thought-out bushfire survival plan, which has been agreed and discussed with members of the household. While leaving early is always the safest option, there are many things you can do to prepare you and your family for bushfire.
7.	False	There will never be as many fire trucks as there are houses. Do not depend on a fire truck being available at your home.
8.	False	Smoke from a fire can limit visibility. You may become confused or disorientated. Power lines and fallen trees on roads may be hard to see, making driving dangerous. It is always better to leave early before the fire arrives.
9.	False	That's right - don't wait to receive a warning. Fires can often threaten suddenly and there may not always be time. It's up to you to know when to leave. It's your responsibility to make the best possible decision for your family based on the current Fire Danger Rating and, should there be any, official warnings for your area.
10.	True	Homes are not designed or constructed to withstand fires in Catastrophic conditions. Catastrophic days are rare – when forecast they are very serious. For your survival, leaving early i.e. the night before or early in the day is the only option.

How many questions could you correctly answer?





Wamboin 15 years ago – from the Whisper, June 1999 Circulation: 800 by Robyn Robertson

Mr John Milton from the Capital Airport Group addressed the May meeting of the WCA on the future development of Canberra Airport and the possible effects on the surrounding region.

The airport was established on its existing site in 1927 and came under RAAF control in 1940. In 1989 the Federal Airports Corporation assumed control of the western civil aviation side of the airport. In 1998 the Commonwealth sold a 50 year lease plus a 49 year option to Canberra International Airport Pty. Ltd. The sale included the RAAF Base Fairbairn which was leased back to the RAAF for a five year period to enable relocation. The VIP fleet remained.

Mr Milton discussed the Year 2020 Master Plan for the development of the airport, and reported that aircraft noise should not be an issue for Wamboin as the area "is way outside any zones affected by noise, at least by Australian and International Standards."

Over the next 10 years the terminal area is to be developed to allow for the Very High Speed Train terminus. The aircraft apron and terminal are to be expanded with opportunities to enhance regional airline networks and international flights and new aviation-related commercial businesses including aircraft maintenance and freight forwarding. The year 2020 forecast for international flights is about 24 per week.

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Wildcare's Winter Sleepovers

Wildcare makes every effort to rehabilitate and release injured and orphaned reptiles, snakes and turtles before the winter sets in, to give them a chance to settle down and find somewhere to hibernate. 'Greedy' (picture) is an eastern long necked turtle that was ready to go and was released in early autumn - back into the wild. Wildcare does not have permanent care animals, the idea is to rehabilitate and then release wildlife back into their habitat. But with the best will in the world, some animals have to be kept in care over winter.

Compared to outdoor living, Wildcare accommodation can be five-star. Lesley who is looking after two eastern long necked turtles said, "The turtles have cracked shells, which have been repaired in a particular way. The shells are growing back



and healing. The turtles normally hibernate in winter, but these will be kept awake and won't be released until spring. However, with a twometre long tank of warm filtered water to swim in and overhead lamps they will be in great comfort. On the menu are feeder fish to eat and chopped prawns every few days."

Wildcare rescues and cares for all injured or orphaned species

and currently there is a brown snake in care. Wayne, the Wildcare Snake Coordinator, said "This injured brown snake was rescued in Yass several months ago and is still with us. He spends most of his time in a secure specially designed box. With a heat tile to lie on and the occasional mice to feed on - what better way to snooze through winter?" This snake is doing well, but timing was wrong for release prior to winter.

There are a few lizards too. A dog killed a blue tongue lizard, however Wildcare was able to save four live young from inside the mother's body. Belinda, Wildcare's Reptile Coordinator, said "They are too small to be released and will stay in care until spring. They started off at 14 grams and 10 centimetres, but are now much bigger. They are kept in a large, temperaturecontrolled tank with a hide, water dish and rocks to bask on under an overhead lamp. On the menu are meat, veggies and fruit! The litter was split up to help them all thrive and they should do well."

One thing to think about if we are tidying up around the yard and property is to be aware that there may be a reptile or snake slumbering under old tin or rocks and timber on the ground. Most dams will have a number of turtles loitering in the mud. Take care and if wildlife is disturbed contact Wildcare on 6299 1966 for advice.

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Help! We Can't Find Your House

It has been a long time since we all attached the supplied address numbers to our property many years ago when the new rural address numbering came in to play.

Since then, many have fallen off or faded to a condition where they cannot be read. As a member of the RFS, we are often called out to incidents including fires and have even provided assistance to the NSW ambulance service during medical emergencies. We all need to find an address quickly. It is harder at night. If you did not know, the first response fire truck to a house fire maybe from Queanbeyan fire station who are unfamiliar with this area. I think many could benefit including the postie and electrical energy service providers if we were to look at our own numbers when we next drive home.

Ask yourself, "Could someone else easily find your place if you only gave them the street number, especially if it was dark?" The reflective backed signs with large black numbers are even better, especially at night and are usually available at your local hardware store. If you want something bigger, any of the local sign makers advertising in the yellow pages can make something up for you. Really it is a small price to pay to ensure any emergency service can find you quickly and your mail and other deliveries also get there.

The letter box is usually always visible from a driving vehicle so ideally, one on the letterbox (if you have a dead end road) and two (if it is a through road) as someone looking for your property could be travelling from either direction. Also one near the gate/entrance to your property (not on your gate as when opened you can't see it) is preferable as many letterboxes are some distance or offset from the gate or there might be multiple gates/entrances together which also can be confusing.

Tax time

As webmaster of the WCA website I've been meaning to write an icle or two for some time, about new computing technologies & innovation. On this occasion I've been prompted to write about Facebook.

Launched in 2004 by founder Mark Zuckerberg - Facebook in simple terms is an interactive global forum, about everything, available to everybody. Sounds great! More specifically it is a website-based system, that allows users to instantly publish textual and multimedia content, allowing their selected 'friends' or the wider Facebook community to view. It can be used for trivial and serious purposes – it all depends on the community of users in question. Privacy setting within Facebook fully controls what information and actions are available to be seen by other. Users can register their interest to receive information from other content producers by "Like" 'ing their pages. This results in a 'new feed', which is the compiled listing of posts from friends, interest groups & websites, presented for easy perusal.

Ten years on from it's original release, Facebook now has over 1.2 billion active users. Facebook's rise to fame can be directly linked with the success of smartphones.

For some people Facebook is unfamiliar, and to some other it can be a 'way of life'. Why the divergence? We see many negative news reports about Facebook; and the lack of good telecommunications services denies the opportunity for some to access social media. There have been a few good news stories, but not many. The obvious answer is that there is a generational divide. For the very young, computers and Facebook have always been there, for older generations it's a new phenomenon, and it can be daunting for the uninitiated.

One of the most powerful features of Facebook, is the ability to build community interest groups. Facebook allows like-minded people to easily communicate and collaborate in a manner not previously devised. Members of interest groups do not need to be geographically co-located, and are not constrained by race, gender, or religion. Groups can be private, invitational, or fully open. Clubs and local associations, charities, and event organisers can use Facebook to spread a message, or to garnish support for their cause.

At present there are a few Facebook groups that support the Wamboin and Bywong community. Local residents can get updates on what's happening in our region, post questions, receive notices & news, post a wanted add, support a school, or just post an observation or opinion on a subject. Nature Notes May 2014

After some low temperatures at the beginning of May, the days have warmed up again with quite high temperatures for this time of the year. Only a few millimetres of rain fell early in the month, but some areas are still holding a fair amount of moisture in the soil.

The warm weather seems to be causing a a bit of confusion amongst the plants with some usually spring-flowering species already showing some colour. There are two *Dillwynia juniperina*, tall spiky-leaved shrubs, near my fence. One is still covered in clusters of silvery buds while the other one is already sporting its yellow and red pea flowers.

Very few of the Little Dumpy Orchids (*Diplodium truncatum*) flowered this autumn, but the earlier rains seemed to have favoured their growth – there are now large patches of green, ground-hugging rosettes here. There are about fifteen populations of this orchid at my place, some with only a dozen or so rosettes but one population now covers nearly two metres of damp soil.

The warm weather also means that the occasional snake is still to be seen. I was looking at some paw marks on a smooth-barked tree recently when I glanced down and realized I was occupying a space uncomfortably close to a large dark-coloured snake with a yellowish belly. Although it didn't have any discernible bands on its body I believe it was a Tiger Snake. It didn't move and I thought it might be dead, but eventually it slithered under a pile of debris near the tree.

The Sulphur-crested Cockatoos are spending a lot of time in the afternoon on the ground feeding on plant material – pulling off strands of the straggly little Nodding Saltbush, *Einadia nutans*, and digging up *Cymbonotus lawsonianus* (Austral Bear's-ear). At this time of the year, they also feed on underground tubers and, last year, demolished a patch of Vanilla Lilies (*Arthropodium milleflorum*) that I'd planted. However, the lilies soon put up one or two leaves and have almost recovered to their former state. The local wildlife may occasionally appear (to human eyes) to damage vegetation, but it usually makes a full recovery fairly quickly.

There have been plenty of Gang-gang Cockatoos around recently. The birds I've seen here all looked like adults, but, last week, I caught sight of three Gang-gangs in a Bundy tree (*Eucalyptus goniocalyx*) Two of them were busy feeding on the seed capsules and definitely adults, but the other one was a juvenile. It was creaking quietly and monotonously to get its mother's attention and some regurgitated food – unsuccessfully for the few minutes I was watching.

Last week, there were huge numbers of bugs (Scutellaridae) on a Cherry Ballart tree (*Exocarpos cupressiformis*) near the road. They were small (about a centimetre in length) and a mottled black, grey and yellowish colour with a V-shaped pattern on their backs. There were so many of them that the tree looked as if it was weighed down with flowers. A few days later, they were all gone, probably seeking sheltered places to hibernate during to coming winter.

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Councillor's Corner

Road Infrastructure — We've held a number of community information sessions over the past couple of years, in conjunction with major road works, to help people understand the road building process. We've also presented some background information on council's road infrastructure that I thought may be of general interest.

Like many rural shires, Palerang's most expensive 'piece' of infrastructure is its transport network, its roads and bridges, and like most rural shires, with a large geographical area and relatively small population, it is the most challenging to maintain. The Palerang LGA covers 5,134 km², and includes around 1440 km of roads, around 600 km sealed and 800 km unsealed. There are also 129 bridges, 22 of which are still of timber construction and nearing the end of their operational life.

From a funding perspective, however, not all roads are created equal. Throughout the State, there is a road management hierarchy of State, Regional and Local Roads.

Funding for the maintenance of State roads is provided by the State, although works are often contracted to local councils. The Kings Highway (Main Road 51, or MR51), Sutton Road (MR52), and Braidwood Road (MR79) are all State roads, maintained under contract by Palerang Council—they don't cost us anything.

The Palerang LGA also contains around 231 km of Regional Roads, being Tarago Road (MR268), Captains Flat Road (MR270), Nerriga Road (MR92), Macs Reef/Bungendore Road (Regional Road 7607 or RR7607) and Cooma Road (RR7625). The significance of Regional Road status in the present context is that the State provides some funding that can only be used for the maintenance of Regional Roads. In fact, around 75% of the 2013/2014 road maintenance grant budget of \$2.2M was only for use on Regional Roads. The State also determines what roads will be classified as Regional Roads, so we can't just make all our roads Regional Roads to take advantage of this funding opportunity.

The remaining 1,000 km or so of roads in the shire are local roads, which must be maintained primarily with revenue derived from rates, supplemented by a small amount of State grant funding. Balancing the road maintenance needs of the different parts of the shire is a major challenge for Council come budget time each year.

To put this funding into a bit more perspective, it costs around \$3.50/m² to reseal a road—that's about \$30,000/km. Rehabilitation, which is the complete (re)construction of a road, starts at about \$350,000/km, for a road that does not require any major excavations.

Many people do not realise that sealing a road is not the end of the story. Apart from ongoing maintenance of pavement failures, even a perfectly good sealed pavement requires periodic resealing. Under normal conditions, the sun alone causes the gradual deterioration of a bitumen surface, causing it to become brittle. If it is not resealed periodically, the surface will ultimately crack and break up.

The industry standard return period for a sealed road is 7-12 years, and for major rehabilitation is 30-50 years. Council's current funding supports a reseal interval of around 22 years, and a rehabilitation interval of around 110 years, so we are steadily losing ground on this front. The difference between best and actual practice is what is commonly referred to as the *infrastructure backlog*, a problem facing most NSW councils, rural councils in particular.

Just to complete the picture, resheeting, which is the resurfacing of unsealed roads (not to be confused with simply grading them), costs \$20,000–\$25,000/km, with a pavement life of 7–10 years. Council is currently running at around 30 years between resheets of its gravel roads.

Of course, this is not all there is to road maintenance. There are also the routine activities such as patching potholes, and the maintenance of signage, guide posts and railing. Fortunately, it's a little easier to manage these activities, so if you notice a pothole opening up, or damaged signs, guide posts of protective railing, please report them to council. We can only fix the things we know about.

On top of the roads themselves, we have 121 bridges to maintain, all from the same budget. But that's a story for another time.
