


THE BIG EVENT FOR DECEMBER IS- XMAS DRINKS: This annual event will as usual be held at the Bywong Hall (Birriwa Rd.) on Friday 9 December from 5:00 pm onwards and this is a great opportunity to catch up with neighbors and friends from Bywong, Wamboin and surrounds. This year there will be a presentation by BCA committee members on the plans and significant progress made to date on the Playground Project which should interest a good proportion of residents. The presentation will include plans, diagrams of the playground layout and much more information. There will also be a miniraffle to aid in fund raising. NB A summary of the current status and important developments regarding this initiative is included in another section of this article.

Retiring Committee Member: This year the BCA Committee farewelled former committee members, Bernie Greethead and Prof Jeremy Shearmur who have both recently moved. Their past efforts are greatly appreciated but the committee has been energized with new members and 'helpers', and should generate new ideas for our community. In particular some creative approaches to the 20th anniversary Car Boot Sale are expected which should make this event truly memorable.

Disability Inclusion Access Plan: A consultation on this plan will be hosted for both the Bywong and Wamboin communities by Debbie Gillman at the Bywong Hall between 6.00 and 7.30 pm on Tuesday 13 December. Anyone with an interest in this issue is welcome to attend.

Playground Project: This is quite a large and expensive undertaking and while sufficient funds are presently available to start the project further money will be required to purchase some of the more expensive items. So far around \$16,000 has been raised to fund the project. This is comprised of a \$10,000 grant from the NSW Government Community Building Partnerships, a contribution of \$5,000 from the Bendigo Bank in Bungendore, a \$300 donation from the Wonderful Women of Wamboin with around \$600 provided by the BCA itself.

The cost of the desired play equipment (4 large items) is estimated to be around \$28,000 with an extra \$7,000 required for the installation. However, additional money will be required for site preparation and necessary improvements to the hall and associated infrastructure for general Health and Safety reasons. The BCA with the Hall committee are finalising details of a QPRC 'Stronger Communities Grant', which will fund the necessary modifications and improvements, and which are in accord with the new "Master Plan" for the Les Reardon Reserve.

The committee is also very actively looking at options for raising the extra money required for the play equipment, but many of the possible grants require an "in kind" contribution from the community. Consequently the

BCA would be very interested to hear from anyone willing to volunteer their skills/labour or otherwise to assist the project. In particular we would welcome assistance from anyone with Project Management experience. Although the playground is not a huge construction job, organising the work flow, liaison with Council etc. will require some time and application.

On this note we would like to acknowledge the assistance of Jennie Curtis from Fresh Landscape Design, who has donated her professional knowledge and skills in designing the playground and developing the Master Plan for the LRR. The project would not have progressed to its present stage without Jennie's help.

He Said What??



Daniel Gilbert discusses the hot topics and questions often raised but seldom answered by other real estate agents.

DON'T ALWAYS TRUST THE STATISTICS

'I keep seeing some agents publishing statistics and charts claiming their success and market share etc. How reliable are these figures and statistics?"

Statistics can give such a distorted picture of the true situation and they should only be relied upon once they are viewed in their whole context. For example, some agents will use statistics as a measure of success to claim a whopping market share or level of sales success in their market. They dazzle home sellers with bar charts and pie charts showing dominant market share, or to show that they are No.1 (whatever that means). Most of the time, they cherry pick a timeframe where they had a successful run of sales and use that time period to broadcast their success. It is just simply misleading. I remember about 8 years ago, one of the websites we were advertising on showed 15 properties as sold in the last month, and 8 of those were ours. What fortunate timing!! We could have used that cherry pick to spruik that we had over 50% market share, which was garbage, neither we, nor any agent had 50% market share. The agent's true measure of success is their long term track record over 5-10 years.

Some agents will use their average days on the market as a measure of success, which is really meaningless because as agents, we don't have control over the time that a property is for sale. Look at this example. Let's say I had 10 listings, vendors all realistic and motivated and I sold all 10 properties after just 30 days on the market. I could beat my chest and say list with me – my average time on the market is only 30 days. Now let's look at the same scenario, except one of my vendors has a highly inflated value of their property, is not that motivated, and it takes a year to sell. Look at the numbers now – 9 properties sell in 30 days, so that's a total of 270 days on the market. Add on the 10th property and that's a total of 635 days on the market, which equates to an average of over 60 days on the market. See how rubbery those figures have become? One unmotivated vendor who took a year to sell, has more than doubled the average days on the market.

The message is this – don't be bluffed or hoodwinked by cherry picked statistics and grandiose claims by agents. Look at their marketing, their proven ability to negotiate and their selling fees (and make sure not one dollar of your money gets siphoned off as franchise fees to fund exorbitant CEO salaries and gala black tie awards nights). 

From: **The Wamboin Firefighter,** compiled by Cliff Spong: "Brigade Donation Drive: Even though we all pay a levy in our annual rates for the rural fire brigade service in our Shire, the amount of money raised does not fully cover all the costs of running the brigades. What is a Foaling Kit?

A foaling kit is not only necessary items you may need in the event of an emergency, it will also include having all the regular equipment needed to deal with the normal events in foal birthing.

Most foals will be born within 20 minutes from the time the mare's water breaks, sometimes referred to as an explosive process, therefore it would be very helpful to have everything you need right there on hand before the time comes!

- 1) List of key contacts (vets no. including after hours no.) & anyone else you may want in the case of an emergency.
- 2) Fully charged mobile or cordless phone DEFINITLEY IN RANGE OF WHERE

THE MARE IS TO FOAL.

- 3) A torch, as 80% of mares will foal after dark.
- 4) Flash cards to help memorise the typical intervals of birthing so you can call the vet ASAP if it differs.
- 5) A watch to keep time with and then record on notepad to make sure foal is progressing through the birth canal.
- 6) Halter and lead rope.
- 7) Clean towels. (REMEMBER you are not the foals mum, you only need to wipe down the new foal if conditions are cold or the mare is not doing her job well.) It is good practice to check and clean the foal's nostrils.
- 8) Tail wrap, things will be much cleaner if you can manage to put a tail wrap on the mare before she enters the birthing stage.
- 9) Strong garbage bag or bucket to collect placenta so it can be examined later to ensure it is complete and no parts have been left behind in the womb.
- 10) Lengths of string incase you need to tie off umbilical cord. Additionally, tie up the placenta if the mare takes a couple hours to shed it as it can be either easily stepped on destroying it for future observations or even ripped from the mare before she is ready to let it go.
- 11) Enema, as foals sometimes have trouble passing their first faeces the meconium. KY jelly is handy for lubrication to insert.

NOTE: PLEASE CALL YOUR VET BEFORE YOU GIVE AN ENEMA AS A FOAL'S BOWEL IS VERY DELICATE AT THIS STAGE IN LIFE.

- 12) Sharp blunt scissors incase you need to pierce the placental sac in the case of 'red bagging'.
- 13) Antiseptic dip for the umbilical stump. A dilute solution of chlorhexidine is used as a dip for the first couple days to minimize infection to this entry point.
- 14) Lastly, have a conversation with the vet prior to parturition to know the available options for colostrum or plasma administration if the concern should arise. It is imperative that you call your vet as soon as possible should you think there is problem with your mare foaling!

The Fire Season is In Force - Fire Permits Are Now Required



The Fire Brigade recommends that you do not burn off during the fire season. It is far better to hold off pile burns or hazard reduction burns until after the fire season. If you find it necessary to have a burn you will need a fire permit and tending your fire has onerous requirements.

Fire permits are free and can be arranged by contacting the Wamboin Brigade Captain on 0409 991 340 or email: captain@brigade.wamboincommunity.asn.au

We have to inspect any burn site before we can issue a permit, which means we may be unable to issue a permit at short notice. So please make your request for a

permit at least a week before the intended burn.

Cooking fires are OK as long as they are in a properly constructed fire place with a 2 metre cleared border around it, and a continuous supply of water (e.g. garden tap & hose) is readily available.



Wildcare Trains Snake Handlers

If you had visited the Wildcare webpage recently you would have read about their annual snake handler training courses are taking place. Wildcare has a large number of trained snake handlers (albeit there is a shortage in the Sutton/Gundaroo area) and the courses are aimed at new recruits who are keen to become snake handlers and there are refreshers for ongoing volunteers.

To run the courses there is a need to get hold of some snakes to train with – typically local tiger, eastern brown and redbellied black snakes. One such opportunity to capture a snake arose during a recent and not uncommon request for Wildcare help.

As Wayne, Wildcare's snake coordinator commented, "A lady rang Wildcare on the 6299 1966 helpline to report a brown snake that had been hanging around her kitchen garden for a few days. When I spoke to her, she couldn't see it anymore, so I advised that, since we were in the process of collecting snakes for the snake handling courses that we run each spring, I



would appreciate it if she could call back if she spots it again, hopefully at a time that I could get there before it disappeared again.

"While running the first training course, she called back. And when we broke for lunch, I returned her call and asked if she could still see it. Apparently it was cruising around her strawberry patch, but it was definitely there! I left the course venue and went to her place, which was 10 minutes away. She had put a stick in the hole where it normally retreated, and was watching it from a safe distance - absolutely perfect! She pointed it out to me and I used my jigger to pull a loop out and gently grab the tail, extricating it from the strawberry plants. I popped it in my snake bag – all done and dusted.

"The property owner was extremely grateful that I could remove the snake safely, and I was impressed that she did exactly what was needed - called Wildcare (6299 1966) and watched it from a safe distance, so I could find and remove it when I got there. "Strawberry" (see photo)

was used on the snake handling course that very afternoon and will be released once she has contributed to the training of at least 40 more Wildcare snake handler volunteers!"

There is no need to be fearful of snakes – they are shy animals and would rather keep out of our way. Left alone they will generally move off and not be seen again. But they can surprise us when we come across them unexpectedly. It is a good idea to get your family to keep the Wildcare number in their mobile phones, so they can readily get help and advice when needed. -Philip Machin for Wildcare 6238 3717


The Wonderful Women of Wamboin by Gail Ritchie Knight

Nature Notes November 2016

With continuing intermittent rain this month and increasingly warm days, the landscape is exceptionally green. And, the eucalypts are still putting on new growth of a range of different colours according to the species they belong to – from bluish and yellowish green to orange and red and all shades between. Black Wattles (*Acacia mearnsii*) are adding masses of perfumed cream flowers to the picture, while Silver Wattles (*Acacia dealbata*) are bearing crops of dark pinkish seed-pods.

Daisies are the most eye-catching plants at the moment. The golden Sticky Everlasting Daisies(Xerochrysum viscosum) are brightening up the roadsides adding a bit of contrast to the still-flowering white Hoary Sunrays (Leucochrysum albicans). The tiny yellow Austral Sunrays (Triptilodiscus pygmaeus) are still carpeting the more open dry areas, and Scaly Buttons (Leptorhynchos squamatus) are competing for notice with Billy Buttons (Craspedia variabilis) in damper sites. And the tall Cauliflower Bushes (Cassinia longifolia) are just beginning to open their white flowerheads. So many of our local daisies are yellow or white, but the less flamboyant, but equally beautiful, mauve-blue flowers of Brachyscome spathulata (Spoon-leaved Daisy) are just making an appearance.

The white star-like flowers evident on dry hillsides at present look superficially like daisies, but they are *Stellaria pungens* (Prickly Starwort) in the Caryophyllaceae Family. They tolerate dry, open sites, and were one of the first plants to recover in the mountains after the 2003 fires, forming vast white carpets. The golden Guinea Flowers (*Hibbertia obtusiflora*) are still flowering, but probably the most noticeable yellow flowers at the moment (excluding the daisies of course!) are those of the Wedge-peas (*Gompholobium huegelii*). There is one at my place growing through a Burgan bush with over forty large, bright yellow flowers.

The birds are busy at present, introducing their young to their surroundings or still nesting. The Sulphur-crested Cockatoos' nest in a large Stringybark hollow may have been raided by something as there was a smashed egg on the ground below the tree recently. At least one pair of Yellow-tailed Black Cockatoos has had more luck though – three of them flew over and landed in a nearby tree this morning, two adults and a noisily complaining young one. And a Noisy Friarbird is obviously still constructing a nest somewhere as it was pulling long pieces of Stringybark fibre from a tree near the house the other day. It was evidently a very discerning bird as most of the strands were dropped before it flew off with a suitable piece in its beak.

I don't know where the Friarbird nested, but a recently constructed Grey Fantails' nest is more obvious. It has been built in a sapling eucalypt on a narrow slanting branch about 2 metres from the ground and is visible from all directions. It is a small, very neat, wine-glass shaped nest, built of fine fibres and spider webs with a long tail of fine bark strands. It took the birds about five days to build, and the female was sitting on the nest for the first time this morning.

Reptiles are becoming a bit more noticeable now the warm weather has arrived – Cunningham's Skinks basking on warm rocks, Grass Skinks skittering through the grasses, Shinglebacks and Bearded Dragons crossing local roads and Brown Snakes appearing in unexpected places. I had two rather-too-close encounters with Brown Snakes within an hour the other day – one in the shadehouse while I was watering and the other on a ledge in the garage (they can climb!). Adds a bit of excitement to our peaceful Wamboin life, I suppose!


The Christmas Day service will be at St Peters at 9am. On New Years Eve a Watch Night service is held at St Andrews starting at 9pm.
