

Children's Playground for the Hall. This project is driven by Merle Horgosi who has so far secured around \$15,000 to finance construction and for necessary alterations and repairs to existing infrastructure. A \$10,000 grant from the Federal government has been augmented by a \$5,000 community grant from the Bendigo Bank.

Professional plans for the LRR including the playground area are being drawn up, and after that is completed the necessary approval from Council will be sought.



Fodder Trees and Shrubs in Grazing Systems - Field Day

The Small Farms Network - Capital Region is hosting a field day, "Fodder Trees and Shrubs in Grazing Systems", in Bywong on 17th April. Guest speakers will include Dr Dean Revell, Adjunct Associate Professor in Animal Biology, The University of Western Australia. Dr Revell is a specialist in animal biology research and is interested in developing options for livestock management to improve profitability and on farm biodiversity. Dean Revell, along with Geoff Butler from Wamboin Gearys Gap Landcare Group and Mathew Lieschke (South East Local Land Services Livestock Officer) will share their expertise on local fodder trees and shrubs suitable for this area, identifying pasture species, provide a seasonal pasture update and explore the benefits and limitations of fodder trees for animal feed.


Using fodder trees and shrubs can enhance farm productivity in a number of ways, Dean Revell will discuss how tree and shrub interactions can increase grazing options on farm by providing fodder during feed gaps at the end of summer and early winter, increasing drought resilience by diversifying grazing options, improving pasture through shading and slowing wind effects and storing water in the soil. As well as paddock walks and presentations, the speakers will take part in a panel discussion – exploring options to get you started, including information on property design and layout, species selection, sourcing seedlings, preparation of sites for planting and having a plan for managing diversity.

The Small Farms Network – Capital Region is a newly established grassroots information service for people who own or live on small to medium sized rural properties around the Capital region. The field day has been made possible by sponsorship and in kind support from South East Local Land Services.

The Fire Season is In Force - Fire Permits Are Required



Fire permits are free and can be arranged by contacting the Wamboin Brigade Captain on 0409 991 340 or email: captain@brigade.wamboincommunity.asn.au

We have to inspect any burn site before we can issue a permit, which means we may be unable to issue a permit at short notice. So please make your request for a permit at least a week before the intended burn.

Cooking fires are OK as long as they are in a properly constructed fire place with a 2 metre cleared border around it, and a continuous supply of water (e.g. garden tap & hose) is readily available.

Nature Notes February 2016

February was ushered in by a long overnight storm that brought several hours of continuous lightning and thunder and some torrential rain. After that, the month was mostly dry and very hot with thirteen days of temperatures hovering above 30 degrees. And then there was the hailstorm. Although we appear to have only got the edge of it, some of the almost golfball-sized hailstones did hit here, one of them leaving a noticeable dent on the bonnet of my car.

The landscape is still nicely green, but there is little in flower at the end of summer except the *Cassinia quinquefaria* bushes which are still bearing heads of pale yellow-green flowers – and a second flush of white flowers on the Hoary Sunray (*Leucochrysum albicans*) alongside several roadsides in the area.

There was a mixed flock of small birds feeding amongst some bushes here the other day. They were mostly the usual visitors – Brown and Buff-rumped Thornbills, Eastern Spinebills, White-eared Honeyeaters and a pair of Grey Shrike-thrushes. And then a Speckled Warbler made an unexpected appearance. I saw them regularly here until two or three years ago when they seemed to have disappeared from my place, so it was good to see one here again. And then, the next day, a Leaden Flycatcher turned up, another bird I hadn't seen here for a while. The flock of White-winged Choughs though is still turning up regularly and seems to be doing quite well, as it now numbers twenty or more birds. Four Bronzewing Pigeons visit regularly, but the Crested Pigeons have moved on or decreased. Until recently, there was a flock of about ten of them constantly here, but now only one or two visit occasionally.

An Eastern Blue-tongued Lizard was sunning itself near the shadehouse last week. I was quite close to it when I saw it, but it showed no inclination to move away. It was quite a large one and may have been a female about to give birth. Blue-tongued Lizards don't reproduce by laying eggs, but give birth to five or more live young usually during January or February.

A single Scorpion-tailed Spider has just made a web in a shrub near the house and has already constructed a row of long, oval-shaped egg sacs. This little spider has a heart-shaped body (about a centimetre long) with an elongated tapering abdomen which it curls like a scorpion. This one is on its own, but, in previous years, I've seen shrubs festooned with multiple webs all containing these little spiders and their egg sacs.

Our road seems to be teeming with wildlife at present. One neighbour has seen the Spotted Quoll again and another has noticed the local Wombat grazing by the roadside. And I've stopped three times this week to let Bearded Dragons cross the road. Life is so interesting in Wamboin!

Wildcare & Gliders

Wildcare recently received a call on their 24/7 helpline (6299 1966) to rescue a 'baby possum impaled on barbed wire'. But as Miriam - a Wildcare Glider specialist said, "Whilst it is not uncommon to be called out to rescue wildlife caught in barbed wire, this little critter actually turned out to be a sub-adult Squirrel Glider weighing just 178 grams. It had wrapped its flight membrane around the wire repeatedly so it was effectively swaddled and impaled. With care the Glider was removed from the barbed wire and taken to a Vet to be checked out. It was given some Wildcare TLC before being released back in the Photo at left just below: Rescued Sugar Glider in Care with Wildcare vicinity it was found."



"We are also lucky to have a good population of Sugar Gliders in our region, but they are very secretive animals and we don't often see them. They are delightful little creatures and make our lives more comfortable by consuming a huge number of insects every night. Squirrel Gliders on the other hand have not fared as well and are classified as vulnerable due to reduced numbers because of habitat loss and fragmentation. A Squirrel Glider colony was discovered in our area only last year, which is great news. Now we have evidence of a second colony in our region. The two colonies are only 8 km apart as the Squirrel Glider flies"

It is not easy to tell the difference between Sugar and Squirrel Gliders. The latter are much bigger. Squirrel Gliders have a very different temperament to Sugar Gliders and are very inquisitive. Both are secretive and don't emerge until well after dark.

As Miriam says, "Whether a possum or a glider they regularly fall victim to domestic pets who are left to wander, barbed wire and rat poison. To avoid this Wildcare asks that you keep

your domestic pets indoors at night. And where it is no longer needed, barbed wire can be removed – a huge task, but well worth it. Humane traps are also recommended if you have a mouse or rat problem. With humane traps you can be sure that you are catching the intended rodent rather than one of our native animals."

As many know, Wildcare is the local volunteer licenced wildlife organisation dedicated to the rescue, care and rehabilitation of our native animals. All members are trained volunteers – nobody is paid, and their work depends on contributions from members of the public to help pay for medications and veterinary fees. Contributions and new members are always welcome. For more information visit www.wildcare.com.au.

Event Information:

All bikes are registered and each rider must have a valid motorcycle licence. All riders are required to comply with the 40km/h speed limit and will not enter the motorsport exclusion zone, particularly the area adjacent to the northern boundary of the forest on "Wamboin Break".

The section of Seven Mile Road adjacent to Wamboin will not be used as a transport section for DSMRA riders, however we have been advised current forestry operations will continue in that area.

Riders who have travelled from interstate and intend to camp (at the old Depot site), and suppliers delivering event infra-structure, will start to arrive from this time. Please be aware there will be increased traffic on Kowen Rd and areas around the Depot site for preparation on the days before and the tidy up after the event.





Councillor's Corner

Community Committees — It's been a pretty torrid month, dealing with all the issues arising from merger proposals and their associated inquiries and submissions. In the process, however, I had occasion to reflect on the ways in which a Council interacts with its community. Of course, this happens in various ways, some perhaps more welcome than others.

One of the more positive interactions is through local community associations and facilities management committees. It would probably come as no surprise to find that rural councils must operate a little differently to urban councils for various reasons, not least of which is the area that must be managed. The Palerang Local Government Area (LGA) covers some 5,147km², while our urban neighbour, Queanbeyan City Council covers just 172km². Add to this the fact that the population of Palerang stands at around 15,510 while the current Queanbeyan population is around 40,860 and the challenge faced by rural councils in providing community facilities immediately becomes apparent.

Urban councils can take advantage of economies of scale, locate facilities centrally, and serve their entire population from these single points. Rural councils must necessarily use a different operating model to provide and manage facilities within local communities, a model that invariably depends heavily on the local communities themselves. Fortunately, this is rarely a problem in rural areas because the communities involved are traditionally close-knit and all too willing to pitch in when the need arises.

The operating model used in Palerang is generally based on committees operating under Sections 355 and 377 of the Local Government Act, so-called 'Section 355 Committees'. At a formal level, these committees are governance structures that are responsible for public assets. At a more practical level, they are the organisational structures through which community facilities are managed and maintained.

Most council-owned facilities in Palerang are managed through one of its 23 active s.355 committees. The committees comprise mainly community volunteers and a councillor or two to help manage the Council side of business. They set the hire fees for, and manage the hire and general maintenance of the relevant facility. These facilities include community halls and reserves, our Greenways, cemeteries, and certain Council buildings and structures such as the National Theatre in Braidwood and the War Memorial in Bungendore.

A lesser known, but important part of the management function is communicating community needs, identifying grant opportunities and coordinating working bees. Without this level of cooperation, it would simply not be possible to provide facilities over such a wide area with such a small workforce.

This is really as much a thank you to those community volunteers who help make all this happen as it is an educational exercise to let people know how their local community hall or reserve is managed.

Merger Machinations — The inquiries into the Proposals to divide the Palerang LGA between Goulburn and Queanbeyan are now complete. The Delegates will finalise their reports by the end of March. In the mean time, the inquiry into the alternative, full merger between Palerang and Queanbeyan is now open. Council has been advised that a single public meeting providing the opportunity for residents to make verbal submissions to the Delegate, Mt John Turner, will be held in Bungendore on 16 March 2016, 7.00pm – 10.00pm at the Bungendore War Memorial Hall. Please note that there is a requirement to register to either attend or speak at this meeting, although the other meetings have not been oversubscribed and it has been possible to just turn up on the night. Written submissions for the full merger proposal will be accepted until 5.00pm 8 April 2016 (see Boundary Review website below for details).
