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It more likely goes to fund costs such as hefty CEO salaries, gala black tie award nights, and lavish travel & accommodation to attend state and national conferences.



2016 Annual General Meeting: This was held on Wednesday 17 August at 7.30 pm. It was encouraging to see new faces at the meeting and the renewed interest in the Community. The committee re-elected Anne Goonan as president, J. P Favre as treasurer and Kerry Cox as secretary. New vice president is Treisha Hemaridis and Attila Horgosi is the new public officer. Several new committee members were also elected including Mike Wilkins, Jeanette Krah and Barbara Salzborn. The expanded committee will invigorate our efforts over the coming year.

There were additional offers of assistance via the FB Bywong hub from many who could not attend evening meetings. It would be appreciated if those members could use an "old fashioned' email to the president's email address below to lock in their contact details.

LRR Master Plan: The playground initiative prompted a new master plan for the Les Reardon Reserve. This was developed in consultation with all regular users of the reserve and was presented for discussion and comment at the AGM by Jennie Curtis (Fresh Landscapes) who designed the new plan.

The master plan includes placement of the proposed children's playground, upgraded pony club trails and facilities, as well as landscaping and planting to improve the grounds. There was some general discussion about details, and the plan was enthusiastically accepted by the meeting. Although impetus for the plan stemmed from the BCA proposal for the playground, the plan is the responsibility of the LRR committee which operates under Council auspices and encompasses all aspects of usage of the hall and facilities. Accordingly the plan will be presented to the hall committee in the near future. The cost for developing this document was shared by the BCA, The Gearys Gap Pony Club and the hall committee.

Children's Playground: Now that the design has been finalised a development application will be lodged with Council, and this will be channelled through the hall committee. The cost of the (approved) playground equipment was much higher than originally anticipated and well in excess of the available BCA budget. This is predominantly due to the risk management and warranties that need to underpin such installations. Nevertheless the plan to be presented to Council will include a selection of immediately affordable items with provision for additional equipment as funds become available.

2017 Car Boot Sale- Preparation: Planning for the 20th anniversary event in 2017 is the major task for the BCA committee in the near future and the expanded committee should bring some new ideas and energy to this effort. Hopefully this will be an especially memorable Boot Sale and any suggestions or ideas for inclusion in 2017 would be most welcome. All offers of help in running the event would also be welcome, and if you have any ideas why not bring them along to the next meeting on 17 October.

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

Bungendore Spring Ball Tickets On Sale

The wattle is flowering, the days are getting longer and preparations for the Bungendore Spring Ball are well underway. True to name, tickets for the annual event will be available on the first day of spring — Thursday 1 September. The Bungendore Spring Ball is an annual event hosted by the local churches, St Philip's and St Mary's. Proceeds of the evening go towards supporting the pastoral work of the churches in the Bungendore community, as well as supporting a nominated beneficiary. This year, funds raised by the ball will be shared with the Bungendore Community Foundation. The foundation has been run by a small group of Bungendore locals for the last ten years. In that time, the foundation has invested over \$110,000 through the NSW Public Trustee.

"Dividends from the investment are used to support the local community in a variety of ways," explained Dennis Langley from the foundation. "The Bungendore Community Foundation has provided funds to assist community groups such as the Showground Trust, the Lake George Men's Shed and the rural fire brigades of Wamboin and Hoskinstown.

"The foundation also helps individuals in the community, such as providing funds to Bungendore Public School to assist particular families with school expenses; or directly helping individuals who are facing financial hardship due to illness or injury."

The theme for this year's ball is 'Fantasy'. So come as your fantasy, or dream up something fantastical, or just look fantastic in your best suit. "The Bungendore

Spring Ball will again be a great community event," said Haidee Whiteley, chair of the organising committee. "The ball receives great support from many businesses and organisations in the Bungendore community, and we look forward to announcing our major sponsors very soon."

Saturday 15 October is the date and the Bungendore School/Community Hall is the venue for Bungendore's night of fantasy. Tickets are \$90 per person and include a glass of sparkling on arrival, an excellent three-course meal and live music by Trouble with Johnny. Sally Simpson grew up by the sea in and now lives on a small farm outside of Canberra. Her work is inspired by her love of the sea, the land and the desert.

Visitors will visit her purpose built studio in a rural setting in Wamboin.

Sally draws inspiration and materials from specific sites in order to capture our moment in time, a period of rapid change with anxieties about the future. Her working process begins as time spent on site, contemplating and collecting. Currently Sally is using washed up rope, coral and fish bones she has collected over many years on the south coast of NSW and Kangaroo Island, South Australia.

Visitors will also see some of Sally's earlier work which focused on farm land and a man made lake, combining local materials such as cattle bones, mud and grass with man made tools and detritus. Her artworks are recordings of the interaction of humans and the land at a particular point in time as if for a future museum.

"I love to see the ways people engage with and react to my

work, and have a conversation about it with them. People also seem to be fascinated by the collections of materials and tools of trade in my studio. So the Artists' Trail should be a stimulating visit for all of us said Sally Simpson

In July the Wonderful Women of Wamboin (WWOW) enjoyed a highly sensory experience. Lynne Klomp from Bungendore introduced us to the world of aromatherapy using essential oils. 
Then in August, local Jan Provis talked about eye health including macular degeneration. Internationally renowned Prof Provis is a researcher at the Australian National University. Her talk covered the physiology of the eye using the largest eyeball props I've ever seen. One of the most alarming statistics Jan mentioned was that after 55 years, the risk of macular degeneration increases 5% every decade. In addition smokers are four times more likely to develop macular degeneration. But it's not all doom and gloom. If we eat a healthy diet including leafy green vegetables and fish three times a week we can reduce the risk significantly, provided we don't carry a certain gene and don't smoke. So have your eyes checked, the sooner the better.

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Behaviour Problems in Horses - PART II:

Most people during some stage of their horsey career will have seen horses carrying out strange activities like that of; cribbing, wind sucking, weaving, stall walking or wood chewing. These are all what you would call stereotypic behaviour's also known as vice's. They are basically thought to be domesticated negative behaviour's, which are usually damaging and unhealthy habits repeated throughout the day.

Have you ever watched a horse rock from side to side, almost like they are in a kind of trance or daze? This behavior is termed 'weaving' and unlike some other vice's that are thought to be brought about due to boredom, this vice is thought to be in response to anxiety and stress. Horses are social animals and therefore this stereotypy is generally caused by being in isolation constantly, a lack of companionship or the horse is generally unhappy with its environment. The horse will rock their head, neck and body back and forth or from side to side, whilst remaining in basically the same spot usually with their head over the stable door. Research conducted has proven that this abnormal behavior tends to occur more frequently in horses that are; stabled all day having only one view point to look out from as well as horses that are not surrounded by other horses or animals for company.

Allowing your horse to weave for a significant length of time for one can become harder to control at a later stage when it becomes a more established behaviour and two, is extremely damaging to the horse's well being. The transferring of weight from one leg to another can result in both joint and soft tissue damage as extra stress is put on the tendon's and ligament's of the foreleg. Swelling of these internal structures along with hoof growth can also become deformed due to the unnatural wear of their hooves. The horse may even lose condition as energy is used throughout the day to carry out the behaviour.





Preventative measures such as the use of anti-weave grills and mirrors along with other opportunities to increase social interaction can be used to help minimise this behaviour. This may include stabling several horses together in a barn or providing additional fields of view for the horse to be able to interact with its environment and neighbours. Studies have revealed that weaving is significantly reduced when stable box design allows direct contact between horses, stables have back doors that open up on to pasture or simply by opening up windows within the barn. All help provide mental stimulation by allowing more visual stimuli, odors and sounds for your horse to interact with in its environment.

Here are some easy ideas you could try first to prevent or help minimise weaving from occurring - 1. Provide high fiber feed through the use of slow hay feeder bags to make our friends work harder for their feed. 2. Engage your horse in lots and lots of physical activity each day to tire them out. 3. Ensure they have adequate time out to pasture each day.

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


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Welcome,

The Statutory Bush Fire Danger Period is fast approaching! (Begins 1st October)

HAVE YOU MADE YOUR BUSH FIRE SURVIVAL PLAN?



Now is the time to prepare or refresh your Bushfire Survival Plan.

Do you know what you will do if there is a grass fire on your property, or a large bush fire in the region, or when the fire danger rating is Severe, Extreme or Catastrophic?

Now is also the time to prepare your property. The generally mild Spring weather is normally an excellent time to clear the gutters, mow the grass around your house and sheds, remove overhanging branches, and clear away the wood pile beside the house

or that pile of prunings you didn't get to burn during winter.

ARE YOU BUSH FIRE READY?

FOUR SIMPLE STEPS

- 1. **DISCUSS** *discuss* with others in your household what to do if a bush fire threatens your home
- **2. PREPARE** *prepare* your home and get it ready for bush fire season
- 3. KNOW know the bush fire alert levels
- **4. KEEP** *keep* all the bush fire information numbers, websites and the smartphone app

The NSW Rural Fire Service website provides an aid to help you with these steps - just go to the NSWRFS website where you can access and download the guide to making your Bush Fire Survival Plan - http://www.rfs.nsw.gov.au



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BURNING OFF – reminder for notification

If you are going to light a fire outside the bush fire danger period – you must notify your neighbours <u>and</u> the local Fire Control Centre well in advance of your intention to burn, i.e. <u>at least</u> 24 hours before lighting up. To notify the local Fire Control Centre (it's in Queanbeyan) of your intention to burn, call 6128 0600 (weekday business hours only – no later than mid-Friday for the weekend). It is also essential that you attend and control the fire at all times while ever it is alight. Penalties for non-compliance are being enforced.

And don't forget, Saturday 17th September is also the Wamboin Community Association's Annual Bonfire & Fireworks night. It's usually a great family activity. As usual, we'll be there. According to the Community Association's website, 'Food and drinks available from 5.30pm, bonfire lit at 6.33pm, followed by the fireworks at 7.03pm precisely!'

BRIGADE CALLOUTS: Until July the Brigade had a reasonably quiet Autumn and Winter period, with only a few fire calls which were mainly to un-notified pile burns. In the last two months the Brigade has attended a major structure fire on Sutton Road; four motor vehicle accidents on Sutton Road, the Federal Highway, Norton Road and the Federal Highway Service Road; and car fire on Sutton Road. The Brigade also responded to a number of false alarms. The Brigade's members continue to turn out in large numbers at all hours of the day and night. One fire call at 3.00am on a Sunday saw eleven members make themselves available and at the most recent call out, on the last Saturday of August, we responded two fully crewed heavy tankers at 9.00pm.



Wildcare's Baby Bird Challenge

Wildcare is always on the lookout for new recruits to help rescue and rehabilitate injured and orphaned wildlife, but in spring there is a special challenge – coping with an expected influx of orphaned baby birds. Baby birds can be great fun – in the way they demand our attention to be fed regularly during the day, become silent and go to sleep over night and grow amazingly fast to young adult stage before being released back into the wild.

As, Wildcare's Bird Coordinator, Maryanne says "With many Wildcare members working full time, there is a need to find additional volunteers at this time of the year who are available during the day. If you care about our native birds, looking after baby birds can be a very rewarding experience. Full training and support is provided and we may also be able to help with cages and enclosures.



"On a related topic, many of the baby magpies that come into care each spring probably don't need to be 'rescued'. Fledgling magpies tend to spend some time on the ground when they first leave the nest, while they are learning to fly - with mum and dad on guard nearby. Of course if they are injured or in imminent danger, we should help. But one option is to place the fledgling on a branch out of danger - or even better in a bucket, with leaf litter in the bottom, and hang it from a nearby branch - and watch to see if the parents return. If in any doubt – please call Wildcare on 62991966."

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

Working with Weeds Field Day

Weeds only tell part of the story when considering the management of rural properties in Australia. The next field day from the Small Farms Network Capital Region is more than an information session about controlling weeds, it's about giving land managers the tools to think about weeds in positive way and to understand the processes that may contribute to weed establishment. The keynote speaker is Alison Elvin, co-director of NaturalCapital Pty Ltd and also a local grazier who is passionate about creating productive, resilient and adaptive agricultural systems that are based on healthy soils, high-quality water and biodiversity conservation.

"With a wealth of practical and theoretical knowledge from both personal and professional experience, Alison has a developed a deep respect for weed species and the stories they can tell us about our land management" says Alex James, the Small Farms Network Capital Region Coordinator. The topics that will be covered during the day include what is a weed, what conditions and land use may have contributed to the problem, identifying key weed species, integrated weed management, weed biosecurity and emerging weed target species. There will be a paddock walk and 'hands on' session in the afternoon and an opportunity for landholders to develop their own weed management plan for the future.

Alice McGrath, Natural Resource Management Land Services Officer with the South East Local Land Services, based in Goulburn will be launching the "Preparing a Whole of Property Weed Management Guide", with plenty of copies for participants to take home. ACT Rural Services will be available to discuss farm biosecurity and weeds to watch.

Wamboin Internet Access – NBN Satellite Disaster by Olaf Theden, Norton Road

Following on from Paul Brugman and John Gough's recent articles in the Whisper about the state of Wamboin's internet access (or lack thereof), the following may be of use to those unfamiliar with what is happening communications wise in our area.

It may come as a surprise to some, but we have been put onto NBN's satellite service area, and since the satellite is now up there, we are now able to get connected to the NBN. This is where the fun stops. The NBN satellite offer may well be a good deal when you are the only home in the middle of an outback property the size of Denmark, but it certainly doesn't come close to what we *already have* and what a community so close to the Canberra CBD would expect in today's day and age. Further, with the advent of the NBN offering connections to the satellite service, it is only a matter of time before the old Telstra exchanges will be shut down (NBN assures me that they won't be *forced* to shut down, but what shareholder owned company keeps their antiquated/obsolete equipment running when there are only a handful of customers left connected on it?). This means the end of ADSL in our area is coming!

Further, the surprise that Wamboin is considered a satellite service area is put into perspective when it shows up as number 10 in the list of 11,517 satellite areas across the countryⁱ in terms of number of households, and 3 of these top 10 are Islands far from the mainland, and 2 Tasmanian locations have already successfully lobbied the Government for inclusion in fixed line NBN offeringsⁱⁱ. (For completeness, Sutton is #29 on this list and Bywong is #35.) There are 635 households in Wamboin, and a further 489 in Sutton and 462 in Bywong. In general that means our area is highly populated and on the border-line between getting a different NBN technology choice (but this won't happen without community action, and not likely within the current NBN rollout!)

This means, that collectively, we will be burdened with a slow, and <u>very expensive</u> communications option (SkyMuster NBN satellite) when we are very close to the civilised world of Canberra and Queanbeyan. For a typical Wamboin family, who doesn't have access to free-to-air TV, no mobile reception and is therefore bound to whatever internet we can get for streaming services, we use between 250GB and 500GB of data per month via ADSL2. For those that like numbers and tables here is a bit of a comparison:

As you can see in the table, we will soon be paying about twice as much for an NBN service and getting nearly one tenth of the required download capacity. While not everyone will be downloading as heavily, you will find that if your current connection is in the 3-8Mbps range of ADSL1/2 and you then get 25Mbps on Satellite, your download quota can disappear in no time at all (and you will be back to dial-up speeds until the next billing cycle).

Unless you wish to be left in the digital dark ages, this calls for urgent community action! There are two ways forward: either lobby NBN (probably via Ministers of Parliament) to change their mind on Wamboin's technology choice (like Tasmania's west coast already has), or engage a private company (eg. Lightning Broadband or Signal Co) to setup shop here in our district. The choices require a bit of community action, as either would require multiple interested parties to show their support and/or outrage at being left for dead in the alleyways of digital communications doom.



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
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Wamboin Muse
