



#### THE BIG EVENT FOR FEBRUARY IS- PREPARATION FOR THE 20th BYWONG CAR BOOT SALE

**Car Boot Sale Planning:** The 2017 CBS will be the 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary of this signature event and committee members and helpers are hoping to come up with some particular creative approaches which should make this event truly memorable. If anyone would like to offer help in the planning or would like to get generally involved with this, please contact us atpresident@bywongcommunity.org.au.

Wamboin Communications Action Group (WCAG) Presentation: WCAG is a small group of Wamboin residents trying to raise awareness about the poor state of our current internet and phone services and the possibility of offering more choice to residents and to voice objections to the NBN Satellite service that we are currently being offered. WCAG have asked to present at the next BCA meeting (7.30 pm on Monday Feb. 13 at the hall) to explain what they are all about and answer any questions. Anyone with an interest in this issue (probably the majority of residents) is welcome to attend. WCAG are not affiliated with or represent any commercial organisation.

**Playground Project:** Work on this is ongoing, with the major efforts directed at securing additional funding. Sufficient funds are presently available to start the project but further money will be required to purchase some of the more expensive items. A summary of the current status of this project –as of the end of 2016- was published in the December Whisper and a more personal presentation and detailed description was given at the Xmas Drinks on 9 December which was very successful with well over 40 people attending.

The BCA committee is actively applying for grants and looking at various options for raising the extra money required. As indicated in previous editions of The Whisper, many of the possible grants require an "in kind" contribution from the community so if you would like to help you can either email the BCA at - <a href="mailto:president@bywongcommunity.org.au">president@bywongcommunity.org.au</a>, or to make a donation to our funds you can deposit into our specific bank account, the details of which are - Bywong Community Inc Playground Account Number: 158 685 339; Bendigo Bank Bungendore BSB: 633 000. In a recent new and welcome development Debbie Sibbick from QPRC Parks and Recreation offered her services to manage the playground development project.

**Bungendore, Braidwood and Queanbeyan Sketches:** Current BCA treasurer, John-Pierre Favre has expertly drawn a series of sketches of historic buildings in these three QPRC towns. These are REALLY GOOD and are striking depictions of these old structures. The calendars using the Bungendore sketches were sold out well before we got to 2017 These beautiful drawings will be published in some "collectible" form, possibly reproduced on a set of "collectible" tea towels. Any profit from these sketches is generously donated by JP to the playground funds. This is an example of an "in kind" contribution to the general playground effort.

**Fires and Other Hazards:** Finally the BCA would like to extend heartfelt thanks to the Wamboin Fire Brigade and associated organisations for their diligence and expertise during the recent fire alerts in the area.

#### **Wamboin Communications Action Group**

#### The current telephone & broadband situation

The Wamboin telephone exchange has been showing its age for quite some time, but it has provided a 'mostly' reliable voice & data service except during and after heavy rain. This exchange is probably the oldest exchange currently in use by Telstra and this has an implication for its maintenance, as the parts are no longer available (Telstra techs have confirmed this), so it can be considered obsolete. Currently Telstra are 'just' maintaining it, although they frequently fail to meet their obligations under the Universal Service Obligation (USO). However, it gets more bleak than this:

Telstra's regulatory obligations to satisfy the standard telephone service universal service obligation (USO) do not define the type of technology that Telstra must use to supply a standard telephone service...

Telstra currently uses its fixed line copper network, satellite and wireless solutions for the provision of the standard telephone service. The Department expects satellite and wireless technologies will continue to be used, where available, for supply of the standard telephone service in the residual 7% of Australia if the copper serving a premises is too degraded for use.

What this means it that when our exchange equipment dies completely (something that can happen at any minute), Telstra may well just hand you a mobile phone or satellite phone to provide you with a standard telephone service (STS). However this means your current ADSL connection will be gone, and your default option for internet connectivity will be the NBN Sky Muster satellite; a service already overwhelmed and under-delivering to Australians in regional and remote areas (with only 10% of its projected user base currently connected). There is currently no obligation to give you ADSL or any other internet connection!

#### Sky Muster and what it means for you

Sky Muster NBN services typically cost more than 4x the comparable ADSL or Fixed line NBN service, or up to 20x the cost when higher data requirements are factored in.

Importantly downloads are capped at 70GB in peak periods (@~\$200/month), with NO ability to increase this at the present time. In fact, NBNCo enforce an average 30GB per connection per 4 week period limit on the service as satellite bandwidth is limited and already congested.

To put this into perspective, the average Australian fixed-line connection downloads 82GB per month, while the average NBN fixed-line connection downloads 112GB per month (when you have a faster connection, you tend to use more), and this has been rising about 50% year-on-year! 

To add to this, the satellite service comes with high latency (delay) making it difficult to use for telephony/Skype/Facetime services. Remember the days of making an international call and needing to wait a few seconds before speaking to ensure you didn't talk over the other person? This will be the new normal when you call your next door neighbours via Sky Muster!

If the claimed satellite speeds were accurate, you could use up your entire monthly data in as little as 6 hours! Although you would incur the 'Fair use limit before this and be throttled to 128KB/s for the rest of the month.

#### NBN Co's Fair Use Policy

- NBN Co requires each customer to limit their Data Usage to no more than 150 GB in any four week period.
- Furthermore, NBN Co requires each customer to limit their Peak Hour Data Usage to no more than 75 GB in any four week period.
- NBN Co requires all RSPs to limit their average customer Peak Hour Data Usage to no more than 30 GB of downloads and no more than 5 GB of uploads in any four week period.
- As a result of this policy, Plans with smaller data allowances represent better value than Plans with larger ones.

- Lobby for fixed-line or fixed-wireless NBN for our area
- Engage with alternate service providers to set up other internet options

#### Wamboin Community Association (WCA) General Meeting - Summary

Date of Meeting: 20 December 2016 Meeting Chaired by: Peter Evans, Acting President, WCA General outline of topics discussed:

Acting President Peter Evans thanked Vice President Jenny Richards for organising another successful and very well attended Wamboin Community Christmas Carols at which \$500 and numerous gifts were donated for the Salvation Army's Christmas Appeal.

Webmaster Steve Richards advised that Wheels of Wamboin event now has its own page on the WCA website. Lofty Mason has registered the WCA for 2017's Clean-Up Australia Day and will advertise via the regular channels. A number of other local organisations gave reports on their activities including:

□ Wamboin Rural Fire Brigade President Peter Greenwood reported that the Brigade had attended 9 call outs and the Boro fire. Fire Investigation attended a grass fire on Norton Road which appeared to have 3 start points. He reminded attendees of the dangers of slashing, welding and angle grinding during Fire Season, these being the cause of 3 recent local fires.

□ David McDonald advised that a well-attended meeting chaired by S355 Committee Chair, Bill Taylor at Bywong Hall relating to Greenways Master Plan for expansion and consolidation of Greenways in Wamboin and Bywong, contributing to ongoing land use planning in the district. Council members attended and were very supportive of the community's efforts.

 $\square$  Wamboin Social Drop-In Group – Denise Hales advised that the trial run of the group was very successful and that the intention is to operate at Wamboin Hall on Thursdays, 10am - 12 noon starting in February.

□ Wamboin Communications Action Group (WCAG) – John Gough explained how and why the WCAG formed with the aim of establishing a register of residents interested in joint representation regarding our area's poor current and proposed telecommunications capabilities. He said that there is a general lack of understanding of NBN capabilities including that our area has been defined "remote/rural" with satellite as our NBN solution which is of little reliable value. He stressed that the WCAG does not support any particular technology or service provider. He also alerted attendees to the imminent failure of the obsolete Amungula Place exchange which would affect landline service as well as ADSL. The WCA agreed to support the activities of the WCAG such as by including a link to WCAG's website on the WCA's website and Acting President Peter Evans invited WCAG to give updates at future meetings.

The WCA meets on the 3rd Tuesday of each month (except January) at 7:30pm at the Wamboin Hall, 112 Bingley Way, Wamboin. Next meeting: Tuesday 21st February. All welcome. - Jenny Warren, Assistant Secretary, Wamb Community Assn.



#### Its been a long hot summer....

Over the past two months the Wamboin Fire Brigade has been called upon to provide equipment and crews on some 16 events involving 46 individual tanker callouts. These events have included motor vehicle accidents, truck fires, grass and bush fires some small, some large; patrolling controlled fires and attending to smoke sightings.

It's been a very busy period and of course summer is not over so we can expect more callouts over the coming weeks.

With all this activity it's time to reflect on your preparations. Are you receiving alerts on your mobile phone for local fires and are you keeping up to date on fires using applications such as ABC Padio Capherra 666. Maybe you are checking on local weather conditions utilizing the

Fires Near Me or via the local ABC Radio Canberra 666. Maybe you are checking on local weather conditions utilising the Wamboin weather station. www.wamboincommunity.asn.au/weather

#### **Brigade Activity**

We have seen fires in our immediate neighbourhood and slightly further afield but still within the RFS Lake George Zone and the QPRC. The incidents reported in this Whisper cover the period 30 November through to 30 January. There is a good chance considering the temperatures lately that the Brigade will be out on the last days of January.

#### **Call Outs**

Wednesday 30 November: Two heavy tankers (Wamboin 1A and Wamboin 1B) attended a truck fire on the Federal Highway at Lake George.

Saturday 3 December: A crew of five was despatched to a motor vehicle accident on Macs Reef Road at 6.30pm and were back an hour later.

*Friday 9 December*: A fire was reported on Norton Road just opposite Merino Vale Drive. All four tankers responded to very quickly extinguish what could have been a dangerous (and suspicious) fire.

Monday 12 December and for several days: Lower Boro Road, Boro. This was the first of the big fires this season. Over several days we despatched one of our heavy tankers and both of our light Cat 7 tankers. A total of 18 crew members, some for repeat callouts, attended what became an extensive grass fire. Our crews were involved in direct firefighting and in patrolling the fire ground on subsequent days and nights. This was a major commitment by the Wamboin Brigade with some crews on the fire ground for 12 hour shifts either through the day or overnight.

Saturday 17 December: One of our heavy tankers was despatched at 4.00pm for a fire on Lake Road. They were turned around and sent back to the shed. Our services weren't required.

*Saturday 17 December:* One heavy tanker and 2 light tankers were despatched to a fire in Clare lane. A total of 9 crew were busy from 7.00pm to 11.00pm.

*Tuesday 3 January:* It was our training night when the pagers went off. There was a fire at the Queanbeyan effluent treatment works and we were able to contribute three trucks and a total of 13 crew members. We arrived at 8.00pm and were back at the shed at 9.30pm.

*Monday 9 January*: Back to the Queanbeyan effluent treatment works. This time 9 crew members in three trucks were on scene from 2.00pm to 4.00pm. The fire was well extinguished through the efforts of ACT and NSW crews and helicopters.

*Wednesday 11 January*: A total of 10 crew members in three tankers attended a fire in Bidges Road. It was a pile of dirt including composting vegetation that had created enough heat to start burning. We were out of the station at 9.30am and back by 11.00am.

*Friday 12 January:* Many will remember the day Sutton Road, north of Norton Road was closed all day. A B-Double truck had rolled. Whilst Sutton Brigade had managed the scene during the morning, Wamboin had a heavy tanker and a crew of 4 present for fire protection from 12.00 noon to about 3.30pm during the recovery period.

*Tuesday 17 January and for several days:* Currandooley/Mt Fairy, this was the second big fire for the season and at the time of writing we still had a truck patrolling the fire ground.

Over several days more than 50 crew members were despatched to this fire, some for repeat tours. In addition to the crews in the fire trucks our support crew was also assisting in the Station preparing meals and food packs. Whilst all 4 of our tankers were at some stage on the Currandooley fire ground we always retained at least on truck at the Wamboin Fire Station.

Our crews were involved in the suppression and extinguishment of the fire, along with patrolling the fire ground and blacking out during the days and nights after the fire had been controlled. Many of our crews were involved in some long shifts.

*Tuesday 17 January:* A fire was reported on Norton Road. Three Wamboin tankers (W1A was already at Currandooley); assisted by the Queanbeyan Brigade and some ACT RFS tankers brought the fire rapidly under control. The fire was threatening two houses on Norton Road.

*Wednesday 18 January:* A smoke sighting on the Federal Hwy was investigated by W7B but turned out to be smoke from the Mulligans Flat fire north of Sutton.

*Thursday 19 January*, A fire was reported at Snow Gum Lane. A heavy and light tanker were despatched with 5 crew on board. They were out of the shed at 3.00pm and back by 4.00pm with the fire extinguished.

#### The Fire Season is In Force - Fire Permits Are Required



Fire permits are free and can be arranged by contacting the Wamboin Brigade Captain on 0409 991 340 or email: <a href="mailto:captain@brigade.wamboincommunity.asn.au">captain@brigade.wamboincommunity.asn.au</a>

We have to inspect any burn site before we can issue a permit, which means we may be unable to issue a permit at short notice. So please make your request for a permit at least a week before the intended burn.

Cooking fires are OK as long as they are in a properly constructed fire place with a 2 metre cleared border around it, and a continuous supply of water (e.g. garden tap & hose) is readily available.

#### **Our Rock-Like Turtles**

Often confused as a tortoise, one of our most endearing creatures that we commonly come across is the eastern long-necked turtle. With one of the wettest spring and early summer periods, Wildcare has been busier than normal with 40 injured turtles rescued in the last four months – often picked up and handed into Wildcare by members of the public. Normally Wildcare rehabilitates only about 35 turtles over a year. So, the increase in numbers could be due to wetter than normal weather or maybe it is just people being more aware of our wildlife and knowing what to do.

As Alicia, Wildcare's turtle and reptile coordinator, says, "Speeding along at 100km/hr, doesn't give much time to react to a turtle loitering on the road – or realise that "rock" on the road is actually moving. A lot of turtles (and lizards) get squished or injured, but more and more drivers are chucking a U-ey, to get back to either safely remove animals from danger or to check for injuries. To avoid getting 'scented', gently scoop up the turtle by carefully putting your hands exactly where your instincts say not to put them: right in front of the head and tail. Don't worry about his head – that will pop into its shell. Turtles are shy and don't bite. If the turtle is obviously healthy then pick it up (front and back) – hold them at arm's length, and release it as far off the road as possible, in the direction it was already going.

"Turtles are termed 'Pleurodira', or 'side-necked' turtles, meaning they fold their head into the side of their shell - tucked as far under their "veranda" as possible, instead of retracting it inwards like other turtle or tortoise species. As many would know, our smiling snake-necked friends are more likely to dissuade you from picking them up by releasing a pungent orange liquid from their scent glands just in front of their back legs – that's why we pick up the animal from the front and back, not from the side. Turtles are tough critters and can remain alive for hours or even days after receiving a fatal crack to their shell, so it is worth checking injured animals. With badly injured turtles, they need to go to a vet to be euthanaised. If a shell crack is minor, Wildcare has volunteers that are trained to fix the break and it will regrow and fuse back together over time." If you are squeamish, a Wildcare tip is to have an old towel in the boot of your car. This can be used to throw over a turtle (lizard or other small non-venomous animal) to then scoop them up as a bundle to move off the road or hold if you need to get help. Lastly, please watch out for our rock-like friends on the roads and have the 24/7 Wildcare helpline - 6299 1966, in your phone to get help and advise. Philip Machin for Wildcare, ph 6238-3717

2017 will see the anniversaries of some notable cars and motoring milestones. Among the most notable will be 50 years of the Toyota Corolla (the world's bestselling car), 70 years of passion for the prancing horse of Ferrari, 40 years of Williams Formula 1 team, 75 years of the Jeep (I didn't buy one but the neighbour did and he yells it out every night across Wamboin), 30 years of the BMW M3 and fifty years of the Mercedes-AMG marriage.



The Corolla made its debut in 1966 and was assembled at a brand-new factory in Takaoka, Japan. Corollas still roll off the line at Takaoka and production has now expanded to 19 other factories worldwide. The Corolla is sold across 140 countries across the world.

The Corolla name stands for a ring of petals central part of a flower. The name was chosen for the hope of an automotive bloom. It certainly did that for Toyota. Australia was Corolla's first export market and the first to build the model outside of Japan (666,700 were built in Melbourne over 31 years). Did you know:

- The Corolla won its class at Bathurst in 1968 and again in 1969. Corolla achieved a Guinness World Record in 1985-86 by scoring 24 consecutive class wins in the Australian Touring Car Championship
- The Corolla was the first car to introduce white reversing lights
- Corolla was the first mass-produced small car to employ twin-cam multi-valve engine technology
- By 1994 Corolla had overtaken the Volkswagen Beetle's production record. Beetle sales topped out at 21.5 million.

Corolla sales now total over 43 million, and at an ongoing annual rate of about 1.5 million per year worldwide

- Corolla was rebadged as the Holden Nova for two generations; both were built in Melbourne until 1999.
- Australians have bought more than 1.37 million Corollas since 1967
- Somewhere in the world, someone buys a Corolla every 36 seconds

Let's hope we can see some Corolla's at the Wheels of Wamboin.

#### **Nature Note January 2017**

With only a few millimetres of rain since Christmas and temperatures above 30 degrees most days, the countryside is beginning to look parched. That does apply mostly to the low vegetation though - with the high winter rainfall and warm Spring days, the trees and larger shrubs put on masses of new growth and are still looking quite lush.

The Cauliflower Bushes (*Cassinia longifolia*) are about the only plants in flower at present, although there were a lot of Yellow Rush-lilies (*Tricoryne elatior*) flowering a few weeks ago in the damper areas. But, you have to be there at the right time of the day to see them – they are one of the species that only opens its flowers around midday. And the little suckering patches of Australian Mint (*Mentha diemenica*) are still bearing a few mauve flowers along the creekline. This year, the Twining Fringe-lily (*Thysanotus patersonii*), usually a frail and difficult to find little plant, put on a good display in places. I had four plants growing up through the *Kunzea ericoides* near the dam, covered in what looked like several hundred little mauve flowers.

The birds have been busy over the last month or two. The Grey Fantails that nested just beyond my lower fence reared two little chicks, and a pair of Red Wattle Birds built a nest high in a tree in my driveway which managed to survive the recent wind storm. Recently, they were carrying food to the nestlings. Leaden Flycatchers, Eastern Spinebills and a noisy pair of Kookaburras have all been seen with young ones. And the Wood Ducks raised a sizeable family of ducklings, even though they spent a lot of time crossing or resting on the road. The King Parrots were attracted to the heavy load of seed capsules on some Hopbushes (*Dodonaea* spp.) growing here, and spent several days feasting on the seed.

One very hot day recently, I was watering some large shrubs when a couple of little Silver-eyes flew in for a drink. I gave them a fine spray with the hose and they fluffed their feathers and had a shower as well as a drink. Then two more arrived. After about five minutes, I was giving a communal shower to a little flock of about ten of grateful-looking birds!

There are quite a few little Grass Skinks skittering around, but, on the whole, lizard numbers seem to be decreasing. I've only seen one Jacky Lizard here this summer, and the only large lizards around are the Cunningham's Skinks – and even they seem to be less numerous. It's possible that the increasingly hot summers are affecting the breeding or survival of insects and other arthropods that lizards feed on. Ants and termites still seem to be doing all right, but a lot of insects that were once common here are now much less evident. However, I did see one little lizard the other day that I hadn't set eyes on for a while – a little Red-throated Skink searching through the flower-pots in the shadehouse.

I wasn't expecting to see frogs very far away from the dam in this weather, but a small Peron's Tree Frog (*Litoria peronii*) visited a waterbowl near the house for a couple of days. And, when I was digging a large hole to accommodate a plant, I dug up an Eastern Pobblebonk or Banjo Frog (*Limnodynastes dumerilii*). These are quite large frogs and have the unfortunate habit of sheltering deep in compost heaps and sand piles where spades and forks are a constant danger. Fortunately, this one was unhurt and was returned to its hiding place – one of the lucky ones.



#### Roads, Rates and Rocket Science

As a retired civil engineer, I couldn't believe what I was reading about wet weather, and how it has affected our sealed road network (Q.P.R.C. news, Oct, 2016).

I did get a laugh out of the subsoil drainage issues, and then I remembered that residents are paying . Road engineering is not rocket science, although I sometimes try to get our grandchildren to believe otherwise.

Subsoil drainage can be an interesting challenge, but this certainly not the real reason behind most of the pavement distress we continue to witness around our region and elsewhere in NSW.

Given a slight hint of precipitation, out come the potholes, loss of shape, and pavement failures. Residents need look no further than Sutton Road, from Queanbeyan to Norton Road. (It is not part of the QPRC jurisdiction.) On this section we have experienced all of the above, and within months of project completion.

What is needed is a return to the old approach to project management, starting with the investigation phase. Water catchments and drainagge paths are part of this equation, along with presence of rock and subgrade evaluation. Having agreed on the "design storm" and drainage solution, we can then proceed with the pavement design. It will take into account this runoff, materials testing and construction quality control measures.

What we are seeing far too often theese days is loose stone "missiles" after sealing, along with shape loss, poor riding quality, bitumen flushing and potholes, often very soon after project completion, along with cost blow-outs.

Ratepayers would appreciate a return to the 'old days', when road projects were delivered on time, to quality and on budget. Any cost blowouts, potholes, loose stones and premature pavement distress in these bad old days would trash the reputation of the responsible engineers and jeapordise their careers. Times have changed.

#### **Wamboin Wanderings**

Living in a place like Wamboin allows us to get away from the city/work activities and appreciate our surroundings. Waking to the dawn chorus is a pleasure, with the magpies usually first, calling out to each other while it is barely light, and again this year, we have a black bird that serenades us for long periods. There are lots of other bird calls that add to the variety of sound, but the kookaburras are usually a bit later after the sun breaks the horizon.

I like to walk my dog when I have a day off or a late start for my Clinics, and on week days I ask my wife to drop us 3kms down the road. I take a couple of plastic bags to pick up litter thrown from cars as I like walking through this lovely countryside without the rubbish, which careless passers-by throw out to create an eyesore.

Over time, I have picked up tape measures, screw drivers, a chisel, a safety helmet, hats, gloves (usually single), "L" & "P" plates, reflection jackets and other clothing. The clothing I usually hang on the roadside posts to alert the hapless owner (or others) that this is lost & "up for grabs".

The nature of the rubbish as evolved over the years, with mostly take-a-way food, soft drink and water containers now. A steady background of grog containers persists, from the drink-drivers hoping not to be detected by throwing the evidence out. The long-necks are rare, but the stubbies & cans (including mixed drinks) remain a steady stream. Also there are a lot less of the cigarette packets now, as the smokers have either given up, are incapacitated, or have died out.

I wave to the drivers as they go to work, to wish them a good day. At first only about half waved back, but now I can count on the fingers of one hand those that don't, and many of the regulars (who are lucky enough to have full-time work) wave a greeting before I get even my hand up, or flash their headlights in greeting. (It is nice to live in such a friendly place.)

On the foggy, misty mornings, I am continually amazed at drivers who do not have their headlights on. Although with some of the 4WD you may think are large enough to be visible, they emerge from the fog suddenly, and surprisingly close without their lights on. Over a third and sometimes almost half the cars that pass me on foggy mornings, chance invisibility without their lights.

Speed is another concern as there is a lot of casualty carcasses on the roadside. When a roo crosses the road ahead, you need to slow down for his mate, who is often following along behind. Last week I found this sad picture of a double impact on Norton Rd.

At night the Roos will escape along the clear path they can see, usually the road that you illuminate in front of you. I've thought of approaching the smash repairers for a subsidy for the Roos we breed, for the business that we generate. There are so few of the larger old roos around in recent years.

The council has sprayed the road verges, but a lot of properties are still showing the yellow St John's Wart flowers. I've just completed my second spraying, and right now the flowers of the serrated

tussock make it easy to distinguish from the native tussock that holds the soil near the Yass River as it passes through my place. The Palerang weed inspectors provided me with good advice on spray types, identifying weeds, timing spraying (for best result, to beat the seeds, etc) so now, besides the perennial St John's Wart, I only have a few thistles, and no briar rose or Paterson's curse any more.

The spring rain had grass up to the top of the fences making the mowing a challenge this year. This fire hazard just had to be eliminated, so there was no choice. (I should have hired a slasher I think.)

We've only had one snake down by the dam this summer so along with the mown open areas near the houses, the lizards are still a good deterrent as the have bred up and keep the spiders down.

Summer increases my time at home as there is so much to do. The garden is so productive with the vegetables now, but my tomatoes are a bit late again this year - (none for Christmas again!).

I have established a small orchard area with a variety of trees, but this year instead of trying to net them individually, I am netting the whole area this Year. I will slide the bird netting on & off just covering the developing fruit, so unless we get an unusually heavy hail storm or unseasonal snow, it should work well. The birds have already beaten me to the young apples, apricots, nectarines, peaches, and pears, but I still have the quinces to go, and next year there will be a much more productive result.

I also want to plant some raspberry, boysenberry, and Blackberry canes on trellises inside the netting in a clearing near the rain tank.

Now as my New Year break draws to an end, work starts up again for the coming year, and although this means less time in the garden, it is always nice to come home at the end of the day. We are so lucky to live in this area where we can escape to the peace of the country.
