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
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#### Wamboin Community Association Acting President's Paragraphs

**Playground Project:** Our last meeting included a detailed progress report from Merle and Debbie Sibbick (QPRC), who is generally overseeing the project and ensuring that this new community facility meets all the relevant Council requirements.

A casual visit to the hall will reveal extensive new steps and paving and the excavated area (filled with some sand) where the play equipment will be set up. There is clearly more to be done and a working bee/workshop devoted to the planting and care of the new trees is planned for Saturday 15 July starting at 1.00 pm, and participants are asked to bring a shovel and any other implements necessary for hole digging. A professional horticulturist will be present to demonstrate the correct methods for planting trees and also acceptable pruning techniques. All the play equipment items should be installed by end of October and the project should be completed by the end of November. Another working bee will be organised for some time in that month.


The cost of construction and installation has been a fair shock to many of us who would have happily knocked up something in timber for a fraction of the cost. However, while such an approach is fine for your own backyard, these days it is not acceptable for a Council facility which must meet minimum safety standards.

Nevertheless our intrepid playground campaigner has obtained grant funds and donations from a variety of sources, to the extent that the bulk of the project has been paid for with only limited pressure on the Association's meagre finances.

The final result will be more than just a playground and will considerably enhance the appearance and useability of the whole hall facility. A Grand Opening is planned for December and this event will likely be combined with the traditional BCA Xmas Drinks function, with representatives from the various playground sponsoring organisations invited to attend. **Tea Towels Update:** The Bungendore and Braidwood tea towels are available at Food Lovers in Bungendore and at the regular weekend market. # Country Park

For our horses that are a bit stiff with their movements when the weather turns chilly there are a few approaches you can take to help them.

Traditionally herbs rich in minerals and vitamins that provide nutrients that are needed for joint repair along with diuretic actions to help remove excess metabolic wastes are chosen, such as nettle, dandelion, celery seed and parsley. However you may want to look at a general tonic to improve the blood flow in the tissues surrounding the arthritic joints so the muscles are more flexible. Such herbs might include yarrow, hawthorn, rosemary and ginkgo.

#### Wildcare Goes Batty

Did you know that bats are the only mammals capable of sustained flight? We don't often hear about bats needing help, but Wildcare rescues and rehabilitates several each year. During the colder months you might come across tiny bats – microbats – taking shelter inside some of your outdoor belongings. Throughout the year they move around to different roosts, depending on mating and raising their young, food sources, predators and migration patterns. Over winter, bats go into a state of 'torpor', which is a kind of semi-hibernation. This enables them to conserve energy during the cold season when their main food source (insects) is scarce. While in torpor, bats can appear almost lifeless, as their breathing and heart rate is lowered.

There are many species of microbats in our region, with such delightful names as the 'chocolate wattled' bat, 'little bent-winged' bat and the 'white-striped free-tailed' bat. They range in size from just a few grams to larger ones (40 gms), but they are all very small! (The larger megabats of our region include the 'grey-headed flying fox' and the 'little red flying fox'



species.)

The types of unusual places that microbats have been found by people reporting them to Wildcare include: in firewood, umbrellas, outdoor furniture, Driza-Bones and up the exhaust pipe of a horse truck. Anywhere dark and dry, that appeals to them and might provide long-term shelter through winter!

If bats are seen together in clusters, and you are able to leave them where they've chosen to settle, they can stay until spring (Oct/Nov), when they will depart. But ensure that they are safe from dangers, such as cats, otherwise they will need to be relocated to a safe place and, for this, you should contact Wildcare. However, if you do find one on its own, or a few together, they could be in trouble and need to be checked out and rescued by a vaccinated Wildcare member (or other relevant wildlife handler). Any microbat disturbed from its roost during winter, and therefore out of torpor, needs to be taken into care. Otherwise it will probably starve.


If you find a lone microbat, or a few together, and have concerns, please call Wildcare on 62991966. Don't encourage a bat to fly off, as it will need to assessed and come into care. Please also be aware of checking any netting over trees, as like birds and other wildlife (lizards, possums), bats can also get caught up in it.

Bats can carry a rabies-like disease called Lyssavirus, which is transmitted through a bite or scratch. It is unlikely that they will be carrying the virus, but they shouldn't be handled by anyone who is not vaccinated. Members of Wildcare and other wildlife rescue groups who are vaccinated have been specially trained in rescuing and caring for bats.

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#### Local Runners Present \$5,000 Donation to Wamboin Rural Fire Brigade

On Friday 23 June, organisers of the Kowen Trail Run, Jessica Robson, Peter Komidar and Pam Muston, presented the Wamboin Rural Fire Brigade with a donation of \$5,000. The donation was the proceeds of the Kowen Trail Run, held the previous weekend at the Wamboin Community Hall, in conjunction with the Wamboin Home Produce Market.

The race was a huge success. We got over 260 competitors, including Olympian Shaun Creighton. As a not-for-profit event, we decided that all proceeds over and above the cost of holding the race should go to the Wamboin Rural Fire Brigade in recognition of their dedication to the protection of life and property in the region.

The race will be back again next year. We want to make this race a key fixture on the national running calendar. In addition, we hope to hold smaller low-key races throughout the year. All races will be held in conjunction with the Wamboin Home Produce Market and the profits from these events will be returned to the local community.

For most of the runners that participated in the race, it was their first trail run in Kowen Forest and their first experience of the Wamboin Home Produce Market. From the comments we've received, it seems that they were overwhelmingly impressed by both.

In accepting the cheque on behalf of the Wamboin Rural Fire Brigade, Peter Greenwood said he was astonished by the size of the donation and the generosity of the running community. He stated that the funds will be directed towards the purchase of important thermal imaging equipment that will be able to detect fires blazing below ground level. These fires, which cannot be detected by the naked eye, are often responsible for the re-ignition of fires thought to have been extinguished.

To enable hundreds of walkers and runners, about as many other people put in marathons of their own preparing and staffing the markets, directing parking, a perfect sound system, and doutbless other work few of us saw, but benefitted by.

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#### Nature Notes June 2017

We've finally had a few noticeable white frosts to greet us in the mornings. And, on the cooler days, the frost lingers under the shade of trees well into the day. When I walked past the dam this morning at eleven o'clock, it was still covered in thick ice patterned with angular markings.

Rain is a different matter – just a few stray drops this month. My dam is well down, only about half full now. But, there are obviously a few Yabbies and other tasty items there, as a White-faced Heron, a Little Pied Cormorant and several Pacific Black Ducks have been in or near the dam in recent weeks.

Not much is flowering at present, but in a few places the prickly Early Wattle (*Acacia genistifolia*) is displaying clouds of cream flowers. Guinea Flowers (*Hibbertia obtusifolia*) are bearing a few bright golden flowers too. And, one of the heath plants, *Monotoca scoparia* is covered in tiny cream flowers – but this species is not very common in this area and the flowers tend to blend into the background so it's not often noticed.

The lizards all seem to have found shelter for the winter by now, but one little Grass Skink was sunning itself in the garden last week.

The Wombat, whose presence had only been indicated by droppings for some months, made an appearance twice recently. One late afternoon, it spent an hour grazing some green grass just down from the house - and, a few days later, it trundled down the hill towards another feeding spot. The Possums, both Brush-tailed and Ring-tailed, are still visiting judging by the droppings under some large trees near the house. And an Echidna has been rummaging in the Meat Ants' nests – I saw a large one tucked into a hollow tree stump last week.

Up at the top of the hill here, a large Red Stringybark tree (Eucalyptus macrorhyncha) has had a large patch of bark removed down to the cambial layer, quite a feat with such tough bark. Similar markings a few years ago were identified as being made by a Yellow-bellied Glider, although they had a more triangular shape than these. Wamboin is full of surprises and interesting creatures – which we should do our best to protect and preserve.

#### **Burning Off**

You can now burn off and reduce the fuel levels on your property without a permit. However, whilst you no longer need a permit from the Captain you still need to call Fire Control, Queanbeyan on 6297 1840 during business hours to advise them you are lighting a fire. You will also need to tell your neighbours about the fire. A simple note in your neighbours' letterboxes should suffice. If you are calling Queanbeyan on a Friday make sure the call is before 12.00 noon.

Advising your neighbours and Fire Control will lessen the chance of a big red truck coming down your driveway because some one reported smoke in the area.

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
#### The Wonderful Women of Wamboin Gail Ritchie Knight

1980 cult classic *The Blues Brothers* was the Wamboin Community Association's (WCA's) choice for the first Community Movie Night at the Wamboin Hall on Saturday 24 June, showcasing the new audio visual equipment.

Local Jakes and Elwoods arrived in their hats and sunglasses. Their support teams brought bean bags and movie snacks. All enjoyed the movie, dancing and post-movie music.

The event was made possible thanks to new audiovisual equipment paid for by a grant under the NSW Government's 2016 Stronger Communities Fund Program via the Queanbeyan-Palerang Regional Council Community Grants program.

In applying for the grant, the WCA felt that making this modern technology available would allow a

broader range of events to be staged at the Wamboin Hall, with a broader appeal across all age groups and would enable a more vibrant, sustainable and inclusive local community.

Before this equipment was installed, events at the Wamboin Hall were conducted without any AV aids, or guest speakers had to bring their own, or events were simply held outside the area.

The new installation will enhance the format of community events such as the WCA's Bonfire & Fireworks Night (this year 23/9/17) and Christmas Carols (this year 15/12/17), Meet the Candidates events, and other community events.

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#### Wamboin Community Association Inc. (WCA) General Meeting - Summary

Date of Meeting: 20 June 2017 Meeting chaired by: Jenny Richards, Vice President, WCA



#### **Community Halls**

The following is written by Lofty Mason to explain the management of Community Halls.

When a new area is planned the developer has to reserve areas for community activities and also to donate money to Council for future development of buildings, such as a Hall, on that area. In Wamboin one of those areas was the allotment on Bingley Way where the Hall and Fire Shed are located.

In 1983 Council granted the WCA \$1000 to purchase a water tank, toilets and a septic tank. Later that year the Council granted a further \$12,000 towards a Hall. Fortunately a lot of residents provided labour so that by July 1984 we had built a basic Hall, a concrete floor and veranda that was enclosed both ends to form a kitchen and a storeroom. We had also set up a water tank, shed toilets and a septic system. Continued money raising efforts by the Community, plus generous donations from residents, enabled us to put in wall lining, heating, a ceiling and to fit out the kitchen with second hand fittings and white goods.

After completing this we were initially surprised to find that the Hall was now the property of the Council. However, when you think about it, the Hall is on Council land and the Council is the obvious owner. The Council requested that members of the Wamboin Community form a Hall Management Committee (responsible to Council) to manage the Hall and the Reserve. The Hall has to be on a stand alone/user pays basis.

The Wamboin Hall Management Committee (WHMC) hires out the Hall to users and the money from this hire pays for the electricity, cleaning, repairs, repainting, upgrades etc. Peter Greenwood is the present Convenor of the WHMC. Deb Gordon is the Secretary; Joan Mason is the Treasurer and Hire Representative. Don Evans, Pete Harrison, Keith France, Ken Gordon, Tim Barter, Trent Abell and self are on the WHMC as the body of tradesmen and willing workers.

Major additions to the original Hall, organised and built by the WHMC with assistance from other volunteers, are the concrete block toilets, the large meeting room, the wood fired heater, the enlarged and modernised kitchen, and the re-roofing of the toilet block. In the grounds we also managed the forming of the oval and excavated the dam. We have received some grants for these works however you can appreciate the value of volunteer labour when you realise we were quoted \$20,760 just to have the roofing framework of the toilet block supplied and erected by an engineering company. Using volunteer labour we pulled down the old roofing, strengthened the walls, erected the framework, resecured the partitions, clad the roof and ceiling, fitted lighting and trim, and finally painted the walls and floor for a total outlay of \$9,269.

Other expenses to consider: so far this year, upgrades/repairs \$1200. The average annual cost for Electricity and Cleaning is \$2,600 added to this the cost of biennial painting. The Council will not pay for these general running expenses or for the replacement of chairs and tables. All money for running the Hall must be recovered from the hire of the Hall. From my point of view, the WHMC is doing a pretty good community service.



#### **Things that Happened**

Tagasaste, Tree Lucerne, High Production Fodder Crop. By Laurence C. Snook. Publisher Night Owl. 1986. This is the title of small book which I bought in 1988. The price then was \$7.95.

When my late husband and I moved here(Wamboin) neither of us had owned country land before. Our knowledge and experience was very slim. Neither having farmed before!

We enrolled in appropriate courses then available at the TAFE in Woden. So began our discovery and a steep learning curve for approximately four years. My husband particularly wanted some Merino sheep, so 40 Merino wethers were selected and we kept them for approximately three years. I had enrolled in a course of horticulture which I eventually completed. Finding the drought and quite harsh winters a challenge I eventually abandoned the idea of having my own nursery. However during those four years we did learn enough not to damage our place too much! We did have a small bush fire I think it was on one of the long week ends enjoyed by Canberrans. We of course had used the weekend to plant tree seedlings and hand-watered them all.

Our neighbours at that time had hired a young man to help with some of their heavier work. He borrowed some sort of tool from my husband. In using it he created sparks which ran under his caravan and the grass caught fire.

At this time we had no phone or house, just a garage, from its roof we had connected a small water tank which hadn't even had time to fill! As soon as we realised what was happening, my husband went to try and put it out with the hired man! I jumped in the car and drove to the road to try and find a neighbour with a phone! (pre mobiles!)

The brigade seemed to take a while to arrive, but they did stop the fire spreading off our land! However we lost all the baby trees we planted that weekend. The Fire captain then was Mr Reardon. He scolded us for using the cutter machine. He didn't listen when we tried to explain it wasn't us. The guy who had used it had by then disappeared! However we were very grateful to Mr Reardon because the following weekend he turned up again with a full tank of water which he then proceeded to pour it all down an old hollow tree which I was sure was about to die, but is still upright with us now.

So we learned early about fire in the country, never forgetting his advice. We started researching via the National Library for trees that had fire resistant properties. I think it was my husband who located my book Tagasaste.

I really don't remember where I tracked down that first brown envelope of seeds, It probably weighed.1/2lb. I think it was somewhere in Orange, NSW. I sowed the first seeds in trays and then transplanted them to tubes, eventually planting them along some of our fence lines.

They did not have a double fence line for protection as by then other priorities claimed any spare cash. My tree lines are all still flourishing, they drop their small seeds after the white flowers die, which by the way are popular with bees.

Just found my Tagasaste book and have re-read the 100 pages. "Fire Resistance". P.Wilson, S.A. page p.46.reports that in 1972 serious bushfire on Kangaroo Island which had defied the efforts of a large group of fully equipped fire fighters, was halted by a Tagasaste hedge around a home which had been abandoned as beyond hope. The leaves of Tagasaste are free from the oils and resins which make green eucalypts, native shrubs and pines so inflammable when heated. because of this Tagasaste hedges resist burning.

There is an Ag FACT available on line. and one or two 2nd hand copies of my small book. Seed seems to be available from various sources.

School holidays, and with it the arrival of two lively little lads from the north; let the games begin!

As a working mother school holidays used to mean a longed for chance to break the daily grind, forget routines and the ticking clock and take a slow deep breath, look outside, dream a little and let the day be ruled only by your stomach. Nothing really changes. Today the lively lads are enjoying those simple things in a Wamboin way, feeding the chooks and collecting their eggs, stacking the wheelbarrow with kindling for the fire, shattering ice on the water troughs, building cubbies, propelling vintage bikes across rocky trails, and weaving stories as they slowly thread their way through the bush, ever alert for gold nuggets and relics from the past! Freezing hands in the morning, dripping noses, rosy cheeks and good appetites, engaged with the outdoors, fascinated, less fearful and with growing respect for the natural world.

With this in mind we decided to build a camp fire and grill sausages and corn for lunch. First we chose a cleared site, checked wind direction and made a fire place with scavenged bricks. We were being good boy scouts. We found an old sewer grate, very heavy and of uncertain provenance, for the grill, and then set off to find firewood. Rubbing two sticks together to create our fire was considered but matches seemed a better option especially with rumbling stomachs. And so we had "the best lunch ever" garnished with a little grit and ash...and a medicinal tipple for the grandparents. Just before we turned into ice blocks in the thin sunshine, we called it a day, quenched the fire and hailed the day as a success. The boys hadn't had a real camp fire before and now they were a little more aware of the vagaries of fire.

The next morning I was up early to light the fire. It was minus 4 on the back verandah, a good frost, and an even better frost for the truffle farmers who'd been plagued for weeks by dripping fogs. I cleaned out some ash from the fire box, noticing a couple of embers in it, added it to the ash already in the metal bucket and left it on the brick path, just to be safe. Then I put a bunch of dried lavender spikes in with the kindling, lit it, and savoured the fragrance of a warm summer. All was good with the world.

We were sitting, chatting after a leisurely breakfast when the liveliest lad exclaimed, "There's a lot of smoke outside!" And there was. Some innocent, helpful hand had emptied the ash bucket onto the composting heap of fallen leaves and dry cuttings and those tiny embers had been fanned by a whispering breeze into life. It could have been a disaster, but swift action soon had it under control. Nevertheless it fired up the adrenalin! We had wanted the boys from the suburbs to become aware of the dangers of fire, but perhaps we went overboard trying to press home our point. The boy scouts' campfire seemed very tame after that.

I wouldn't live anywhere else....and Wamboin is still their top school holiday destination.....but it was a salutary experience for all of us.....
