



Two rally days for March saw a great turnout of riders at Wamboin Pony Club. The weather is staying warm and we still have new members joining our club. We now have a great mix of riders of all ages and the newer members are all starting to get to know each other. During our past two rally days some time has been spent introducing the newer members of our club to the various mounted games that teams will compete in during our upcoming club event. Mounted games are games of skill played in teams that test both horse and riders abilities. One of the trickier games riders practiced this past rally day was the

balloon race. Riders and horse ride up to balloons secured on the ground carrying a stick that has a point on it. As they pass the balloons they have to pop one - this really tests both rider and horse because as you might expect some horses don't react well to the noise of a popping balloon. Our new Wamboin riders took it slow and steady and some horses were good and some not so great when that balloon was popped.... a bit more practice and riders will be ready for competition! April is here and it's going to be time to head to Zone 16 Camp at Bungendore Showground in the first week of the school holidays. 240 odd riders will spend a week doing some intensive riding and learning new skills, reports in the next Whisper. So remember your local Wamboin Pony Club has horse riders aged from 5 – 25 and we have a group of dedicated and experienced instructors. Wamboin - Bywong Market Update October - December 2016

Introduction

This report has been compiled using data sourced from allhomes.com.au and EAC redsquare.com.au which link into NSW Land and Property Information Services. The analysis and report has been prepared by Daniel Gilbert, a licensed NSW real estate agent who holds a Bachelor of Commerce from the ANU, with combined majors in mathematics & statistics. He is a current working principal of Gilbert Real Estate and has over 20 years hands on experience.

Scope Of The Report

Our previously prepared Wamboin – Bywong market report summarised the entire 2016 calendar year sales activity. This data was then compared with activity over the 2014 & 2015 calendar years to identify market trends and movements over the 3 year period. The report showed a definite upward shift in market values over the three year period, with an average sale price for the 2016 year of \$980,000.


This report (and future reports) will analyse market activity on a quarterly basis, which will provide more timely information to identify movements and trends in the market. This report covers sales activity over the October – December 2016 quarter (DEC Qtr).

Analysis

Sales activity over the DEC Qtr consisted of 10 sales. Sale prices ranged from \$850,000 - \$1,310,000, with the average sales price just over 1 million dollars (\$1,005,000).

The following bar chart shows the spread and number of sales within each price sector. We can see that 6 of the 10 sales (60%) were under \$1M, whilst the remaining 40% were over \$1M. This is fairly consistent with the annual 2016 figures of 65% of sales under 1\$M, and 35% over \$1M, and if anything, shows a very minor increase in sale prices toward the end of the year.

This increase may just due to minor fluctuations and the small population size, so a more accurate picture of market performance and trends will emerge over the coming quarters.



What is interesting to note, is that in 2014, just 14% of sales were over \$1M, in 2015 this figure had jumped to 22%, then reached 35% in 2016.

Summary

2016 has shown to be a strong market for the region, backed by a very strong Canberra market, favorable economic conditions, continuation of record low interest rates and lifestyle benefits. The start to 2017 has seen continued strong enquiry, with several properties in the region under offer in the past few weeks. This trend looks like it will continue as we head into Autumn 2017.



Wamboin Community Association (WCA) General Meeting - Summary

Date of Meeting: Tuesday 21 March 2017 Meeting Chaired by: Peter Evans, Acting President, WCA The March meeting of the WCA highlighted the many activities and projects being undertaken by the WCA Committee, the broader WCA membership and other community-based groups active in Wamboin. All these people volunteer their time and skills to improve the facilities and services available to the entire community with a view to enhancing community spirit and every resident's enjoyment of our rural-residential lifestyle.

General outline of topics discussed:

- Attendees heard brief reports from members of the WCA Committee including Acting President and Vice President Peter Evans who reminded attendees that the WCA's Annual General Meeting (AGM) is 18th April. Nominations for Committee positions from WCA members of at least one year's standing need to be received by the Secretary 7 days before the AGM. Later in the meeting Peter confirmed all is on track for the annual Wheels of Wamboin event on Saturday May 18th from 9am-1pm. Additionally, as a member of the Council's s.355 Greenways Committee, he reported on the current Master Planning exercise with the objective of ensuring opportunities for Greenway connections and expansion are available to the community in future via local planning instruments.
- Secretary David McDonald confirmed that scheduled maintenance of the Wamboin Hall's defibrillator was underway. Among other correspondence, a \$1000 donation had been sent to the Carwoola Community Association President to support that community's fire recovery. Assistant Secretary Jenny Warren said that Wildcare snake handler Wayne Alford would be guest speaker at the September Spring Talk with invitations to speakers for October and November underway, and she explained the plans for the installation of audio/visual equipment in the Hall, a new capability funded by Council's Stronger Communities Fund.
- Treasurer Keith France presented the WCA's Annual Statement noting the sound financial position of the Association. He specifically acknowledged the contribution of the Wamboin Whisper's advertising revenue.
- Editor of the Whisper Ned Noel thanked everyone who had taken the time to write something for or deliver the Whisper, acknowledging the time and effort such contributors invest to make the Whisper interesting and available to all local residents.
- Committee member and co-convenor of the Wamboin Home Produce Market, Lance Schultz reported that the March market saw a full complement of 21 stallholders including a number of young residents on a range of fund raising stalls. Customer numbers were up and everyone enjoyed the music provided by local group Poetry in Motion.

A number of WCA members are also long-term members and volunteers of multiple local community groups, for example:

- Lofty Mason:
- Wearing his WCA member hat, Lofty reported that Clean-Up Australia Day had successfully removed 2.5 x 1 tonne ute loads of rubbish from our roads, though he said that the volunteer turnout from Wamboin this year was disappointing.
- As a member of the Wamboin Hall s.355 Committee, Lofty reported that new carpeting had been installed at both Hall entrances and that the recovering of the stage was well underway.
- Peter Greenwood:
- As Wamboin Rural Fire Brigade President, Peter was pleased to report no fires or call outs of any kind since the last meeting, until a two vehicle crash earlier today on Macs Reef Road. The Brigade received two Thank You letters from the owners of properties protected by the Wamboin Brigade during the recent Carwoola fire.
- As a Golfer, Peter asked for confirmation that the WCA would be the sponsor of the Mini Masters event in April, and this request was confirmed by WCA Acting President, Peter Evans.

The 2017 Clean Up Day resulted in 32 volunteers cleaning up 48K of Wamboin roadsides. Of these volunteers, eleven were from the Joe Rocks/Mountain Road Group. That means only 21 volunteers (6 who operated on the previous Friday and Saturday) were from the rest of Wamboin, which is a bit disappointing. All rubbish was taken to Council's Bungendore transfer station. We thank Council for providing free tip facilities. Council loaned 4 signs and 10 hi-viz jackets and also provided funds for drinks, nibbles and sunscreen.

We collected: a considerable number of car parts and tyres; many blocks of package Styrofoam; some old fencing and chairs. Other than these, the normal bottles, cans, food wraps and general waste made up the 3 one-tonner loads. The final result was less than half of Wamboin roads were cleared. Looking to next year, if we get together as a community, maybe we can clean up all the local roadways and make Wamboin a place we are proud to live in. Lofty Mason. (Wamboin CUA Coordinator)

2017 celebrates 75 years of the Jeep. The first prototype military Jeep was actually developed by Bantam, pictured at right. Designed in 18 hours by Karl Probst, a freelance auto designer from Detroit, the 1,840-pound Bantam exceeded the Army's expectations during initial testing in September 1940. The War Department, however, had concerns about Bantam's ability to meet the military's production volumes and invited Willys-Overland and Ford to bid on the reconnaissance vehicle contract, this time using Probst's design as a guidepost and allowing engineers from the two automakers to inspect and measure the Bantam. Each automaker crafted a slightly different version with different advantages. The contract was eventually awarded to Willys-



Overland. A second production contract for the same design later was awarded to Ford to meet demand. More than 637,000 Jeeps were built by Willys and Ford during World War II, while poor old Bantam was awarded a contract to build quarter-ton trailers that were pulled behind the Jeep.

A vehicle forged in the needs of war that grew into one of the world's most recognized brands, automotive or otherwise. The single-piece, stamped slotted grille with round headlights that Jeep also uses as a logo. On a cold still night you can hear the voices of those poor deluded Jeep owners yell across the Wamboin valleys "I bought a jeep". — Peter Evans

According to the RFS and the Bureau of Meterology:

- The drier than average outlooks are likely a result of forecast higher than normal pressure across western and southern Australia, meaning fewer rain-bearing systems are likely to cross the coast.

This closure does *not* apply to the areas known as Sparrow Hill, Orchard Block or the car park recreation area at the bottom of Molonglo Gorge. The forest will be closed for a non-competitive motorcycling event - the DSMRA's Kowen Forest Ride 2017. This ride is organised as an annual membership drive for our association. The clergy and congregations are very pleased to welcome Yvonne Barrett as our new lay minister, and Dr David McCarthy in his continuing lay minister role.



Wildcare's Albino Brushtail

Almost everyone can recognise a brushtail possum, all bright eyes, bushy black tail and little pink nose. They are among Australia's most attractive and adaptable animals and are found the length and breadth of the continent, save in the arid interior.

Would you recognise the animal in the accompanying (colour) photo, as a brushtail? Most people would think him a new species or an albino brushtail, but he is your genuine neighbourhood brushtail who thumps over your roof at night and breathes so loudly and lasciviously he could be the caller Telstra warns you against and advises immediate hanging up. He just happens to be a golden version of the brushtail you see after dark. His lovely colour (which ranges from gold cream to bronze gold) is the result of a genetic mutation occasionally seen south of Sydney (never north) and most commonly in Tasmania. It is not a case of albinism, which is caused by a lack of pigmentation. These brushtails do not have the identifying red eyes

and limited sight of the albino. They have the same bright blackberry eyes and pink noses as their grey brothers. They reproduce annually and their offspring may or may not carry the golden gene. In the Southern Tablelands and on The Monaro there have been random sightings of golden brushtails. Wildcare actually had the pleasure of rehabilitating a handsome young golden male in 2016. The gene therefore exists in the local population so, should you see a grey mother carrying a golden back-baby, you need not worry.

He is a perfectly healthy youngster who will grow to live a normal brushtail life. He will sleep in a tree hollow all day and dine on moths (like all possums, he luuurves bogongs), bottlebrushes, all varieties of wattle, correa, lillipilli, hakea and every kind of flowering eucalypt, as well as the new tips of all of gums, every evening. Sadly, his very obvious golden colour makes him more susceptible to predators, so his life is generally shorter than that of the usual grey brushtail. However, we can minimise the risk to this beautiful animal by keeping cats indoors at night, locking in our chooks to deter roaming foxes and ensuring our dogs are leashed to kennels overnight.



To make your property possum friendly, put a possum box in a tree near your house, plant lots of flowering native plants and accept that a certain percentage of your figs, stone fruits, apples and pears are a small price to pay for the pleasure of watching possums play in the evening. You might even be lucky enough to see a mother with a golden baby! Contact Wildcare 0n 6299 1966 for any wildlife help and advice.



Nature Notes March 2017 Jo Walker

After some good falls of rain this month and with temperature still quite high, the grasses have grown quickly and the landscape is beautifully green again.

A few plants are still flowering. Some of the Hickory Wattles (*Acacia implexa*) are still bearing clusters of scented cream flowers. *Cassinia quinquefaria* continues its long flowering season, its greenish yellow flowers giving off a slight honey perfume. The white-flowered Hoary Sunrays (*Leucochrysum albicans*) along Norton Road are producing a second flush of flowers. And the Narrow-leaved New Holland Daisies (*Vittadinia muelleri*) and the Woolly New Holland Daisies (*V. gracilis*) are quite showy this year, bearing a multitude of tiny bright blue flowers. Crimson Rosellas seem to find the seeds of the New Holland Daisies tasty and can often be seen plucking away at the fluffy seed-heads.

Earlier in the year, I found some orchid leaves amongst the scrubby *Kunzea ericoides* shrubs above the dam. They were almost certainly the precursors to the seven Parson's Bands Orchids (*Eriochilus cucullatus*) now flowering there. By the time these dainty little orchids are bearing flowers, their ground-hugging leaves have withered away and disappeared. So far this year, I haven't seen one Little Dumpy Orchid (*Diplodium truncatum*), a species that usually flowers about this time.

There didn't seem to be many butterflies around this summer – or, at least, not a great range of species. Most commonly seen here were Common Browns (*Heteronympha merope*) and Admiral Butterflies ((*Vanessa itea*) with a few Painted Ladies (*V. kershawi*) – although, earlier this month, there were a few of the more spectacular Orchard Swallowtails (*Papilio aegeus*) gliding around. These appear as large black butterflies but have white markings on the upper side of their wings, the female's white patches more extensive than the male's. The larvae prefer citrus plants as food.

It seems a bit quieter here now that the Dusky Woodswallows have taken off to somewhere warmer for the winter months. For a week or two earlier in the month, they were collecting here before starting their migration and calling to each other constantly, a rolling, gently musical sound. Some were flying around and others were perched, huddled together, in long groups along the branches of trees at the top of the hill.

I can't help myself. When I came home the first thing I did was visit the garden. The bushes looked unchanged. A mystery! Then I discovered a half eaten tomato with the first signs of blush, on the ground, and tell tale tunnels between fence and netting. Possums!!

Don't get me wrong, I like possums. One gave me the origin of the old saying, "playing possum" by lying comatose in a bush just off the back steps. It had fallen, dead, from an overhanging tree during the night. We watched its contorted little body all day. There was no movement, not even a twitch; poor little dead creature.

Then, as the light faded it suddenly shook itself back to life, and shot off. It had been playing possum. Doubtless he was the grand daddy of all the thieving critters that have raided my tomato bushes this season!

While I can accept nocturnal possums grunting, groaning and cavorting on the verandah outside my bedroom window, accept their high spirited sport as they roll down the sloping roof, and even their appreciation of my hard won strawberries and cape gooseberries, I have a sense of humour failure when it comes to self sown tomatoes. They were a gift, with all the promise of coming into "mellow fruitfulness." Now there is not even enough for green tomato chutney!
