As a resident of this council area you are entitled to submit a written opinion to The Delegate nominated in the website relating to Palerang Council and submissions will be accepted up to 5:00 pm 28th February 2016. There will be two public inquiry meetings held (also outlined in the relevant website and in the local papers) where people may come but if you wish to speak at these meetings you must apply without delay. At the time of writing these Notes the WCA as an organisation, did not have a position on this however I expect that to change within the next day. What we really need to know is what the public out there in Wamboin feel about this? Please, please, come to our next general meeting (information below) and tell us what your opinions are so that we may proceed feeling that we are supporting the views of the majority of the community. If you can't make the meeting members of the Committee can be reached via the information on our own WCA website.

WCA Meeting – Our first WCA meeting for the year will be held at 7:30 pm on 16th February 2016 at the Community Hall in Bingley Way. Any interested person of the community is very welcome to attend. Our meetings are held on the third Tuesday evening of each month except for January so come along and see what's happening.

Clean Up Australia Day – Clean up Australia Day is fast approaching and its time to clean up Wamboin. Sunday 5th March is our nominated day so please come along to the Community Hall on that morning and sign up to tidy up an area or stretch of road in Wamboin and make it beautiful. On 20th January, St Andrews, Wamboin, celebrated 31 years as a registered church within the Canberra Goulburn Diocese. Initially as an offshoot of St Peters, Sutton, services were held for many years in the newly built Wamboin Community hall. The new church building was started in 1997 on land at the corner of Poppet and Norton Roads, donated by the Schultz family. Local tradesmen were used wherever possible, and on 8th March 1998, St Andrews, free of debt thanks to the vision and generosity of David and Robyn Robertson, was consecrated. Later, the Sutton Road Mission District (SRMD) was created with the union of St Peters and St Andrews... "one church, two campuses".

Easter is early this year. Lent begins shortly with an Ash Wednesday service at St Andrews, at 7.30pm on February 10th. Lenten studies, offered to all those interested, begin on Tuesday evening, 16th February, and continue each Tuesday night culminating in a Passover meal on March 22nd.

With the new school year, the very popular Kids' Club has started again, meeting at St Andrews each Friday night during NSW term time from 5.30 to 7pm. Children from preschool to High school age are welcome, and parents are invited to participate where possible. A light meal is served at the conclusion of activities.

Services are held on the first and third Sunday of each month at St Andrews, at 9am, and at the same time on the second and fourth Sunday at the charming little country church of St Peters. 

The Wamboin Firefighter

FOR ALL EMERGENCY CALLS

PREPARE. ACT. SURVIVE.

And summer went where....



It's now late January and I am writing the Wamboin Firefighter article for the February Whisper. Outside it's overcast and raining. It's been raining this past week and the rain will probably continue over the next few days. It's like an English summer; the countryside is green, creeks are flowing, and dams are full. The risk of bushfire is way off the radar. HOWEVER, the Bureau of Meteorology tells us the risk of bushfires continues and that summer still has several weeks to run. If you recall the article in the December Whisper, the major fire in Wamboin in 1985 occurred in March. So, this is not the time for complacency, we need to continue to be alert to the risk of fire and to ensuring our bushfire survival plans are up to date, accessible and ready to implement.

Brigade Activity

December and January have been busy months for the brigade. Whilst there haven't been any major fires in the Wamboin and Bywong districts, motor vehicle accidents, a fire at Tarago and a couple of small fires in our neighbourhood have kept the brigade busy.

Call Outs

Tuesday 1 December: It was the brigade Christmas party and a Total Fire Ban day when a fire was reported. A tanker with a crew of five was despatched along with the brigade captain in the PC. The fire which was contained in a 44 gallon drum was extinguished without incident and the crew was back to the shed by 8.00pm. The Queanbeyan police also joined us for this fire.

Thursday 3 December: Two tankers and the PC were despatched to a small grass fire at the end of Norton Road. The genesis of this fire was grass mowing and some well intentioned fuel reduction. Fortunately the winds were down compared to previous days and the fire was quickly extinguished. Bungendore also attended and helped us with the mopping up.

Sunday 13 December: Two tankers and one of the light vehicles with a total crew of 11 left about 2.30pm for a fire that emanated from composting horse manure. The fire was extinguished and all were back at the shed by 3.30pm. A timely example of just how easy fires can start.

Sunday 13 December: On the way back from the compost fire one of the tankers attended an unreported motor vehicle accident (MVA) on Norton Road. There were no injuries.

Saturday 2 January: A crew of six was despatched at 8.00pm to an MVA at the intersection of Macs Reef Road and the Federal; Highway.

Monday 4 January: A crew of 4 left the shed at 2.00pm to attend an MVA at the intersection of Bungendore Road and the Federal Highway.

Wednesday 6 January: The call was for an MVA at Smiths Gap. A heavy tanker with a crew of five was ready to go at about 8.40am but we never left the shed. Police were on the scene and there was no fire danger.

Friday 9 January: A crew of five attended an MVA on Sutton Road. They were out of the shed at 7.00am and were back in time for breakfast at 8.00am.

Thursday 11 January: A major scrub and grass fire broke out in the Tarago area. We despatched a crew to support the local Tarago brigade. Our truck left the shed at 2.50pm and returned at 9.00pm after quelling the fire. A good day's work for all concerned.

Thursday 21 January: At 5.40pm we despatched a crew of 4 to a serious MVA on Bungendore Road. Eight people were injured and required hospitalisation. Two travelled by helicopter and the rest via road transport. We assisted the Bungendore brigade and returned to the shed at 8.00pm.

Friday 22 January: The fire control tower in Kowen Forest reported smoke at the intersection of Fernloff and Norton Road. A tanker was despatched however it seems Norton Road was being resurfaced at the same time and in the same location. The reported smoke turned out to be steam from the bitumen laying equipment. Better safe than sorry.

Friday 26 January: A motorist travelling south on the Federal Highway reported a fire in the vicinity of Donnelly Road. A crew of five departed the shed at about 9.00pm and were back at just before 10.00pm. No fire was located after a thorough search of the area.

The Fire Season is In Force - Fire Permits Are Required



Fire permits are free and can be arranged by contacting the Wamboin Brigade Captain on 0409 991 340 or email: captain@brigade.wamboincommunity.asn.au

We have to inspect any burn site before we can issue a permit, which means we may be unable to issue a permit at short notice. So please make your request for a permit at least a week before the intended burn.

Cooking fires are OK as long as they are in a properly constructed fire place with a 2 metre cleared border around it, and a continuous supply of water (e.g. garden tap & hose) is readily available.

Voluntary-Simple Lifestyle @ Wamboin

We get bombarded daily about all the electrical gadgets and pre-prepared food that we 'need', but we have proved living a simple, fairly frugal and environmentally-friendly lifestyle is possible. Born in Canberra in 1949, I grew up in an era with only a radio and record player—no television. When not at school we roamed the countryside, free as birds. We lived a simple, frugal and idyllic lifestyle. I've always had a hankering to return to that era; of course that's not possible, but my Minnesota farm raised husband Charles and I have chosen to live as simple as we can in the 21st Century.

After my elderly folks went into a Nursing Home in Canberra in 2014, and we were no longer their full-time Carers we downsized from a four bedroom house, with rumpus room and large garage to a slide-on Camper on the tray of our 4WD. Downsizing was so liberating, no longer are we surrounded by 'things' that are not useful, no longer are drawers and cupboards full of 'things' that we never use or wear. I can walk past a shop without being drawn in to buy 'something'. Everything we own has a use and a place (even better if there are several uses), and *usually* gets put back to that place!

We currently reside on a bush block at Wamboin; a nearby dam provides us with water for hand/clothes washing, showering etc. The water's scooped up in a bucket, and ten litres of water provides us both with a hair/body wash every second day. Our use of dam and fresh water is limited in use, as we attempt to practice water conservation. An old re-purposed Jerry Can collects grey water from our sink, then with the aid of a tap underneath is used for rinsing off dirty items.

I make personal products free of harmful chemicals e.g., hand sanitiser, hand & body wash, shampoo, shaving cream, cleaner, and tooth-paste. Vodka is an essential ingredient I always have on hand, it can be used in a variety of ways, including as a cleaner of anything, with added essential oils, and depending on the scent, it becomes a sweet room freshener, underarm deodorant, floor cleaner, or mosquito repellent. Clothes washing is achieved with our 'washing machine' a brilliant Australian invention called 'The Scrubba Wash Bag', which packs down into a tiny bundle. If any clothes are crumpled the 'ironing' is done by hanging clothes in the fresh air and spraying with a mix of water and lavender oil. Shower water is pumped from an old 10 litre saucepan heated on the stove; the pump is powered by our Camper battery, and the toilet is a porta-loo that we dump into friends' septic system.

We have a variety of frugal living techniques including cutting up old clothing, tea-towels etc., which then become 'non-paper' towels that are either washed and re-used or thrown away. We clean and re-use plastic bags, and try to avoid using products such as plastic wrap and foil as much as possible.

Time permitting we like to make our own yoghurt and cottage cheese using powdered milk. I soak dried pulses to cut down on cooking time, and start them on the stove, then put the saucepan on the bed, surrounded by the doona and pillows. After a few hours we have perfectly cooked pulses e.g., chick peas for hummus. We also own a 'DreamPot' a wonderful Australian product that is a thermal non-electrical slow-cooker which is useful for a wide variety of slowly cooked food. A baked dinner is produced in our 'Cobb Cooker', that uses heat beads, turning the Cobb into an oven or barbecue. While we lived in Canberra we bought a cheap dehydrator and dried as many vegetables and fruits as possible, so that we have a supply that would probably last us five years! From those dried products we have our own garlic, onion and ginger powders, soup mixes, taco mix, Italian Sausage mix etc. These products can be bought easily, but by making them at home we control what goes in, avoiding fillers and too much salt etc. A small hand-held vacuum sealer seals food in bags, making them last a lot longer.

We like freshly ground coffee beans so we have a coffee grinder and also a small electrical whizz for making nut butters and hummus. These 240 v appliances trip the fuse in the camper so we power them with a Super Mini Booster which is 12 v rechargeable battery, then an inverter changes the current to 240 v AC. The Mini Booster can also start a diesel engine with a flat battery! We watch our favourite TV shows on our iPad, we own the "world's smallest printer" that can print in colour, we have a LapTop, and a mobile phone, things that I have to agree I would miss if they were suddenly taken from me!

Voluntary simple living need not be a hard lifestyle, as we know, but instead can provide those living it with a sense of freedom and good feelings. Living a simple life is almost like returning to the 'good old days' before GladWrap was invented, when the baker brought warm bread to your door, and when the greengrocer honked his horn to let residents know he was in the street with a truck load of fresh fruit and vegetables. Yes, life was simple and still can be, especially in the bush at Wamboin. Give it a go!! - Margaret McJannett (I'm a retired Early Childhood Worker. 

Wonderful Women of Wamboin



Nature Notes January 2016 Jo Walker

The countryside was beginning to look brown and dry as we welcomed in the New Year. And then the rains came – with some memorable rather wild weather. The storm that came through on the last Saturday night of the month lasted for nearly two hours with continuous spectacular lightning displays accompanied by uninterrupted rumbling and crashing of thunder – plus some torrential rain. With nearly 100 mm of rain here this month, the landscape is reverting to an almost spring-like green.

Not much is flowering at the moment The Hickory Wattle (*Acacia implexa*) has shed its cream flowers and the white flower-heads of the Cauliflower Bushes (*Cassinia longifolia*) have aged and faded and given way to the yellowish-green flowers of the fine-leaved *Cassinia quinquefaria*. It's the time of year to appreciate all the different shades of green displayed by the local vegetation.

There haven't been a lot of butterflies around so far this summer. Most of those seen were the Common Browns (*Heteronympha merope merope*) and there were very few females of the species amongst them. There have recently been quite a few Wood Whites (*Delias aganippe*) flying about near the Cherry Ballart trees (*Exocarpos cupressiformis*) on which they lay their eggs. And the black and white day-flying moths (*Nyctemera amica*) have made a few appearances but there are not many of them.

For several years now, I've been visited on and off by a pair of the beautiful King Parrots. A week or so ago, six of them suddenly turned up – two pairs of adults and two juveniles. They followed me around outside making it clear that they would like some bird seed. Although I complied with their wishes I haven't seen them since.

A few days ago, there was a male Mistletoe-bird feeding on the fruits of one of the mistletoes in a tree above the dam. I could see it flicking its tail against the branch it was on to deposit the sticky seed that had passed through its gut and was now ready to germinate and provide another food-plant for the little bird.

A small flock of Varied Sitellas also visited. These little tree-creepers used to appear in flocks of twenty or more when I first came to Wamboin but now seem to be reduced in numbers. There were about ten in this flock. They are fairly small birds, and search for insects under the bark of trees. They have a distinctive way of finding food, usually travelling from the tip to the base of branches or in a downwards direction on tree-trunks. The undersides of their wings are orange, easily visible when they are in flight.

Meat Ant nests seem to be increasing this year – which is probably why I've seen two Echidnas trundling across the hill recently. One was very large and brown-spined, but the smaller one was very dark with blackish spines. Snakes seem to be abundant this summer. I often go a year or two without seeing one here, but this summer I've already seen four Brown Snakes – and the one I almost trod on was very large!

It's been a strange summer. Wet, then dry; hot then cool; some more rain; and a few days of drying wind too. No doubt there will be a few more changes before summer finally drifts away. Unlike winter, when many species hibernate or look for a quieter time, summer can be a haven of wildlife activity.

With the grasslands drying out, more and more kangaroos are making their annual pilgrimage to the side of the road at dusk through to dawn looking for more tasty morsels. Love them or hate them, there is only one way to reduce the risk of hitting a kangaroo on the road and that is to slow down and be much more vigilant. At 80 km/h - allowing for thinking and braking distance, you will need 54 metres to stop the car before impact. However, at 60 km/h one only needs 33 metres to stop. And at a slower speed you will have more time to look around and spot the ones on the verges. If you hit a kangaroo – please

don't simply drive away. Often injured kangaroos can be saved and if there is a joey on board it can be rescued too.

In the backyard, many people have a birdbath and these need to be kept topped up if you want to enjoy seeing the joy of a bird splashing itself clean or having a drink. Water dishes can also be placed at ground level in sheltered areas for lizards. If you rescue an injured bird, place it in a box on a nest of newspaper or a towel and keep it in a quiet warm place – then contact Wildcare.

In our region we have a wonderful array of lizards. Lizards tend to get injured by cats and dogs that are allowed to roam - and whipper snippers! Injured lizards can be placed in a box and kept in a cool spot, such as a bathroom, before seeking help.

You can discourage snakes from visiting your backyard by removing piles of timber and rubbish. Keeping the backyard neat and tidy allows you to see what is around and avoid creating hiding places for snakes close to the house. Wear gloves when gardening and know where your hands are going. And obviously keeping screen doors and windows closed will help stop a snake coming into the house. Wildcare has a number of trained volunteers who can safely remove a snake, but make sure someone is watching it, so the rescuer knows where to look. More often than not, a snake is just passing through and will move away under its own accord. Never try to catch a snake yourself.

If you don't feel confident picking up an injured animal, such as a bird, lizard, echidna or turtle, keep a towel handy (in the boot of the car?) to throw over the animal, scoop it up and move it to safety. A towel is also useful to calm a larger injured animal by covering its head.

These are just a few ideas involving some of the more common wildlife incidents. Safety is paramount whether on the road or in your backyard. Call Wildcare's 24 hour-helpline on 6299 1966 for help and advise. - Phil Machin



Councillor's Corner

Local Government Reform — They say a week's a long time in politics, and local government in NSW is no exception at the moment. The local government reform process has moved rather quickly since IPART released its assessment of NSW Councils back in November.

In December 2015 the Minister for Local Government released 35 Merger Proposals, involving 65 NSW councils, and in January 2016 outlined the process by which these Proposals would be assessed. The Proposals have been referred to the Chief Executive of the Office of Local Government (OLG), who has in turn delegated responsibility for their assessment to 18 Delegates whom we understand will report their findings by May 2016. Individual Delegates will hold public inquiries into the Proposals for which they have responsibility during February and prepare their respective reports for comment by the independent Boundaries Commission. The Minister has indicated that he will consider the information so provided and announce his determination before the end of June, with the intention that the new Councils will commence operating on 1 July 2016.

While the precise details are unclear, it is believed that current councillors would most likely be dismissed, and the new Councils would operate under administration until new elections, which would be delayed until March 2017. It may be a slightly cynical comment, but it would appear that we are following a process simply because legislation requires the process to be followed. As it stands, provided this process is followed, the Minister has plenty of room to move with respect to the decision he ultimately makes—he is under no obligation to adopt any particular recommendation that comes out of the process.

The 'process', however, is constrained in the output it can produce. It only allows for the consideration of a Proposal, or a 'minor amendment' thereof. It cannot consider anything more.

The Proposal that the Minister presented in relation to Palerang was to divide our LGA between Goulburn and Queanbeyan, in spite of the fact that, for the duration of the Fit for the Future exercise we had been advised that no consideration would be given to boundary adjustments, only full mergers. The main problem here is that a full merger is not considered to be a 'minor amendment' to the current Proposal, so the present process cannot comment on whether or not the proposed division of Palerang is more or less appropriate than a full merger. It is in recognition of this fact that Palerang Council has forwarded an alternate Proposal—for the full merger of Palerang and Queanbeyan—to the Minister for consideration.

It is important here to note the, perhaps subtle, difference between a Proposal and the position held by Council on the matter. Council's resolved position remains to stand alone as an independent Council, and this is the position that Council will continue to prosecute in its representations. The only option presented by the Minster, however, was to divide Palerang between Goulburn and Queanbeyan—he did not provide for the option of merging Palerang wholly with a single neighbour. The only way this option could be considered in the present process was for someone, either the Minister himself, Palerang Council, or residents, through a petition, to lodge such a Proposal.

The reason that Council has lodged the full merger Proposal is because it believes this to be a better outcome for our community than dividing the current LGA—it is Council's preferred fall-back position from its preference to remain as an independent council. How much attention this Proposal gets is, however, entirely up to the Minister. If your head is spinning at this point, I'm sure you're not alone. I'm not entirely convinced that anyone was ever intended to be able to understand exactly what was going on...

As a footnote that will no doubt please some residents, the Special Rate Variation (SRV) that was under consideration by Council is now firmly off the table. Regardless of Council's position, the OLG has directed that no council involved in a Merger Proposal will be eligible for an SRV in the coming year. The State Government has also stated that there will be no change to any existing 'rate path' for a period of four years following any merger. How outstanding works will be funded in the interim and what financial considerations might come into play at the end of that period will be a matter for consideration by the Council of the day.

The bottom line is that the ball is now very much in the hands of Palerang residents. The only remaining opportunities to influence the Minister's decision will now be through the Delegate's public inquiry and lobbying the local member, John Barilaro.

The public inquiry into the Queanbeyan–Palerang (part) merger, that currently involves Wamboin and Bywong, will be held in Braidwood and Queanbeyan on Thursday 11 February. The Queanbeyan meeting is from 7.00–10.00 pm, at the Comfort Inn Airport International.

Please note that you must register to either attend or speak by Friday 5 February 2016. Written submissions will however be accepted until 5.00pm 28 February 2016 (see Boundary Review website below for details).
