The Bungendore Abbeyfield House Project Needs Your Support!!

This is a special request for your help. If you support the Abbeyfield House for seniors in Bungendore - then please tell your local Member for Monaro!

Monaro NSW Government representative, Minister John Barilaro MP, has been a strong supporter of the Abbeyfield project. He recently encouraged the NSW Minister for Ageing to visit Bungendore and look at the planned site for the house. The Bungendore Abbeyfield committee had the opportunity to meet and describe the project and the need for the Abbeyfield House to Minister Ajaka, and Minister Barilaro announced another \$10,000 toward the project.

John Barilaro is prepared to lobby at all levels of Government. He needs community support to do that effectively, and has now posted out a 'survey' to gauge local community support for the Abbeyfield House. It has been sent to all residences in the 2621 postcode (Bungendore/Bywong area). Although Wamboin is also "local" it is difficult to post to the 2620 postcode given the wide geography of the area (e.g. Michelago).

The survey 'flyer' is seeking "signatures to help lobby NSW and Federal Minsters to commit to construct this overdue amenity" - the Abbeyfield House.

With a healthy indication of community support, he stands a much better chance of succeeding.

We (the committee) would really appreciate it if - in the absence of a piece of paper (which many dispose of without reading) - you could make a little effort on our behalf and contact Mr Barilaro to show that you support the Abbeyfield Bungendore project. Help him to convince 'the powers that be' that this is a project worth their full support and funding!

The Federal Member for Eden-Monaro – Dr Mike Kelly MP - fully supports the project as well.

This is an important milestone in the project as it takes the initiative to a much higher level. Please take the time to put in a positive response for us...and help to give the Abbeyfield House project a significant step forward. (we'll be long dead before we raise the money needed with jams and pickles!)

The way in which horses are managed can have a significant effect on their health and also on the health of the land where they live. At our next event, nationally acclaimed author and expert on horse property management, Stuart Myers B.A from Equiculture will deliver a seminar which is of value to not only horse owners but to the wider environment in which they live.

Rainfall

Just to join in the talk on the record rainfall, I have fixed a problem I have experienced with both of my Nylex rain gauges. When we had a very heavy fall of rain, after the measuring tube filled (26.5mm) the cup would start to fill. This was due to the airtight fit of the cup to the outer case. Problem: When I tugged the cup off (it is a very tight fit) I would sometimes spill some of the rain. Solution: I drilled a small (1/8) hole in the outer case just below the cup. This releases the trapped air and the gauge works fine with the extra rain (over 26.5mm) spilling into the outer case for later measurement. Alternatively, the hole could be drilled in the outer skirt of the cup (above the outer tube) with equal effect.

Maybe worth a mention that in Australia daily rain readings are made at 9am and are recorded **on that day**. For interest, in New Zealand, readings are also made at 9am but are credited to the previous day. The argument being the previous day gives a 15 hour window versus 9 hours. Written with webbed feet. 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The Facts About The Ellerton Drive Extension

Suggested for the Whisper and for the Stony Creek Gazette by Palerang-Queanbeyan Regional Council, Prepared by the Council's Manager of Integrated Planning and Communications, Ricky Tozer

Much has been said in the local media, and indeed this newsletter, regarding the Ellerton Drive Extension. Planning for this road has been ongoing for many years and intensified in the last four years to the point where it was approved by Determination Panel in June 2016 to proceed.

The Ellerton Drive Extension is the major piece of the puzzle to ensure Queanbeyan's traffic network continues to operate at a satisfactory standard as the city's population grows.

The 4.6km project will link east Queanbeyan at the current termination point of Ellerton Drive with Karabar at the intersection of Old Cooma Rd and Edwin Land Parkway. The Extension will be a single lane road with climbing lanes and will include a new bridge over the Queanbeyan River which will be above the 1 in 100 year flood level.

- The benefits of the Extension include
- alternate access around the Queanbeyan CBD
- reduction of congestion on key Queanbeyan roads, especially around the CBD
- reduction of the number of heavy vehicles travelling through the CBD
- increasing road network capacity to address growing Googong population
- a river crossing above the 1 in 100 year flood level
- additional access/exit points for residents in the Fairlane estate and emergency access points for Greenleigh residents The corridor for the Ellerton Drive Extension has been identified on Council mans, plans and strategies since the 1970s

The corridor for the Ellerton Drive Extension has been identified on Council maps, plans and strategies since the 1970s and has been supported to some degree by eight previous councils.

The EDE project will be financed by a combination of Government grants and loan funding. The NSW and Commonwealth Governments have provided \$25m each in funding towards the construction of the road. With the road estimated to cost between \$80m-\$86m, QPRC has approved obtaining a long term low interest loan for \$36m to fund the remainder of the project. All of this loan, including interest, will be repaid via developer contributions, which will primarily come from the developers of Googong. In summary, ratepayers will not be required to pay extra for this project via their rates.

The Googong and Tralee Traffic Study (developed in 2009), and subsequent updates, have shown that Dunns Creek Road is not required to be built within in the study horizon (up to 2031) based on population forecasts. In September 2015, Council recognised the role Dunns Creek Road could play in Queanbeyan's traffic network well into the future by selecting a preferred alignment and the identification of the road corridor.

Staff are continuing to finalise tender documents for the construction of the road, with initial stages of work expected to commence prior to Christmas 2016.

Ellerton Drive Extension Timeline

- 1974 The Ellerton Drive Extension corridor is shown in the Queanbeyan Structure Plan.
- 1994 The Ellerton Drive Extension corridor is shown in the Queanbeyan Structure Plan.
- 2004 The Ellerton Drive Extension corridor is shown in the Queanbeyan Structure Plan.
- September 2006 NSW Planning Minister requests Council prepare a long-term residential and employment lands strategy to accommodate growth for up to 25 years. The Strategy includes the EDE, then known as the Edwin Land Parkway.
- November 2006 Residential and Economic Strategy 2031, which includes EDE, endorsed.
- April 2007 NSW Department of Planning reviews the strategy and requests Council develop a transport strategy to service new residential and employment lands.
- 2009 Council engages Gabites Porter to conduct a fully-functioning integrated land use/transport model to analyse Queanbeyan's traffic network
- June 2009 Council supports in principle the recommendations of the draft Queanbeyan Strategic Traffic Plan and places it on exhibition.
- August 2009 Council adopts the draft Queanbeyan Strategic Traffic Plan and resolves to rename it the Googong and Tralee Traffic Study (2031). In adopting the Study, Council accepted the recommendation of Option 05B which included a combination of the Ellerton Drive Extension, four-laning of Old Cooma Rd and various intersection improvements.
- October and December 2013 Council holds two Public Transport Forums.
- September 2011 NSW Government provides \$4m package to allow design and environmental studies for the EDE, further stages of Old Cooma Rd, various intersection upgrades as well as seed funding Dunns Creek Rd corridor identification and related studies.
- February 2013 Council agreed to a list of priorities to raise with candidates for the Federal election. The number one priority was funding for the EDE.
- August 28 2013 Council resolved to proceed with detailed design of the EDE. Following consultation, the design would include gated emergency access at the end of Lonergan Dr, Greenleigh and a left in, left out and right in connection to Fairlane Estate.
- December 2013 Council accepts a tender for consultants to prepare detailed design.

- June 2014 Commonwealth and NSW Governments announce funding contributions of \$25m each
- December 2014 The traffic model used in developing the Googong and Tralee Traffic Study is updated with current Census data, land release data and Queanbeyan and Canberra traffic counts. The updated study supports the findings of the previous study.
- December 2014 February 2015 A range of documents relating to the EDE, including Review of Environmental Factors, Species Impact Statement and Preliminary Design are exhibited.
- February 2015 Commencement of noise workshops with affected residents.
- February 2015 Council resolves to hold an independently facilitated Community Forum on the EDE
- April 2015 Around 350 community members attend Community Forum on the EDE
- December 2015 Bitzios Consulting commissioned by RMS on behalf of Council to review the traffic modelling and reporting in the Googong and Tralee Traffic Study (2031). Review found that processes were consistent with standard strategic modelling practices and modelling appeared logical and consistent.
- February 2016 Species Impact Statement Addendum publicly exhibited
- May 2016 Independent consultant prepares Determination Report
- June 2016 NSW Office of Environment and Heritage provides concurrence for Determination Report
- June 2016 Determination Panel Meeting and Extraordinary Meeting held in Queanbeyan




Figure 1 – Plan View of the Proposed Ellerton Drive Extension



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Safe Disposal of Sharps:

The word 'sharps' in the medical profession might make the general public only think of just a single needle, however there are a couple of different types of sharps which include scalpel blades or syringes with needles securely connected (eg. vaccinations). The information in this article is designed to give you a basic understanding of the potential hazards involved with sharp instruments that you may use yourself or come into contact with when owning a horse.

It is essential that both medical and veterinary practitioners, including all their employees follow safe working procedures at all times and in regards to this article the '<u>Safe Disposal of Sharps</u>'. Occupational and personal health & safety make this information imperative to pass on to our clients and the general public as it is a crucial no. 1 rule which if not followed can do bodily harm to others outside the workplace or even at home, when collecting and disposing of waste.

As a veterinarian or nurse, there is a high chance of a needle stick or sharps injury occurring at some stage throughout our careers due to the tasks we carry out every day on the job. However, this also becomes a risk factor to our clients when they take home prescribed injectable medications.

Needle stick injuries can occur anywhere from when you first take the needle out of its plastic slip, to during administration, or even after the entire procedure but before safe disposal. Did you know research has proven that a common way for them to occur within and around the veterinary field is actually after the procedure, left in a coat or pant pocket to be found days later! An inadvertent puncture of the skin may be the minor physical trauma endured, however there is always concern for the potential exposure to infectious agents or contents of the syringe.





Do you personally give your own horse or horses their half yearly or yearly vaccinations such as; tetanus, strangles or the equine herpes vaccination? Do you give regular monthly Pentosan injections to improve your horse's joint mobility? Are you left with several needles to safely dispose of within the year?

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The Wamboin Firefighter

The Wamboin Firefighter newsletter is produced by the Wamboin Rural Fire Brigade for the benefit of residents and property owners in the brigade's area that includes the localities of Wamboin, Bywong and Sutton (south of the Federal Highway) and Bungendore (along and west of the Lake George escarpment).



BUSH FIRE DANGER PERIOD (FIRE SEASON) HAS COMMENCED!!

The Statutory Bush Fire Danger Period runs from 1 October to 31 March

FIRE PERMITS ARE NOW REQUIRED

If you are planning to light a fire in the open

during the Bush Fire Danger Period, you will need a Fire Permit.



BURNING OFF – FIRE PERMITS REQUIRED

From 1st October if you wish to light a fire in the open (other than a bbq or cooking fire in a properly constructed fire place with a 2 metre cleared border around it) you will require a Fire Permit before lighting up.

The key things to remember:

- You need a fire permit if it's the Bush Fire Danger Period.
- Just because it's the Bush Fire Danger Period doesn't mean you can't use fire but there are restrictions to ensure fire is used safely and minimises danger to you, your property and the community;
- Getting a permit is free and easy.
- There are heavy penalties if you don't follow restrictions or rules.
- Permits for properties in the Wamboin Brigade area (see above) can be arranged by contacting the Brigade Captain on 0409 991 340 or email: <u>captain@brigade.wamboincommunity.asn.au</u>
- Requests for permits should be made at least a week before the intended burn, because we must inspect the burn site before we can issue a permit, and thus may be unable to issue a permit at short notice.
- Fires lit without a valid permit are illegal and may attract severe penalties, so it is in the resident's own interest to obtain a permit.
- Permits are issued subject to various conditions including notification by the permit holder to the Lake George Zone Fire Control Centre in Queanbeyan and to all adjoining occupiers or owners of land including land that is separated by a lane, road or waterway.
- Permits are automatically revoked if the Fire Danger Rating is Very High or above. They are also automatically revoked during days of Total Fire Ban. Permits may also be suspended on days of High fire danger after taking into account changed or deteriorating weather conditions.

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As temperatures get warmer we ask landowners to use care when lighting fires. It is an offence to allow a fire to escape from your property and it is your responsibility to ensure that fires are not left unattended.

If a fire does escape, it is essential to call Triple Zero (000) immediately so emergency services can respond accordingly and minimise damage.

SEASONAL PREPARATION OF YOUR PROPERTY

Given the volume and frequency of the rain these past couple of months the bogging index for most of us anywhere off road will remain almost off the scale for a wee-while yet. But be assured, if we start seeing a little more sun and temperatures climbing the lawn and pastures will begin to take off. Subject to the caveat above, here are a few suggestions you might incorporate in your property preparations over the coming weeks:

- Slash or mow long grass and remove any build-up of material. Keep garden mulch away from your house.
- Remove leaves from gutters.
- Cut back trees overhanging both your home and your access/egress route(s).
- Remove fallen branches and other debris.
- Check/service equipment, e.g. grass cutters, water pumps, sprinkler systems and fire extinguishers.
- Make sure the pressure relief valve on LPG cylinders faces outwards (so a flame won't be directed towards any part of your house).
- Review, update and practise your Bush Fire Survival Plan.
- With your family, identify and assemble items that will form part of your Bush Fire Survival Kit.

BRIGADE CALLOUTS

In the past month the Brigade has attended 4 motor vehicle accidents, 2 un-notified pile burns and 1 false alarm.

Since the beginning of 2016 the Brigade has responded to 45 events.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

On Saturday 17 September with the resumption of the Wamboin market after winter recess, the brigade set up its information stall outside the fire station to answer visitor queries and offer advice about property and personal preparations for the coming bush fire season. Several new residents to the area took the opportunity to call by.

On the same day the Brigade played its usual role of parking BBQ and fire protection at the WCA Bonfire and Fireworks evening.

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Nature Notes September 2016 Jo Walker

The very wet winter weather seems to be continuing into spring, with almost 50mm of rain since I came home from a trip in the second week of September and more forecast before we reach October. The creeks are running noisily and there are many areas on my place that have had surface water running over the soggy ground for weeks now. A multitude of frogs are taking advantage of the wet conditions, calling from the dam and all of the ponds along the creek.


Many of the local wattles are still flowering – Silver Wattles (*Acacia dealbata*), Red-stemmed Wattles (*A. rubida*) and Poverty Wattles (*A. dawsonii*) are all still bearing clusters of bright yellow flowers. But, a lot of the other shrubs and the smaller plants seem to be a bit backward in flowering this year. The Urn Heath (*Melichrus urceolatus*) is almost at the end of its winter flowering and a few of the peas are just beginning to bloom. The tall prickly-leaved *Dillwynia sieberi* has a good display of yellow and red flowers and the low-growing *Hovea heterophylla* is adding a few purple patches to the green landscape. And, of course, the twining False Sarsparilla (*Hardenbergia violacea*) is providing even more vivid purple. There are several of these beautiful plants sprawled along the road cutting on the western end of Norton Road.

The sodden ground has benefited the Billy Buttons (*Craspedia variabilis*) and the Pale Sundews (*Drosera peltata*). The number of Billy Button plants has increased noticeably although they are a bit late to flower this year – so far, they are just beginning to produce the long stems bearing buds. The Pale Sundews are also still in bud, but have come up in bright green carpets in the very wet places. Another moisture loving plant, the Common Buttercups (*Ranunculus lappaceus*) are just starting to produce their glossy golden flowers.

There doesn't seem to be a lot of nesting activity amongst the birds yet, although a Sulphur-crested Cockatoo seems to be guarding a hole high in one of the Red Stringybark trees along the creek. And a pair of Black-faced Cuckoo-shrikes were recently very busy flying from shrub to shrub and amongst the trees at the top of the hill. And, between the time I started these Notes and finished them, I walked down to pick up the newspaper and noticed the pair of Spotted Pardalotes busy at the nesting site they have used for the previous two years!

A small flock of Silver-eyes has been flying around the wattles for the last few days and appear to be finding some small insects there. A pair of Ravens have taken up residence recently, but the pair of Magpie-larks that were here for most of the winter seem to have moved away. A few Red-browed Finches are still around and a pair were examining the briar bush below the house where there were four Finch nests one year.

Most lizards are apparently still hibernating as, so far this spring, I've only seen a few Grass Skinks. The Echidnas are already digging into the nests of Meat Ants and turning over the soil in search of other prey. And most of the Kangaroo joeys are exploring their surroundings for at least part of the day before returning to the warmth of a pouch and are probably about to experience an unusually green summer.



Wildcare's Small Surprise

Wildcare has often encouraged people to keep the area around their house and backyard nice and tidy, so that wildlife – particularly venomous snakes, can be discouraged or readily seen. Woodpiles can be a high-risk area, as snakes, lizards, spiders, echidnas and other animals can make it their home. If we are vigilant we can see problems before they arise, but a recent Wildcare incident brought home the need to take great care.

Dianne, a Wildcare volunteer, described a recent rescue, "I was called out to a Burra house to check out what was said to be a sugar glider that had turned up inside a house – it had been found in the lounge room. You can imagine my delight and surprise to discover it was actually a tiny, but adult, Feathertail glider. This little lady was about 10 grams and extremely lucky. *Photo to right: a Feathertail*

"Some firewood had been brought into the house and the glider must have fallen from it. The homeowner found it on the carpet, heading towards the door and she could not believe her eyes. To think this tiny creature had been carried into the house on the back of a log was amazing. Normally Feathertails spend their time above the ground, but can come down to forage for food, such as ants and termites. Checking out the woodheap, it appeared to be in an ideal place to attract this type of animal, being close to a huge old broad leaf peppermint, Eucalyptus bridgesiana, situated in an overgrown deep gully. "This lucky lady was in good condition and was released back into the gully.



Insectivorous bats and possums have also been known to catch a ride on firewood, so please take care."

At this time of year, as wildlife gets on the move, it is even more important to ensure animals cannot readily get into the house and give you a surprise. Wildcare often gets called out to remove snakes that have wriggled through a gap or when a screen door has been left open! One year, Wildcare rescued an echidna that had trundled through an open door and taken up residence in the hallway.

The Wonderful Women of Wamboin Gail Ritchie Knight




