The November market had a record number of stalls and lots of lovely local garden produce now that the growing season is upon us. Should be even better next month now we've had some rain.

We have had a number of enquiries from people wanting stalls at the markets. As a result we have drawn up a set of guidelines based on current practice (and supported by the WCA). These are listed below. Any comments or questions- please come and talk to us at the Christmas markets.

#### Wamboin Home Produce Markets - Guidelines

- Aim to preserve the integrity of the market as a Wamboin <u>Home Produce</u> Market.
- Encourage the **presence of local producers on the day** so that they can share their experiences as producers with other members of the community.
- Maintain a variety and balance in type of stalls.
- Actively **promote the café** at the market, **as a monthly neighbourhood meeting place**. Include this opportunity to 'meet your neighbours' in the WCA introductory pack sent to new residents in the area.
- Seek out additional **opportunities for advertising the markets** eg facebook, local free to air radio, community noticeboards etc.
- Avoid the markets becoming a commercial enterprise where goods produced outside the region are sold on a commercial or franchise basis.
- Allocate one or two stalls each month for **guest stall holders** from the wider region, eg Bungendore, Queanbeyan, Braidwood, providing variety in the goods that are being offered.
- Support joint ventures eg scheduling the annual Wheels of Wamboin event for a market day.
- Level of fees for stallholders to be decided by the Wamboin Community Association at their annual general meeting each February.

Be flexible in applying these guidelines and do not apply them retrospectively

#### **Local Weather Online**

#### Wamboin Weather Station Commissioned

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For all you weather fanatics and everyone else we now have weather data recorded from the Wamboin / Bywong district available online.

As part of the commissioning of the Wamboin Neighbourhood Safer Place (NSP) a new weather station was installed at the Wamboin RFS shed. The data collected by the weather station includes temperature, wind speed, humidity, barometric pressure and importantly the Fire Danger Index (FDI) and it's all on the web.

Most of our community is some 200 metres higher than Canberra which means on extreme fire days the weather information from the BOM weather station, based at local conditions

the Canberra airport, may not reflect our local conditions.

This new facility will allow our community to be aware of local weather conditions and the risk of bushfire. To access this information log on to the **Wamboin RFS** or **Wamboin Community** websites and click on the **Weather Station** tab. The website has been designed to operate in Google Chrome and will also operate in Interernet Explorer.

#### FIRE DANGER INDEX (FDI) AND YOUR BUSHFIRE SURVIVAL PLAN

In last month's article we discussed fire danger ratings and how they can be a trigger for acting on your bushfire survival plan. With FDI data now available online you can see in real time what action should be taking.



Fire Danger Rating	Fire Danger Index	Impact Potential	Action
Catastrophic	Above 100	Very likely people in the path of the fire will die. Property will be destroyed.	For your survival leaving early is the best option
Extreme	75 - 99	Likelihood people in the path of the fire will die. Property will be destroyed.	Leaving early is the safest option
Severe	50-74	There is a chance lives may be lost and property destroyed.	Leaving early is best. Only stay if you and your home are well prepared and you can defend it.
Very High	25-49	Loss of life unlikely, some property may be destroyed.	Only stay if you and your home are well prepared and you can defend it.
High	12-24	Loss of life unlikely, property damage limited	Know where to get information and monitor situation.
Low/Moderate	0-11	Little or no risk to life or property	Know where to get information and monitor situation.

#### **BURNING OFF – FIRE PERMITS REQUIRED**



A request for a Fire Permit should be made at least a week before you intend to burn but as the season warms up and the country cures your chances of getting approval to burn is pretty negligible.

#### MACS REEF WASTE TRANSFER STATION (MRWTS)

At long last the Waste Transfer Station on Macs Reef Road, Bywong, will open on Friday 5 December 2014, as will the Bungendore Waste Transfer Station and Resource Recovery Centre on Tarago Road. The respective landfills (tips) will close on 2 December. It is the culmination of a lot of work over many years by members of the Wamboin and Bywong communities with Palerang Council.

A Waste Transfer Station operates in a different way to a landfill/tip that we are used to so it pays to familiarise oneself with the mode of operation in this facility, particularly in regard to what will be accepted and what will not, the new hours of operation and the new charges.

The Macs Reef site currently limits the material that can be handled at the WTS but has been configured to accept household waste, recyclable material, oil (engine up to 40 litres), batteries and electronic waste (TVs, computers & mobile 'phones). Eventually provision might be made for green waste and a small buy-back facility for re-usable items.

Details of the new opening hours and waste charges are listed elsewhere in this attachment to the Whisper. Payment of the gate charges can be made either in cash or by credit card on entry. Evidence of local residence is required either with the current Palerang tip pass or your drivers licence (local address).

It should be noted that the gate fee is in addition to Council's Waste Programs Charge in your rates. This Charge will partially cover the transport of waste by Council from the WTSs to the Woodlawn Bioreactor and to the Hume Materials Recycling Facility and the rehabilitation of the landfills. It also goes to Council's general rubbish and clean-up responsibilities, specifically emptying bins in parks and ovals, shopping areas, public toilets, annual household chemical clean-outs, and cleaning up illegal dumping. In accordance with Council's 20 year waste strategy, the Waste Services Charge is mooted to cease in 2018/19 when the Council closes its remaining landfill sites in Palerang.

For a more comprehensive account on the Macs Reef and Bungendore Waste Transfer Stations, you might refer to the Palerang Council's web site - particularly the Frequently Asked Questions. The Wamboin Community Association web site provides a history of the process that led to the establishment of the new facilities.

Please note that O'Sullivans Rural Waste will continue to operate their collection service to Wamboin/Bywong/Sutton Park. – John van der Straaten

#### A Note on the \$5 Charge 240 Liter Bins at the Waste Transfer Stations

A resident emailed me to say that it might be problematic to charge \$5 for landfill material coming to the Waste Transfer Stations in 140 L bins but more for 240 L bins, as most bins are now 240 L. After a brief conversation with staff, it has been agreed to accept 240L bins without any additional charge (i.e. \$5 for a 240L bin). The issue was an historical one. When we (the community—I wasn't on Council back then) first did all the survey work and the like, the proposal was to use 140L bins for a collection service, as per the towns. But in the intervening period, as we have introduced rural collection services, they have all used 240L bins, so that's the way we'll go now. There were always bound to be some teething problems with the new system, so please let me know if you encounter anything else that needs attention. – Pete Harrison


Have you ever experienced the awful discomfort of reflux and stomach ulcers? Unfortunately horses of all breeds, equestrian disciplines and ages are also prone to this condition called Equine Gastric Ulcer Syndrome, (EGUS), and it can affect their performance ability, bodyweight and comfort.

#### CANBERRA Equine Hospital

Part of the reason horses get stomach ulcers is because of the anatomy of their stomach, which has a nonglandular covering in the top 1/3 that has minimal protection from stomach acids and 80% of ulcers occur here. The lower 2/3 of the stomach is glandular and secretes hydrochloric acid for digestion but also mucous and bicarbonate

that provide protection from the acid. As horses are continual grazers, the stomach is constantly producing acid, which is the primary reason for ulcer development.

Causes of stomach ulcers include feeding high grain diets, stress, (e.g. illness, transport, new environments), intermittent feeding, intensive training and treatment with nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs, such as bute. Signs of ulcers in horses include picky eaters who may prefer hay and grass to their hard feed, mild colic, discomfort when doing up




the girth and riding, diarrhoea, weight loss, attitude change, poor hair coat and poor performance.

Stomach ulcers can only be diagnosed in horses by gastroscopy, that is, passing a long tube with a camera at the end up the nose, down the oesophagus and into the stomach to look inside. No other tests are reliable. Treatment is usually successfully achieved by using drugs that inhibit the stomach acid production or coat the ulcers, and by changes in the horse's environment to reduce stress. Usually we

don't see complete improvement until after 4 to 6 weeks of treatment and some animals require preventative dosing around periods of stress.

#### Lizards – Part II

I enjoyed reading Will Gregory's story in last month's Whisper about catching and keeping lizards - his enthusiasm was captivating. Having friends, parents and grandparents joining in his hobby made the story even more compelling. Regrettably there is a problem – but one that can be easily readily overcome.

Not everyone knows that all wildlife, including lizards, is protected under the National Parks & Wildlife Act 1974 and it is simply against the law to take animals from the wild. There is good reason for this. Will mentioned Dad catching a shingleback and Grandma/pa picking up another for his collection. What may not be realised is that shinglebacks mate for life, so by taking one from the wild means that a close lizard relationship, which could go on for 20 years, has been broken. I'm not sure what type of skink Will's friend gave him, but many live in family groups - not just on their own.

It is not for me to say, but if Will wants to keep reptiles permanently, then I reckon Dad needs to get a Reptile Keeper's Licence (you need to be over 16 years) and buy lizards from a licenced breeder. Many pet shops sell reptiles (and other species), which are bred specifically for private collectors.



The Office of Environment & Heritage (OEH) also publishes a Code of Practice for the Private Keeping of Reptiles and this covers all you need to know about looking after a permanent care reptile privately. The Code might indicate the need for a bigger tank and advise feeding the skink a wider variety of food – not just carrot. OEH also recommends you join a reptile keeper organization, such as a herpetological society.

This might all sound a bit heavy, but it is the right thing to do. Here is the OEH website address with all the info:

It is important to get the lizards that have been caught from the wild assessed by say Wildcare or the National Parks and Wildlife Service rangers to see if they can be put back where they were found. Wildcare has found this to be quite successful depending on an animal's condition and how long it has been in care. If an animal cannot be returned to the wild, then NPWS staff can see if it can be classified as a permanent care animal. But in future there is only one way to go and that is get a licence and buy lizards from a licenced breeder.

Lastly, perhaps it would be good for a story to be written in the school newsletter, so that all of Will's friends know why they shouldn't take animals from the wild and how keeping lizards can be done legally. -- Philip Machin 6238 3717

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#### Bywong &Wamboin Greenways: A Successful Public Asset

I love walking and I love the bush. To me, being able to get out, to roam and to enjoy is obvious. And my dogs love it, too. So, I was pretty happy when I moved to Bywong in 2006 & discovered we have a small network of public access trails in the area, that was initiated as part of a 1988 Bi-Centennial project, that eventuated as a pilot network in 1994. This is a unique project to a rural residential area of NSW and I am unaware of any other area that has this designated facility\*.

I always wished there were more of them, and so I called a public meeting in April 2010 and we started the Greenways Renewal Working (GRoW) group. In those 5 years, I have learned an enormous amount about how it all works, and I have also had the great pleasure of leading public walks in the area.

Why public walks? 1. Exploring, social, community & health – people enjoy getting out, being introduced to new walking new areas and meeting others. 300+ people have participated over the 4 - 5 years we have been running walks. 2. Establishing a pattern of use–this is a form of protection for the future. Nothing prevents any of these public access ways being re-zoned or sold off into private ownership. We have been advised that an established pattern of public use would be the best way to protect these public access ways. NEXT WALK Australia Day 2015 Monday 26 January 8 am



Success: there were doubts in the early days from property owners about the wisdom and cost of such a network, and these doubts occassionally re-surface from local residents and from the Council. However to date, none of the concerns have actually materialised and, in fact, there is a quiet but palpable current of local support.

Green Army 2015: In addition, Angus Taylor, Member for Hume, has advanced the Bywong & Wamboin Greenways network for a 6 month program of rehabilitation works & assistance, with input from Palerang Council, from a paid "Green Army" and we are hopeful this will commence in 2015.

\*Greenways have a mixture of different legal status--some are Crownroads, NSW Govt, and some owned by Palerang Council, specifically as greenways for non--motorised use & to help provide wildlife corridors. They are all in public ownership. All Crown roads – paved or unpaved – were created to facilitate access & this legality remains so, even if a crown road runs across or adjacent to a private property.

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#### **Councillor's Corner**

Local Government Reform (yet again...) — There have been further developments on this front since my last piece back in April, so here's a further update.

The NSW government has now responded to the Independent Local Government Review Panel (ILGRP) recommendations by releasing its Fit for the Future (FFTF) blueprint for reform of the NSW local government sector. This program requires each council to effectively prepare a business plan for its future, based on the recommendations of the ILGRP. The ultimate goal is to give communities confidence that their council is financially sound, operating efficiently and in a strong position to guide community growth and deliver quality services.

For Palerang and Queanbeyan councils, the Panel recommended that either a merger between the two councils, or participation in one of the new Joint Organisations of councils, would provide the best opportunity to achieve the scale and strategic capacity required to satisfy the needs of their respective communities into the future.

While the merger option is the one that is receiving most media attention, it is not the only option available to the two councils. As the preferred recommendation of the ILGRP, however, the merger option is a reference point that needs to be considered in justifying any alternative. As such, both councils have agreed to explore the feasibility of the merger option while also developing alternatives, including that of remaining as stand-alone entities and engaging closely with other neighbouring councils in one of the new cooperative Joint Organisations of councils.

The Joint Organisation (JO) structure, not unlike that of the current Southeast Regional Organisation of Councils (SEROC) of which Palerang and Queanbeyan are both members, provides a framework for regional strategic planning and cooperative resource sharing arrangements between member councils. This model is seen as all the more significant in SE NSW because, unlike any of the other recommended structural reform proposals, it offers the capacity to recognise the influence that Canberra and the ACT have on the economies of neighbouring councils and the SE NSW region in general.

Public commentary on the options that are developed by the two councils is also a mandatory component in the preparation of a FFTF response. The State government has made it clear that it will be the community that decides on the future of their council. To this end, council will circulate information brochures and canvass formal feedback from the community in the coming months. Please take the time to read this material when it is circulated, and help your council to make a recommendation that is in the best interest of your community.

Many aspects of the Fit for the Future reform package involve new models, and some even depend on changes in legislation that are yet to be drafted. As such, there are still many unknowns, even though councils have been given a June 2015 deadline to have their reform proposals submitted for review. While the coming months will be challenging, Council will make every effort to keep you informed throughout the process.






