Bonfire Night – The big event for September is of course Bonfire Night. The bonfire is building nicely on the oval but just a couple of reminders if you wish to deposit something on the bonfire. PLEASE NO BUILDING WASTE! We only need cuttings and logs not exceeding 150 mm in diameter. No bricks, or pallets or other building waste please. The bonfire is an event which involves quite specific timing. It begins at 5:00pm on Saturday 19th September. Food stalls wont open until about 5:30pm so that people can get some food and drink before settling down to the main event of the evening – the lighting of the bonfire at 6:33 pm and the fireworks (weather permitting) at 7:03pm. To assist the fire brigade (who have agreed to help out with parking) we ask that people don't arrive prior to 4:45 pm. Prices for the event are as follows: Adults - \$5, Children - \$2 and a Family - \$10. This gains entry to the ground and the bonfire and viewing of the fireworks. However this is an opportunity for all our local service groups around the area to raise some much needed funds by selling all sorts of good things to eat and drink. So please come along and join us on the 19th September at 5:00pm and support this great event.

#### The Wamboin Neighbourhood Safer Place 112 Bingley Way, Wamboin NSW 2621

This article introduces the new Wamboin Neighbourhood Safer Place (NSP); subsequent articles will cover additional aspects of how it will be operated. After the devastating bush fires in Victoria a few years ago it became obvious to governments that there is a need for local places/spaces to be designated as "Neighbourhood Safer Place". The NSW Rural Fire Service (RFS) website <a href="https://www.rfs.nsw.gov.au">www.rfs.nsw.gov.au</a> explains the RFS position and lists all NSW NSP.


An NSP provides the minimum to survive. The Wamboin NSP will provide protection from ember attack, radiant heat and direct impact from fire. There will also be potable water for drinking and basic washing, information about the fire, and NSP assistance teams for parking, registration, public information, hygiene and first aid.

However, from the outset it must be understood that an NSP is a **PLACE OF LAST RESORT**; it is **NOT** an Evacuation Centre or any other similar community emergency support facility. It is a place to flee to when your Bushfire Survival Plan has not worked.

The Wamboin NSP is not going to be a safe alternative for most residents in Wamboin or Bywong; its 'catchment' is quite small. Where the NSP is not a safe option, you should identify safer locations close to home; this should be part of your Bushfire Survival Plan. Remember, depending on where you live and the direction of threat, it might be better for you to go to Queanbeyan, Canberra or Bungendore. The NSP only provides basic survival facilities.

Please update or complete your Bushfire Survival Plan before the fire season commences – probably 1<sup>st</sup> October. If you need a blank one or would like some guidance the Fire Brigade has a regular 'stand' outside the Fire Shed concurrent with the monthly Wamboin Produce Markets. Alternatively, the Brigade Captain can always be contacted – see front page for details.



Ann Goonan, President This News Put Together by the Bywong Committee



Information Session – Home and Property Security: This was delivered prior to the AGM on 10 August by Senior Constable Naomi Nemec from the Monaro Police. Although there has been some concern of late regarding break in and robbery of homes and properties, according to Constable Nemec the level of such incidents is really quite low in our general area. Nevertheless all incidents should be reported, and of course everyone should be alert to any activity that looks out of the ordinary or suspicious. The quickest and most direct contact for expressing any concerns is to the Queanbeyan Police. Even if nothing much happens in response to a situation, the police use all sorts of information in building up patterns of crime or potential crime. This is useful for future crime prevention purposes.

Annual General Meeting: This was held on August 10 and heralded a few major changes within the executive and committee. After more than three years of energetic and dedicated service Darryl Bourke has stepped down as President and Anne Goonan stepped up to fill that office, having been involved with the Association since the 1990s.

Bernie Greethead vacated the position of Secretary and we thank her for her diligence and persistence – deriving written minutes from the multiple conversations that sometimes flowed during meetings! Kerry Cox has taken up the challenge and is now the new Secretary of the BCA. Dr. Clive Boughton and Jean-Pierre Favre remain as Vice President and Treasurer respectively. Guy Cotsell remains as Public Officer, however with some 'succession planning' in train. Merle Horgosi and Bob Angel return as ordinary committee members and we welcome our new committee members: Jeremy Shearmur, Felicity Lawrence and Steve Walker.

The outgoing President noted that for the BCA to continue its regular activities (Car Boot Sale, Trivia Evenings etc.) and expand activities, we need new members and of course new ideas. As an example of such initiative, Merle Ketley is actively investigating the possibility of establishing a children's play ground at the Bwyong Hall, and the committee and executive are supporting her initiative. Darryl Bourke and Bernie Greethead were both thanked by the executive and committee for their excellent work and contributions over the past years.

Macs Reef Road and Federal Highway Intersection: Following concerns raised first by the Wamboin Community
Association, and again more recently by Bywong Community Association with NSW Roads and Maritime Services, Mr. Adam
Berry (Network & Safety Manager Southern) met with the community to talk about the issues. The planned solution to the
present problems will include the installation of a STOP sign at the intersection and the reinstatement of the 'slip' lane.
This meeting was held on August 24 at Bywong Hall, and there was some audience skepticism that the proposed measures
would lead to greater safety at the intersection. Nevertheless, according to Mr. Berry long term (20 year) changes to the
Federal Highway may well dictate significant improvements to the intersection in the future, although the time frame is not
certain and could be decades. There were no immediate plans for Roads and Maritime Services to invest significant funds on
this intersection although it is used by over 5000 vehicles each day. Next BCA Meeting: The next meeting is at 7:30 October
12<sup>th</sup> at the Hall.



#### Acceleration Lane, Intersection of Federal Highway and Macs Reef Road, Bywong

Roads and Maritime Services will reinstate a short length of acceleration lane at the junction of the Federal Highway and Macs Reef Road at Bywong, following community feedback about safety at the intersection. The work will include installing a short auxiliary lane to allow motorists turning left from Macs Reef Road to accelerate onto the Federal Highway. Work is planned for November 2015.

Why are we doing this? In October 2014 Roads and Maritime Services removed a short length of acceleration lane on Federal Highway at Macs Reed Road following a report of observed near misses at this intersection. An investigation found that a short length of auxiliary lane on the shoulder of the Federal Highway was being used as an acceleration lane for traffic turning left from Macs Reef Road. The auxiliary lane did not meet current standards for an acceleration lane and was removed.

Following removal of this lane, concerns were raised by the community that a road safety issue had been introduced, and near misses were now occurring where they had not previously occurred.

What will change Even though the previous intersection arrangements did not meet design standards, Roads and Maritime will install a short length of acceleration at this site together with a stop sign on Macs Reef Road. The introduction of a stop sign is to reinforce the need for motorists to stop and wait for an appropriate gap in approaching traffic before turning left onto the Federal Highway. The short acceleration lane will provide a 'second chance' for motorists who misjudge a gap in traffic.





#### Macs Reef Road/Federal Highway Intersection - Update

In July's Whisper, the WCA Vice President reported that Roads and Maritime Services (RMS) had returned to a second Wamboin Community Association meeting to advise that the acceleration lane would be reinstated and the Give Way sign would be replaced by a Stop sign. This new arrangement was confirmed by RMS in late July by a letterbox drop to local

While the return of the acceleration lane is appreciated, a Stop sign has not proved as popular. On being contacted by the Bywong Community Association, Adam Berry, Network & Safety Manager Southern, RMS, suggested he could attend a meeting at the Bywong Hall on August 24.

A dedicated group of hardy Bywong and Wamboin residents braved the appallingly wet and cold conditions to hear Adam again outline why RMS had removed the acceleration lane - there had been reports of vehicles rolling out of Macs Reef Road without due consideration of traffic in the main carriageway. RMS's view was that this presented a significant risk due to the high speed differential between Highway traffic and vehicles entering from Macs Reef Rd.

As he has done at the two previous meetings, Adam acknowledged the high volume of traffic, both local and coast commuters and that the intersection, in any form, is not ideal mainly due to its proximity to the Sutton Road off-ramp. He advised that in 2017-18 RMS is undertaking a Corridor Strategy for the Federal Highway, which will devise a plan for how the route is managed over the ensuing 20 years. Until then, the intersection will operate with the short acceleration lane and a Stop sign.

Attendees spoke of the lengthy delays caused by the removal of the acceleration lane and went on to question the logic of a Stop sign, which is only going to make matters worse. Adam did agree that the new arrangement will make the intersection less efficient, but that in RMS's view, these measures were making it safer.

This lead to a well-informed discussion about the intersection's accident record, which is very short. Attendees familiar with the history of the intersection reported that there were numerous "rear-end" accidents during a previous Stop sign period, which reduced after the Stop sign was replaced. In the period reviewed by RMS, 2009-2013, there were 3 reported accidents at the intersection, only 1 of which was attributed to the high-speed differential.

The issues of poor driver behaviour and the lack of understanding of merge rules was discussed. Despite it generally being considered polite and efficient to do so, according to the Australian Road Rules, there is no requirement for Federal Highway traffic to move to the right lane to allow entering traffic to merge. Adam did agree to consider installing Merging *Traffic Ahead* signs on the Federal Highway approach to the intersection.

Adam concluded that a risk assessment had been done, the Give Way sign will not be reinstated.

Meeting attendees concluded that advocacy for reinstatement of the Give Way in conjunction with the acceleration lane was now only available via our local member, (The Hon. John Barilaro, MP, Minister for Regional Development, Minister for Skills, and Minister for Small Business, GPO Box 5341, SYDNEY NSW 2001 or by Email: monaro@parliament.nsw.gov.au).

#### The Fire Season Approaches



At the time of writing the Fire Season will start on 1 October. This means you have only a few weeks left for clearing and reducing the fuel load around your house. Of course after this date you can always transport your green waste to the Bungendore waste transfer station but the waste must be within limits, namely no stumps and no branches greater than 250 mm in diameter.

So if you are planning on more clearing then it's time to get busy assuming the start of the Fire Season has not been brought forward and you have already run out of time.

When it comes to preparing your home the RFS Fact Sheet No2, *Bushfire and Your Home*, provides a wealth of information on the things you can do. It's available on

the RFS website.

One project that you could start now to prepare your house is filling all the gaps in your brickwork or around window frames or door frames. This is about stopping embers penetrating your house and it's a great way to stop rodents getting in. Once you start looking there will be lots of gaps that need to be filled. Have you ever looked under the roof capping of your metal roof; this is great place for leaf litter to build up.


There are several ways of filling these gaps including metallic mesh or fire resisting expanding foam. Both are available from local hardware stores

If you are planning on a burn remember you are required to call Fire Control Queanbeyan on 6128 0600 during business hours and before 2.00pm on Friday, and advise all your neighbours.

#### **Brigade Activity**

Call Outs: August has been the busiest month so far this year.



*Monday July 27:* At 11:20 am two medium tankers with a total crew of five responded to assist Mulloon, Braidwood and Bungendore brigades at a 65 ha grass fire on the Braidwood-Goulburn road. Crews returned to the station at 2.50 pm.

*Tuesday 4 August:* At 10.45 am a heavy tanker with a crew of five was sent to a truck rollover on the Federal Highway near Eaglehawk, returning to station by by 12.05.

*Thursday 6 August*: At 3.30 pm a heavy tanker with five members, and the captain's vehicle responded to a reported smoke sighting near Scholefield Rd on the Federal Highway. No fire was found and crews returned to station.

*Thursday 6 August*: At 11.30 pm a heavy tanker with crew of four responded to a fire which destroyed a cabin at the Capital Country resort, assisting NSW Fire &

Rescue and Sutton RFS crews, returning to the station by 2.00 am. .

Saturday 8 August: At 6.45 pm six crew turned out to the station for a truck fire near Collector, but were called off before they left the station.

Sunday 16 August: At 5.55 pm a heavy tanker with four crew and the captain's vehicle responded to another reported fire near Schofield Rd. Again no fire was found and crew retuned to station.

Friday 21 August: At 5:50 pm the captain investigated a fire near Bungendore Rd and the Federal highway, which turned out to be an authorised agricultural burn, requiring no further action.

Sunday 23 August: At 12:10 pm two heavy tankers and the captain's vehicle with total crew of 10 responded to a fire which destroyed a shed/temporary dwelling on Woolshed Lane. Crews from NSW Fire & Rescue, and RFS units from Bungendore and Queanbeyan assisted. All units had left the scene by 4:00 pm. At 12:30 am the following morning two heavy tankers with total crew of four responded to a flare-up (back in station by 2:00 am) and a tanker with four crew attended the scene from 8:00 am to 10:00 am.,





#### **Intermittent Sinister Counterattacks from Underneath**

While the recent rains are a welcome sight for many; too much or too little of a good thing can be the road engineers' worst nightmare.

Unsealed roads tend to be the most obvious barometer on this situation. Long term users of gravel roads know only too well the 'rapid fire machine gun' type effect of dry weather corrugations and the pot hole maze that comes with persistent periods of wet weather. But what about sealed roads?

Generally speaking these are immune from the effects of wet weather, provided that thin layer of bitumen and stone (the seal) remains intact. Without the seal, water may penetrate the pavement from the top resulting in potholes and localised pavement failures. All an excellent argument for maintaining seals through a targeted and ongoing reseal program.

But there is another more sinister way that water can attack a sealed pavement. From underneath. A less common form of failure (but perhaps more dramatic when it does occur), subsurface attack usually takes the form of an intermittent spring and has an uncanny habit of attacking new or recently constructed pavements. While we don't really know why this occurs, it is likely that it is associated with the interruption of long established subsurface drainage paths as part of the initial road works. It is not always obvious where these drainage paths are created, interrupted or destroyed at the time of works but it is a sure bet that where such an interaction has occurred you will find out about it in a future period of wet weather.

Residents of Wamboin have recently had the opportunity to see this phenomenon in action on no less than two occasions; on Norton Road and Macs Reef Road. Both represent a disappointing blemish on what is otherwise an excellent project outcome and efforts are now being made to attend to the situation. A word of caution though, fixing subsoil drainage issues can be more art than science, sometimes with new paths opening as others are intercepted/closed. Long term residents will recall Council's successive attempts to address an earlier situation on Macs Reef Road near the Yass River crossing.

Persistence does pay off however and residents are assured that efforts to solve these situations will continue to be made now, and into the future if that eventuality arises.

#### Wildcare - Alert not Alarmed

It's that time of the year when we all get a spring in our step. Wildlife is on the move too. From a safety perspective, we should all be alert to unexpectedly coming across a venomous snake. Snakes are shy creatures and are more fearful of us than the other way around. Wildcare has close to 100 snake handler volunteers across the region, who can advise and help relocate a snake that's in the wrong place. But better to be prepared and let these wonderful animals move away without interference.

Wayne (see photo), Wildcare's Snake Coordinator, has some great tips to keep you safe "With the warmer weather, snakes are going to start to come out of their winter hibernation. They will warm themselves, become active and search for food and mates. Be aware that browns and red-bellies are widespread in our region. And around Bungendore/Wamboin, tigers are common too. Expect the unexpected and dress appropriately when walking through undergrowth, farming, gardening or pottering – jeans, boots, gloves when gardening, provide some protection, as snake fangs are quite short (2-5mm). Be careful at night and ensure you can see what's around.

"It's a good idea to keep the surrounds of the house, yard and outbuildings clear of rubbish and reduce debris to minimise snake hiding spots. This allows you to see what is around. Mice and rats, attracted to loose grain, will bring snakes. If



you have water features, these attract frogs – which bring snakes too. Bird netting can be a problem and if possible raise it off the ground to stop a snake becoming trapped. When gardening, know where your hands are going and wear gloves. Dogs and cats should ideally be kept under control and not allowed to wander over large areas where they can seek out snakes. Ensure a snake doesn't enter the house through an open door or window.

"In short, the risk of encountering a snake can be reduced by being alert to their behavior and having a good old tidy up, so you can see them. Snakes are shy and defensive and will move away if allowed to."

Wayne goes on to say "When outside, it is a good idea to let others know where you are and carry a mobile phone. Carry a compression bandage, including in the car. If you do happen to get

bitten, be calm. Staying still is important, as venom is transferred via the lymph system, which is pumped by muscle movement. Don't move and the venom will move slower through your body. Using a compression bandage with immobilisation will give you several hours before experiencing any ill effects. Hospitals have test kits to identify a venom type - so there is no need to catch, kill or identify the snake! Trying to kill a snake is fraught with danger, as they will feel threatened and defend themselves by attacking. Do not clean the bite area. Wrap a bandage over the bite, to the end of the limb, and back up to the groin/armpit. Mark the bite area. Immobilise the limb and the patient. Call 000 and bring the ambulance to the patient."

If you come across a snake that is trapped and cannot move away, call Wildcare on 6299 1966 for advise and help. Left alone, snakes will generally move off on their own accord. (PS. At the WCA meeting in August 2003, the proposal to hold monthly produce markets was discussed. It was decided to commence the markets on 18 October 2003.

This was reported in the September 2003 Whisper, and the announcement concluded "This will provide a market opportunity for local residents who do not produce on a commercial level but have surplus home produce to sell. There would be a nominal charge for stallholders. If you are interested and wish to support this idea or have any comments please contact Tony Power before the next WCA meeting on 16 September."

As a result of this, Alan and Eleanor contacted Tony, and together with Tony and Moira, they traded at the very first Wamboin Produce Market, both families selling their home garden produce.

At the time, Alan was acting as a distributor for two Sydney based, friend-owned businesses, one a chocolate products selling company and the other a company selling dried fruit and nut products. After a few markets and some discussion with Joan and Lofty, Alan took on a second stall and commenced selling chocolates, sweets, dried fruit, and nuts. This evolved into what has been operating for the last few years, with Eleanor selling her Raspberry products on one stall, and Alan selling bulk dried fruit and nuts on another.

Fast forward to August 2015 and 120 Wamboin Markets later. Having operated his stall at all but two markets, when family members operated it for him, Alan has decided to call it quits as far as the dried fruit and nuts are concerned. He is not distributing the product anymore, both businesses having changed owners, and costs associated with acquiring the items have escalated.

So at Wamboin Produce Market #121 on September 19, Alan will join Eleanor in selling her Berry and fruit jams, and other berry products. But no more dried fruit, nuts, or chocolates, but maybe still some Nougat and Turkish Delight if there is space with the jams. Thank you to all who have supported the stall over the years.

#### **Councillor's Corner**

**Electronic Housing Code (Update)** — Well, I fully intended to continue our discussion on the use of the Electronic Housing Code (EHC) this month, but as fate would have it, I hit a bit of a snag that I haven't yet been able to overcome! Suffice it to say that the EHC isn't quite ready just yet... But I'll come back to this subject as soon as the current problem is sorted.

In the mean time, I thought I might take a step back and take a broader look at the Development Application (DA) process. A DA is a request for permission to carry out a certain development. Development can be:

- the subdivision of land;
- the demolition of a building or work;
- the erection of a new dwelling;
- the change of use of a building;
- the construction of a shed; or
- the carrying out of a range of other building works.

The assessment of a Development Application determines whether or not a development is appropriate for a given location. An indication of whether or not any particular development might be appropriate on a particular lot is provided in a 149 Certificate as discussed in last month's Councillors Corner.

In general, the assessment of a DA is a multi-step process that is outlined in several information sheets available from the Palerang Council website (www.palerang.nsw.gov.au, and search for "Development Application"). From the outset, it is good to know that council planning staff are available to assist in all stages of the DA process. In particular, they are available to discuss proposed developments prior to the lodging of a formal DA. These pre-DA meetings

particular, they are available to discuss proposed developments prior to the lodging of a formal DA. These pre-DA meeting are provided free of charge and residents are encouraged to take advantage of this service to help ensure that all necessary information is provided with an application and that subsequent processing proceeds without unnecessary delay.

The most common cause for delays in DA processing is incomplete information. To assist in this task, Council provides individual checklists (available from the Council website—see previous reference) for the varying types of development. As one might expect, the more complex a development, the more information will likely be required, and processing fees vary accordingly.

Certain developments will need to be advertised and/or notified in accordance with Council policies. While Council is the consent authority for most DAs, some require that Council seek comment from certain State Government Agencies—Roads and Maritime Services (RMS) for traffic matters, Rural Fire Service (RFS) for bushfire conditions or the Office of Environment and Heritage (OEH) for flora, fauna or heritage considerations.

Council is obliged to consider all planning matters that have been raised within any submission that may be made before making a decision regarding a DA. There's not much you can do about State Agency requirements, but it's a good idea to discuss your plans with your neighbours. Potential problems can often be resolved early and easily if anyone likely to be impacted is aware of your project up front.

You can now track the progress of your DA on-line (see above reference to the Palerang Council website). Remember that having obtained development approval, you must then apply for a Construction or Subdivision Certificate and appoint a Principal Certifying Authority before commencing any work. These are both mandatory precursors to the issue of an Occupation Certificate on completion of the works.

Sometimes August can be the pits. It teases with the promise of spring and then capriciously serves up the worst of winter. One day can be calm, warm and golden, and the next fierce winds and bleak. While I had been feeling at one with nature, the rampaging gang of cockatoos had doubled around behind my back and put me back in my box. Never admire anything blooming in the garden with proprietary pleasure! The few potted flowers that had managed a little colour on the front deck had been desecrated and heads had been snipped off the first daffodils. If that were not enough, the anti social possums had waged war under the cloak of darkness on my red succulents, ripping them out, scattering broken bits on the paths, and shredding the rhubarb in my vegie patch. I've been finding worms, pulling out weeds and wishing we still had chooks, attempting to control periwinkle and aluminium plant, both a challenge, and snipping and pruning. I have had some wonderful, peaceful, absorbing moments in the garden, but perhaps the best was just recently. I was in a rather neglected corner protected from the night nibblers. It had suddenly come alive with demure hellebores, their heads bowed, purple violets, blue irises peeping through straggly straplike leaves and a scattering of proud daffodils. Then, in the distance, I heard a blackbird. I was suddenly transported to Europe! But a ringing telephone broke the spell....except there wasn't a phone close at hand! A clever bower bird, I suspect, had just painted the final brush stroke on my old world picture, then slashed the canvas. It had been playing mind games with me. Koels may be back, but I haven't seen or heard any blackbirds as yet! The bowerbird's ruse was a moment of magic...... and mischief!

Winter is waning and August has had its moods. Wattles, daffodils, wilful cockatoos and pesky possums have appeared on cue as has the returning birdlife, but there is always a surprise, always something quite magical in a Wamboin garden. And it will only get better with spring. I wouldn't live anywhere else!

Quoted from Page 128 of Road Users Handbook: Horse riders and horse drawn vehicles have equal rights to share our roads. Watch out for ridden, driven or lead horses. When you come across horse traffic, keep these points in mind: (1) As horses can be unpredictable, you should slow down and give them plenty of room. (2) You should never sound your horn, rev your engine or pass a horse at high speed. (3) You should slow down or stop if a rider is having difficulty with a horse. (4) if you are signalled by a person in charge of a horse which is difficult to control, you should stop your vehicle and not continue until it is safe to do so.

When you are a horse rider: horse riders must obey the same general traffic laws as other vehicles such as keping to the left and giving hand signals. When on the footpath you must give way to pedestrians. If you ride a horse, wear bright clothes and a safety helmet. (Suggested for Inclusion in the Whisper by Tony Cuthbertson of the Pony Club.)
